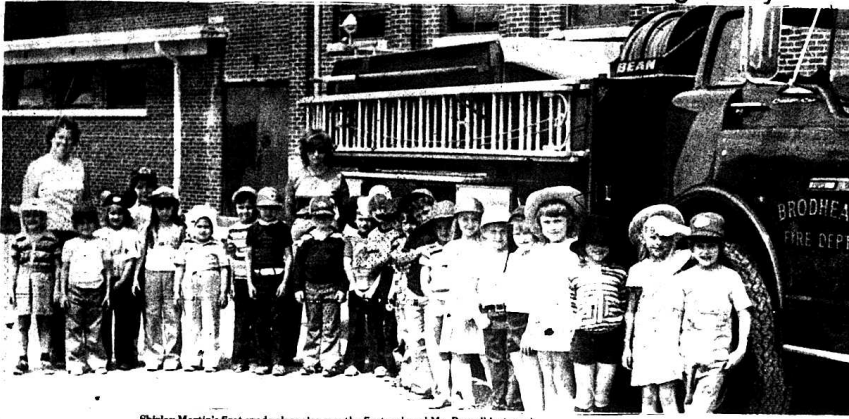


# Alpha Program Provides More Than Just Reading Ability

If this sounds like a first grade primer, it is. Even though it's no book but part of real experiences that first graders at Brodhead School have been having these last few weeks.

As part of the "Alpha" program, their teachers have invited people to come to school to speak about their professions. The teachers combine career education, learning body parts and learning letters by name, the person Freddy Fireman, Bob Barber, a part of his body (Munchy Mouth, Elephant Ears) and part of their dress or food (Bright Belt), etc.

"The children love it," said Darlene Cameron, a teacher's aid who arranges the visits. "Like everyone else, they like a break in their routine."

Hardresser Doug Brock gave three-haircuts in each class the day of his visit. Larry Taylor let the children climb into the cab of his truck. Gary Gentry, of Southern Belle Dairy, gave each child chocolate milk when he came.

Other visitors that the teachers have lined up are a lawyer, school superintendent, insurance man, photo grapher one for each letter of the alphabet.

"We'll have an x-ray technician for x," Mrs. Cameron said. "But y has to be our crazy letter. We let the children put it in front of all the other words like yade, for yade, or yepeter for yepeter."

This is the fourth year of Alpha program. First grade teachers at Brodhead are Molly Hamm, Lena Hayes and Shirley Martin.

## James and Ikerd Attend First Meeting of Appalachian Dev. Council

Bill James and Jerry Ikerd, both associated with the Bank of Mt. Vernon, attended the first meeting of the Appalachian Development Council, a group formed by Gov. Julian Carroll earlier this summer to plan for economic growth in eastern Kentucky. The Council has 22 members appointed for two-year terms to advise Gov. Carroll. Mr. James said the meeting was boring.

"Like all first meetings of organizations, they had a lot of ground work to do, like forming committees," he said. "I do believe, however, that once we get organized, this group will be very influential for the whole Appalachian region of Kentucky."

The meeting was held at the Governor's Mansion in Frankfort, and Gov. Carroll spoke to the group. He said a main task is plan for the time when coal was no longer abundant.

The Council voted to work on the following areas: transportation, education, economic development, local, state and federal relationships, and the quality of life-including health care, housing, environment, etc.

Mr. James said the Council will probably meet every other month.

**Do You Really Own Land?**

## Special Class Held For Expectant Moms

The Rockcastle County Hospital is now sponsoring classes in prepared child birth for patients who will be delivering at this hospital. The first series of classes is now in progress. The classes are designed for couples who want to learn more about the process of labor and delivery and who want to participate and share in that event.

- There are 3 main objectives to this class:
- 1) To learn what is going to happen to you both during labor and delivery.
- 2) To learn techniques that help you remain in control during labor.
- 3) To practice these techniques so that when you go into labor you will automatically perform them properly and effectively.

Ideally, the classes begin during the 7th month of pregnancy and run for 6 consecutive weeks. Each class session lasts for 2 hours. Some class time is spent on general educational parenting, such as care of the baby, formula and breast feeding, proper exercises during and after pregnancy.

