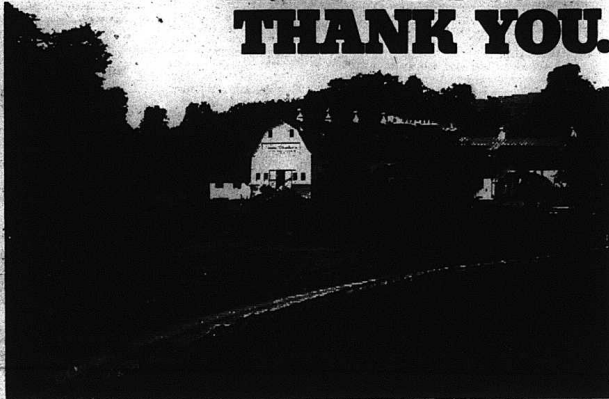

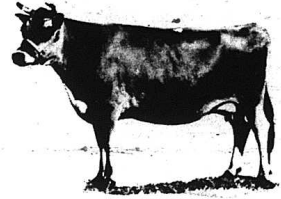
DAIRY MONTH IS A NATURAL TIME TO SAY THANK YOU.

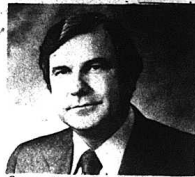

July 7 Will Be A Big Day for Rockcastle County, Judge Thacker Says

"The biggest day in the history of Rockcastle County" is what Judge Hubert Thacker is calling July 7, 1978.

On that day, dedications ceremonies will be held for the Rockcastle County Multi-County Industrial Park and the

new addition to the Rockcastle County Hospital, both in Mt. Vernon.

Senator Walter "Dee" Huddleston, Rep. Tim Lee Carter and Terry McBrayer, State Commissioner of Commerce, will be giving speeches that day at the two ground-breakings. In between ceremonies, a luncheon for about 150 invited guests will be held at the Rockcastle County High School. Mr. McBrayer will keynote the speeches at 10:30 a.m. at the dedication of the industrial park. Sen. Huddleston will speak at the luncheon. Rep. Carter will lead the hospital dedication at 1:30 p.m. Bill James, of the Bank of Mt. Vernon, said newspapers and television stations from Lexington, will be covering the event, and two full tables of reporters will be set at the luncheon. A public relations representative from the state of Kentucky in Frankfort, Pat Karen, is in charge of publicity.

The Industrial Park has been in the planning stages for over a year, and it will involve over a million dollars in construction, land and engineering costs before its completion, according to Mr. James. Planners hope to attract six medium-size manufacturing firms to the 89 1/2 acre site, located one mile from the City of Mt. Vernon. Selling points of the area are its access: to the railroad and major highways; through a planned access road to be built later this year with money from the state government.

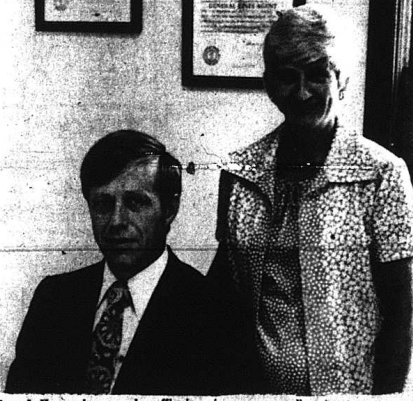
The new factories will provide jobs to people in Rockcastle County, where unemployment levels are higher than the national level. Rockcastle County Hospital is planning to more than double its size this year in a \$1.5 million construction project financed entirely through a mortgage from the Farmers Home Administration, according to Luke Dober, executive director of the hospital. 'Groovy' Highway To Be Resurfaced

That grooved pavement on I-75 has not proved to be the "groovy" road it was expected to be. The road is being resurfaced by the State Department of Transportation at a cost of \$1,029,987.45. The project should be completed in November, according to John Sturgill, District Engineer. Mr. Sturgill said the grooves were an experiment. "The heavy truck travel over the road had caused ripples," he explained, "making the road rough and dangerous. So we had to plane it down to get rid of the ripples." After the road had been flattened and melted down, the grooves were put in an experiment. "We thought the surface would be satisfactory and provide better traction," he said. He said the 14 mile stretch near Mt. Vernon was chosen for the experiment last September because of the heavy amount of traffic it carries. Apparently, the grooves provided less traction because the Department of Transportation received several complaints. The Department let out bids for resurfacing, and the Allen Company of Winchester was awarded the contract. "One ride over that road myself, and I thought it was a satisfactory surface," Mr. Sturgill said, "but I guess other people felt differently."

