142 New Houses Help County's Taxable Assets To Increase By Over \$10 Million This Year

The total value of things that can be taxed by the county and state has grown by almost \$10 million this year, Robert Cromer, Rockcastle County Tax Commissioner, announced today.

Things that can be taxed include real estate, mobile homes, motor vehicles, air and water crafts, machinery, inventory, trade tools, construction equipment, stocks and bonds, and bank shares. Farm machinery and livestock have not been taxed since 1952, Mr. Cromer said.

The total assessment is now \$4.7 million up from \$37.0 million in 1977.

Mr. Cromer said growth was due to 112 new houses being built, inflation, growth in bank shares, stocks and bonds, and regular reassessments.

Tax rates have remained the same in the county for the past four years, partly because the assessments have gone up. The rates are: 13.8 cents per \$100 assessments to the county general fund; 4 cents to the Health Department; 15 cents to Library; 20 cents to Agriculture Dept., and 25 to Soil Conservation. In addition, the state of Kentucky collects 31.5 cents per \$100.

Tax rates can remain the same or even be lowered because of the growth in the assessments, Mr. Cromer said.

According to figures from Mr. Cromer, the value of residential houses on less than 10 acres has gone up by \$1.1 million from last year. Other increases are farms up \$2 million; commercial property up \$1.2 million; motor vehicles

up \$1.8 million; merchants inventory up \$200,000; and bank shares up by \$570,000, and stocks and bonds up by 11 million.

One of the few categories to lose assessed value is unimproved land, down by almost \$300,000.

Unimproved coal, stocks and bonds are not taxed by the county, only the state.

According to a report by Sheriff Manuel Shephard who left office in January, he collected a total of \$133,562.36. The total amount charged to incoming Sheriff Henry Abney was \$31,114. In his report of June 7, Sheriff Abney had collected and paid the county \$29,219 in taxes. Delinquent taxes amounted to about \$7,000.

Burglary Most Frequent Crime, But Lately It's Declining Here

Crime in Rockcastle County in the first six months of 1978 decreased from the same period in 1977. Burglary, breaking into an occupied home, was the most frequent crime, but this was down from 63 in 1977 to 39 in 1978.

Robberies, taking property by force but not necessarily breaking into a dwelling, were down from 1 last year to 3 in 1978.

There were two murders, two forcible rapes, seven automobile thefts, and four aggravated assaults in 1978 six month period. Aggravated assault involves physical violence, although the victim does not have to be battered or even struck.

Last year for the same period, the statistics were: three murders, no rapes, four aggravated assaults, and ten automobile thefts.

The statistics and definitions were released by the Kentucky Uniform Crime Reporting Program, which collected them from law enforcement agencies all over the county, including state, county and city police. Crime trends in Kentucky showed an overall decrease of 17 percent, with the decrease due chiefly to fewer aggravated assaults (down 9.1 percent statewide).

However, there were more robberies, murders, burglaries and auto thefts throughout the state this year than the same period last year.

Medal of Honor Winner Honored 38 Years After Brave Act

Private David Monroe Smith, a Livingston man who won the Congressional Medal of Honor in 1952, was honored recently for his brave act in Korea.

His parents are dead. His brothers and sisters have moved out of the area, and as far as people can say, Private Smith has few relatives and friends left here.

L.D. Bond, Commander of Post 3869, Veterans of Foreign Wars, remembered him as a classmate at Livingston Elementary School.

"He was a year ahead of me, sort of quiet," Mr. Bond said. "He was fairly tall with light hair. I think he quit school after graduation from grade school. I don't think he went to high school. He enlisted."

Mrs. C.F. Mullins remembered Private Smith as a boy. He and his family had lived behind her for years in Livingston.

"He was a good boy, one of the finest in Livingston," Mrs. Mullins said. "His father was crippled—only one leg, and Monroe (we all called him Monroe) took care of his dad. He would take him in his wheelchair into town so his father could talk with other people.

"I think the Smiths had a store, but they had a hard time because the father was crippled, and you didn't have

government help in those days. The Smiths moved right after Monroe died, and then maybe six years later, the mother died, too."

