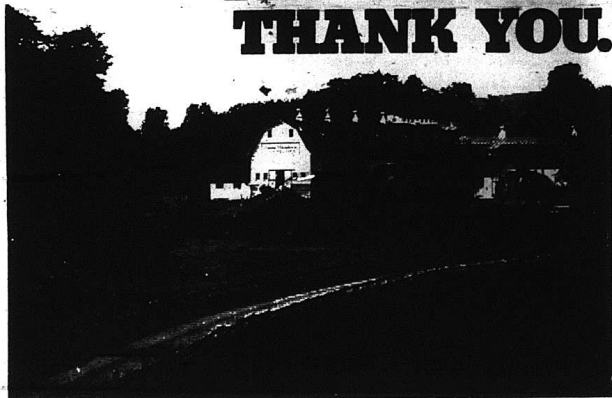

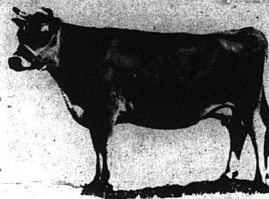
## DAIRY MONTH IS A NATURAL TIME TO SAY THANK YOU.

# 42 Children Participate In Nutrition Camp at Lake Linville

"It went very well for our first effort," said Cheryl Witt, County Homemaker Extension Agent, when she described "Nutrition camp".

Forty-two children participated in the day camp held June 18 at Lake Linville. They did mostly what all youngsters do at camp: learn crafts, take nature hikes and enjoy a cook-out. The one difference was they also had lessons in nutrition-distinguished in stories about Billy Broccoli and Charley Carrot and games in which one team was the Bread Group, for example. The cook-out itself involved a brief talk beforehand about eating a balanced lunch.

The day camp was sponsored by the Expanded Foods and Nutrition Education Program, a federal project in which carefully trained individuals teach selected homemakers about meal planning and food-shopping. Some of the mothers of the children in the camp are enrolled in the EFNEP program.

The children themselves cooked the dinner called "Meal in 'Foil'". Fresh carrots, potatoes and onions are sliced on top of a hamburger, then covered with catsup and wrapped in foil. This broiled on the grill for a half hour.

Forest rangers Steve Bullen and John Skinner taught the children how to recognize leaves and flowers.

4-H members Audrey Morgan and Donna Smith lead crafts-making macrame and candle sticks from wood. Volunteers supervising the day were Ms. Witt, Joyce Sowder, Eynonne Shumate, Teresa Estes, Bessie St. Clair, Juanita Durham and Jewell Durham. The congregation Bible Study will be held Thursday at 7 p.m. with the special program "Continue in the Things Learned" following.

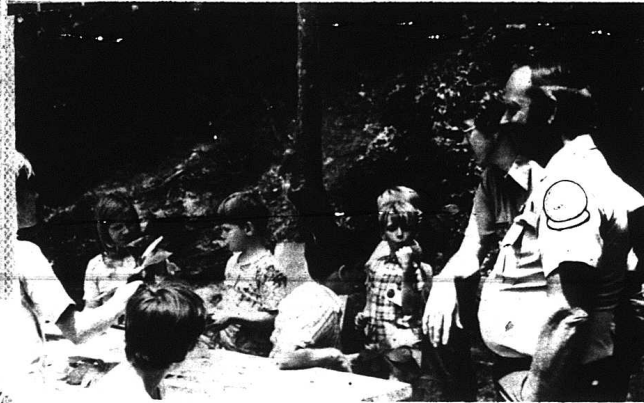

# Fishing Report

With surface water temperatures now above 80 degrees on the state's major lakes, water levels are at or near summer pools and generally stable with fishing fair. The lake-by-lake rundown, as compiled by the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources.

