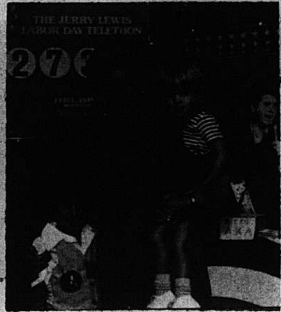

### Parent Seminar

Where did we learn how to be someone's parent? It's one job we take without any training and this might not be the best, according to Eula Lawrence, who will conduct two seminars in "Parent Effectiveness Training."

Ms. Lawrence is director of Consultation and Education for an eight-county area in the Cumberland River Valley Comprehensive Care program. The seminars will be held at 6 p.m. Tuesday, October 10 and 17 at the Sears Building.

"Just because we are biologically able to be parents does not mean that we know how to be parents," Ms. Lawrence said.

She said that the most important skill a parent can learn is how to communicate and how to understand what the child is saying.

"Only seven percent of communication is with words," Ms. Lawrence said. The rest is through facial expressions, body postures and so forth. Ms. Lawrence said it is important to learn all aspects of communication skills.

"Unless we can communicate, we do not know the other's needs and cannot develop a good relationship," Ms. Lawrence said.

Building a better relationship between parent and child, and being able to communicate so the child will talk to us are two skills to be taught at the

seminar. Other emphasis will be confronting each other without being destructive to self esteem or to the relationship, resolving problems so that both sides come out as winners, helping a child to consider and adopt values and learning to recognize behavior that is bothering us.

"This is not group therapy," Ms. Lawrence said, although parents sometimes bring up individual problems that they might have with a certain child. She said the classes are open to anyone interested in children or interested in learning better communication skills.

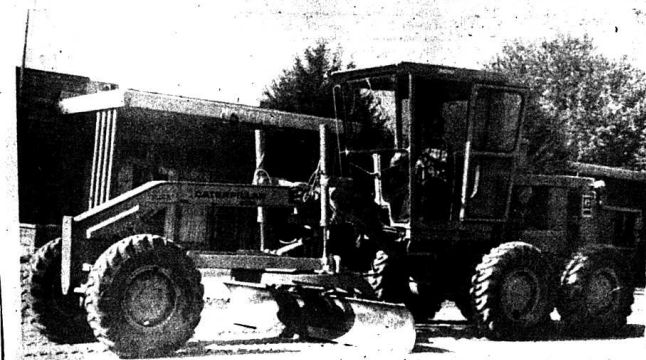

## Fiscal Court Won't Go Along With Proposal To Seed Road Banks Against Soil Erosion

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court turned down a plan to put plants along state highway banks and thus prevent soil erosion. All magistrates but Amos Burdette refused to vote on the issue at the court's regular meeting Tuesday, because they did not want the county to become involved with state roads. Judge Huber Thacker supported the plan.

Greg Stephens, County Soil Conservation officer with the U.S. Department of Agriculture, asked the court to sponsor the project. The Conservation Service would pay for seeds and materials, and the state Department of Highways would provide labor. The county would not pay at all, he said.

He said that the Conservation Service has identified 44 acres of road banks that are eroding and contributing to the pollution of Lake Lanville and many streams. The plants would control erosion, he said. The Conservation Service wanted to seed 12 acres along the state roads in the next three years. The other 26 acres are along county roads.

## Old-Time Renfro Valley Is Theme Of New Burger Queen Restaurant

The Burger Queen restaurant, near the Mt. Vernon exit on I-75, opened for business this Monday. It looks like Burger Queens everywhere but it is also unique to this community.

"We have a Renfro Valley theme," Randy Ison, resident manager, said. The theme is carried out with musical instruments in the center of the restaurant, large pictures of fiddlers and performers and old-time posters from radio broadcasts. The picture to the right of the comments shows John Lair, founder of Renfro Valley, as a young man in the 1920s.