When he enlisted in the Army in 1950, Private Smith was about 20 years old and there was a war going on. He was shipped to Yonson, Korea, as a runner in the mortar section of Company F, 8th Infantry Regiment.

It was rugged, mountainous area, and the Americans were outnumbered. The enemy overran the front lines, encircled and closed in on the mortar section. The section had been ordered to withdraw, but they had no way out.

On September 1, 1950, during bitter fighting, Privates Smith spotted a grenade lobbed at his position. He shouted a warning to his friends, and full aware of the odds against him, threw himself by the grenade and smothered the explosion with his body. His act saved five men's lives.

Private Smith was brought home to be buried. His parents wanted him to rest in Livingston, not Arlington Cemetery, although he was entitled to that honor.

In 1952, Private Smith's mother accepted the Medal of Honor from the President of the United States. Private Smith has been the only one from this

county according to their county attorney Fred Nekirk. Mr. Nekirk said that evidence such as that collected in Rockcastle County has been used similarly in Pulaski District Court. He said that citizens help by reporting littering.

Mr. Nekirk said that the cases are heard before Judge Walter McQuire and Judge Calvin Aker, the same judges who would hear the Rockcastle cases.

He said that the judges have been "sentencing" litterers to picking up two truckloads of garbage around the county and paying for its disposal in the landfill. They must bring pictures of themselves doing this. Mr. Nekirk said, as well as pay court cost which usually amount to about \$35.

Littering in some instances is a crime under Kentucky Statute 512.070. All household garbage in the county is supposed to be bagged and placed only in the county dumpsters. Businesses and stores and other commercial operations must hire private collectors to pick up and dispose of their garbage. Big household items must be taken to the Rockcastle County landfill near Pine Hill and left there for a fee.

The Fiscal Court voted to strictly enforce these state laws at their last meeting earlier this month.

Social Security Payments \$334,574 Per Month Here

Social Security benefits were being paid to residents of Rockcastle County at the rate of \$334,574 a month at the start of 1978, Bob Anderson, social security manager in Richmond said today.

Social security benefits can be paid to retired persons age 62 and over, to workers who become severely disabled before age 65, and to survivors of deceased workers.

Monthly social security checks are also paid to certain dependents of a worker who has retired, become disabled or died.

Of the 2349 social security beneficiaries living in Rockcastle County, 968 are retired workers, 160 are disabled workers. Another 405 persons are receiving benefits as the wives or husbands of retired or disabled workers. Widows, widowers, and dependent parents of deceased workers number 847.

In Rockcastle County, 1002 people under age 65 and 1347 people age 65 and older are receiving monthly social security benefits. Of total beneficiaries, 864 are men, 1094 are women and 451 are children.

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Legislative Report

Each interim committee divides itself into standing subcommittees for the purpose of studying a particular situation or problem. Appointments of such subcommittees by the interim committees is subject to the approval of the Legislative Research Commission (LRC).

Subcommittee chairmen are appointed by the interim committee chairman, in consultation with the vice chairman. Subcommittees are subject to the same rules and restrictions as, standing committees.

Several interim joint committees have organized subcommittees for the 1978-79 interim. Committees requesting approval of subcommittees from the LRC include Labor and Industry; Education, Elections and Constitutional Amendments; Public Utilities and Transportation; and State Government.

The LRC approved three subcommittees requested by the Interim Joint Committee on Labor and Industry: a panel for collective bargaining, a panel on wages and hours, and a panel on workmen's compensation.

The Interim Joint Committee on Elections and Constitutional Amend-

ments was granted approval for subcommittees on Elections, and on Referendum and Initiative.

The Interim Joint Committee on Education was authorized to impanel four subcommittees: Issues and Legislative Proposals for the 1980 General Assembly; Education and the Arts; Needs of Dyslexic Children; and Program Implementation Oversight.

The Interim Joint Committee on Public Utilities and Transportation was granted jurisdiction over matters pertaining to energy policy, construction and development to be overseen by a subcommittee on energy.

The Interim Joint Committee on State Government has formed a subcommittee to study the possibility of introducing legislation to regulate the use of the state's transportation fleet. Subcommittees take their findings and conclusions before the standing committee of which they are a branch for further input and discussion.