The classes are taught by Betty Purrell, RN and assisted by Linda Martin, G.I.P.N. Mrs. Purrell received training for this type of instruction by the Lexington Association of Parent Education. She also had taken classes herself several years ago in preparation for the birth of her own children.

## Livingston's \$434,000 Sewer Plant To Begin Operation This September

A \$434,000 sewer treatment plant will be completed and operating by the end of this month, Bertie Rice, mayor of Livingston, announced today.

Ms. Rice said that the plant, which is located on the south end of town, will process about 40,000 gallons a day, though in emergency it could handle double that amount.

Ms. Rice said the Livingston has needed a better sewer plant for some time. She said the old sewer was too small, and sludge was getting into the river, which is against the law.

Ms. Rice said that she applied for a federal grant for the new plant, and received enough money to build it completely.

The plant was built by four men from McGregor Construction Company. They are Dewey McClure, Homer Tolle, Boyd Everole, and Aaron Walters. The company also built plants for Broadhead and Mt. Vernon.

Mr. Tolle said that the Livingston operation is called a "packaged plant" because it has a prefabricated treatment tank. He said the tank came in two

section and was welded together at the site.

The site has a small white building where its controls are kept. Outside the building on its lot is a lift station, which lifts the sludge that has been pumped in above the floodline and on to the drying beds where it is processed as solid waste.

## Livingston Works On Seniors' Apartments

A housing project for the elderly in Livingston is making some progress, Mayor Bertie Rice announced today. She said that the land has been acquired, and that preliminary development is now taking place.

The apartments will be located on a lot (now vacant) next to Poynter Store on Main Street. "It's an ideal location for the elderly," Ms. Rice said. "It will be on Main Street, in walking distance to stores and the church."

Ms. Rice said that the need for good housing among older citizens was very great, and that she hoped some who have moved from Livingston would be able to return there to live in the new project.

Green Keith, a topographer, should be finished making maps of the lay of the land by the end of the week, she said. These maps will be used by Lexington architects Bob Flowers and Steve Graves to design the apartment building which will have between 15 and 20 units.

The city of Livingston has applied for more than \$500,000 for the project through the federal government's Dept. of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). So far, Ms. Rice said, the city has received \$100,000.

Of this \$100,000, about \$30,000 has been set aside to repair sub-standard housing in Livingston. She said that people eligible for the program will be asked to apply for help in rehabilitating their homes, and it would probably be on a first-come basis.

The rest of the money is for the elderly housing project. About \$17,000 was paid to F.L. Poynter for the land itself. More money is being spent to level off the land and build a two-foot contour to make it ready for construction. The rest is to pay map-makers, architects, surveyors and other expenses.

Ms. Rice said that the next step for the city is to apply for the rest of the grant. She said that the project should be completed and ready for residents in about a year and a half.

After the project is built, the city of Livingston will have several choices in how they run it, according to Jim Cass at Cumberland Valley Area Development District. He said that the city could own and maintain the apartments or lease them to a private owner. It could also be taken over by a private developer who would supervise the building and day-to-day operation. The developer would pay taxes to the city if he owned the apartments.

## Mt. Vernon City Council Discusses Water Bill Payments and Sidewalks

Most of the Mt. Vernon City Council's regular meeting Monday night was spent in closed session discussions about whether the Cedar Rapids Country Club should pay an \$1100 water bill, and about police hiring and organization.

County Club members Bill James, Jerry Hamn, Tom Payne, Clay Colson and Dr. George Griffith met with the Council for about an hour. Afterwards, Mayor Roland Mullins said that the club is hiring an engineer to study whether \$1100 worth of water could have been lost when a pipe froze at the club in February. Water superintendent Matt Powell, Jr., who was not included in the closed session, will be working with the engineering study, Mayor Mullins said.

Wayne King, who manages the boat dock in Renfro Valley, came to the meeting to question his water bill of \$150, which he said was due to faulty

water lines installed by a private contractor (not the city). He was told to pay the bill.

Three candidates were interviewed for police jobs, also in closed session. They asked that their names not be used because they are holding jobs elsewhere.

The Council discussed whether to hire a new police chief or a part-time person to cover parking meters and school crossings. A vacancy on the three-men force exists because Bonnie Halcomb resigned.

