

## Letters Urged to Back 'Loose-Lief' Program

Kentucky's burley growers are being urged to lend written support to a proposed federal regulation that would allow official grading and pricing support for a small quantity of baled loose-lief burley when this year's crop is sold.

Farmers have until Aug. 7 to tell the Department of Agriculture what they think of the proposal. Kentucky Farm Bureau, a chief proponent of loose-lief burley sales, is urging its members to initiate a heavy flow of mail in support of the new rules.

Two separate federal regulations will have to be amended to allow grading and price supports for an amount not yet defined in hands. Agriculture Secretary Bob Bergland is supporting the amendments, following their endorsement in May by the Council on Burley Tobacco, a group representing all segments of the tobacco industry.

The changes would apply only to this year's marketing season, and would allow some 5 percent of the 1978-79 crop to be sold in bales as a marketing experiment to allow farmers to try the new method. Marketing 1 to 2 percent of the bales would have to contain stalk cured tobacco, with leaves oriented (stems toward the outside of the bale).

Farmers who wish to participate in

the program would be required to apply for a loose-lief quota at their local ASCS offices. Most individual quotas would be capped at \$400 per acre, 5 percent, whichever is greater. No farmer would be required to sell any baled tobacco unless he chooses to do so.

Comments from farmers about the proposed rule changes should be sent to two separate addresses, Farm Bureau spokesmen noted. They are: Acting Director, Price Support and Loan Division, ASCS, P.O. Box 2415, Washington, D.C. 20013, and Hearing Clerk, U.S. Department of Agriculture, Room 1077, South Building, Washington, D.C. 20250.

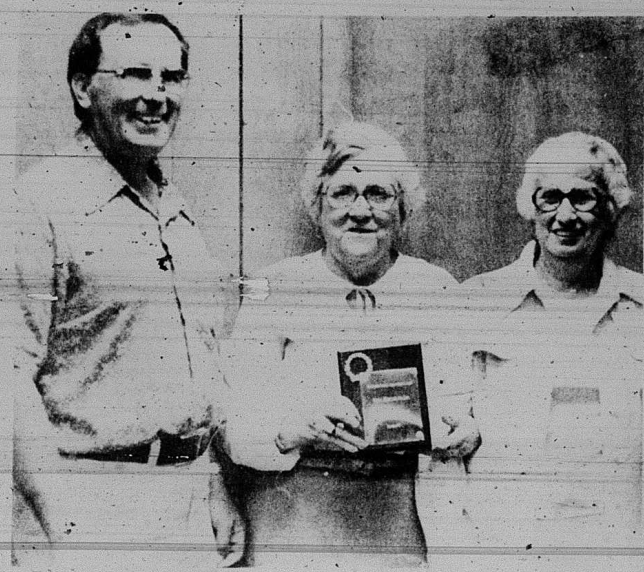

## Legislative Report

By Harold DeMarcus

House Bill 352 was enacted by the 1978 General Assembly, signed by the Governor and is now law. This measure creates a legislative program review and investigations committee as a permanent standing committee of the General Assembly.

This law establishes the committee's membership as four senators appointed by the President Pro Tempore, two senators appointed by the speaker, six representatives appointed by the speaker, and two representatives appointed by the House Minority Leader.

These appointments are required to be made at the beginning of each regular session for two-year terms. However, since this is a new committee, appointments were made prior to the start of interim committee meetings. The committee's actions are required to be by majority vote of full membership.

The Program Review Committee was designed by the General Assembly to give the legislature more input into the operation of state government during the legislative interim. The panel will have the power to make performance reviews of state agency operations in areas of agriculture, waste, education and health care, and other areas of public concern.

The committee will have subpoena power and will be able to call witnesses under oath. The committee has the power to order the production of agency documents or records and compel obedience by attachment of person or subpoenaed. They may deem a person who refuses to obey a subpoena guilty of contempt of the General Assembly, and the committee is permitted to institute criminal proceedings if a witness perjures himself before the committee.

Also the committee may, in rare instances, withhold state funds from a person who fails to respond to the subpoena or fails to make records available upon request. Whenever the committee points out deficiencies in a state agency, the agency must give immediate consideration to the committee's report.

## Social Security Pays Blind People Benefits

Over 120,000 people disabled by blindness and receiving \$5,000 or their dependents receive social security disability benefits, a social security representative said today.

The standards for determining substantial gainful activity for persons disabled by conditions other than blindness. Blind people need credit for a certain amount of work under social security to be eligible for benefits on their own record. In 1978, the amount ranges from 1 1/2 years to 8 1/2, depending on the age when he or she became blind.