At the close of the interim period each committee submits a final report to the LRC indicating its activity during the interim and its recommendations for legislation to be presented to the forthcoming General Assembly.

Committee reports received by the LRC are assembled into a single document. This document is then published and presented at the pre-session legislative conference.

Being in the political arena the subcommittee system is not perfect. However, it is the method the General Assembly used to study a particular situation that is deemed important.

Landscape Notes for October

Fertilize your Kentucky bluegrass or fescue lawn with 1/2 lb. of actual nitrogen per 1000 sq. ft. this month. Check for thatch buildup in your lawn. Thatch is an accumulation of dead, undecomposed organic matter such as roots, stems, leaves, etc. Cut out a plug of turf and check for thatch: 1/4-3/4 inch of a dense thatch is water and

air movement into the soil and creates a favorable environment for insects and diseases. If you need to dethatch your bluegrass lawn, this month is a good time. Often dethatchers are available on a rental basis from lawn-equipment suppliers. (Thatch fescue seldom develops enough thatch to be a problem.)
Planting Time: Fall is a good time to set out coniferous evergreens and deciduous trees and shrubs. Keep them well watered (at least 1 inch per week) for the whole first year after planting. If you are debating whether to go ahead and plant trees and shrubs around your home grounds, consider the following:
Trees and shrubs are long-term investments.

they inspire your visual environment.
Trees and shrubs can help you conserve energy. Evergreen windbreaks protect from cold winter winds. Deciduous trees drop their leaves and allow solar heat to reach your home in the winter while their shade in summer reduces air conditioning needs.
Ground cover plants save trips with a gas line power mower.
Propagating time: Most annual flowers may be propagated from cuttings. If you hope to hold them overwinter in the house, annual flowers which grow best in the shade or low light areas should be selected. Balsam, fibrous begonias, tuberous begonias, torenia, coleus, impatiens, lobelia and ferns will overwinter in an area of your

home where sunlight is available for several hours each day.
While you can see "what's what and where", mark the location of your perennials now so you won't plow them under next spring along with the rest of your garden. Lift tender bulbs such as calla, cannas, dahlias, tigridia, lily and tuberose after the first frost. Cur them in an airy but protected spot for a few days. A dark cellar room is a good place to store them over winter.
Plant your spring bulbs. Plant cornflower, larkspur, poppies, cosmos, and calendula-hardy annuals that will flower next spring. Try sweet williams, pinks, pansies, snapdragons, and English daisies in the cold frame or protected seedbed.
Fertilizing time: Fertilize your trees

and shrubs once they are dormant. If you only fertilize them once a year, follow the Kentucky Shade Tree Association recommendation of 3 lb. actual nitrogen per 1000 sq. ft. of root area.
Have your vegetable garden soil tested. If it needs calcium, now is the best time to lime your garden. Lime corrects improper soil acidity, supplies calcium and magnesium (if dolomite is used), makes other nutrients available and improves the physical structure of the soil. However, lime should be applied in the fall and only when a soil test indicates the need for it.
Fall Liming Best for Tobacco Fields
Applying lime in tobacco fields this fall will prevent manganese toxicity in next year's crop—a major problem in the production of tobacco on acid soils in

Kentucky, says Ken Walls, Extension soils specialist in the UK College of Agriculture.
He recommends having soils tested and applying, as much lime as needed to adjust the soil pH to around 5.4. This will maintain the desired pH range of 5.5 to 6 during next year's growing season after fertilizer has been applied. High rates of fertilizer commonly used on tobacco reduce the pH to half point below the initial reading.
The best time to apply lime in fields growing continuous tobacco is before seedling the cover crop, says Walls. Farmers using a crop rotation of 2 years grass-legume soil followed by 2 years of tobacco should apply lime right after harvest using the last tobacco crop in the rotation.