The Council voted to meet again the next night to discuss the police further.

The Rockcastle County hospital Board requested that a parking lot in front of the ambulance entrance be blacktopped. Robert Cromer, speaking for the Board, said it would pay for everything—materials and labor—if the city would loan equipment. The Council granted the hospital's request.

The Council turned down a similar request to blacktop a parking lot behind The Bank of Mt. Vernon on property of the Mt. Vernon Produce Company, owned by Bob Jasper.

Clive Pittman and Clinton McClure asked the Council to extend the city sewer line 200 ft. to their property on Fairground Hill. The Council took no action on this.

Mayor Mullins told the Council that he would like to get a grant to hire four workers under the Comprehensive Education Training and Employment Act (CETA) to work on sidewalk installation and repairs. He said he would like to put a sidewalk on William Street for school children. No action was taken at this meeting.

Last month the Council adopted a revenue-sharing budget, that would mean \$19,800 for sidewalk repair and installation, \$300 for the Cumberland River Valley Mental Health program, and \$500 for the Rockcastle County Senior Citizens.

## County Opens Bids On \$50,000 Grader

Money from the state of Kentucky for a road grader came to Rockcastle County in record time, according to County Judge Executive Hubert Thacker.

"We applied the first of the month, and it came August 31," he said.

The county is getting \$50,000 through the coal severance tax fund. Fiscal Court met Tuesday morning and voted to open bids on the grader this week. If the grader can be bought for less than \$50,000, the rest of the money has to be returned to the state.

The grader is used to smooth roads, spread gravel and remove snow, among other things. The county owns two already.

"We're hoping to get the schools open more days if it snows again," Judge

Fire Chief John Cox said the fire started in one of the four bedrooms of the white frame house. He said that the smoke was caused by burning gas and insulation in the attic.

Mrs. Morris said she was glad that her mother was not at home.

"I'll hate to tell her," Mrs. Morris said. "You know, they have lived on this spot for over 40 years. Their house burned down once before, in 1960, NS and they built it again. I told them it was bad luck to build on the same spot."

### Reading Tests Being

#### Conducted in Local Schools

Reading tests are being conducted in all Rockcastle County schools this week and next to help teachers determine which students might need extra help. Grades 3, 4, 5 and 6 are being tested, and children who score poorly may be placed in "special classes" taught by special reading teachers. This is the first year for such testing.

Nancy Hale is one such special teacher who is administering tests at Livingston School.

"We are using the state-made test," she said, "though some schools are using the regular achievement tests."  
She said she liked this test—the Doren Diagnostic Reading Test—because 12 reading skills are tested, and she can see exactly where the child needs help.

"Most tests don't tell us the child's problem," she said, "but his does. For example, a child might be good in everything but vowel sounds. The test will tell us this."

Ms. Hale said that some children, who were in remedial reading last year may not have to attend those classes, if they do well on the tests.  
The younger children need more time to take the tests, because they write slowly, Ms. Hale said. It might take a few weeks to administer the 3rd and 4th grade tests, but the 5th and 6th graders finish faster. Each child goes to his own pace and is not pressured to finish in a time limit.

"I think this gives a better measure of what the child can do," Ms. Hale said. "If I say, 'You have 10 minutes to do this section,' some children can't work that way—"

Ms. Hale said that some children who race through the tests and score high present another problem—how to challenge their interest and abilities with stimulating work.

That the previous Water Rate Resolution of the District, fixing the water rates applicable to water service furnished by the waterworks system of the District, which Water Rate Resolution was adopted on March 13, 1972, is hereby amended so as to increase the water rates for services rendered by said waterworks system of the District as follows:

Section 2. New Monthly Water Rates.

