

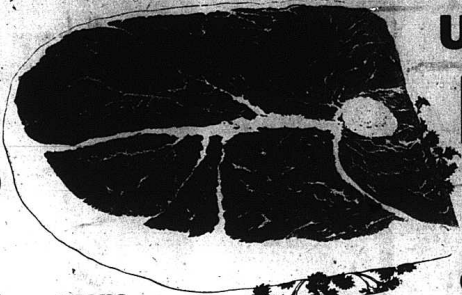

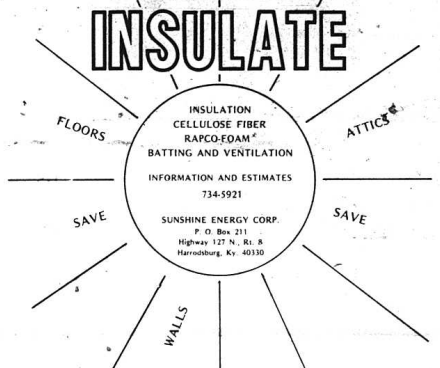

Senator and U.S. Representatives Lead Hospital and Industrial Park Ceremonies

Several national politicians and people from the State Department of Commerce came to Mt. Vernon Friday for ground-breaking ceremonies at the Rockcastle Mollu County Industrial Park and the Rockcastle Hospital. Among those participating were U.S. Senator Walter Huddleston, Rep. Tim Lee Carter, former state Commerce Secretary Terry McBrayer, Kentucky Rep. Harold DeMaureo and many others. The all-day event of speeches and wish-making took place in 90 degree temperatures and sun hot enough to make people cover their head with handkerchiefs. Rep. Carter discarded a 12 page speech to shorten the ceremony at the hospital because it was so hot. In the evening, scenes of the day were broadcast on Channels 27 and 42 television newscasts.

Fiscal Court Judge Hubert Thacker spoke briefly, followed by Clyde Lovell, a member of the Industrial Authority, who introduced Mr. McBrayer and Rep. Carter and the featured speaker, Sen. Huddleston. "The senator said there were seven important factors in making industry come to the area: the site itself, transportation, the nature of the community, recreation, schools, hospitals and the enthusiasm of the people. He praised the high school building and vocational school, Lake Lanville and the planned addition to the hospital. "The senator said 'all levels of government must work together,' noting that federal money will help Rockcastle build sewers and pads. He said that he thought agriculture was the state's greatest asset, and that it 'must be protected' and be considered along with the proposed industrial expansion. Dedication of the hospital's new addition began about 1:30 p.m. The hospital has planned a \$13 million project that includes adding skilled nursing facilities, a dietary department, therapy equipment rooms and a nursery. Mr. Ralph Beiting, pastor of Our Lady of Mt. Vernon Church and director of the Christian Appalachian Project, led the prayers. Wayne Stewart, member of

the hospital Board of Directors, thanked Father Beiting for his past help in providing nurses when the hospital needed them. Mr. Stewart also praised Rep. Carter, who is a medical doctor, for taking "a personal interest in the hospital during our darkest hours five years ago." "The Board was meeting every night trying to find answers to the hospital's problems," he said. "Rep. Carter walked into our hospital and talked to us and gave us hope."

City Council Debates Next Year's Budget

At the regular July meeting of the Mt. Vernon City Council Monday, members went over a tentative budget for 1979, heard pleas from the Rockcastle County Senior citizens for money, and purchased a fire truck for \$4,980. The truck will be bought from Jack Coak & Co., Mobile, Ala. and should be delivered in about a year. The Coack company had promised to partly finance the truck at 6% interest, but John Baker, representing the company, said the deal fell through.

Association Elects Officers

The Rockcastle County Education Association recently selected the following officers: Keith Singleton, president; Pauline Mullins, secretary; and B. L. Dyer, treasurer. Delegates to the K.E.A. convention are Bige Towery, Keith Singleton and John Hale. Alternates are Buford Paulsen, Charles Napier, and Jerry Mink. These officers will serve during the 1978-79 school term. The elected officers express their appreciation to the members for their vote and support.

The Industrial Park ceremonies started about 10:00 a.m. with prayers led by Rev. Ernie Johnson. Bill James, president of the Industrial Authority introduced Mr. McBrayer, complimented him for helping with the project. "We are working to insure a sound economic future for all," Mrs. McBrayer said. He said he had been in 91 counties and had seen good and bad areas "and felt that the Rockcastle community had 'vim, vigor and enthusiasm to make the project a success.' He said enthusiasm was as important as having a good site itself.

Mr. McBrayer said industry would first come to the foothills before the mountain area. When asked later what industries he thought might come to Rockcastle, Mr. McBrayer said, "Distribution operators, warehouses, repair plants and wood processors. We are interested especially in those unrelated to the coal industry."