**Barren:** Black bass fair to good on the lower lake early and late at night off points and rip rap and fair and improving on the upper lake early mornings on crank baits in shallow stump beds; bluegill fair on the upper lake still fishing crickets off deep banks; white bass slow on the lower lake early and late on plunker and fly combination in the jumps; in tailwaters, catfish and white bass fair; clear to murky, stable at summer pool and 82 degrees.

**Kentucky:** sauger good trolling deep runners and drifting minnows over ridge tops; catfish fair still and drift fishing worms and nightcrawlers over channel drop-offs; in tailwaters, sauger good to excellent; catfish fair to good; clear, stable at summer pool and 82 degrees.

**Barkley:** bluegill fair on flyrod poppers along the beach line in inlets and bays; black bass slow on spinner baits and artificial nightcrawlers off points and over drop-offs; in tailwaters, catfish fair; white bass slow; clear, stable at

summer pool and 82 degrees.

**Dale Hollow:** White bass fair to good early and late on plunker and fly combination in the jumps and by still fishing minnows at night off points and deep banks; black bass fair on surface lures early and late and on artificial nightcrawlers at night in inlets and bays and over drop-offs; clear, stable at summer pool and 83 degrees.

**Rough River:** White bass fair to good on the south fork and slow on the north fork early and late on plunker and fly combination in the jumps; bluegill fair on the south fork off deep banks; crappie slow on the north fork around stick ups; clear, stable at summer pool and 83 degrees.

**Green:** white bass fair to good early and late on spoons, spinners and plunker and fly combination in the jumps; bluegill fair off rocky banks and over drop-offs; clear, stable at summer pool and 84 degrees.

**Cumberland:** white bass fair to good early and late on plunker and fly combination in the jumps; black bass slow to fair on surface lures off shallow banks early and late and on spinner baits and artificial nightcrawlers off points at night; in tailwaters, trout fair to good; crappie, sauger and white bass slow; clear, falling, 10 feet below the timberline and 82 degrees.

**Herrington:** black bass fair still fishing soft crawfish during the day and casting artificial nightcrawlers at night off points; bluegill fair still and drift fishing worms and crickets off deep banks; clear, stable at summer pool and 83 degrees.

**Noles:** white bass fair to good early and late on plunker and fly combination in the jumps and by still fishing minnows off points and deep banks; black bass slow and improving on surface lures off points and in inlets and bays early and late and on spinner baits and artificial nightcrawlers off points and over drop-offs at night; in tailwaters, white bass slow; clear, stable at summer pool and 82 degrees.

**Laurel:** trout fair at night still fishing worms off deep banks; black bass slow on spinner baits and artificial nightcrawlers off points and over drop-offs; clear, stable, 2 1/2 feet below power pool and 82 degrees.

**Grayson:** bluegill fair in inlets and bays; black bass slow on spinner baits off mud banks and around stick ups; in tailwaters, bluegill fair; clear, stable at summer pool and 82 degrees.

**Buckhorn:** crappie fair over submerged cover; clear, falling slowly, one foot below summer pool and 82 degrees.

**Dewey:** crappie fair over sub-

merged cover; clear to murky, rising slowly at summer pool and 83 degrees.

**Cave Run:** musky slow casting and trolling medium and deep runners over main channel drop offs and in timbered coves; bluegill slow in timbered coves; in tailwaters, crappie fair; clear, stable at summer pool and 81 degrees.

**Fishtrap:** crappie slow around stick ups; clear to murky, stable at summer pool and 83 degrees.

Mrs. Thompson said that the idea of a park "had been in the back of our minds for about five years." For the past three, the club has been raising money for the project by serving food at auctions held by Sammy Ford Realty.

"We have stood out in the rain sometimes to raise this money," she said. "We have also asked people to loan us bulldozers and shovels, and put all our poor old husbands to work."

Mrs. Thompson said that the club needs a shelter house to hold meetings, as there is no such place in the community.

"We held an exercise class in my

home once—some twenty women trying to exercise and you can imagine it got crowded," Mrs. Thompson said. "Also events like crafts fairs need a larger space than a private home."

