Police Hunt for Man Wanted in Shooting

A security guard at the Renfro Valley Music Festival shot and critically wounded Stanley D. Wright of Route 4, Mt. Vernon Friday night about 11 p.m. in front of several witnesses.

State Trooper Jim Silvers said that police in several states are now looking for Early Wagner of Hamptonville, N.C., who was one of the two security guards hired by entertainer Mac Wiseman for the event.

Mr. Wright remains in serious condition in Intensive Care at Good Samaritan Hospital in Lexington. He was shot in the forehead at close range with a small calibre pistol.

Trooper Silvers said he and Detective Joe Gossett have the names of seven witnesses who saw the shooting.

Witnesses told police that the guard and Mr. Wright were arguing over Mr. Wright's admission to the festival when the guard pulled a gun out of his pocket and shot him. The guard then ran out to a car and drove away. Mr. Wright was rushed by ambulances to the hospital.

"The guard was not authorized to carry a weapon," Officer Silvers said.

Police have a warrant for Mr. Wright's arrest on a charge of first degree assault.

People from all over the United States came in campers and cars to Renfro Valley last week for a three-day music festival. The music started at 4 p.m. Thursday and played continuously afternoons and evenings until midnight Saturday.

Rockcastle Improvement Council to Present Monthly Awards

An award will be given once a month to any individual, club, business, or group that has made a significant achievement toward improving Rockcastle County. Gailfin Craig, chairman of the Awards Committee of the Rockcastle County Improvement Council, said today.

Mr. Craig said the first such award would be presented at the Council's

regular meeting Monday at the PCA Building at 7 p.m. The winner will receive an engraved plaque.

"We want to promote the improvement of the county this way, and give deserved recognition to the individuals who have helped in this effort," Mr. Craig said.

He said that the Council will recognize not only outstanding individ-

uals who have performed volunteer work, but also groups such as a club or athletic team, and organizations such as the police department or a city council. He said that the standards for giving the award are flexible.

"If a businessman for example, fixes up an old building that was once an eyesore, or if someone restores an old home—anything like this benefits the community," Mr. Craig said.

The Council is asking people for nominations for the award. A form for this purpose follows this article.

Other members of the Awards Committee are Wayne Stewart, Oscar Fain and Tony Hopkins.

Anyone may attend the Council meeting Monday, where the meeting will deal with community issues. Mt. Vernon's application in the All-Kentucky City Contest will be considered.

"It cuts down duplication of service," Ms. White explained. "It is much simpler for the community to use and gives them 24-hour access to law officers."

Ms. White said that often citizens call all three numbers and policemen are sent where they are not needed. The Central Dispatch system will contain equipment to keep track of where police are at all times, so that proper help could be dispatched immediately.

"The system increases police response time," Ms. White said. "We find these systems make a big improvement in service to the community."

A contract is being drawn up between the city of Mt. Vernon and the Fiscal Court, which must be approved by the state Attorney General. Then the application must be approved by the Regional Crime Commission by July 24; by July 31, approved by the Kentucky Department of Justice; and then by September 14, by the Kentucky Crime Commission.

Rockcastle is seeking \$41,154, of which \$37,049 would come from the federal government. The rest comes equally from state and local monies. The grants are for personnel only, and not equipment, Ms. White said.

The amount includes training of personnel, which would take place in Richmond at Eastern Kentucky University's School of Law Enforcement.

School Board Hires Nine Teachers, Rejects All Bids on Roof Repair

Nine teachers, seven athletic coaches and an assistant principal were hired by the Rockcastle County School Board Tuesday night at a special meeting.

The new teachers will be given assignments later by Superintendent Charles Parsons. They are: Betty Jo McKinney, Johnny Hamm, Pam Cash, Kathy Bussell, Nancy Hale, Ladoy Parrett Graves, Larry B. Hammond, Patricia Renner and Debra Stevens.

Garbage Collection Costs More This Year

Garbage collections may be costing Rockcastle Countians more than anticipated.

In March of this year, the Fiscal Court entered into a contract with Multi-County Sanitation, owned by William K. Bullen. The three-year agreement directs the company to provide 48 dumpsters and pick up garbage from them at a rate of \$19,200 per year. But, the contract also provides that County Judge Executive Hubert Thacker may, by written order, direct that more dumpsters be added at a cost of \$40.00 per month and that more pick-ups can be made at a cost of \$7.00 each.

For the month of July, Multi-County's bill to the county amounted to \$1,800 for regular pick-ups and \$1,498 for extra ones. The hundred extra pick-ups were ordered in the company's first month as county garbage collector.