Mr. Ison, who underwent five weeks of training in Louisville to become a manager, said the restaurant has hired 32 employees and may add five or six more. Because the crew is still learning, he said they have opened "quietly" with

The contracts provide for a sale of bonds, but Mr. Dober said it is assumed that the Farmers Home Administration will buy all the bonds.

Mr. Dober gave a report of ambulance activity that showed \$38,720 is owed to the hospital by people who used the service within the last 18 months but did not pay their bills.

J.D. Cottengim asked the Court to repair roads near Pine Hill.

Judge Thacker was given the authority to buy insurance on the county's voting machines.

Irene Bales, County Clerk, asked that deputy clerks receive a 7% cost of living raise using money collected in the Clerk's office for fees. The Court agreed to allow the raises.

## Four-Year-Old Dies In Pony Accident

A four-year-old Mt. Vernon girl died Saturday afternoon when a pony, carrying her and her father, reared and threw them both off his back.

The child, Jennifer Gail Whitaker, became entangled in the pony's halter and was dragged along the ground, according to Buddy Cox, deputy county coroner. Mr. Cox said death was caused from a broken neck and other fractures.

The accident occurred at the home of the child's grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Mullins at Climax.

Jennifer Gail was born January 31, 1974, the daughter of Kenneth and Helen Mullins Whitaker of Mt. Vernon.

## Brodhead Crime Spree Ends With Arrests of Three Persons

Two juveniles have been arrested in connection with a series of robberies that occurred last week in Brodhead, according to Elizabeth Mullins, mayor of Brodhead.

Larry W. Middleton of Brodhead has been arrested in connection with the case and charged with possession of stolen property and complicity. Further charges are pending, according to Greg Ennis and Detective Joe Gossett of the Kentucky State Police.

Several items have been recovered by the State Police from the homes of Bonnie Cash, Steven Trebolo, Garlan Cummins, and the Brodhead School. More recoveries are expected, Officer Ennis said.

"We hope that we have the situation under control now," she said. The crime was committed the weekend of September 25, when burglars entered four houses and three public buildings.

The Brodhead School lost about \$500 in individual equipment, including three tape recorders, a cassette player, and a Weather Alert machine. "We were very upset about this," Eliza Towery, principal of the school, said.

Mr. Towery said that while he hesitated to recall the number of burglaries that the school has had over the last year because there have been so many, this robbery was particularly upsetting because the items taken were brought through a school effort.

The children collected about 50,000 Campbell soup labels to buy this equipment," he said. "There was so much school spirit involved in this project, it's a shame that this happened." The Brodhead Post Office was also burglarized Sunday night, Sept. 24, but postmaster C.B. Owens said that nothing from the mail was missing, as far as he could tell. He said that the robbers broke the front door lock and removed the glass in the lobby door to enter the mailroom.

It was the first time the post office had been robbed, Mr. Owens said. In the same week, the homes of Steve Trebolo and Ronnie Cash were burglarized, but according to Ms. Mullins, some of their valuables have been returned.

## Brodhead Plans Community Center

The Brodhead Town Board met Monday evening and discussed the recent crime wave, according to Elizabeth Mullins, mayor. Some adjustments were made in the working hours of city policemen.

Mrs. Mullins said that a "secret donor" telephoned her and agreed to contribute to the remodeling of the old jail into a city hall and community center. Mrs. Mullins said that other money for this project is coming from proceeds from a rare sale and contribution from Brodhead Homemakers Club.

The Board voted to collect back taxes, meet with a realtor about the Puzry Duro property and to hire Cam [Cont. to 8]

## Jenny Robbins Made It To Grand Ole Opry, But She's Coming Home for Benefit Concert

Country singer Jenny Robbins says she does not have a lot of stories to tell about her childhood in Butcher, Holler, Ky. and some of the dramatic tales that other country singers tell about being poor.

"I grew up in good old Mt. Vernon," Ms. Robbins said. "I went to Mt. Vernon Elementary School and then to Brodhead School and listened to Renfro Valley's music station all the time."

Ms. Robbins said that her profession was something she was born with and "I always had the singing parts at school." "I never pursued my singing and I still don't think I've used it to the fullest," she said. "I seem to have skipped some of the little steps and gone right to the top."