The park will also have a softball field, a basketball court, swings and teeter-totters. The Club is depending on

volunteers to help clear the land and level the sloping area for a field. The building will probably be a simple, one-room concrete blockhouse.

The Quail Homemakers Club has about 20 members. Other officers are Betty Pursell, vice president and Virginia Hansel, secretary-treasurer.

## Bill James To Serve As Advisor On Economics to Gov. Carroll

Bill James, vice president of The Bank of Mt. Vernon, has been named to the newly formed Appalachian Development Council, a group that will be advising Gov. Julian Carroll on solving problems in eastern Kentucky.

Mr. James was one of the 19 people from 49 counties chosen to serve. The committee was formed after a three-day conference on economic development, held in Morehead last week.

Most of the recommendations center on eastern Kentucky's need for more and better government services (education, housing, water and sewer, health, and fire protection) and better transportation (highways and railroads).

The members of the Council will serve four-year terms, advising the governor and the staffs of the Appalachian Regional Commission and the Governor's Economic Development Commission. These groups develop programs and policy for legislative or executive action.

Mr. James did not attend the conference at Morehead, but he said he would be happy to serve on the Council. He is active in the Rockcastle Improvement Council, the Rockcastle Multi-County Industrial Authority, as well as the Jaycees.

Also nominated to the Council was Jerry Ikard, of Somerset, who is on the board of The Bank of Mt. Vernon. Others include four state legislators, two mayors, three co-operations executives, two educators and another banker.

Rockcastle Countians are being asked to come to the dedication ceremonies for the industrial park and hospital next Friday at 10:30 a.m. and 1:30 p.m. Sen. Walter Huddleston, Rep. Tim L. ## Berea Attorney Hired To Defend Indigents

Berea attorney Dale Henley has agreed to help the Rockcastle County District Court by handling cases of several defendants unable to pay a lawyer. Mr. Henley will be paid on an hourly basis by the Fiscal Court.

"I have handled my services as the need arises," Mr. Henley said. "I will be representing several people and trying to get these cases moving."

Mr. Henley will be in Mt. Vernon Thursday representing three defendants at their preliminary hearings before Judge Walter McGuire. They include Burman Baker, 54, of Rt. 4, Mt. Vernon, charged in the fatal shooting of Earl Smith, 53, of Rt. 1, Broodhead. Mr. Baker's hearing was originally scheduled for June 1, but continued because no public defender was available.

Mr. Henley will also represent a man from Mt. Vernon charged with rape and James Gross, 29, of Covington, Ky., charged with kidnapping. All three are now being held in jail.

Under state law, the Court is required to supply an indigent client with an attorney in cases involving felonies or damages over \$300. Such cases have been stalled in the Rockcastle District Court since January, when Nicholas Williams, another Berea attorney, resigned as public defender.

The Court has been asking the Office of Public Advocacy in Frankfort to send lawyers to the county in such cases, but often the lawyers are not available at the times they are needed, here. If a defendant is unable to post bond, he has to be held in jail until his lawyer is available.

"marketplace," and the Greek theme is carried out in white columns on the exterior.

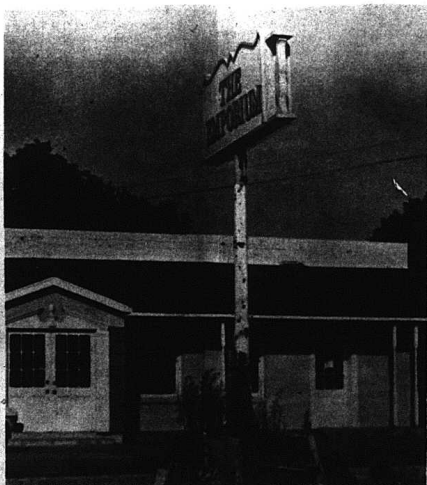

### Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor:  
 As you know the minimum fine for almost all traffic violations in Kentucky will increase by \$15 effective June 17, 1978. This increase came about because of a law enacted by the 1978 General Assembly. The purpose of the increase is to generate revenue to provide funds for the continuation of the 15% educational incentive supplemental pay to local police officers' salaries.