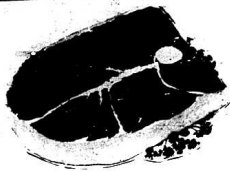

# County Agent's Notes

**Japanese Beetles in Eastern Kentucky**  
Japanese beetles are being found now in ornamentals in Eastern Kentucky. Corn growers should be aware that these beetles may spread to their crop, causing damage to corn in the early silk stage.

"These insects have been found primarily east of I-75 in the state so far this year," points out Chris Christensen, Extension entomologist in the UK College of Agriculture. "Producers in counties bordering this area should be aware of the possibility that they'll find Japanese beetles in their corn, too."

This beetle is one-third to five-eighths of an inch in length, with a greenish bronze or bronze head and upper thorax (body part to which the first pair of legs is attached). The center of the wing covers also is greenish bronze, and there are five white spots

along each side of the abdomen.

"The farmer should be concerned if 40 percent or more of his corn field is in the early silking stage and he has a heavy beetle population," Christensen says. "Their feeding on silks in this stage can halt or reduce pollination, preventing kernel set."

This entomologist says that checking your field is the best way to determine whether you have the problem. He recommends choosing five locations at random throughout the field, and checking 25 plants in each location.

Count all Japanese beetles on each ear. If the ears average more than two beetles each, use control measures. As a control in corn, Christensen suggests Sevin 50 percent wettable powder, applied aerially at 2-4 pounds per acre, in a minimum of 5 gallons of water per acre.

"If silks are brown, then pollination has occurred and kernel set has already taken place," he says. "So beetles can feed on the silks in this stage without causing damage to the corn."

Christensen says this beetle actually feeds on about 250 host plants, causing damage to ornamentals and fruit trees in particular. Roses, apples, peaches, plums, pears and grapes are some of its favorites. In general, he recommends use of Sevin dust to kill the pest on fruits and ornamentals around the home, but cautions its user to read label directions to determine which plants the substance may be used on.

**Spot Treatment for Johnsongrass Control**

An Extension weed control specialist advises farmers to spot-treat corn and soybean fields with a chemical to control johnsongrass, one of the worst weed problems in Kentucky.

"Spot treating is an important part of an overall johnsongrass control program because it reduces reinfestation from seed produced by plants left to mature in the field," says Bill Witt, in the UK College of Agriculture.

Roundup, the only herbicide labeled for spot treatments in corn and soybeans, will severely injure or kill the crop along with the weeds in the areas treated. But the specialist says this loss of crop is worth taking to reduce seed production of the costly weed.

For spot treatments, Witt recommends applying Roundup at the rate of 2 1/2 ounces per gallon of water when most of the johnsongrass is at least 18 inches tall. He cautions not to add a surfactant to the weed control chemical. Although corn and soybeans should be spot-treated if infested with johnsongrass, the specialist points out that it is easier to see and treat the weed in the shorter crop of soybeans.

## Food Preservation Clinic

### Home Canned Fruit Juice

Q. Fruits juiced in glass jars lose their beautiful deep color during storage. How can I stop them from fading?

A. Store them in the dark. If your storage area isn't light-proof, wrap the jars in newspaper or you could store them in the cardboard cartons the jars came in.

Q. What containers are best?

A. Use standard canning jars and lids for fruit juice. Never use ketchup bottles, soft drink bottles, or any other commercial containers not labeled for home canning purpose.

The glass is not suitable for the extremes of temperature encountered in home canning and the tops are not made for re-use. Breaking jars and tops that don't seal can make mockery of all your hard work.

Q. How does "nectar" or puree differ from fruit juice?

A. These are usually made from the juice of apricots, peaches and pears and are thickened with finely-sieved pulp. To serve as a beverage dilute with ice

water.  
Q. Why do crystals often form in home-canned grape juice?

A. These tartaric acid crystals are naturally occurring substance in grapes. They are harmless. To prevent this, refrigerate the juice for 24 hours after straining. Crystals will form and settle to the bottom as a sediment. Strain the juice again before canning.

This step is also necessary before making grape jelly to prevent the formation of crystals in your finished product.

Q. Is it necessary to add sugar to the juice?

A. No. Fruit juice may be canned without any sugar at all if you like it that way. Sugar is added for flavor only. It does not help preserve the juice.

### Canning Peaches

Wash peaches and remove skins. Dipping the fruit in boiling water, then quickly in cold water makes peeling easier. Cut peaches in half. Remove pits. Slice if desired. To keep fruit from darkening during preparation, drop it into anti-darkening solution. Drain just before heating or packing raw.