Hope For Flurry of Loose-Leaf Sign-Ups
Supporters of this year's loose-leaf burley tobacco sales program are hoping for a flurry of enlistments by farmers as the Sept. 29 sign-up deadline approaches. Early reports indicate that relatively few farmers are volunteering to sell baled burley in southern and eastern Kentucky, while interest has been stronger in central parts of the state. Officials hope more growers will apply for a loose-leaf allotment at their local ASCS offices following a three-week period when good harvesting weather kept burley farmers in the fields. Each grower is eligible to be granted a baling quota of 5 percent of his effective quota, or 1,500 pounds, whichever is greater. Individual farmers can receive quota over the 5 percent level, however, if part of a county's 5 percent loose-leaf allotment goes unclaimed. Consideration for additional loose-leaf quota will be based on each farmer's original request, ASCS officials say. Farmers wishing to sell the maximum amount of baled burley should apply to sell 100 percent of their effective quota in baled form, ASCS says.

New Office Opened in Somerset To Provide Legal Assistance

The Appalachian Research and Defense Fund of Kentucky, Inc. announces the opening of its newest office which is located in Somerset, Kentucky. The office will provide free legal assistance to persons who meet the federal government poverty guidelines and who reside.

No criminal cases or cases in which a money settlement would pay for a private attorney's fee can be handled. A wide variety of other services are offered, however. Such matters as divorces, child custody and bankruptcies will comprise a small portion of the cases. The attorneys are also prepared to handle less routine issues such as environmental problems related to surface and deep mining; legal problems related to black lung disease; and difficulties encountered in obtaining benefits from the United Mine Workers Health and Retirement Funds. Additionally, clients can be represented in a full range of poverty law problems including consumer matters, education, welfare, housing, and individual civil rights. The office employs a paralegal who can represent clients in welfare hearings and can help appeal denial of state and federal benefits.

Currently staffed with two attorneys, the Somerset office will have a total of four attorneys by this fall. The office is located in the American Federal Building, Room 215, 107 South Main Street in Somerset. Appointments are scheduled for Mondays and Wednesdays from 9:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. and may be arranged by calling 678-7313 weekdays.

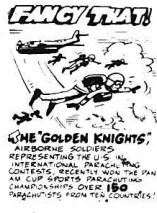
Telephone Company Upgrading Underway

John Wallace Black, Customer Service Manager for the Continental Telephone Company of Kentucky announced that the Company's upgrading to one and four party service is now in progress at the Brodhead and Mt. Vernon exchanges. The project includes the addition of over 210 miles of aerial and buried cable facilities within the two exchange areas. Cables being placed will vary in size from 1200 pairs to a 3 pair distribution cable. The changing of existing customers to one and four party lines is now in progress. In making these changes, customers could experience temporary interruptions in their service. "Every effort will be made to keep all

interruptions to a minimum" Black stated. This service improvement program for both exchanges is scheduled to be completed in December, 1978.

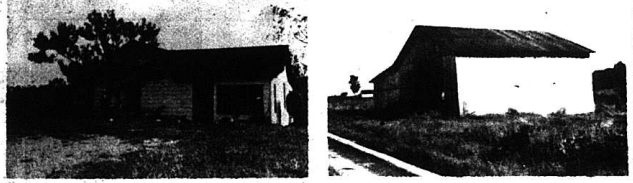

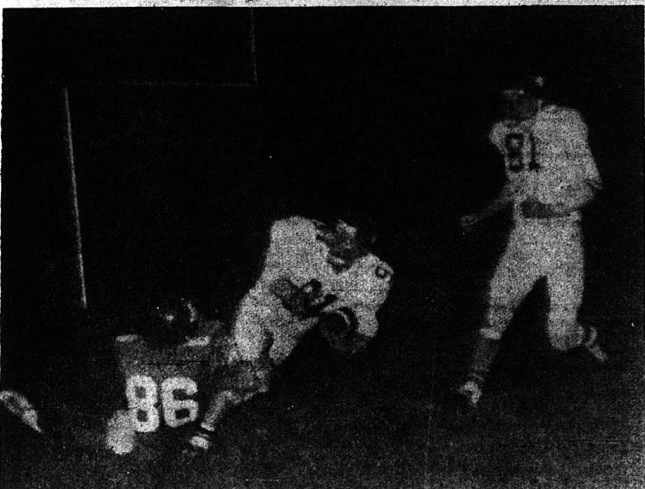

Mustangs were ahead at the time 12-0 but the Rockets came back to win 20-18. No. 81 in the picture is Walter Browning.

