Be Aware That: Second generation European Corn Borer populations are much lower than expected. The reasons for this are unclear but are probably related to heavy rains in some areas and a very spread-out emergence of European Corn Borer moths from the first generation larvae. Growers with late corn, peppers and snap beans should continue to monitor fields closely. The second generation of budworms is beginning to infest late tobacco; Mexican bean beetles are beginning a second generation on soybeans along the Ohio.

Expect Problems With: Hornworms and aphids on tobacco; flea flies on cattle; Japanese beetles on various plants in eastern Kentucky; corn earworms on sweet corn; potato leaf hoppers yellowing and stunting alfalfa; fall webworm and locust leafminers delimiting trees.

Corn Insect Situation: Hold your breath for it looks as if the second brood

European corn borers may disperse to a large extent and thereby not cause severe pressure on the crop. This often occurs following heavy first brood pressure.

Fall Armyworms are causing isolated damage ranging from light to moderate. Remember, last year we tried many different insecticides for control with only moderate success. The best control material is methomyl (Lannate or Nudrin).

Fall armyworms feeding in the world in late planted corn can be controlled with spray applications. Worms feeding on the tassels shoot; the fungus produces spores that can infect leaves higher on the plant. The spores are spread by splashing rain, by wind currents, and by field implements. Warm, moist weather conditions favor disease development and spread. Poorly nourished plants are more susceptible to early blight than are vigorously growing plants. Fungicides, such as Bravo, Dymone and Maneb and mancozeb can be used to protect tomatoes from early blight. Applications can be made often during rainy weather. Follow instructions on the label and observe waiting days to harvest.

Tomato Early Blight  
Early blight disease is regularly the most damaging disease of tomato in Kentucky. The disease appears first on spots on the leaflet. They are circular to angular, dark brown to black, and range

from the size of a pin point up to about 10 mm in diameter.

Concave ridges often form in the leathery-appearing necrotic tissue to produce a characteristic target-board effect. When spots are numerous, the infected leaflet yellows and dies prematurely. The leaves wither up and droop and often drop off. The disease begins on the lowest leaves and gradually works up the plant. Many tomato plantings have been showing symptoms of early blight for several weeks. However, in some home garden plantings, the disease is just beginning to develop, especially on the Rampo variety which seems to develop the disease later than many others. As lesions begin to develop on lower leaves, the fungus produces spores that can infect leaves higher on the plant. The spores are spread by splashing rain, by wind currents, and by field implements. Warm, moist weather conditions favor disease development and spread. Poorly nourished plants are more susceptible to early blight than are vigorously growing plants. Fungicides, such as Bravo, Dymone and Maneb and mancozeb can be used to protect tomatoes from early blight. Applications can be made often during rainy weather. Follow instructions on the label and observe waiting days to harvest.

### Vegetables With a Different Taste

If you're tired of serving the vegetables from your garden in the "same old way", here are some recipes to take advantage of the fresh and nutritious in garden produce available now.

#### Fresh Corn Pudding

- 6-8 ears fresh corn with corn removed
- 2 cups milk or half & half
- 3-4 eggs, well beaten
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup margarine
- 2 tablespoons flour

Mix corn, flour, sugar and salt. Add well beaten eggs and milk. Heat on range over low heat until warm. Melt margarine in baking dish, pour part of corn mixture over it and mix, then pour remaining corn into baking dish. Bake at 350 degrees for one hour.

#### Scalloped Cabbage and Cheese

- 1 head cabbage
  - 1 can cream of celery soup
  - 1/2 cups grated cheese
  - buttered bread crumbs
- Cook cabbage in boiling water for 7 minutes, drain. Alternate layers of cabbage and cheese in buttered casserole dish. Pour soup over mixture. Top with bread crumbs. Bake at 425 degrees until hot and bubbly.

#### Squash Casserole

- 6 small zucchini squash or yellow crookneck squash, sliced 1/4" thick
  - 4 medium tomatoes, sliced
  - 1/4 cup salad oil
  - 1/4 teaspoon oregano
  - 1/4 teaspoon basil
  - 1/2 cup shredded cheddar cheese
  - salt and pepper
  - 1/4 cup bread crumbs
  - 2 tablespoons margarine
  - 1/4 cup parmesan cheese
- Saute squash in oil and drain. Combine spices and cheeses. Alternate layers of squash, tomatoes and cheese layers in buttered baking dish. Mix crumbs and melted margarine, top casserole. Bake 25 min. at 350 degrees.

