Concern Surfaces Over Foreign Buying of U.S. Farmland

A U.S Senate-passed amendment

requiring foreigners who buy or lease U.S. farmland to report their holdings has spotlighed concern by some farm officials over the increased interest among foreign nationals in American form real estate as an investment.

Kentucky Farm Bureau President J. Robert Wade said the Senate amendment was supported by Farm Bureau, and said that overseas individuals and companies are buying large amounts of farmland in some states. Wade said the falling value of the dollar on international currency marksts. dollar on international currency markets is prompting a surge in such buying, as foreign investor's hope to realize a sizeable profit on the property when the dollar's value goes back up.

Wade said some Kentucky farmland has been purchased recently by foreign buyers.