Raw Pack: Pack raw fruit to 1/2 inch top. Cover with boiling syrup, leaving 1/2 inch head space. Wipe jar rims clean. Adjust jar lids. Process in boiling water bath. Pint jars 25 minutes, quart jars 30 minutes.

As soon as you remove jars from canner, complete seals if necessary.

Hot Pack: Heat peaches thoroughly in boiling water. Drain. Pack into jar. Cover with boiling liquid, leaving 1/2 inch head space. Wipe jar rims clean. Adjust jar lids. Process in boiling water bath. Pint jars 20 minutes, quart jars 30 minutes.

As soon as your remove jars from canner, complete seals if necessary.

### Canning Pears

Wash pears. Peel, cut in halves, and core. Continue as with peaches, either raw or hot pack.



# Medicare Can Cover Home Health Care

Home health care is a valuable part of the protection under Medicare, a social security spokesman said today.

Sometimes people do not need full-time skilled care they receive in a hospital or other health facility, but still have an illness or injury that prevents them from leaving home to receive the health services they need.

This is when home health care under Medicare can play an important role. People who need part time skilled health services can receive home health care in their homes from a home health agency. Both Medicare hospital insurance and medical insurance can help pay for covered home health services.

Medicare can pay for these home health services: Part time skilled nursing services, physical therapy or speech therapy.

If a person needs one or more of these services, then Medicare can also pay for the following services if necessary: Part time services of an occupational therapist, home health aide or medical social worker, and medical supplies and the use of medical appliances furnished by the home health agency.

Medicare hospital insurance can pay for home health care if all of the following six conditions are met:

1. There is a qualifying hospital stay of at least 3 days.
2. The home health care is for further treatment of a medical condition which was treated in the hospital or covered skilled nursing facility stay.
3. Part time skilled nursing care or physical therapy or speech therapy is needed.
4. The person is confined to his or her home.
5. A doctor prescribes home health care and sets up a home health care plan within 14 days of the most recent discharge from a hospital or participating skilled nursing facility; and
6. The home health agency takes part in Medicare.

Medicare medical insurance can

cover home health care if conditions 3, 4, 5 and 6 are met. There is no need for a hospital stay under medical insurance. Hospital insurance can pay the full cost of up to 100 home health visits in a benefit period. The visits can be used for up to 12 months after discharge from a hospital or skilled nursing facility.

Medical insurance can also pay the full cost of up to 100 home health visits in each calendar year. After the 90th annual deductible is met.

A free leaflet, Home health care under Medicare is available at any social security office. It gives more details about home health care under Medicare. The address and telephone number of the nearest social security office can be found in the telephone directory under "Social Security Administration."

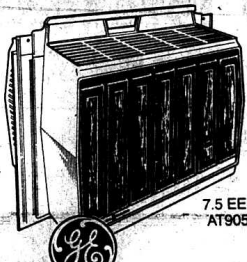

## Fishing Report

White bass fishing in the jumps and black bass fishing at night continue to dominate main lake fishing on Kentucky's 15 major lakes with several tailwaters reporting fair to good angling for catfish and trout. The lake by lake rundown, according to the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources:

**Laurel:** trout good at night still fishing worms and nightcrawlers off points and deep banks; bluegill good off deep banks; clear, stable, three feet below power pool and 86 degrees.

**Cumberland:** black bass fair at night on spinner baits and artificial nightcrawlers off points and deep banks and on the lower lake, in jumps on surface lures and plunker and fly combination; white bass fair early and late on the lower lake on surface lures and plunker and fly combination in the jumps and at night still fishing minnows off rocky deep banks; in tailwaters, catfish and trout fair; clear to murky, stable at pool and 81 degrees.

**Nolin:** black bass fair at night on artificial nightcrawlers over submerged cover; white bass slow early and late on plunker and fly combination in the jumps; in tailwaters, trout fair; clear, stable at pool and 83 degrees.

**Rough River:** white bass fair early mornings on plunker and fly combination, spinners and spoons in the jumps;

two feet below pool and 85 degrees.

**Barkley:** bluegill slow on flyrod poppers and still fishing worms and crickets in inlets and bays; black bass slow on artificial nightcrawlers over submerged cover; in tailwaters, catfish good; clear, falling slowly, two feet below pool and 88 degrees.

**Dale Hollow:** white bass fair early and late on plunker and fly combination in the jumps; black bass fair at night on artificial nightcrawlers off deep banks and in weed beds; clear, falling slowly, 2 1/2 feet below pool and 85 degrees.

**Herrington:** bluegill fair early and late still and drift fishing worms and crickets off deep banks; catfish and white perch fair still fishing soft crawfish off points; clear, stable at pool and 82 degrees.