The Board of Directors of the Kentucky State Police Professional Association has directed me to write this letter for the following reasons. There has been much said about the \$15 increase which has lead many people to remark that police officers will soon be working on a "fee" system. The news media has reported on numerous occasions that traffic fines will increase by \$15 and this increase will go to all police officers in the state. One major TV station reported it goes to the "state's police officers." This was misinterpreted by many listeners of that station to mean "State Police officers. Since Kentucky State Police Troopers write a high percentage of traffic citations in Kentucky we, quite naturally, will receive most of the criticism. Kentucky State Police officers are provided annual

# Financing Is Assured For Social Security

The social security system is assured sufficient income into the 21st century, a social security representative said recently.

The additional income provided by 1977 legislation virtually eliminates the financial problems faced by social security during the past few years.

At the same time, the additional cost to most workers will be moderate. For example, under the old law, a worker with 1978 average earnings of \$1,201 in 1987 on average earnings estimated to rise to \$18,600 by that year. Instead, under the new law, his 1987 tax will be about \$1,311, an increase of only \$130 for the year over what he would have paid under the old law. This is about \$2.50 more a week.

The first year the social security tax rate will be higher under the new law is 1979. The 1979 tax rate for employers and employees each will rise to 6.13 percent from 6.05 percent. The rate will increase in steps until it reaches 7.65 percent in 1990 and after. Under the old law it was scheduled to increase to 7.45 percent in 2011 and after.

Under the new law, as under the old, the maximum yearly earnings subject to the social security tax will rise. The 1979 maximum will be \$22,900 instead of \$18,900. Additional increases are scheduled until the maximum reaches \$29,700 in 1981 under the new law, instead of \$21,900 under the old law. After 1981 the maximum will increase automatically as average earnings rise, as it does now.

The 1978 tax rate is 6.05 percent, the same as it would have been under the old law. A worker who has average earnings, about \$10,000 in

1977, will pay total social security taxes of \$605 in 1978, the same amount payable under the old law. A worker earning \$17,700 or more in 1978 will pay a total of \$1,071.

Under the old law the self-employment tax rate of 8.10 percent for 1978 was scheduled to rise to 8.35 percent in 1981. Under the new law it will be 9.30 percent in 1981. Additional increases are scheduled until the rate reaches 10.75 percent in 1990 and after.

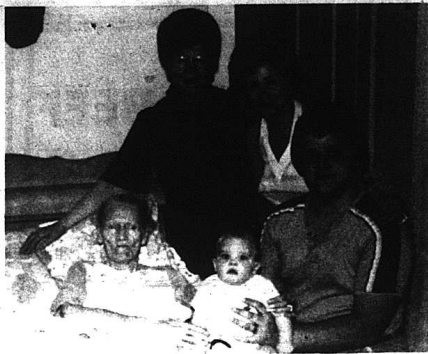

## Kentucky Afield

In spite of the 212 deer hunters took on the Ballard County Wildlife Management Area in West Kentucky last year, the area still has far too many deer. If crowded conditions continue to exist, biologists fear that the health of the herd could be endangered from an outbreak of just about any communicable disease. The over-abundant deer are also damaging crops on the area, reducing the yield for both the sharecroppers who raise these crops and the food available for ducks and geese.

The need to reduce Ballard's deer population necessitated the rules governing this year's hunt, says Joe Bruna, director of fish and wildlife game management division.

"We can only allow deer hunting for a limited time on Ballard because of the area's waterfowl populations," Bruna says. Ballard is the wintering home of huge concentrations of ducks and geese, and allowing deer hunters in the area after the first of November could disturb the waterfowl.