That the rates and charges for water service furnished by the Rockcastle County Water District are hereby fixed and established on a monthly basis as follows:

A. Minimum Water Rates Based on Size Connections.

The following minimum rates shall apply to the respective size water connections for the respective minimum quantities of water per month applicable to such size connections:

Size of Water Meter Connection	Number of Gallons per Month to be Provided for the Minimum Rate	Minimum Monthly Water Rate Per Connection
5/8 inch x 3/4 inch	2,000 gallons	\$7.50
1 inch	5,000 gallons	15.00
1 1/2 inch	10,000 gallons	25.00
2 inch	25,000 gallons	47.50

### B. Meter Rates for Water usage in Addition to Minimum Charge.

Subject to the minimum monthly water rate specified above, the following meter charges shall be made for each 1,000 gallons of water consumption per month to customers of all size connections:

First 2,000 gallons or less	\$7.50 (Min. monthly charge)
Next 3,000 gallons	2.50
Next 5,000 gallons	2.00

All over 100,000 gallons	.80

### Section 3. Waterworks Connection Charge.

That the waterworks connection charge shall continue to be as follows:

Size of Connection	Connection Charge
5/8 inch x 3/4 inch	\$200
1 inch	250
1 1/2 inch	300
2 inch	350

### Section 4. Billing, Collection, Penalty.

That the rates or charges aforesaid shall be billed monthly, on statements which shall be issued on or about the first of each month, and all bills for such service shall be considered due and payable ten days after the date of issue.

If a bill is not paid within ten days after such date of issue, such bill shall be considered delinquent, and there shall be imposed a penalty on each bill of not more than ten percent (10%) of the charges (other than sales tax) shown on the face amount of such delinquent bill. The District may serve a customer written notice of his delinquency. If such bill is not paid within ten days after the mailing of such notice, the District may disconnect the water service of such customer without further notice. If water service is disconnected by the District by reason of delinquency in the payment of any water bill, reconnection of such service shall not be made until the owner or user pays all charges and penalties owed, plus the amount of \$25.00 as a disconnection and reconnection charge. If any deadline date falls on a Sunday or legal holiday, such deadline shall not expire until the next secular day thereafter.

Section 5. By-Laws, Rules and Regulations Incorporated by Reference. That on March 13, 1972, the Commission of the District adopted By-Laws, Rules and Regulations for the operation of the waterworks system of the District. Such By-Laws, Rules and Regulations are incorporated in this Amended Rate Resolution by reference as a part hereof. Copies of such By-Laws, Rules and Regulations are on file at the office of the Secretary of the Commission, where same may be examined by an interested parties.

### Section 6. Severability.

That if any clause, provision, paragraph or section of this Resolution be ruled void or unenforceable by any court of competent jurisdiction, the remainder thereof is intended to be adopted and shall be in full force and effect notwithstanding.

Section 7. All Former Provisions in Conflict Repealed; Effective Date or Ordinance.

That all orders, resolutions, motions, or parts thereof, insofar as same may be in conflict herewith, are repealed, and this Resolution shall take effect from and after its passage, approval and publication as provided by law.

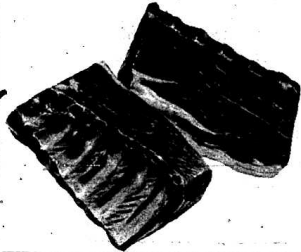

Funeral services were held Monday, Sept. 11, 1978 at the Brodhead Baptist Church by Rev. R.C. Flynn. Burial was in the Albright Family Cemetery. Arrangements were by the Watson Funeral Home.

Some of the cleaning products you are using may be doing more harm than good, according to Bell County Extension Agent Donna Clore.

Ms. Clore spoke to a group of Homemakers Club leaders this Thursday at the Rockcastle County Library.

Ms. Clore said that in years to come, the government may start labeling and inspecting household cleaners in the same way it does food products, to warn consumers of these problems.

"Spray on furniture waxes can build up and leave a film so thick you won't be able to get it off," she said. "They can ruin wood furniture over a period of years."

Household bathroom cleaners can make scratches in sinks and tubs and dirt can collect in these scratches, Ms. Clore said. In other words, you might be making the porcelain dirtier by using such cleaners.

Silver cleaners that dissolve in water and clean the pieces by soaking are also harmful at times, Ms. Clore said. The cleaners are so harsh that they can eat away at the glue on handles and actually make the handles fall off.

Ms. Clore gave several recipes for household cleaners that anyone can make themselves, using common ingredients. She demonstrated how well they worked by using them to clean brass, silver and other pieces.