**Barren:** bluegill fair off deep rocky banks; white bass slow to fair early and late on plunker and fly combination in the jumps and at night still fishing minnows off rocky deep banks; in tailwaters, catfish and trout fair; clear to murky, stable at pool and 81 degrees.

**Nolin:** black bass fair at night on artificial nightcrawlers over submerged cover; white bass slow early and late on plunker and fly combination in the jumps; in tailwaters, trout fair; clear, stable at pool and 83 degrees.

**Rough River:** white bass fair early mornings on plunker and fly combination, spinners and spoons in the jumps;

**Barren:** bluegill fair off deep rocky banks; white bass slow to fair early and late on plunker and fly combination in the jumps and at night still fishing minnows off rocky deep banks; in tailwaters, catfish and trout fair; clear to murky, stable at pool and 81 degrees.

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**Nolin:** black bass fair at night on artificial nightcrawlers over submerged cover; white bass slow early and late on plunker and fly combination in the jumps; in tailwaters, trout fair; clear, stable at pool and 83 degrees.

**Rough River:** white bass fair early mornings on plunker and fly combination, spinners and spoons in the jumps;

black bass slow early and late and at night on artificial nightcrawlers off rocky points and deep banks; clear to murky, falling slowly, one foot above pool and 88 degrees.

**Green:** bluegill fair early and late off deep banks; black bass slow at night on artificial nightcrawlers off points and over drop-offs; in tailwaters, trout fair, clear, stable at pool and 84 degrees.

**Fishtrap:** crappie fair late evenings and at night over submerged cover; catfish slow at night still fishing cut bait in the backwaters; clear, stable at pool and 83 degrees.

**Buckhorn:** bluegill fair off shallow banks; catfish slow at night still fishing worms and cut bait off points; clear, stable at pool and 83 degrees.

**Cave Run:** Musky slow to fair trolling deep runners over main channel and casting deep runners in timbered coves; crappie slow to fair over submerged cover; in tailwaters, crappie slow to fair; clear, falling, six inches above pool and 81 degrees.

**Dewey:** Crappie fair early and late over submerged cover; clear; stable at pool and 87 degrees.

**Grayson:** bluegill slow off deep banks; crappie slow early and late around stick ups; in tailwaters, trout fair; clear, stable at pool and 87 degrees.

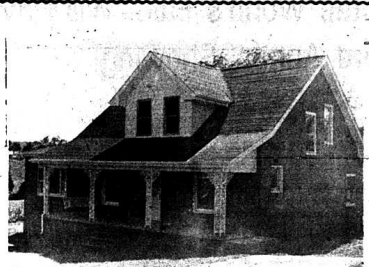

## KSP Activity Report

During the month of June, the Kentucky State Police Post at London report the following activity:

532 motorists were issued citations for moving hazardous violations; 259 motorists were issued citations for other traffic violations; 737 persons were issued warnings for faulty equipment and different traffic violations; 206 motorists were assisted with break downs, given tourist information, etc.

A total of 270 traffic accidents were investigated. Of these, 194 were property damage only accidents; 72 were personal injury accidents; there were 4 fatal accidents; 139 persons were injured and 6 persons were killed.

77 motorists were arrested for driving while under the influence of intoxicants, 88 criminal investigations were made resulting in 291 criminal arrests. 23 stolen vehicles were recovered, 507 persons attended 7 safety programs conducted by the KSP.

During the month of June the Kentucky State Police at London report the following activity for Rockcastle County:

100 motorists were issued citations for moving hazardous violations, 29 motorists were issued citations for other traffic violations, 105 motorists were issued warnings for faulty equipment and different traffic violations; 90 motorists were assisted with tourist information, breakdowns, etc.

30 total traffic accidents were investigated; of these, 21 were property damage only accidents; 6 were personal injury accidents; there was 1 fatal accident; 17 persons were injured and 1 person was killed.

The nitrate causes the soil to become acid, and the acid releases the manganese," he said.

By putting limestone on the soil before planting, the acid condition can be overcome. Mr. Durham can help by testing your soil for acidity and estimating how much limestone your soil needs.

Unfortunately, there is not too much you can do for your crop this year if it does have manganese toxicity, Mr. Durham said. Occasionally, plants will recover and develop a normal green color later in the season.

"Some are using burned lime, but we tend to think that's a waste of money," he said.

Mr. Durham advises that if you have enough land, you can lime the soil after the tobacco crop and seed the field with a grass or grass legume. The soil should sufficiently recover.

"But we don't want them to overlime," Mr. Durham said, "because that causes other problems."