Now it is possible to allow open hunting on the area, according to Bruna. "We need to limit the number of hunters

for safety reasons, not to control the deer harvest. If we opened the 8,000-acre area the number of hunters who would flock in would greatly increase the chances of accidents."

Because of the time problem and because bow hunters aren't nearly as efficient as gun hunters archers took 29 deer during six days of hunting last year, only two days, Oct. 15 and Oct. 16, could be set aside for bow hunts on the area, Bruna says. Gun hunts will be conducted on seven days: Oct. 20, 21, 22, 23, 27, 28 and 29.

Both gun and bow hunters may take only antlerless deer. The only way to control a herd size, Bruna says, is to harvest does. But to help compensate for having to pass up a shot at some trophy bucks, all deer taken at Ballard will be "bonus" deer. That is, you may still hunt at Ballard even though you have already taken a deer elsewhere in the state, and if you take a deer at Ballard, you may still use your statewide deer permit to take another deer elsewhere.

Each day of hunting will be limited to 120 hunters, chosen in a random drawing. The application period for this drawing is between July 1 and July 10 only. Applications received before and

## Extensive Participation In Conservation Act

An extensive public participation process concerning the Soil and Water Resources Conservation Act is getting underway in Rockcastle County.

Greg Stephens, district conservationist for the U.S. Soil Conservation Service (SCS), says the first part of this grass roots effort will involve public awareness of the act itself.

The major emphasis of the new law resists heavily with public involvement, Stephens explained. The law calls for the public to explain what they feel are the local conservation or natural resources problems. Then the public participants will be asked what solutions they feel could best solve the problems. This way the SCS can develop programs directed more toward the natural resource and conservation problems the public feels are most urgent.

To carry out the Soil and Water Resources Conservation Act, the SCS will join with the Rockcastle Conservation District to sponsor a public meeting in July.

If your name is drawn, be sure to show up on the day of the hunt with a valid statewide hunting license and a statewide deer permit. Although the statewide tag will not be used on Ballard's "bonus" deer, it is required and must be presented at the check station before the hunt.

## Short Rows

At this time of year poison ivy often becomes a great nuisance to just about everyone venturing outdoors. Springing up as it does just about anywhere and everywhere, it is a very attractive vine but every inch of it is a menace and harmful to the average person. Bare skin contact with poison ivy without immediate scrubbing with soap and water will more than likely result in a

rash that will itch like nobody's business and be extremely difficult to alleviate.

To avoid such unpleasantities with poison ivy, learn to identify it and avoid contact. When encountering a vine or a vinnelike shrub with fresh green "leaflets three" let it be. Some people confuse poison ivy with the harmless Virginia Creeper but this attractive vine has five distinct dark green leaflets instead of three.

Poison ivy can be eradicated from the premises by spraying with brush killers, which any local county agent can recommend. Be sure to request his advice before spraying because just any brush killer may not be particular about what kind of vegetation it kills. Some killers may render the soil sterile. In any case, do not use any kind of a weed or brush killer around vegetable plants.

When working around poison ivy, be sure to wear gloves and immediately afterwards wash with strong soap and water. This will greatly reduce the risk of being poisoned.

There is a medical preventive that is said to keep from being poisoned by poison ivy and its near relative, poison sumac, but only a dermatologist or some other medical practitioner is qualified to advise and administer in this respect.

There are also non-prescription, over the counter drug store remedies for poison ivy rash and itching.

# County Agent's Notes

## Evergreens

During June and the first half of July is perhaps the best time of the entire year to prune evergreens in Kentucky. These plants have made their early spring growth and when it gets hot they slow up in their growth but will soon be setting buds for next spring's growth. By pruning now, the plants will set buds around the end of the small twig where the cut was made and this means a thicker, denser plant which always means better looking evergreens.

The rules for pruning are:

1. Never cut the top out of the evergreen until the plant is as tall as you want it to grow.
2. Remove one-half to two thirds of the new growth. By examining the different kinds of evergreens, it will be found that it is comparatively easier to prune in this way.