This recipe for brass cleaner really works, as Ms. Clore demonstrated:

Brass and Copper cleaner  
2 tablespoons salt

lemon juice or white vinegar  
(just enough to moisten salt)

Dip cloth in mixture and rub until clean. Rinse and dry for a bright shine.

Whiting is a mild abrasive, that looks like soft white powder. It can be bought for about 45 cents a pound at hardware stores.

Cream Silver Polish  
1 lb. powdered whiting

3 tablespoons odorless, tasteless castor oil

3 tablespoons washing soda

1 cup boiling water

Add castor oil to boiling water. Stir in washing soda and whiting. Let cool.

Store in a jar with a tight-fitting lid.

To use: Dampen cloth, dip in silver cream. Rub tarnished silver until it shines. Wash silver in hot soapy water. Rinse in hot water. Polish with a soft, clean cloth.

Mrs. Clore said that after the flood in Pineville, people made up this recipe for Furniture Wash to clean off mud and dirt from belongings:

1 quart boiling water

1 tablespoon turpentine

3 tablespoons boiled linseed oil.

Mix oil and turpentine in pan and add boiling water. To use: wear rubber gloves. Wring a soft cloth from this mixture, wash a small area at a time, and rub with a clean dry cloth. Keep mixture hot by placing pan over hot water.

This first glass cleaner is good for car windows, because it works in cold weather. The second one is a cheap old stand-by.

Glass Cleaner No. 1

1 1/2 teaspoons liquid detergent

5 teaspoons rubbing alcohol

4 quarts of water

Mix detergent and water, add alcohol and stir. Store in bottles.

To use: Spray or sponge cleaner on glass and wipe off with squeegee, chamois or cloth.

Glass Cleaner No. 2

2 tablespoons of vinegar

1 quart warm water

Mix. Store and use as above. Good for removing water spots on outside of windows.

Sink Disposal Cleaner

2 lemons

2 trays of ice cubes

Cut lemons into eights and put them down the disposal, with the ice cubes on top of them. Operate the disposal with cold water until lemons and ice are all gone. The lemon helps clean the blades and eliminate odor. The ice makes the grease congeal so that it can be chopped up and flushed out.

Septic Tank Reactivator

1 pound brown sugar

1 envelope dried yeast

1 quart water

Add sugar and yeast to water and stir until dissolved. Pour this mixture

Concern Surfaces Over Foreign Buying of U.S. Farmland

A U.S. Senate-passed amendment

requiring foreigners who buy or lease U.S. farmland to report their holdings has spotlighted concern by some farm officials over the increased interest among foreign nations in American farm real estate as an investment.

Kentucky Farm Bureau President J. Robert Wade said the Senate amendment was supported by Farm Bureau, and said that overseas individuals and companies are buying large amounts of farmland in some states. Wade said the falling value of the dollar on international currency markets is prompting a surge in such buying, as foreign investors hope to realize sizeable profit on the property when the dollar's value goes back up.

Wade said some Kentucky farmland has been purchased recently by foreign buyers.

## Friends Are Partners in 'Puppy Paws, Ltd.' Crafts

Chestnuts roasting on a fire... Jack Frost nipping at our nose." Julie Harris and Dianne Dober have been humming these songs for months, and are hoping other people will be thinking about Christmas, too.

The women are busy filling Christmas orders for their handcrafted items, and will be showing samples of their work this Saturday at the Home Spin Shop, corner of Williams and Lovell in Mt. Vernon. It will seem like Christmas, too, because the shop will have a decorated tree, Christmas music and refreshments. The two have been in business since last Friday, under a partnership they call "Puppy Paws, Ltd.," but they have been making crafts as a hobby all their lives.

"When we met each other at a tea last year, by the next day we were best friends," Mrs. Dober said.

As mothers of young children, they found that they could work at crafts while they visited each other and watched the children. But what started as a small business, has grown large enough to be distributed in eleven shops, including North Carolina and Cincinnati. The women make wooden items,

such as napkin rings, puzzles and toys, and cloth things like wallhangings, children's purses. Some of the wooden things are decorated with molded figures made from baked dough.

Mrs. Harris cuts out the wooden items in her father's workshop, and also sands, jets, and decorates them. Mrs. Dober handles the sewing end of Puppy Paws, Ltd.