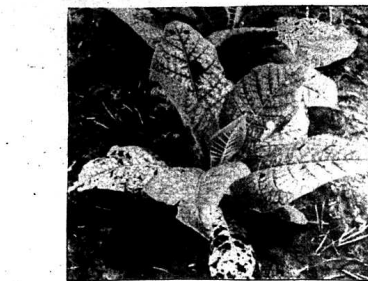

# Kentucky Afield

By John Wilson

One of the most impressive catches to come from Kentucky waters in recent years is our new state record rockfish. Not only is the size of the fish spectacular—45 pounds, 8 ounces—but the fact that it was caught on six-pound test line makes the catch even more outstanding.

Walter C. Lilly, Milton, West Virginia, caught the fish on a Countdown Rapala in the Beaver Creek section of Lake Cumberland April 16.

The previous record, a 44 pound, 4 ounce rockfish, was taken from Herrington Lake in 1970. Rockfish, which are actually landlocked striped bass, were first stocked in Kentucky waters in 1952.

In addition to providing some excellent big game sport fishing (as coastal fishermen have long known and as more and more freshwater anglers are finding out) the rockfish also helps improve fishing for other game species by utilizing adult gizzard shad.

These shad quickly grow too large to be eaten by other game fish, such as black bass, but they are just right for a rockfish. Without some kind of control, gizzard shad might overpopulate and game fish populations could suffer as a result.

Shad can be controlled by selective poisoning, but it is much less expensive and more environmentally sound to find a natural way to limit populations—and the rockfish seems to be an answer.

Fisheries biologists used to attempt shad eradication programs, but now their aim is to find ways to utilize these fish. Young gizzard shad are an important source of food for bass, crappie and other game fish, while adult shad can provide food for rockfish.

If shad do overpopulate, they don't spawn regularly—overcrowding will cause many species to inhibit reproduction—and a shad spawning failure means less food for game fish. But if the rockfish keep the shad numbers below this saturation point, an annual shad spawn will occur, assuring continual available forage for game fish. Some bass fishermen have expressed concern that the rockfish will prey on or compete with black bass, but biological studies have shown that these fears are unfounded—bass and rockfish occupy different parts of the lake. Bass are basically creatures of the shorelines and bottom, while rockfish are open water roamers.

Herrington Lake, about 20 miles south of Lexington, probably has the best rockfish population right now, but Lake Cumberland isn't far behind. More and more of these fish are also being taken below Kentucky and Barkley dams and Barren River Lake and the Ohio River are receiving regular stockings.

As populations grow and fishermen start learning more about how to catch rockfish, its popularity should grow considerably. This, biologists think, should lead to another fringe benefit—as more anglers turn their attention to

## Is Conscience a Safe Guide?

Many people say, "It does not matter what one believes or does in religion, just so he follows his conscience."

This is not true in secular matters. In traveling on the highways, we do not follow conscience about the road to take—we use the road map. In matters of health, we don't follow our conscience—we want a doctor. We may take poison in all good conscience and die because our conscience was wrong.

Honestly, sincerely and the good conscience do not change the physical laws of nature. Nature's laws were framed by the same God who gave us the laws of religion and worship. Why then should we think conscience could change any of God's laws?

Conscience is not safe in the business world. Sincerity does not keep banks from failing, business from going broke, or companies from losing money. It is not enough in marriage. Many marriages fail, not because of insincerity, but because of other factors.

If conscience is not safe in these matters, why should we think it safe in religion? Conscience is not our guide; it serves as a court. It is the exercise of one's judgement of knowledge previously acquired.

Conscience may accuse or excuse (Rom. 2:12-15) or bear witness (Rom. 9:1). Conscience is only what we are going contrary to what we have been taught. When one is doing what he has been taught to be right

(whether or not it is right), his conscience is clear and is spoken of in the Bible as good (Acts 23:1, pure (2 Tim. 1:3) and void of offence (Acts 24:16). If one violates what he had been taught, his conscience is said to be defiled (Titus 1:15) or seared (1 Tim. 4:2).

Conscience should not be violated (Rom. 14:14). However, to think a thing is right does not make it right, for the Apostle Paul persecuted Christians with a good conscience (Gal. 1:13; Acts 26:9-10; Acts 23:1).

What then is our guide? In religion it is the BIBLE only. "Through thy precepts I get understanding..." (Psa. 119:104) Christ has all authority (Matt. 28:18). We must not go beyond His word (2 John 9). Reject His word and you will be rejected (John 12:48). We will be judged by His word (Rev. 20:12); not by our conscience.

Conscience is not a safe guide. The Bible, God's Word, is the only safe guide in religious matters. To learn what is contained therein and to follow it is to be guided safely and thus one will be assured of having a good conscience.