Neglected evergreens that have not been pruned for years may often have to be discarded because they cannot be pruned as drastically as other plants. This means that the plant that has grown 3 to 6 feet above the eaves of the house will be cut back to the eaves and remain alive. The spreading type of junipers and yew may be headed back 15 to 18 inches and they will fill in and become denser.

The upright kinds will fill in and become dense by a small amount of pruning on the ends of the branch. The bottom branches should never be cut off evergreens because the best looking ones are those that have branches clear to the ground.

## Tips for 4-H'ers

### Preparing for Dairy Shows

Dairy shows are won or lost long before an animal and its owner step into the show ring. With county fairs and shows coming up, 4-H'ers planning to enter competition in these areas might benefit from some advice offered by H. Lee Durham, Rockcastle County Extension Agent for 4-H.

"Anyone entering a dairy show should be familiar with its rules," Durham says. "Most require advanced entry, and it is a good idea to enter your animal early and send any fee required."

Durham says it is imperative that entrants have proper health papers prepared by a local veterinarian. "If required, have proof of ownership and the animal's registration papers available at check-in time," Durham says, adding that it is important to arrive on time and be ready to show when your class is announced.

"When you arrive at the show you may have a specific stall assignment," he continues. "Find your stall and present your papers to the superintendent in charge."

The agent notes the importance of developing a routine at home of feeding and watering show animals to get proper "fill" important for a heifer or cow to show at her best. He advises that an entrant give his heifer or cow a bath the night before the show, and then clean legs and feet on the morning of competition.

"Just before entering the show ring, give your animal a final grooming and 'beck her for dirt spots,'" says Durham.

## Senate Bill 114

### Enacted This Year

Senate Bill 114, enacted by the 1978 legislature, makes it mandatory that the application for an operator's license contains the social security number.

This law is effective on June 17, 1978; however, since there will be several teenagers applying for a license that do not presently have a card, they will be allowed ninety (90) days to obtain a number. When their card is received this office should be immediately notified in order that the number can be entered on their Kentucky driving record.

Applications issued on or after August 1, 1978, will not be accepted unless they contain the social security number.

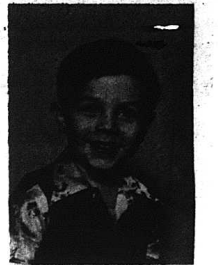

### Incentive Program

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) has traditionally offered cost-share programs to aid farmers in managing their land to increase yields and preserve and improve the environment. Since good woodland management is important on many farms, forestry practices have been included in ASCS programs. The current program under which forestry assistance is offered is the Forestry Incentives Program, or FIP.

The FIP is designed to increase the future supply of sawtimber and related forest products, and enhance our environment. This will be achieved by promoting the maintenance of productive timber stands, and by encouraging the establishment of timber stands on suitable idle land.

## Social Workers List Five Problems Of 'Most Urgent' Concern to Community

On Thursday, June 22, at 7:00 p.m. in the community room of the Bank of Mt. Vernon, 29 persons attended a "Forum on Community Concerns" sponsored by the Cumberland River Comprehensive Care Center in Mt. Vernon. In summary, these were the findings or highlights at the meeting.

Alcohol Abuse (Paul Witt speaker): There were 35,300 to 36,000 alcoholics in our 8 county area. Each alcoholic effects from 6 to 7 people. One can become an alcoholic from drinking beer and wine as well as the hard liquor.

Drug Abuse (Mattie Robinson speaker): There are \$10 billion spent on drugs annually in America. Fifteen thousand people die annually in the U.S. from a drug overdose. Drug abuse is growing among prescription and over-the-counter drug users.

Family Disunity (Bob Fields speaker): Our American lifestyle is destroying family cohesiveness. Family members need to learn to give more of themselves to each other to save this family unity. Nothing can replace the family for emotional support.