Gem Coal Pays Fine For State Violations

Ky. Gem coal co. of Barbourville has paid the state a \$2,000 civil penalty and agreed to perform corrective measures on its strip mine site near Mt. Vernon in Rockcastle County following an informal conference with the state Department for Natural Resources and Environmental Protection. A reclamation inspector with the department's Bureau of Surface Mining Reclamation and Enforcement had issued two notices of non-compliance with state regulations to the company for failing to provide adequate silt control. The company has agreed to provide adequate silt control, and reclaim the area to the satisfaction of the department. If there is to be any further mining, the company has agreed to first submit a revised method of operation to the department for approval.

Covington Men Held On Kidnapping Charge

Two men from Covington, Ky. are being held in Rockcastle Co. Jail on charges of kidnaping and public intoxication. Judge Walter McGuire set bond at \$25,000 on the kidnaping charge, and \$500 each on the misdemeanor. The men are James E. Gross, 29, and James G. Granger, 24, and they will be held pending action from the Grand Jury, which meets July 17. State Trooper Jack Lawless said he arrested the two men on the drunkenness charge, but later two young women from the Lighthouse Home for Runaways in Clifton, Ohio swore out warrants against them for kidnaping. The girls claimed the men forced them to travel by car.

Burside, Ky. were hired to make a detailed study of this area and its need for better wastewater treatment. The study is 168 pages long, and analyzes the population trends to 1995, and the current treatment of waste. The study then explains eight alternative plans one could be chosen to remove raw wastewater and also ways to finance the project.

Last March, the City Council voted that "Alternative 8" would be best for the city. The Council used seven standards to judge the alternative. In order of their importance to the Council, these standards are cost, implementation, water quality, environmental effect, reliability, land use, and energy consumption.

Social Workers to Lead 'Town Meeting' About Community's Problems Thursday

Five people who should know will be giving talks this Thursday night at the Bank of Mt. Vernon on problems that concern the community the most. After each 10-minute presentation, the audience will be given the opportunity to respond in a Forum for Community Concerns, sponsored by the Cumberland River Comprehensive Care Center (CRCCC).

According to the study submitted by engineers Richard Moore and Jack Crawford, Mt. Vernon today has but one plant operating at 200,000 gallons per day and 14 temporary plants. When the weather is wet, this current system is put under a strain.

The "new plant will require at 915,000 gallons a day, operating two fulltime employees. It will cost residents about \$7.00 a month. Estimated cost of building the project is \$5,966,786, of which 75% could possibly come from the federal government.

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After talking with many social workers, police officers, ministers, and others, Mr. Keaton said that five areas seemed to concern them in particular, and these will be the areas of discussion Thursday. 1. Drug Abuse: Mattie Robinson, a team leader at Manchester office of the CRCC, will educate about drug abuse, will speak on this topic. 2. It was designed on a five-year growth scale and built to fill all the customer orders for upgrades," he said. At the present time, contract workers from the B. E. Make Deer Hunting Reservations by July 10

Applications for deer hunting reservations on the Ballard County Wildlife Management Area in far western Kentucky will be accepted July 1 through July 10, according to Joe Bruna, director of game management for the state fish and wildlife department.

Applications received before or after those dates will be discarded, Bruna said, as will duplicate applications.

Each application must be mailed to the manager, Ballard Co. Wildlife Mgt. Area, Rt. 1, LaCenter, Ky. 42056 and must have the word "archery" or "gun" written in the lower left-hand corner of the envelope. Also, each letter must include a \$10 fee (certified or cashiers check or money order) for each applicant and must include a self-addressed, stamped envelope. Letters of application are limited to no more than three hunters, and must include the name, address, age, telephone number, hunting license number, method of hunting (gun or archery) and 1st, 2nd, and 3rd choice of hunting dates.