Since March, the average cost of garbage collection has been \$3,995 per month or \$40,740 per year. The county had been paying Rockcastle Sanitation Company about \$2,634 per month in 1977 or about \$31,608 per year.

The Fiscal Court held a special meeting Feb. 22 and voted to advertise for bids on garbage collection. Multi-County Sanitation submitted the only bid and it was accepted in a special meeting of Fiscal Court on March 2.

In a check of some nearby counties, it was found that several did not provide a garbage collection service. Jackson County depends on private collectors although the city of McKeen has its own system. Lancaster has garbage pick-up but the county of Garrard does not maintain the service. Jackson County provides a landfill but no garbage collection service.

Madison County recently did away with their system which was similar to Rockcastle County's.

Garbage collection in Rockcastle County is paid for through federal revenue sharing funds.

Head coaches will receive an additional \$2,000 above regular salary; assistant coaches will receive \$1,000 increment. They are: William D. Riddle, head basketball coach; Charles M. Carter, assistant basketball coach; Charles Norris, assistant basketball coach; Preston Parrett, head girls basketball coach and elementary Athletic Director; Judy Bullock, assistant girls basketball coach; David Hansen, assistant coach for 8th and 9th graders and Jack Laswell, baseball coach and secondary Athletic Director.

Mark McKinney was hired as a full-time assistant principal for the Mt. Vernon Elementary School. He has been teaching at Broadhead Elementary School and, before that, he taught at Rockcastle County High School.

Charles Baker, who has been in the Rockcastle school system for 17 years and is currently teaching high school chemistry, appeared at the meeting in support of his application for the assistant principal job at Mt. Vernon. Mr. Parsons explained to him that Mr. McKinney was Buford Parkerson's choice for the job after he had considered all applications. Mr. Parkerson is principal of Mt. Vernon Elementary.

E.J. Smith, who had been part-time assistant principal at Mt. Vernon Elementary, was hired as full-time worker in the Foods Service.

Mary Alice Hunt was hired at regular teacher's salary as a part-time Foods Service worker and part-time homebound teacher.

Bids on High School Roof

The Board rejected the two bids received for insulation and repair of the Rockcastle County High School roof. Mr. Parsons told representatives of the companies that the Board could not afford to pay \$65,000 as they had indicated in their bids.

Donald Shelton, a Lexington architect, agreed to revise the specifications on the roof so that the price could be lowered.

When asked why a six-year-old roof needed such extensive work, Mr. Shelton replied that he is familiar with many schools in Kentucky that have had the same roof problems that Rockcastle has.

Christian Appalachian Project Plans Family Life Center near Renfro

The Christian Appalachian Project will be expanding its work in Rockcastle County, according to executive director Mike McLaughlin.

One major project—a Family Life Retreat Center that may include as many as eight buildings—is now in the planning stages, he said. Small furniture-making shops are now in operation in Mt. Vernon.

Mr. McLaughlin said CAP purchased about 100 acres of land two months ago at auction near Renfro Valley (the old Parsons property) and is beginning to clear it off now so that "we can see the lay of the land." He said that building will begin next spring, but that trailers or other temporary shelters may

be used at first.

"It will be a center to strengthen family relationships and help marriages, he said.

The director of the center will be Len Spanjer.

Mr. McLaughlin said that CAP is now involved with 15 main development projects such as counseling centers, foster home care, and so on, and that workers in these projects have been concerned about family life.

"We find that many people who work with come from broken families or have suffered abuse in family relationships," he said. "We want to enrich the family and involve each member."

Mr. McLaughlin said that the programs at the center will be determined by the Rockcastle community.

He said he is sending out questionnaires and information letters in the next week, or so to gather opinions and recommendations from the community.

"We are not definite on the number of buildings we will have or what programs we will follow, because we want the community's ideas," he said.

Mr. McLaughlin said that Father Ralph Belling, founder of CAP, has several ideas in mind, such as a large dormitory-type building for family retreats and perhaps a lodge, but that CAP wants to see first what the

needs of people in this area, and nearness to CAP headquarters in Lancaster.