Juvenile Delinquency (Cora Leporin speaker): Placing responsibility upon the parents of juvenile offenders is proving very effective with law enforcement officials. Compared to our 8 county region, Rockcastle County is ranked the lowest in juvenile delinquency.

Child Abuse and Neglect (Mike Bryant speaker): It is against the law not to report a suspected child abuse or neglect situation. With the rise in child abuse-reporting and detection, prosecution has increased.

It is hoped that further such meetings may be held to discuss issues relevant to the needs of Rockcastle County and its citizens. All who are interested in participating in such meetings are urged to attend as they are announced.

## Blood Drive Set for July 14: County May Improve Its Record

People in Rockcastle County will be asked to donate blood Friday, July 14, in Reno Valley during a community blood drive sponsored by the Rockcastle Jaycees.

A center will be set up in the building in front of the Old Barn in rooms loaned free by the people of Reno Valley. Air conditioning will be provided by Rockcastle County Registration.

Steve Midkiff, chairman, said that while people attending the Blue Grass Festival may stop in to donate blood, the Jaycees are looking to Rockcastle citizens to register in advance of the day and "come out in numbers."

Rockcastle is currently one of the three worst counties out of a 40-county region in Kentucky in blood donation, according to Harry Alheid at the Central Kentucky Blood Center in Lexington. Only 18 pints have been collected in the last three years, whereas the Blood Center estimates that people here use 454 pints per year.

Kentucky hospitals often reach a crisis situation, Mr. Alheid said, because not enough blood is available. What is collected one day is used the next.

Mr. Midkiff said that local softball players will be asked to sign up at the Mt. Vernon Elementary School playground. The Jaycees will be contacting churches, businesses, and social groups also.

"The Jaycees will be passing out handbills and putting up posters about the event. A large banner will be run across the Main Street of Mt. Vernon or Reno Valley."

Anyone who wants to register can do so the week of the Blood Drive by phoning Mr. Midkiff at the Public Health Department.

There are several advantages to the individual who donates blood:

- 1) His spouse, children under 18 years of age, parents, and parents-in-law as well as himself will be provided blood transfusion anywhere in the United States if necessary. Most regular insurance policies do not include blood transfusion costs.

- 2) If at least five members or 20% of a group donate blood, the entire group will get coverage for blood transfusions.

The Jaycees will be recruiting groups in particular.

- 3) State employees get a half day off.
- 4) It does not hurt, takes only 45 minutes, and you help save someone's life.

People who have signed up to donate blood so far include Mr. Midkiff, Bill James, Sammy Ford, Tommy Hodges, Jane Kundtz, and Oscar Pain.

## Post Office Wants Vacationers To Make Arrangement for Mail

Making arrangements for holding or forwarding mail prior to leaving home for vacations can save customers a lot of misery and inconvenience, Postmaster James S.O. Smith reminded local residents today.

"An over-flowing mailbox can be an open invitation to burglars," Postmaster Smith said. "Letting mail or newspapers pile up is advertising the fact that the house or apartment will be empty and unguarded."

Householders should ask a friend or neighbor to check their mailbox daily and to hold their mail until vacation's over. Or, if they prefer, they can ask the Post Office to hold their mail for up to 30 days, or to forward it to the vacation address.

The postmaster offered these additional tips for taking some of the worry out of vacation planning.

Vacationers should buy enough stamps for scenic postcards and other

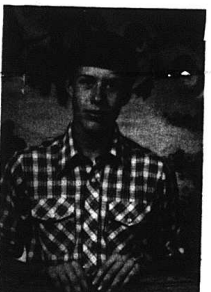
correspondence before they leave. They may not be conveniently near a post office later.

They should use sufficient postage—ten cents for postcards and 15 cents for letters weighing one ounce or less. For letters weighing more than one ounce, the additional postage is 18 cents an ounce.

Mail should be deposited, when possible, at post offices or in downtown, business district collection boxes, where more frequent pickups are made.