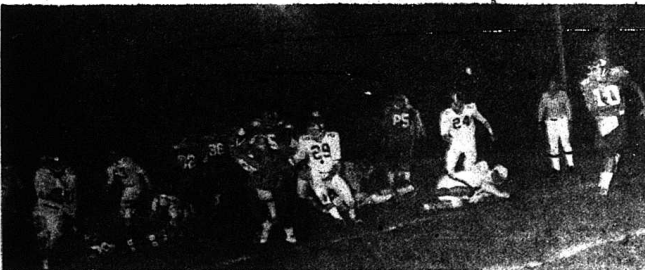

Local 4-H Members To Participate in National 4-H Week

Rockcastle County 4-H members will be participating in the Annual 4-H Week, a nationwide event, Cheryl Witt, County Extension Agent announced today. The theme of 4-H is: Freedom To Be.

The program now has 1180 members in 44 clubs in all the county schools, she said. This is up from 829 members in 9 clubs in 1971. 4-H Clubs meet through the cooperation of school officials, with both teachers and parents assuming leadership roles.

Ms. Witt has been in charge of both the 4-H Club and Homemaker Clubs

programs; however, next year, another agent may be hired to take over the 4-H program. Fiscal Court has budgeted for such a position to be filled in 1979.

Members are competing in a poster contest to express what 4-H does and is, and to show that 4-H is opportunity for all. Posters will be displayed in local store windows next week, Ms. Witt said.

Six winners will be chosen in grades 4 to high school, and they will receive ribbons and certificates. The winning posters will compete in the State Poster Contest, and could be selected for the National 4-H Poster.

Another important 4-H event coming up is the Annual Awards Recognition Banquet, to be held at Brohead School, 6:30 p.m. on October 20. At this banquet, members will be honored for the achievements in the past year.

The annual 4-Variety Show is scheduled for November 7. 4-H members are given the chance to display musical and dramatic talents while competing for ribbons and certificates.

Nationally, 4-H is the largest youth organization with over 5.5 million members. Some of its fastest growth is now taking place in cities and suburbs.

The Rockcastle Rockets went to the dressing room at half time last Friday night down by 12 points to Lone Jack. However, they came back in the third quarter to score 18 points and to add 7 more in the fourth quarter for the 20-18 win over the Mustangs.

As in every other game this season, the Rockets won the toss and elected to receive. And, as in the Clay County and Leslie County game, the Rockets mounted a serious threat on their first offensive drive only to see it stymie on Lone Jack's 23 yard line.

The Rockets played ball control the first quarter, allowing the Mustangs possession for only four plays; however, after another Rockets fumble just before the quarter ended on the Lone Jack 32 yard line, the Mustangs came to life and scored their first touchdown eight plays later around left end from the 7 yard line. Lone Jack's kick for the extra point was blocked.

On their first drive of the second quarter, the Rockets elected to go on 4-2. But, quarterback David Riddle was caught before he had a chance to hand the ball off and Lone Jack took over on the Rockets' 38 yard line a take-over which eventually set up the Mustangs' second score of the first half. On their very first play, the Lone Jack runner broke loose and a touchdown on that play was averted by a last second tackle by Steve Mitchell on the Rockets 8 yard line. However, three plays later, Lone Jack scored. A try for two points was no good.

That old-bug-a-boo for the Rockets, the penalty cost the Rockets again as a 40-yard touchdown pass from Anderkin to Eddie Thompson was called back because of a backfield in motion penalty against the Rockets. On the next play, a pass from Riddle to Anderkin was intercepted and returned to the Rockets' 48 yard line. Lone Jack ran one play, picking up three yards, then a Mustang pass was picked off, deep in Rockcastle territory, by Keith Bussell and returned to the Rockets' 15 yard line. A face mask penalty against Lone Jack gave the Rockets some breathing room but the half ended with the Mustangs out in front 12-0.

Lone Jack received a 15 yard penalty on the kick-off to begin the second half and had the ball 1-10 on their own 10. They were forced to punt on the series and Keith Bussell returned the short punt to Lone Jack's 29 yard line. The Rockets garnered a first down to Lone Jack's 17 on a pass from Anderkin to Bussell. In the next play, a Mustang pass was picked off, deep in Rockcastle territory, by Steve Mitchell. The Rockets try for two extra points failed but the Rockets were back in the game at 12-6.

