

Junior High Students Get Option on School Lunch

School districts participating in the National School Lunch Program may away permit their junior high and middle school students to take as few as three of the five menu items offered in school lunches. The action, acronunced by Assistant Severetary of Agriculture Spectral Programment of the School Sch

Law 95 166.

"The purpose of this change is to reduce food waste in the school lunch program" Mr. Rutler said. "Junior high and middle schools may offer this option to their students upon approval of their local school fund authorities. Senior high chools students have had the option to choose since June 1976.

"The Department wants all children to eat the complete school lunch," he said, "And in order to achieve this, we encourage schools to offer nutritious meals that reflect children's food preferences. However, if junior high or certain items in the lunches, they won,' to be required to accept them on their plates. Previously, they were required to accept all five components of the

school lunch."

The five components of the school lunch are milk, bread, meat or meat alternate, and two vegetables or fruits. Students will continue to pay the full amount for lunches, even if all five amount of lederal reimbursement for each lunch served will not be affected by the change.

In February 1978, the Department issued proposed regulations to permit junior high and middle school students to thoose as few as three of the five items in school function. The Department received 308 comments on the proposal; 287 of the responses favored the change.

The amendment to the regulations appeared in the Federal Register of June 16 It will become effective upon publication.

Spoilage in Canned Foods
Q. What caused canned food to spoil?

what caused canned noot of points of the poi

Q. What is involved in correct processing?
A. Correct processing means using the method recommended for the food-either a boiling-water-bath or steam-pressure canner-and for the time specified in the canning instructions for each-food.

each-food.

Pressure Canning
Q. What foods should I process in a pressure canner, and why?
a. All low-sidi foods-meat, poulty, fish and all vegetables except tomatoes and pickled vegetables except processing at a heat of 250 degrees Farenheit, which is reached in the canner under 10 pounds of pressure. This temperature is pounds of pressure. This temperature will also get rey the spore that allows the rare-but-deadly foulish took for form.

Water-Bath Cannin
Q. When should I use the boiling water-bath canner?

A. Use it to process high-acid foods: fruits, tomatoes, pickled fruits and pickled vegetables. These can all be safely processed at the lower heat (21) degrees' reached in a boiling-water-bath bath canner.

For tomatoes, food specialists do recommend the addition of Jemon juice or canning tablets containing citric acid and salt. Added according to directions, these make sure the tomatoes can be safely processed in the 1 boiling water 1 canner.

Wy No Open-Kettel Canning? **
 Q. I know "old timers" who still use the open-kettle method for tomatoes and fruits. Why isn't this recommended any

A. There is always the danger of contamination by food spoilage when foods are transferred from the cooking kettle to the jars.

The only thing you can safely can by the open kettle method is jelly. Even so, you must use great care.

Jams preserves, conserves, marmalades, and also pickles should always be processed in a boiling water-bath canner.