#### Corn Fritters

- 1 cup sifted flour
  - 1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
  - 1 tablespoon sugar
  - 4 teaspoon salt
  - 1 egg
  - 1/2 cup milk
  - 1/2 cup corn
- Mix dry ingredients together. Add eggs, milk and corn. Drop batter into hot fat, teaspoon at a time. Maintain fat at 350 F. Fry fritters until golden brown, turning once. Drain on towel. Serve hot with butter and jelly.

## Livingston Men Form Volunteer Fire Department Dept.

Livingston has its first volunteer fire department organized by Bobby Wilson who is now serving as Fire Chief. The 16 volunteers held their third regular meeting Tuesday night, and heard descriptions of firemen's gear by a salesperson. All but two members have had at least twenty hours of training in putting out fires.

"We've learned to climb ladders, locate trouble, and some emergency medical techniques," said Calvin Webb, assistant Fire Chief. Mr. Webb, a member of the Livingston City Council, maintains the 19-year-old fire truck, which once belonged to the city of London.

Mr. Webb and Mr. Wilson have had over 40 hours of training, some of it through the Mt. Vernon Fire Department. The group will start regular drills at their next meeting, held the first and third Tuesdays of the month. "If we drill regularly, we should qualify for lower insurance rates," Mr. Wilson said. The city of Livingston now carries the lowest possible rating (A1FD) for home owners' insurance purposes. Mr. Wilson said anyone is welcome to volunteer.

## State's A Good Tenant Here: Pays \$4800 Rent to County

Laurel County officials have told the state of Kentucky that it is until September 4 to clear out of the courthouse because the state has not paid its rent. Could such a situation ever happen in Rockcastle County? Judge Executive Hubert Thacker says no.

"The state has been paying \$4800 a year to rent the office in the courthouse," Judge Thacker said. "And under the new system that started in July, we stand to get more money." Laurel County was to receive \$1,250 a year in rent, but no money was ever paid because state and county officials could never agree on the amounts.

Rockcastle received its rent money on time, Judge Thacker said. Under the system that was recently passed in House Bill 214, each county will be paid according to the real estate value of its courthouse and by how many square feet the state is using. The state will also pay its share of utilities, Judge Thacker said.

An appraisal of the courthouse was performed June 30 by Ford Realty and Auction Company, Inc. to conform with the new laws. The company put the value of the building at \$1,040,000, based on \$65 per square foot. The lot is worth \$70,000, according to the appraisal, making a total of \$1,112,000. Under the new law, the state is to pay 4% of the appraised value of the building based on the proportion of the building it is using. If the state of Kentucky is occupying half the office in the courthouse, its yearly rent becomes four percent of \$1,112,000 or \$22,240 (plus utility costs).

Courthouse utilities last year cost the county over \$17,100. Judge Thacker said that the state has not yet approved the Ford Company's appraisal figures or agreed to any lease contracts. "I don't see any problems," he said. "We have never had any problem getting our rent." But Laurel County is different. According to Skip Garrison, a reporter who covers the Laurel County courthouse for a London newspaper, county officials there are concerned about the cost of operating jail-\$55,000 a year. Under the new judicial system that came into effect last year, fines that people pay go to the state rather than the county. It was partly because Laurel County lost revenue this was that it would not accept the state's \$1250 a year rent.

## FHA Announces \$4 Billion Available To Farmers Caught in Credit Squeeze

President Carter recently signed a bill to provide up to \$4 billion of additional credit to the nation's farmers. Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland said loans under the new law would be available next week through the department's Farmers Home Administration (FmHA). The new economic emergency loan program will offer special help to farmers who face a shortage of credit from regular sources or who are particularly hard hit by the current combination of rising production costs and lower prices for their crops and livestock. Under the program, these farmers can borrow up to \$400,000 at an unsubsidized interest rate to sustain their normal farm operations or refinance existing debt. FmHA will guarantee loans by commercial lenders or make loans directly to farmers who lack other sources of necessary credit. Other provisions of the new Agricultural Credit Act of 1978 will go into effect in about two weeks. According to Bergland, they will: -double loan limits in regular FmHA programs for farm ownership and operations; -raise limits on farm loans made by private lenders and guaranteed by FmHA; -make loans to family-sized farms operated by partnerships, cooperatives and corporations. Previous restrictions on eligibility to farmers operating as individuals. The interest rate on economic emergency loans made directly by FmHA will be 8 1/2 percent. Rates on future loans will be based on the government's cost of borrowing. In the case of FmHA guaranteed loans, interest rates are negotiated between the borrower and lender, with FmHA guaranteeing up to 90 percent of the loan. Loans for operating purposes will be made for up to 7 years. Loans that are