County Blood Drive Friday in Renfro

Rockcastle County will be trying to change its record as one of the three worst counties in the state when it comes to giving blood. This Saturday in Renfro Valley a mobile unit from the Central Kentucky Blood Center will be there to serve local donors from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Chairman Steve Midkiff said that many people already have appointments to give blood, but that anyone who comes will be taken care of. Only a few people cannot give blood for medical reasons, and the personnel in the mobile unit are careful to screen them out. The goal that the Blood Center has set for Rockcastle County is 454 pints per year, the amount the Center estimates is used by people here. However, last year only 18 pints were collected in the county, according to Harry Alheid, Donor Service Representative.

Everyone was beginning to file off the speaker's platform when someone remembered that the actual ground-breaking ceremony had not taken place. It was quickly staged in front of TV cameras.

Mr. Vernon Mayor Roland Mullins, Sen. Huddleston and others appeared on television broadcasts later. Quentin Barnett, a life-long resident of Rockcastle, said on television that he was glad to see the industrial site, adding that all three of his children had to leave the county to find jobs.

In some counties, such as Pulaski which collects 1386 pints yearly, people hold blood drives on a regular basis. Mr. Alheid said he said that any group of 25 or more people can become a donor group, which means that if 5 people donate, the others are covered under a sort of insurance plan. "Many people do not understand that if they are hurt in an accident, chances are that their insurance does not cover the cost of blood transfusions," Mr. Alheid said. By giving blood, a person can insure these costs are paid for himself, his spouse and children, parents, and parents-in-law. The process of blood donation takes about 45 minutes. Mr. Alheid said, with the medical examination lasting 30 of those minutes. You must register, answer questions about your medical history, be weighed, and have your blood

Instead about \$14,000 will be borrowed at 9 3/4% interest from the Bank of Mt. Vernon. The rest of the money will come from a fund of \$19,000 set aside last year, and about \$22,000 in federal revenue sharing funds. Mayor Roland Mullins proposed a budget for next year, and asked members to read it over at their leisure and discuss it next month. The budget of \$63,700 shows \$29,300 for salaries, about \$24,500 for operating expenses including police and fire. Federal Funds to County Will Double This Year

Rockcastle County will gain about \$5,000 more than last year from the federal government in revenue sharing funds. The increase will start in January, 1979, changing quarterly revenue from \$28,065 to \$47,275. Fiscal Court Judge Hubert Thacker said Rockcastle became eligible for extra money through its increased participation in the federal jobs program under the Comprehensive Educational and Training Act (CETA). "The more CETA workers, the more revenue-sharing," he said. The extra money brings changes in the county budget, which was approved last week by the Fiscal Court. Nearly all items receive a little extra, and several new categories of expense appear. For example, the county will spend \$5,000 toward the salary of a third County Extension agent to work in the 4-31 program. The revenue-sharing money should amount to about \$127,000. Of this, about \$37,000 is for maintenance and equipment; \$26,400 for roads; \$32,000 for garbage disposal; \$8,500 for social services; Courthouse administration amounts to \$19,556 of which some \$14,000 is for utilities. The rest of the budget amounts to about \$234,500. Some \$140,000 is the general government budget, which includes administration and salaries for all county offices, election expenses, and miscellaneous such as Rescue Squad. The remaining \$100,000 or so is divided with about half to be "road fund" (\$53,455). This breaks down to \$15,955 for supplies and the rest in separate funds each magistrate to spend on roads in his district. The final \$44,700 is spent according to laws past several years ago that direct a certain amount of tax money be spent on certain agencies, such as the Health Department, the Library, etc. Some \$12,000 of this money is in an "Anti-Recession Fund."

Joe Clark Appeals Election Ruling

Judge Phil Acker, Rockcastle County Circuit court, ruled this month that Mr. Mason should have won the election last November for county magistrate from the Fifth District. Mr. Clark had won by 22 votes in a write-in campaign. Judge Wickler ruled that 34 votes for Mr. Clark were illegal because election officials had not filed out affidavits required by law whenever officials help voters cast their ballots.

KIDNAP CASES DISMISSED

Two men from Covington, Ky. had their cases dismissed in District Court Thursday by Judge Walter McGuire. James Granger, 24, and James Gross, 29, had been accused of kidnapping by two young women from the Lighthouse Home for the Blind in Cincinnati, Ohio. Judge McGuire said there was not enough evidence to pursue the case against the men, who have been held in Rockcastle County Jail since June 20. Judge McGuire did find sufficient evidence to direct the cases of two local men accused of rape to the Grand Jury, which meets July 17.

Public Hearing Set On Soil Conservation

6. Modernism rejects the deity of Christ by insisting He was not virgin-born (Matt. 1:18-25).
7. Modernism dims the reverence for God by substituting the commandments and achievements of men. (Matt. 15:9).
8. Modernism substitutes the spiritual new birth of John 3:15 with a social gospel, rites, ceremonies and another gospel of good behavior.
9. Modernism would substitute human churches for the one true church built by Christ and identified in the New Testament (Matt. 16:18; Eph. 4:11).
10. Modernism is pagan unbelief because it takes sides with the enemies of the Lord by refusing to believe in the physical resurrection of Jesus Christ from the grave, and in His coming again as He has promised (Matt. 28:18; John 14:13).