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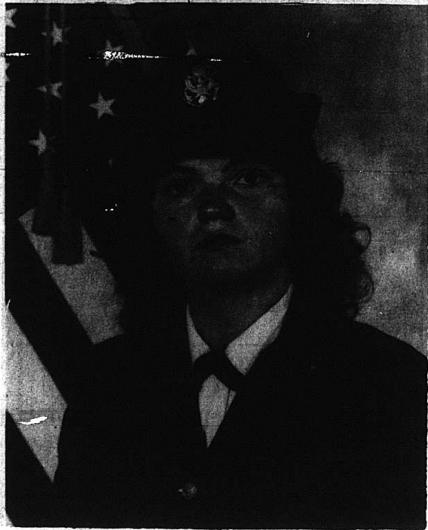

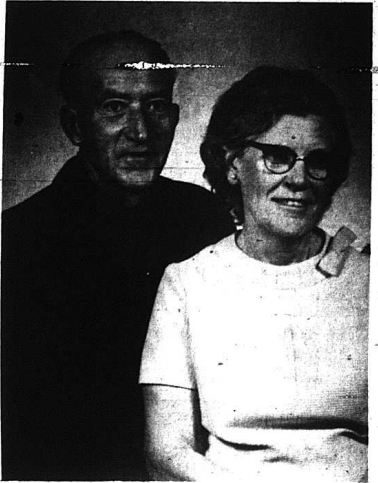

Making Jelly

Q. Jams, preserves, and marmalade must be processed for 5 minutes in a boiling-water-bath canner, but this is not recommended for jelly. Why not?

A. Jelly cannot withstand processing because the pectin tends to break down, causing the jelly to get runny.

A high concentration of sugar helps preserve the jelly, but there is still possibility of spoilage from mold and other micro-organisms getting in when the jelly is ladled from the kettle to the jar.

To help assure as safe a product as possible, sterilize the jars before filling with jelly and seal with hot paraffin immediately. Storing jelly in a cold place also helps. (But don't freeze it!)

Q. If you find mold on jelly, you can just scrape it off, can't you?

A. That's not a good idea. Some molds produce harmful toxins which can spread through the jelly without your noticing it. It's better to throw out one whole jar of jelly than take a chance.

Q. Why should you make no more than 6 to 8 cups of jelly at one time?

A. If you try to make a larger quantity, you have to cook it longer and the result is a softer jelly. It's best to follow a reliable recipe, making just the amount it calls for.

Using Ripe and Under-Ripe Fruit

Q. Why do you need to use a combination of ripe and under-ripe fruit for jelly?

A. It takes both pectin and acid for successful gel formation. There is more pectin and acid in under-ripe fruit than in

fully-ripe fruit. So if you make jelly without added pectin, you should use $\frac{1}{4}$ cup ripe-fruit and $\frac{1}{4}$ slightly under-ripe fruit.

Q. Are powdered and liquid pectin just about the same?

A. No, they are not interchangeable, and the type of pectin used decides when you add the sugar. Follow the instructions on the label.

Containers To Use

Q. May I re-use commercial peanut butter, baby food or mayonnaise jars for my jelly?

A. Yes. However, these commercial jars are not recommended for any other type of home preservation. For jelly, which is not processed in a canner, they are suitable.

Make sure the jars are clean, and that they are sterilized and still hot just before use. Handle with care, because there is a chance of breakage. Seal jelly with paraffin and use the original cap as a dust cover.

When Jelly Doesn't Jell

Q. Is there anything you can do about jelly or jam that doesn't jell?

A. Yes, remake it as follows: To remake with powdered pectin: measure out $\frac{1}{4}$ cup sugar, $\frac{1}{4}$ cup water and 4 teaspoons powdered pectin for each quart of jelly to be recooked. Mix pectin and water and bring to boil, stirring constantly to prevent scorching.

Add jelly and sugar, and stir thoroughly. Bring to a full rolling boil over high heat, stirring constantly. Boil mixture hard for 1 minute. Remove from heat, skim pour into hot sterilized containers, and seal with paraffin.

To remake with liquid pectin: Measure out $\frac{1}{4}$ cup sugar, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, and 2 tablespoons liquid pectin for each quart of jelly to be recooked. Mix with jelly and bring to a full rolling boil. Stir constantly. Boil mixture hard for 1 minute. Remove jelly from the heat, skim, pour into hot sterilized containers, and seal with paraffin.

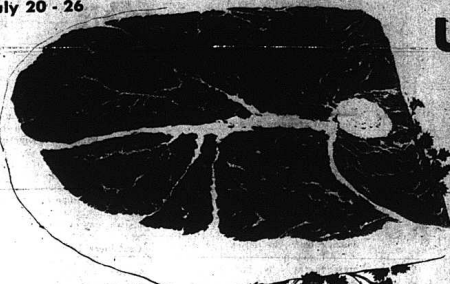

Brooks also has a speech compressor machine, which speeds up normal speech.