But the two friends work together in many ways. They work out designs together every item is original, and since Mrs. Dober draws well, she helps decorate some of the wood items.

"If we both don't like an item, we won't make it or try to improve it," Mrs. Harris said.

They also take business trips together to find stores that will buy their samples.

"The first time we went, I was so scared," Mrs. Dober said. "I told Julie to do all the talking, and I'd just write. But it ended up that I started to talk."

Puppy Paws has begun to include other members of the Dober and Harris families. Mrs. Dober's father, Frank Droege, makes large model airplanes and napkin rings shaped like animals

from wood. The napkin rings did so well in stores that Mr. Droege was offered a full-time job at making them, which he did not accept. Mrs. Droege crochets shawls and baby things. Mrs. Harris' father, Gillis Craig, taught her how to work with wood.

"And our husbands put up with it all the time," Mrs. Harris said.

The two are very concerned with the quality and safety of their items, so much that one store owner told them the quality was too good. "We didn't listen," Ms. Harris said. They wanted the toys to be sturdy, non-toxic, and big enough for small children to handle.

"We ask ourselves, Is it safe? Would we give it to our own children?" Mrs. Dober said. She said their puzzles might look better with shells, but they refuse to take that risk.

Likewise, fabrics are all washable and permanent press.

The two live near each other in Mt. Vernon. Mrs. Dober is the wife of Luke Dober, the administrator of the Rockcastle County Hospital, and the mother of Chris, 7, Amy, 6 and Beth, 9 months. Mrs. Harris is a native of Mt. Vernon, married to Les Harris, and the mother of Tobee, 7 and Robynne, 5.

They don't want Puppy Paws to get too big, or get to be a chore. They enjoy

the creative part of it, and the chance to have their own involvement separate from their lives as wives and mothers.

"I can give you an example," Ms. Dober said. "I made a baby quilt, a beautiful thing with appliques and ruffles, and it could have become a good seller. But after the second one, I

dreaded doing it. We want to make money but we've got to enjoy what we do. When an item isn't fun to make, we cut it out of the line. No more baby quilts!"

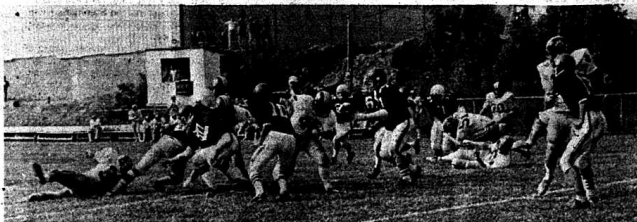

## Safety Against Tigers Gives Rockets First Win of Season 2-0

A safety against the Clay County Tigers and a barely missed field goal attempt by the Tigers spelled the difference in last Friday afternoon's game between the Rockets and Clay County with the Rockets coming out on

top 2-0 for their first win of the season. The only score of the game came about middle-ways in the fourth quarter when a bad snap to the Clay County punter, who was backed up into his own end zone, forced him to down the ball

rather than run the risk of trying to come out with it. Several Rockcastle defenders were right on the spot and helped make the decision no doubt.

On the free-kick to the Rockets, Mark Hopkins got a good run-back but the ball was knocked loose and the Rockets recovered in Rockets' territory. Three plays later, Mike Arnold intercepted a Clay County pass and got a good return but a clipping penalty against the Rockets after the interception backed the Rockets up to their own 20 where it was 1-10. Denzil Chasteen then picked up good yardage but the run was nullified because of an offside penalty. Chasteen picked up 6 on the next play and the Rockets got only a yard each on the next two plays bringing up a 4 and 7. Bobby Hammons didn't get his punt off in time and Clay County blocked it and took over on the Rockets 13 yard line with 1:51 remaining in the game.

The Tigers ran three plays and picked up eight yards but with 31 second left elected to go for the field goal and winning three points—a field goal which missed only by inches to the right.

The Rockets' defense played superbly and they had to. On Clay County's first possession of the game, they drove to the Rockets 29 yard line where it was 1-10. They picked up 6 yards on two plays before Charlie Falin and Larry Bradley caught the runner in the backfield for a three yard loss and, on the next play, Walter Browning applied pressure to the quarterback and his pass was incomplete.