"The top" is singing at the Grand Ole Opry last August and appearing on television on the Wilburn Brothers program. Or working on twelve television shows of her own - or having a song - "You've Just Found Yourself A New Woman" - be among the top ten in country music and be listed as a "chart buster" in music trade magazines. Or, being named by Record World magazine as one of the most promising female artists of the year.

Mr. Cash said the robbery had occurred when both he and his wife were working. Monday, Sept. 25, and that jewelry had been stolen. The Trebolo robbery occurred Sept. 27 between 7 and 8:30 p.m., according to Mrs. Trebolo. She said the thieves entered the back door and took "many things of value."

"The Sale Barn at Brodhead Fairgrounds, and the homes of Ernie Walwin and Ricky Kirby were also broken into, according to Lillian Collett, Brodhead Town Board member. Ms. Collett said these break-ins occurred the same week, but nothing of value was taken."

The state police, the county Sheriff, and the Brodhead police are investigating these crimes. In the case of the post office, federal investigators were brought into the case.

Sherman Denny, a Brodhead policeman, said he thinks the robberies are done by teen-agers being advised by adults.

"When we arrest them, they say, 'What are you going to do to us? You can't put us in jail because we are juveniles,'" Officer Denny said. "Our hands are tied in a lot of ways."

Officer Denny was fired upon by someone using a 12 gauge shotgun a few months ago. After that incident, another part-time policeman, Wayne Denny, was hired.

"I don't have sense enough to be scared," Sherman Denny said. He said he did not know why he was shot at, because he had never used a blackjack or in any way tried to "rough up" a suspect.

## Forest Fires Can Be Prevented By Following Advice by Ranger

October 1st marks the beginning of fall forest fire season in Kentucky. The danger of forest fire occurring increases as the trees shed their summer leaves and the sun reaches the forest floor to dry the leaves, grass, and other flammable material. Because of this increased fire danger, Kentucky laws prohibit the burning of any trash, brush and other debris within 150 feet of any woodland, except between the hours of 4:30 p.m. and midnight. These laws are in effect from October 1st to December 15th.

According to Steve Bullen, Rockcastle County Ranger of the Kentucky Division of Forestry, the 4:30 Burning Law is designed to discourage outdoor burning during the daylight hours. "After 4:30, as the sun goes down, the winds usually die and the humidity rises," he said. "It's much less likely that a trash or brush fire would get away from someone during the evening hours. Violators of the 4:30 Burning Law are subject to a \$100.00 to \$100.00 fine or 30 days to six months imprisonment, or both.

Even after 4:30, Rockcastle County residents are asked to be careful with fire. When someone lets a fire escape into the woods, they have broken the law, regardless of the precautions they are taking when the fire starts. Persons found responsible for causing forest fires are subject not only to fines and imprisonment, but may also be made to pay the cost of putting the fire out.

## 4-H Week in Rockcastle County

This is 4-H Week in Rockcastle County — the time when the community recognizes the 1200 local youth (about 75% of all the county's young people) enrolled in the 4-H program.

4-H has grown in the past six years here, from nine clubs to 44 clubs. The young people have learned to work together for the benefit of the community in the "Community Pride" program, to compete in many events such as the annual Tag Meet and the 4-H exhibits at the Brodhead Fair, and to just have a good time at places like the 4-H summer camp or at a Christmas party.

Young people from grades four through high school age can participate in 4-H clubs, but activities are different for different ages. Here is what 4-H means to Jamie Cox, a 5th grader who has been in the program only a year and Billy Cameron, Jr., a high school junior with over six years of 4-H experience.

The song, "I'm a little bit country, I'm a Little Bit Rock n' Roll" look Jamie and her sister, Jennifer, all the way to the State Fair in Louisville last year.

The two girls won second place in the Rockcastle County 4-H talent show, competed on the district level and won again.