with different agencies in the Dept. of Defense. Gregg Stephens, Soil Conservation Officer in Rockcastle County, said that "no way was \$14.2 million spent in flood control here last year." County Judge Executive Hubert Thacker said also there was no such major project. The Signal checked with the company's headquarters in North Carolina, where spokesmen said to work had been done by them in Rockcastle County last year. Then the reporter contacted U.S. Representative Tim Lee Carter's office. He said the \$14.2 million had been spent in Livingston County. Mr. Jeannette later confirmed this error. The press release allegedly gave an accounting of how all federal money was spent here on an item by item basis. Rep. Carter's office said these accountings were often wrong in places and that for this reason Rep. Carter does not distribute the figures. Among the large amounts spent here, the figures show so follows for fiscal year ending June 30, 1978: -Food Stamps, \$1.0 million. -Medical Assistance, \$339,000. -Disabled Child, \$38,000. -Social Security, \$2.8 million. -State Services and Public Assistance, \$1.0 million. -Unemployment Compensation, \$12,000. Dept. of Agriculture, \$1.68 million. -HFA, \$307,000. -Civil Service Retirement, \$436,000. -Post Office, \$622,000. -Veterans Administration, \$666,000. The release figured Rockcastle's share of interest on the national debt to be \$800,000 last year. Large contracts to provide supply to the military went to McCandless Co., \$146,000 and Balle Coal Company, \$462,000.

## Mt. Vernon Signal Finds \$14.2 Million Government Account Error

The Mt. Vernon Signal has found an \$14.2 million error in government accounts. Sen. Wendell Ford recently sent a press release to the Signal, that said \$29.8 million in federal money was spent last year in Rockcastle County. Of that, according to the release, \$15.3 million went to the Department of Defense. Mike Jeannette, Ford's office liaison, told the Signal that \$14.2 million went

with different agencies in the Dept. of Defense. Gregg Stephens, Soil Conservation Officer in Rockcastle County, said that "no way was \$14.2 million spent in flood control here last year." County Judge Executive Hubert Thacker said also there was no such major project. The Signal checked with the company's headquarters in North Carolina, where spokesmen said to work had been done by them in Rockcastle County last year. Then the reporter contacted U.S. Representative Tim Lee Carter's office. He said the \$14.2 million had been spent in Livingston County. Mr. Jeannette later confirmed this error. The press release allegedly gave an accounting of how all federal money was spent here on an item by item basis. Rep. Carter's office said these accountings were often wrong in places and that for this reason Rep. Carter does not distribute the figures. Among the large amounts spent here, the figures show so follows for fiscal year ending June 30, 1978: -Food Stamps, \$1.0 million. -Medical Assistance, \$339,000. -Disabled Child, \$38,000. -Social Security, \$2.8 million. -State Services and Public Assistance, \$1.0 million. -Unemployment Compensation, \$12,000. Dept. of Agriculture, \$1.68 million. -HFA, \$307,000. -Civil Service Retirement, \$436,000. -Post Office, \$622,000. -Veterans Administration, \$666,000. The release figured Rockcastle's share of interest on the national debt to be \$800,000 last year. Large contracts to provide supply to the military went to McCandless Co., \$146,000 and Balle Coal Company, \$462,000.

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## City Council Moves to Pass Ordinance To Ban Swimming in Lake Linville

Following a drowning last week in Lake Linville, the Mt. Vernon City Council moved to pass an ordinance to prohibit swimming there at all times. The motion passed unanimously at the regular Council meeting Monday night.

Mayor Roland Mullins said the ordinance would be strictly enforced. Decisions concerning a sentencing project and revenue sharing funds were put over to a special called meeting to be held August 21.

A Lexington-based building contractor, Bob Williams, is investigating delays about a senior citizens' project that was to have been constructed this fall by Rural Development Associates of Knoxville, Tenn. Mr. Williams will report at next Monday's meeting.

## New Reading Emphasis, Annual State Tests Stressed at Rockcastle Teachers' Meeting

Teachers in Rockcastle County were introduced to two important new programs mandated this year by the Kentucky legislature. Representative from the Frankfort office of the State Board of Education explained the programs at an in-service meeting August 10, held at Rockcastle County High School.