On the Rockets next possession,

quarterback Rick Anderkin passed to Mark Hopkins for a gain of 28 yards to Clay County's 40 and another pass to Chasteen was good to the 10-yard-line. But, on the next play, Steve Mitchell fumbled the ball and Clay County recovered the ball. However, they didn't get anywhere because Mike Arnold got his first of two interceptions in the game and it was the Rockets ball on their own 30.

A deflected pass which was picked off by a Tiger defender next set Clay County on their drive. Clay County moved the ball well and a Tiger touchdown was averted by Keith Bussell who got the runner on the Rockets 47. On the same drive, Mike Arnold was the only man between the runner and the goal line and he made the stop on the Rockets' 16.

Again, the defense was called and they were ready. In three plays, the Tigers could only get five yards from the stingy Rocket defense and on 4.5, Larry Bradley broke through into the Clay County backfield to get the runner for a 4 yard loss.

On this possession, Mark Hopkins picked up 6 yards and then Hammons fumbled deep in the Rockets backfield and Clay County recovered on the Rockets' 11. The Tigers couldn't convert their good luck into a score however and four plays later, the Rockets took over on their own 14.

The first punt in the game, for either side, came early in the second half when Clay County was forced to punt. The Rockets' defense couldn't get anything moving and they had to punt the ball way with Clay County taking over on their own 8. On this drive, at about mid-field, Clay County decided to go for the first down on 4:2 and the defense again held; but, on the first play of the Rockets possession, Clay County picked off an Anderkin pass and once again, they were in possession on their own 34 yard line.

The Rockets held again and on their next series, were moving the ball well with Chasteen picking up a first down on a reverse. But, the Rockets had to give up the ball on their next series on a fourth down and Clay County took over on their own 38. They were forced again to punt after three tries to move the ball. The Rockets again were not able to come up with anything offensive and Hammons punt, a long one to Clay County's 10 yard line, set up the safety which was to win the Rockets the ball game.

On Clay County's first play after the punt, Kenny Johnson broke through to sack the quarterback for a two-yard loss; the Tigers then picked up two and on 3-10, Bradley and Matt Poyner got to the runner for a big loss bringing up the fourth down play and the safety.

This was Clay County's first loss of the season and the Rockets have now lost two games by a total of two points and won one by two.

This Friday night, the Rockets will journey to Leslie County.

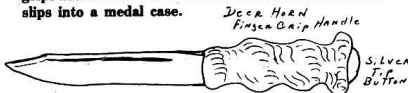



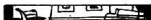

Weighty Facts

Have you ever tried very hard to lose weight and failed? You probably found every pound you lost, plus a few of someone else's. Sometimes it's the temptation of beloved foods, plus the guilt of letting them get the best of you, that's your downfall.

Other pitfalls may be still feeling "hungry" after eating non-filling diet foods and feeling "different" because others know you are on a diet. You can also blame your flabby will-ower, your husband's or wife's lack of interest or support, the holiday season, a change in the weather, etc.

How it all began. Why do you eat the way you do? Let's find out. If probably all started when you were little. For instance, do you remember your parents urging you to eat everything on your plate? Did you have to keep on eating sometimes when you were already full? After 2 or 3 years of this, a habit is formed.

Have you ever seen that TV commercial, "I can't believe I ate the whole thing"? It can be cited as an example of the clean plate philosophy and the trouble it can get you into.

Being encouraged to eat when you were troubled or ill certainly didn't help matters either. Because by now, eating when you're worried, or bored, or lonely, or just not feeling well has become an established routine.

Even babies get a very early message about eating. Many a mother or father will urge a baby to finish up all the formula in the bottle, the reward him or her with a hug when the last drop is drained. This unconscious reinforcement for over-eating helps establish eating habits that could lead to weight problems later on in life.

As you grew up you probably did a lot of strenuous things—swimming, bicycling, basketball, baseball, etc.—activities that helped burn up energy. But now you're doing these things less often and are more likely to be watching someone else engaged in sports. This change of activity is compounded by a decreased basal metabolic rate. After 25, your need for energy to keep bodily functions going decreases by 2.5 percent every 10 years. That means 50 calories less each day for every 10 years of life past age 25.