Dates for deer hunting on the Ballard area are: archery, Oct. 15-16; gun, Oct. 20, 21, 22 and 23 and Oct. 27, 28 and 29. Only antlerless deer may be taken and all deer taken on the area will be "bonus" deer and will not count against the regular statewide deer archery or gun season's limits. However,

each hunter must have a valid Kentucky deer permit, although it will not be used on the area except for claiming reservations. Each day's hunt will be limited to 120 hunters who will be chosen by random drawing. The \$10 fee included with each application will be refunded to those hunters who are not chosen in the drawing.

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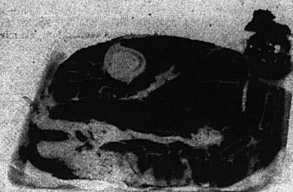

Here's what happened to people involved in the worst accidents. They were hit by objects picked up and thrown with great force by the mower.

Riding mowers turned over on steep slopes.

Riding mowers backed into and/or ran over people. Small children were most often the victims.

Mower blades slashed hands or feet poked into clear grass from the discharge chute.

Common sense helps

Here are some suggestions on lawnmower safety, most of which are good old common sense.

Never let children ride on a mower with you.

Cut the grass before it gets too long for easy mowing.

Wear tough leather shoes and boots that give you good traction. Canvas shoes or bare feet are risky.

Mow across slopes with a push mower.

Stay off steep slopes with a riding mower. Ride up and down other slopes.

Clear yard before mowing. Pick up rocks, twigs, other objects.

Clear yard of people, too.

Don't mow wet grass. It's slippery, the discharge chute clogs more easily, and electric mowers have more potential for shock.

Show this article to the rest of your family.

Delegate the lawn mowing job to a youngster only if he or she is old enough, big enough and careful enough to handle it. If your safety precautions go unheeded, find another worker or do it yourself.

When you buy a mower, choose one with the Outdoor Power Equipment Institute (OPEI) seal. This means the mower has all the recommended safety features.

Food Safety Reminders

1. Shop at clean, well-kept food outlets that sell fresh, high quality food.
2. Do not buy frozen foods stored above the frostline in store freezers or canned foods that have bulging ends, rusting seams, or leakage.
3. Take food home immediately and refrigerate or freeze perishables.
4. Maintain a clean dry kitchen, free of flies and insects and pets.
5. Clean up food spills and crumb-filled crevices.
6. Frequently clean refrigerator, freezer, and other storage areas.
7. Wash or replace soiled sponges, brushes, dishcloths, and towels.
8. Scrub cutting boards after every use to avoid cross contamination.
9. Follow label instructions for storing and preparing packaged and frozen foods.
10. Never taste food that is suspect.
11. Wash hands before preparing

food and avoid using hands to mix food.

12. Keep hands away from mouth, nose and hair, and never prepare food if you have an infectious disease or infection.
13. Avoid coughing or sneezing over food.
14. When holding food for serving, keep hot foods hot and cold foods cold.
15. Thaw meat or poultry in the refrigerator. If necessary, hasten thawing by placing under cool, running water.
16. Stuff poultry just before cooking. Refrigerate or freeze leftover poultry and stuffing separately.
17. Promptly refrigerate cooked foods and leftovers, and reheat thoroughly.
18. Foods held for 3 or 4 hours at temperatures between 60 and 120 degrees may not be safe to eat. This includes preparation, storage and serving time.
19. Dispose of foods with off odors.
20. Use clean eggs that are free of cracks.

Rural Development Comm. Meets;

Discuss Multiflora Rose

Members of the Rockcastle County Rural Development Committee were taught how to get rid of multiflora rose by using a certain herbicide at their regular meeting June 12.

Multiflora rose is an excellent feed for wildlife, especially birds. Harold Ballinger, soil conservationist, explained. Birds have helped to spread the growth of the pretty rose bush all over

the county, but especially along fences. Tordon 10K is a treatment for multiflora rose. It comes in the form of small cylinder-shaped pills, which you scatter over the ground.

Tordon 10K should be handled with care and people who know how to use it are given a special identification card, according to Mr. Ballinger.