"Some of these mandates might better apply to other counties," he said, "but we all have to follow them."

One program is designed to improve the quality of education in general; the other emphasizes reading. They are explained by Charles Parsons, superintendent of schools, agreed that the money might be put to uses, but said there is no choice but to obey the laws.

Teachers who retired in the last two years were honored at an in-service day for teachers Aug. 10, held at the Rockcastle County High School.

## Legislative Report

 Without question, Kentucky's most valuable resource is its people. After all, the Commonwealth is nothing more than the people within its boundary. The 1978 General Assembly was fully aware of this fact, that is why we passed many bills which will contribute to better health care for all Kentuckians.  
 House Bill 717 establishes the Kentucky Cancer Commission to fund and coordinate cancer research in the state and appropriate \$2 million to build research facilities.  
 House Bill 817 establishes a "bill of rights" for nursing home patients to guarantee that they are properly treated. House Bill 219 directs the state's Department for Human Resources to conduct unannounced inspections of nursing homes and other long-term care facilities.  
 House Bills 217 and 219 were developed by the legislature's subcommittee on Long Term Care after extensive research by subcommittee members who visited many long-term care facilities prior to the beginning of the 1978 session.  
 House Bill 497 requires hospitals with emergency services to have a doctor on call at all times to examine rape victims and advise them of available medical services.  
 House Bill 686 increase state control of Kentucky's 15 community mental health programs. The new law will allow state officials to make changes in local programs if they are not being properly operated. This measure resulted from the efforts of a special legislative committee which studied the operation and financing of the state's Comprehensive Care Centers.  
 Senate Bill 179 will require insurance companies to include alcoholism treatment coverage in group health

insurance plans.  
 House Bill 17 allow state medical assistance recipients to get dentures and have them paid for under the medicare assistance program.  
 Senate Bill 109 creates within the Department for Human Resources the office of the Surgeon General. This measure requires the Surgeon General to be a licensed physician and to serve as the chief medical officer of the Commonwealth.  
 House Bill 186 establishes a program to obtain information concerning the "Sudden Infant Death Syndrome" and requires the distribution of information regarding the characteristics and incidence of this menace to the general public.  
 In addition to the above-mentioned bills, the legislature also approved a \$9.8 million appropriation for facilities to care for critically ill newborn babies. This includes new funding for 14 regional hospitals to add facilities to provide neonatal care and increased money to the University of Kentucky Medical Center to improve the facilities there.

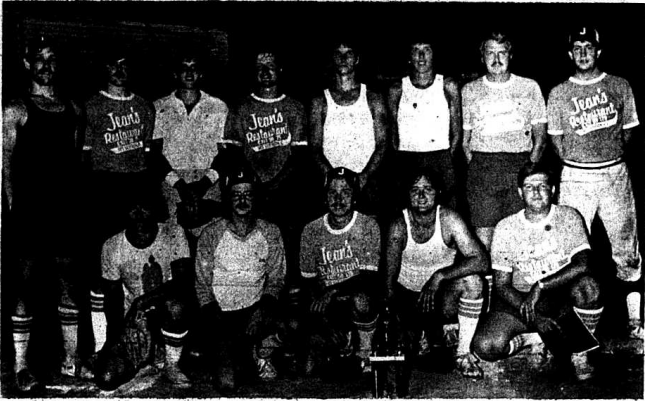

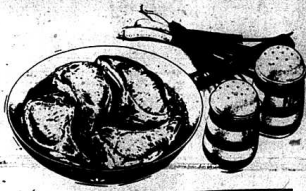

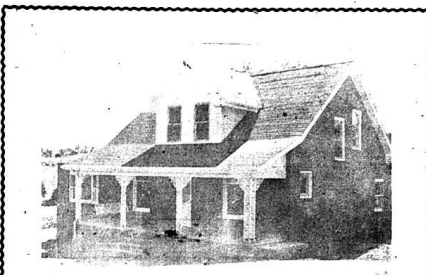

## Two UK Medical Students End Summer of Rural Practice

Two University of Kentucky medical students ended a summer of learning about rural medicine at Rockcastle County Hospital last Friday.

Both students said that the experience convinced them that they wanted to become "country doctors."

Jim Cohen and Dexter Napier, both from Louisville, worked at the hospital as part of the MECO Program, state-funded project designed to interest doctors in practicing in rural areas.