During the course, students learned to test, inspect and repair the electronic system of the Improved HAWK launcher and associated equipment.

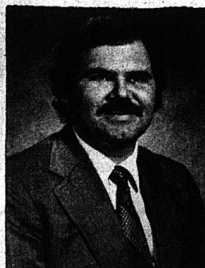
The HAWK Missile is a medium altitude air defense system.

Fishing Report

Recent cool nights have dropped surface water temperatures on Kentucky major lakes into the mid to upper 70's while black bass and crappie remain the most popular species on the stringers. The lake-by-lake rundown, according to the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources:

Cumberland: crappie good on the upper lake with some near limits still and drift fishing minnows over submerged cover banks and fair on the lower lake still and drift fishing minnows over deep submerged cover. Black bass fair to good on the lower lake trolling deep runners across deep points and deep banks and on plunker add fly combination early and late in jumps; in tailwaters, trout good, with some scattered limits; clear, falling, 70 feet below the timberline and 78 degrees.

Herrington: black bass good with some limits on surface lures early and late and artificial nightcrawlers at night off rocky banks and points, crappie fair to good over submerged cover and around stick ups; clear, falling slowly, three feet below pool and 78 degrees.

Barron: crappie fair to good over river channel drop-offs and submerged cover; black bass fair to good on the lower lake on artificial nightcrawlers and crank baits off points and over drop-offs, in tailwaters, trout fair; clear, tumbling, stable at pool and 76 degrees.

Barkley: crappie good over submerged cover; black bass on surface lures, deep runners and crank baits off rocky points, in tailwaters, catfish and crappie fair; clear, stable, 3 1/2 feet below pool and 78 degrees.

Kentucky: sauger fair trolling deep runners and drifting minnows over ridge

tops and creek channel drop-offs, crappie slow and improving over submerged cover drop-offs, in tailwaters, sauger fair to good, catfish fair; clear, stable, 3 1/2 feet below pool and 78 degrees.

Green: Bluegill fair to good off rocky points, and over submerged cover; black bass fair on artificial nightcrawlers off points and over drop-offs, in tailwaters, trout fair, clear, stable, one foot below pool and 80 degrees.

Rouch River: Crappie fair to good over submerged cover and around stick ups; black bass slow to fair at night on artificial nightcrawlers off rocky points and over drop-offs, clear, falling, one foot below pool and 78 degrees.

Nolin: black bass fair on crank baits over stump beds; crappie fair around stick ups; in tailwaters, trout fair, clear, falling slowly, one foot below pool and 79 degrees.

Buckhorn: black bass fair on crank baits off rocky banks; bluegill fair in inlets and hays; in tailwaters, trout fair, clear, falling slowly, one foot below pool and 78 degrees.

Buckhorn: black bass fair on crank baits off rocky banks; bluegill fair in inlets and hays; in tailwaters, catfish and trout fair, clear, falling, 1 1/2 feet below pool and 79 degrees.

Laurel: trout fair to good at night still and drift fishing worms and nightcrawlers off rocky banks; black bass slow on surface lures, spinner baits and artificial nightcrawlers in timbered coves and off rocky banks, clear, falling slowly, eight feet below power pool and 79 degrees.

Cave Run: musky fair on deep runners easting in timbered coves and trolling over main channel drop-offs; black bass slow easting artificial nightcrawlers and still fishing crawfish off banks; clear, falling, 2 feet below pool and 78 degrees.

Dale Hollow: white bass fair on plunker and fly combination in jumps; crappie slow still and drift fishing minnows in deep coves and over submerged cover; clear, falling, 5 1/2 feet below pool and 78 degrees.

Grayson: crappie fair around stick ups, black bass slow to medium deep runners and spinner baits off mud banks; in tailwaters, trout good, clear, tumbling, falling slowly, two feet below pool and 74 degrees.

Fishtrap: crappie slow around stick ups; white bass slow still fishing minnows in inlets and hays; clear, stable at pool and 79 degrees.

Dewey: crappie slow off deep points and around stick ups; clear to murky stable at pool and 78 degrees.

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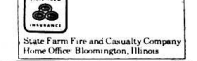
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