Travelers should be sure they have the addresses and correct ZIP Codes for persons with whom they'll be corresponding. In fact, the Postmaster says, it might be a good idea to write or type them on envelopes before leaving home, just in case. Envelopes and cards should also bear a return address.

"And please write legibly," Postmaster Smith said.

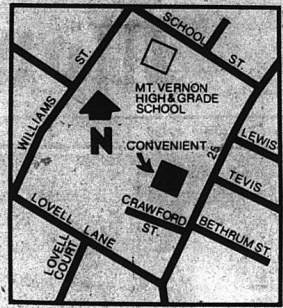

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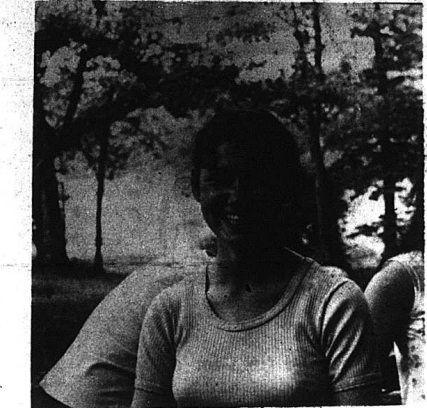
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# Miss Morgan Hopes To Turn Art Talent Into Career

A. Hot pack means pre-cooking food for a short time before putting it into jars for processing. Raw pack, or cold pack, means putting food right into hot jars without pre-cooking and then covering it with hot syrup or another hot liquid.

Q. Does it matter which method you use?  
A. Most fruits and vegetables can be either hot packed or cold packed. Many people prefer to use the cold pack method because it's easier.

Fruits with a delicate texture, such as raspberries and blackberries are better cold packed. Cold packing helps to keep them from falling apart.

# Why Leave Headspace?

Q. Why is it important to leave a certain amount of head space in the canning jar?  
A. When food is processing, it needs room to expand. The head space allows room for the liquid to bubble up during processing. Without this head space, some of food might be withdrawn from the jar along with the air, causing a deposit of food on the jar rim and preventing the seal.

Q. Why use 1/2 inch head space for some foods and 1 inch for others?  
A. The need for head space varies because some foods shrink during processing and others expand. The food that expand and need extra space are corn, lima beans and peas. Follow the directions in a recommended canning book on how much head space to leave for each food.

**Too Much Head Space**  
Q. What happens when you leave too much head space?  
A. The food at the top of jar might discolor from a lack of liquid over the food. It is best to eat as long as the jar is properly sealed.

Another possibility is that the jar might not seal if all the air isn't exhausted during processing.

**Canning Cherries**  
Raw Pack: Wash cherries, remove pits if desired. Fill jars to 1/2 inch of top. For a full pack, shake cherries down while filling jars. Cover with boiling sirup, leaving 1/2 inch space at top. Wipe jar rims clean. Adjust lids. Process in boiling water bath: 20 minutes for quart jars and 25 minutes for pint jars.

Hot Pack: Wash cherries, remove pits, if desired. Add 2 cup sugar to each quart jar. Add a little water to unsticked cherries to keep them from sticking while heating. Cover rim and adjust to a boil. Pack hot to 1/2 inch of top. Bring to boil. Process in boiling water bath.

Process pint jars for 10 minutes and quart jars, 15 minutes.

As soon as you remove jars from canner, complete seals if necessary.

**Canning Fruit Juice**  
Wash fruit. Remove pits, if desired, and crush fruit. Heat to simmering (185-210 degrees-F). Strain through cloth bag or sieve. Add sugar if desired about 1 cup to 1 gallon juice. Reheat to simmering. Fill jars to 1/2 inch of top with hot juice. Wipe jar rims clean. Adjust lids. Process in boiling water bath: pints and quarts for 15 minutes.

As soon as you remove jars from canner, complete seals if necessary.