You should know your pastor, priest, or church is in this classification of Modernism-make sure-investigate. If the answer is "yes", God commands you to come out of it (2 Cor. 6:14-18); 2 Tim. 3:5; Eph. 5:11). True faith cannot be based upon imagination, but must depend upon sufficient evidence. Such evidence of the inspiration of the Bible is available and when proper investigation is given, one will be forced to conclude that the Bible is God's Word, and must be respected and obeyed!

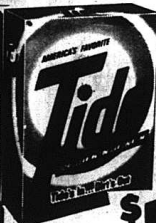

Junior High Students Get Option on School Lunch

School districts participating in the National School Lunch Program may now permit their junior high and middle school students to take as few as three of the five menu items offered in school lunches. The action, announced by Assistant Secretary of Agriculture Sydney J. Butler, is required by Public Law 95-166.

"The purpose of this change is to reduce food waste in the school lunch program," Mr. Butler said. "Junior high and middle schools may offer this option to their students upon approval of their local school fund authorities. Senior high school students have had the option to choose since June 1976.

"The Department wants all children to eat the complete school lunch," he said. "And in order to achieve this, we encourage schools to offer nutritious meals that reflect children's food preferences. However, if junior high or middle school children don't intend to eat certain items in the lunches, they won't be required to accept them on their plates. Previously, they were required to accept all five components of the

school lunch."

The five components of the school lunch are milk, bread, meat or meat alternate, and two vegetables or fruits.

Students will continue to pay the full amount for lunches, even if all five items are not accepted. In addition, the amount of federal reimbursement for each lunch served will not be affected by the change.

In February 1978, the Department issued proposed regulations to permit junior high and middle school students to choose as few as three of the five items in school lunches. Public comment was requested. The Department received 389 comments on the proposal; 287 of the responses favored the change.

The amendment to the regulations appeared in the Federal Register of June 16. It will become effective upon publication.

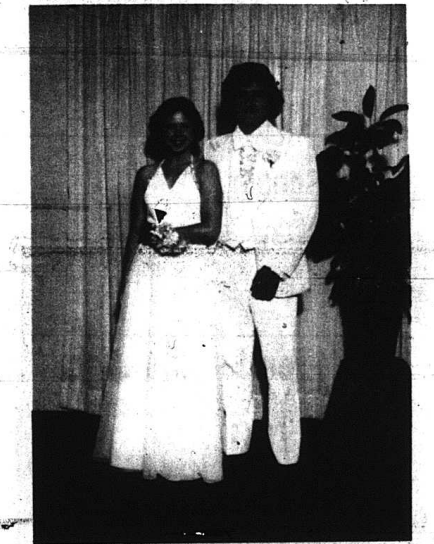

Spoilage in Canned Foods

Q. What caused canned food to spoil?

A. There are three possible causes: a faulty seal, processing too short a time or at too low a temperature, or improper handling of food.

Q. What causes a faulty seal?

A. Again, we can point to three main causes, failure to follow the manufacturers instructions for the canning lids used, leaving the wrong amount of headspace at top of jar, and using a jar with a hairline crack or a chip along the sealing edge.

Q. What is involved in correct processing?

A. Correct processing means using the method recommended for the food—either a boiling-water-bath or steam-pressure canner—and for the time specified in the canning instructions for each food.

Pressure Canning

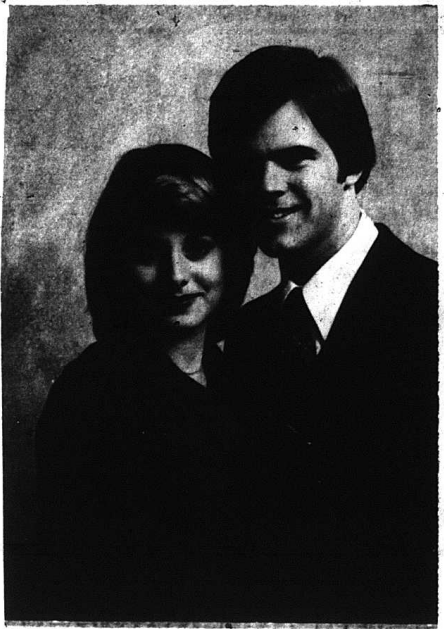
Q. What foods should I process in a pressure canner, and why?

a. All low-acid foods—meat, poultry, fish and all vegetables except tomatoes and pickled vegetables—require processing at a heat of 240 degrees Fahrenheit, which is reached in the canner under 10 pounds of pressure. This temperature is needed to kill food-spoilage bacteria. This temperature will also destroy the spore that allows the rare-but-deadly Botulism toxin to form.

Water-Bath Canning

Q. When should I use the boiling-water-bath canner?

A. Use it to process high-acid foods: fruits, tomatoes, pickled fruits and pickled vegetables. These can all be safely processed at the lower heat (212 degrees) reached in a boiling-water-bath bath canner.

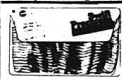