Luke Dober, hospital administrator, said this was the first year the county participated in MECO which means Medical Education-Community Orientation.

"Fayette County has one doctor for every 200 people," Mr. Dober said. "This program is to expose students to rural medicine in the hope more doctors will come here where they are needed rather than in the cities."

Mr. Dober said the students were "Wonderful for the morale of the hospital" and that the questions they asked kept the nurses on their toes."

Mr. Cohen and Mr. Napier said the first two weeks of the program were spent becoming familiar with the hospital. Then each student spent four weeks with either Dr. Orson Arvin or Dr. G.H. Griffith.

"We went on their rounds, observed procedures, just followed them all through their working day," Mr. Cohen said.

They were both impressed with how long and hard this "working day" was. Mr. Cohen said he thought rural doctors had to know more because they had to handle cases alone rather than rely on other doctors who might be available at a large city hospital. But he said he thought the kinds of medical problems here were the same as a general practitioner may find anywhere.

"Mr. Napier said he was leaning toward a country practice before he came here, but now he was convinced that is what he wants to do."

"Urban hospitals are impersonal," he said. "The staff here has less social stratification. They care more about each other personally, and have better relationships with the employees."

Mr. Cohen had not given a rural practice much thought before this summer, but his Rockcastle Experience definitely made up his mind.

The students stayed in an apartment near the hospital and were paid a salary. They both have 3 more years of medical school and then residence programs before becoming licensed doctors.

## School Entrance Age

Any child whose 8th birthday falls between September 1st and December 31st, 1978, must register their child in the Kindergarten this year, 1978, in order for them to be able to enter the first grade the next school year of 1979-80.

Below is an explanation of the State Law that regulates the entrance age.

School Entrance Age (H.B. No. 92)-Changes go into effect July 1, 1978. No change this year.

1. For first grade and kindergarten, the entrance age was moved from December 31 to September 1.

2. Parent or guardian may petition the state board to allow children becoming five between September 1 and December 31, 1979, to enter kindergarten at beginning of school term.

3. Parent or guardian may petition state board to allow children becoming six between September 1 and December 31, 1979, to enter first grade at beginning of school term.

4. Any child completing kindergarten during 1978-79 shall be eligible to enroll in first grade for school year 1979-80.

5. Children that are six years of age on or before September 1, 1979, come under the compulsory attendance laws.

## Fishing Report

With surface water temperatures now in the low 80's, fishing is generally fair on the state's 15 major lakes with some good bluegill fishing to be found. The lake-by-lake rundown, as compiled by the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources:

Green: Bluegill good off rocky points and over drop-offs, crappie fair over submerged cover, in tailwaters, catfish and trout fair; clear to murky to muddy, rising slowly, two feet above pool and 81 degrees.

Laurel: Trout fair to good at night still and drift fishing worms and nightcrawlers off deep points and deep banks; bluegill fair to good on flyrod poppers and by stillfishing worms and crickets around stick ups; clear, stable, 3 1/2 feet below power pool and 81 degrees.

Herrington: Bluegill good still and drift fishing crickets and horseweed worms off deep banks; rockfish slow casting deep runners in the are of the dam; clear to murky, rising slowly, 2 1/2 feet above pool and 81 degrees.

Barren: Black bass fair to good early and late and at night on artificial nightcrawlers off deep banks and points; white bass slow to fair trolling deep runners with trailers over flats; clear to murky to muddy, rising slowly, two feet above pool and 80 degrees.

Cave Run: Musky fair casting and trolling deep runners in timbered coves and over main channel drop-offs; black bass fair at night on spinner baits and artificial nightcrawlers off deep banks and over drop-offs; clear to murky, falling slowly, one foot above pool and 82 degrees.

Cumberland: Crappie fair still and drift fishing minnows over submerged cover; white bass fair on the lower lake early and late on plunker and fly combination in jumps and slow on the upper lake at night with crappie off deep banks and points; in tailwaters, crappie and trout fair; clear to murky to muddy, stable, 15 feet below the timberline and 83 degrees.

Grayson: Crappie fair around stick ups; bluegill fair in inlets and bays; in tailwaters, trout slow, clear to murky, falling slowly, two feet above pool and 81 degrees.

Dale Hollow: White bass fair early and late on plunker and fly combination in the jumps; black bass slow to fair at night on artificial nightcrawlers off deep banks and in weed beds; clear to murky, stable, three feet below pool and 82 degrees.