The group also discussed their farm tour, which is scheduled for the week of July 10. About 20 people have signed up to travel through four southern states and view farm operations there.

The Committee is also involved in a seeding project. About 30 acres have been seeded by members this spring—the results will be checked at the September meeting. Another project is highway clean-up.

The next meeting is August 14 at the Rockcastle Steak House. It is open to the public.

Removing Ticks From the Skin

Prompt removal of attached ticks reduces the chances of acquiring Rocky Mountain spotted fever from ticks carrying the disease. However, rough removal may leave mouthparts embedded which may cause other infections.

If ticks are found attached in the skin, they should be touched with a drop of chloroform, gasoline, turpentine or a hot needle to cause them to relax their mouthparts. If you do not have these materials, use a steady, gentle pull with your fingers. Sterilize a toothpick tip with carbolic acid, silver nitrate, or iodine and drill the tip in the hole made by the mouthparts. See your doctor if mouthparts are left in the skin.

Have You Lost Your Nitrogen?

Were you able to get nitrogen fertilizer applied to any of your fields during the few dry days that we had the last of March and the first two or three weeks of April? If you did, your corn may run short of nitrogen this summer. The drier period which some of Kentucky had during the early part of the spring allowed some farmers to plant corn and apply nitrogen. Following this was three to four weeks of extremely wet weather. The soils were saturated much of this time, and the soil temperatures were above 50 degrees, encouraging bacterial activity. This means that much of the nitrogen applied early was turned to nitrate nitrogen and subsequently lost by denitrification and leaching. This would be especially true on the wetter type of soils where denitrification would be the most probable way the nitrogen was lost.

Some of the fields in Kentucky planted early are about knee high now and showing a light or pale green color. With the high amounts of nitrogen applied to the soils the color should be dark green. If this has happened to you then much or most of your nitrogen may have been lost. This would be quite profitable to sidress 50 to 100 pounds of nitrogen per acre. If accomplished soon, it could be done by a ground rig with anhydrous ammonia, urea, ammonium nitrate, or solution nitrogen. If the corn was planted early and still has arther green color, you may decide to forego the additional nitrogen at this time. The fields should be checked weekly and if the bottom leaves turn yellow beginning at the tip of the leaf, then it will pay you to add 50 pounds of nitrogen per acre by airplane.

If your corn is showing nitrogen deficiency, it will pay you to add extra nitrogen until late as tasseling time.

Corn-Maize Dwarf Mosaic Virus
Maize Dwarf Mosaic Virus (MDMV) is a virus disease of corn that is widespread in Kentucky, especially in fields that have a Johnson grass problem. MDMV is vectored by at least 12 species of aphids. Johnsongrass is considered to

be major reservoir for the virus from which aphids can carry the virus to corn.

MDMV symptoms are characterized by corn plants having an yellowish color and chlorotic patterns of mosaic, ring, fleck, mottle and streak on younger leaves. Green stunting may be observed. Isothermwise yellowish green infested leaves. Some standing and reddening of leaves and small or barren ears are later symptom expression of MDMV. Another virus, Maize Chlorotic Dwarf Virus (MCDV) may effect corn causing similar symptoms to MDMV and is often present in MDMV infected plants. Some difficulty may be experienced in separating and identifying these two virus diseases. More critical for the farmer is to identify whether either virus is causing a problem than to accurately distinguished between viruses since most hybrids that are screened for virus resistance are screened for both MDMV and MCDV.

Control recommendation for MDMV control are the selection of tolerant corn varieties and destruction of Johnson grass and other overwintering reservoir hosts. For Johnsongrass control refer to the UK Agronomy publication AGR-6. Tobacco

Both black cutworms and variegated cutworms are causing damage. Flea beetles have not been serious as yet, however, newly set plants should be watched closely for the presence of either or both pests.

Stalk borer (Papaipema nebris) is sometimes a pest of corn, especially where there's a weed problem in the field or field borders. The borers usually infest weeds such as giant ragweed first, and then move to corn as they outgrow the weed hosts. In some instances we are seeing stalk borer damage in corn fields without a weed problem. No chemical control is registered for stalk borer, but it is likely that controls applied for European corn borer would have some controlling effect on stalk borer, too.