Mass media and advertising can also claim part of the responsibility in habit formation. Very subtle reminders promote eating super-sweet and greasy foods, especially for snacks.

Changing your habits. Understand-

ing the how and why of your eating is as important as what you eat. Changed eating habits, not short-lived diets, are the best way to take off pounds and keep them off. Behavior modification techniques do just that! The emphasis is placed on finding the bad habits and then either substituting good for bad or eliminating the habits for preplanning your eating.

Make conscious decisions. Whenever you see a tempting food commercial in a newspaper, magazine or on TV, say in a newspaper, magazine or on TV, say "I won't eat that." I can do without a piece of cake, cookie or soft drink."

When you're at a social function,

say, "I'll eat some peanuts (or other hors-d'oeuvres) or another drink only twice, not every time someone suggests it, or every time the tray is passed."

When you order from a menu in a restaurant, say, "I'll have the leanest piece of meat or fish, I'll eat vegetables; have a salad with a small amount of dressing; and my beverage without sugar." Then do not deviate or make an exception.

When taking a break, say, "I'll have a piece of fruit, or some juice, instead of a coke," or "I'll skip the coffee and demt."

When reading the paper or a book, say, "I'll just read now without smoking and then eat when it is mealtime."

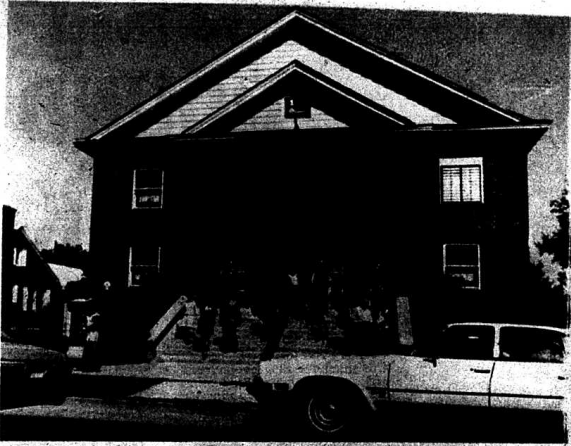

Mingwee darts in the shallows and muscels reside in its waters. One of the most beautiful spots on this creek has a sand gravel beach about 8 yards wide and 20 yards long. Sound nice? Well, just above that beach is a time bomb. It is an illegal dump which has accumulated tons of trash thrown out by people who don't care enough about the environment to take the effort to go to a green box.

In that dump are cans, bottles, milk cartons, disposable diapers, and just about everything else needed to ruin the creek. All it's waiting for is the water to rise or the trash to fall the little extra distance to the creek.

The people who did this should be ashamed. The ones who throw the trash out in that dump don't live out of state and just pass through. Most of them are from right here in Rockcastle County.

Some of you reading this will know you are completely innocent. But what about you others? Have you ever driven along a road and just thrown out a couple of bags of trash? Are you the young lady who threw the paper cup out of her station wagon on her way to Berea last August 19? If you are, you were seen. And your license plate number and car description are on file.

Is your name locked up at the Rockcastle County Health Department awaiting legal action? It could be, if you have thrown trash out at an illegal dump.

Trash is a problem that won't go away. But at least we can keep it in its place.

For the sake of that little creek, of the beautiful scenes in your county, for the sake of your bank balance if you get summoned to court, please dispose of trash properly.

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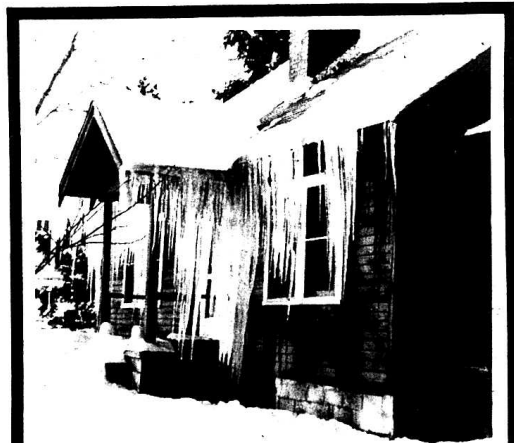
