How to Handle Condemnation

It's a real shock when you're told that part (or all) of your property will be taken for a new highway, sewer line, high tension line or other public use. It's usually an even greater shock when the representative of the public utility, highway department or government tells you what they propose to pay.

Relax, and react rationally. Your property may be taken if it is really needed for public use but you must be compensated at "fair market value." If the initial offer is unacceptable, make an appointment to discuss the facts with your attorney. If he agrees with your position, he'll arrange for one or more Real Estate Appraisers to appraise the condemned property for you. With the facts they give him about "fair market value," he can represent you better in direct negotiation, at a preliminary hearing, or (if necessary) in a court action.

One caution—Have a clear understanding of the fees of attorney and appraisers before engaging them.

Kevin Dwayne Scott is First LeMaze Method Childbirth at Local Hospital

Kevin Dwayne Scott is the first baby born under the LeMaze Method of childbirth at Rockcastle County Hospital.

His parents, Charlene and Gary Scott, took three classes at the hospital and learned how proper breathing and

conditioning exercises can help make childbirth easier for the mother. The course has six lessons altogether, but baby Kevin was a month early so they missed the last three.

Still, Mrs. Scott thinks that the

LeMaze classes were very helpful. "I'd really recommend it," she said. "Kevin is our first baby, but I was not scared because I knew what would happen. I was in class what to expect. I knew what the feelings meant and what would happen."

Her husband was in the labor room when Kevin was born and helped "coach" Mrs. Scott, using the LeMaze Principles. When asked about being in the delivery room, Mr. Scott said, "I'd rather be there than standing around in the hall, worried about my wife."

The LeMaze Method is being taught by Betty Purcell, registered nurse, through three couples as well. The method is taught when a woman has seven to nine pregnant, because the exercises are not effective before then.

In the first lesson, according to Mrs. Scott, women are taught how to concentrate on breathing. Certain types of breathing are useful at certain times of the birth process. "Panting" is used when chest breathing becomes hard to maintain. "Cleansing breaths" are taken after contractions.

At the second lesson, Mrs. Scott was given exercises to do twice a day. One exercise is designed to stretch inner thigh muscles for ease during delivery. Another for relaxation, and so forth, Mrs. Scott said that she did the breathing and body mechanics exercises every day for about one hour.

Besides the breathing exercises, some class time was spent on learning to take care of the baby, proper nutrition and so forth.

Mrs. Scott said that she was not tense or frightened during the delivery because she tried to think about the breathing techniques. She was in the labor room less than an hour, and was told later that LeMaze births are usually quicker because when the mother is relaxed, she can help the birth process along and also feels less pain.

Mrs. Scott's mother, Maggie Faulkner, didn't think much of the LeMaze classes at first.

"Well, I've had seven children and I couldn't see anything," Mrs. Faulkner said. "I thought it was a little crazy. But after Charlene went the first time, I saw that it made a lot of sense."

After Kevin was born, Dr. George Griffith told the family that if all the births were that easy, he would be out of business. Dr. Griffith was the one who recommended the LeMaze Class to the Scotts.

CLASSES OFFERED

Classes for parents-to-be and classes for parents are being offered in Rockcastle County.

Betty Purcell, a nurse at Rockcastle County Hospital, is teaching a class in prepared childbirth for patients who are delivering at this hospital. The series is now in session.

These classes are designed for couples who want to learn more about the process of labor and delivery and who want to participate and share in the event, Mrs. Purcell said. Ideally, the classes should begin during the 7th month of pregnancy and last 8 weeks.

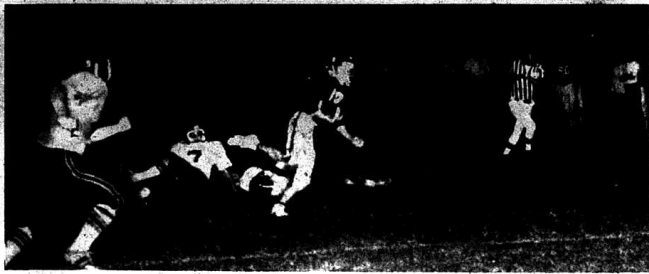

Legislative Report

By Rep. Harold DeMatas

House Bill 332, enacted by the 1978 General Assembly, was the Governor and became effective September 1st but was extended library days to October 1st. This bill requires an owner to affix to the rear window of his motor vehicle a sticker or emblem which indicates the expiration date of insurance.

The main purpose of the law is to aid in the enforcement of House Bill 314 passed by the 1974 legislature which states that all Kentucky motor vehicles must carry liability insurance.

Seemingly, this legislation is self-explanatory. However, it is not without controversy. The two points in question are where to put the sticker, back or front window and whose idea it was in the first place.

The bill allows that the state commissioner of insurance shall prescribe by regulation the location of the sticker. Insurance Commissioner Harold McGuffey prescribed that the sticker shall be affixed to the driver side of the front windshield because there are some motor vehicles that do not have rear windows.

In accordance with Commissioner McGuffey, many insurance companies have already had the sticker placed with the windshield directions, including the Farm Bureau insurance company which spent \$100,000 for stickers for

stickers for their clientele, many of whom received and placed them on their vehicles.

The Administrative Regulations Committee reversed Commissioner McGuffey's windshield prescription to the original rear window allowance. A compromise was reached, the sticker will be placed on the rear window unless the vehicle has no rear window or the sticker is already on the windshield.

The second controversy is, whose idea was House Bill 332? The bill was sponsored by the House Minority Leader, Bobby Richardson, so he takes credit for it. In a Courier Journal story, Governor Carroll was quoted as saying that he dreamed up the sticker idea. Also, during a television debate between 6th District Congressional candidates, state senator Tom Eastery said he bill was his idea.

So much for the questions, what needs to be done is to have this cleared up for the people affected, the owners of motor vehicles in Kentucky.

If a state trooper gives you a citation for not having an insurance sticker and you can prove that you do in fact have liability insurance then the citation will be dismissed. Thus, in my opinion, the placement site of the sticker was nothing more than a silly intergovernmental squabble. Although, when you receive the sticker you should place it on your vehicle.
 As for whose idea it was, 108

members of the General Assembly voted yes to House bill 332 and I believe the credit of blame should lie with the state legislature.

So goes the saga of the insurance sticker to date. This legislation has seen a rocky course since enactment and other trivial arguments may rise from it.

The only drawback of this bill is that the cost for the stickers incurred by the insurance companies will be passed on to you, the consumer. But with everyone having liability insurance, a person will not have to pay to have his vehicle repaired from damage caused by an accident that is not his fault. *****