Kentucky: Black bass fair and improving on buzz baits and artificial nightcrawlers at the heads of inlets and bays and off shallow banks; sauger slow to fair trolling deep runners over ridge tops; in tailwaters, catfish and sauger slow to fair, clear to murky, stable, three feet below pool and 80 degrees.

Barkley: Black bass slow to fair on surface lures, artificial nightcrawlers and crank baits in inlets and bays; crappie and trout slow to fair on drop-offs and main channel; in tailwaters, catfish good; clear to murky, stable, three feet below pool and 84 degrees.

Fishtrap: Crappie fair evenings and nights over submerged cover and around stick ups; in tailwaters, catfish slow; clear a murky to muddy, stable at pool and 80 degrees.

Nolin: Black bass slow and improving at night on artificial nightcrawlers off deep banks and points; white bass slow to fair on spinner baits with trailers over flats; clear, stable at pool and 82 degrees.

Buckhorn: Black bass slow on crank baits and spinner baits; bluegill slow off shallow banks and rip rap; clear to murky to muddy, falling slowly, 1 1/2 feet above pool and 82 degrees.

Dewey: Crappie slow over submerged cover and around stick ups; clear to murky to muddy, falling slowly at pool and 82 degrees.

Rough River: Crappie slow early and late and at night over submerged cover and around stick ups; clear to murky to muddy, stable at pool and 82 degrees.

## County Judge Thacker

Working to Keep Program

County Judge Executive Hubert Thacker is currently working to keep the Weatherization Office in Rockcastle County. Funds for the project will run out in December, 1978, according to Pat Todd, Weatherization Aide.

The project employs over 10 workers under the federal Comprehensive Energy Education and Training Act (CETA). The "weatherize" houses of people eligible under federal poverty guidelines by improving insulation and sealing spots where heat can leak out.

The Office was established by Judge Thacker and the County Fiscal Court through the Daniel Boone Development Council, whose executive director is Frank Jones. Ruth Martin, of Manchester, directs the Laurel and Rockcastle County projects.

Working in Rockcastle County are Ms. Todd; Ann Lopez, a Project Service Worker; and Beverly Holman, Youth Conservation and Community Improvement Project worker.

Applying for social security retirement benefits? You'll need your social security card, proof of your age, and your Form W-2 for the previous year, if you're self-employed, or your last Federal income tax return.

## questions and answers

Q: My wife and I are going to retire soon. Our daughter, who is now 28, has cerebral palsy. We are her sole source of support. Can she get any social security benefits when we retire?

A: A child who was severely disabled before 22 and who continues to be disabled may get benefits when either parent retires, becomes disabled, or dies after having worked long enough under social security. When you apply for retirement benefits, you also can apply for payments for your daughter. The people at any social security office can tell you what medical evidence you will need for your daughter's application. Depending on her circumstances, she may also be eligible for supplemental security income payments. You should ask about these right away at any social security office.

Q: My wife is going to have an operation and will be in the hospital for at least a month. Medicaid will pay for most of her care. How will this affect our SSI payments?

A: If an eligible person or couple is in a hospital or health facility for an entire month and Medicaid is paying over half the cost of the care, the basic SSI payment amount is reduced. However, when only one member of an eligible couple is in a health facility, the income of each member is considered separately in determining the amount of SSI payment.

Q: This summer, I rented 40 acres of my farm land to a friend. I helped him plant corn and provided some equipment. Do I have to count the rent I received as income for social security purposes?

A: Farm rent income is covered under social security if, under the rental arrangement, the farm landlord "materially participates" in the actual production of the farm commodities or in the management of production. If you are a

materially participating farm landlord, you must count the rental income you receive in figuring your net earnings from self-employment. Social security offices have a free leaflet, "Farm rental income... does it count for social security payments?", which explains how to determine if you are materially participating.

consolidated or reshuffled will have an additional 7 years repayment term. Under special conditions, FMA may authorize repayment over 200 years.

Loans for annually recurring expenses will be repayable annually. Loans are limited to a maximum of \$400,000 to a borrower. A borrower's combined debt for economic emergency and other types of FMA farm real estate and operating loans may not exceed \$650,000.

Dawson represented Rockcastle County at recent Right to Read Workshops, and will be helping to institute the book distribution program here.

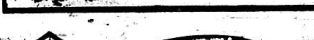
Ms. Johnson said each participating child, from age 3 to high school seniors, can be allowed up to five books during the year round program.