"It was fun to sing like that," Jamie said. "I wasn't scared about it. I liked it." Jamie and Jennifer wore overalls and checked shirts when they sang. The whole thing made Jamie want to become a professional singer, although now she is fairly sure that she wants to become an artist. She uses her art talents in 4-H work, especially in craft making and most recently when she made a poster for 4-H week.

Jamie appeared at the State Fair also this summer to give a demonstration on first aid techniques with Paige Anderkin. The two showed the crowds at the fair how to take care of

ruts, bruises and other emergencies. Billy said the most interesting part of this experience was answering questions people had.

Jamie likes to collect rocks and said she enjoyed looking through a fossil collection at the State Fair. She hopes to be able to use her drawings and rocks in a 4-H project sometimes.

Jamie is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Cox of Mt. Vernon. Her 4-H club meets once a month with her teacher, Mrs. Powell, as leader.

Billy is one of Rockcastle County High School's leaders when it comes to 4-H work and the Future Farmers organization, but he said he does not want to become a farmer.

"I'm allergic to hay and corn," he said. His allergies make him cough and sneeze and sometimes break out in hives.

But Billy still enjoys working with animals which do not bother the allergies. He has raised rabbits, Bantam chickens and Holsteins. Every year he raises a calf from a Black Angus he also raised himself. Billy saves the profits from these enterprises for his college education.

"I once sold 21 rabbits," he said. "They were half California-type rabbits and they are a lot of trouble."

Billy said the most useful part of 4-H for him has been learning how to keep careful records of the animals and the competition between members.

"The competition keeps you interested in it," he said.

Billy has competed in the Lions Blue Grass Fair in Lexington, the Brodhead Fair and in Louisville. He took training at Eastern Kentucky University and is now qualified to judge dairy cattle events himself.

Of four countywide Hog Meets he has entered, Billy won each time and

went on to district competition.

Billy has served as president of his 4-H Club and said one of the most meaningful things the club did was a project at Sowder Nursing Home in Brodhead.

"We visited there each month and gave the people little tags to have for their doors," he said. The nursing home projects under the 4-H Community Pride program.

Billy is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Billy Cameron and the family has a 41-acre farm with 25 head of dairy cattle. Billy's father is a biology teacher at Rockcastle County High School and his mother is a teacher's aide at Brodhead.

## Legislative Report

On several occasions the Personal Service Contract Review Subcommittee has been discussed in this column. It came about by the enactment of House Bill 110 by the 1978 General Assembly. The purpose of the committee is to provide more input by the legislature into the issuance of personal service contracts.

This committee has no power to reject a contract, its only leverage is the opportunity to make any discrepancies public knowledge. The approximate cost to implement this committee was \$7,000.

It is widely believed that the mere existence of the committee will discourage the proposal of many questionable contracts, thus saving the Commonwealth much more in tax revenue than the \$7,000 input.

In the past there have been accusations of abuse in the issuance of personal service contracts. Primarily, this stems from the fact that the Governor has almost complete control of these contracts, which is to say that he may issue a contract to anyone for

anything. On Sept. 12, the committee held its first full meeting. There were 45 personal service contracts to be reviewed and almost half were deferred to the October meeting, due to the lack of agency representatives present, who were needed to answer the legislators' questions. However, three major questions were raised at the meeting that reveal the worth and purpose of the committee.

The first item was a personal service contract issued to the Department of Finance for \$300,000 to hire a space utilizing consultation firm in Los Angeles to make studies in hopes of improving upon the delivery of services by state agencies, also to make feasibility studies related to new programs. During the meeting it came to light that the contract only called for \$50,500 but the Department of Finance requested an additional \$219,500 to be used for expected cost overrun.

We of the committee referred the contract to the October meeting so that officials from the Department of Finance could answer questions raised such as, could the spare utilization firm produce unsurvanted work to get the extra \$219,500.

The whole situation was highly publicized, which was the committee's aim and three days later the governor, hoping to avoid controversy, cancelled the extra \$219,500 provision of the contract. After one meeting, the committee has succeeded in stripping \$219,500 of waste from state spending.

The second item revolves around a state law that prohibits any state employee from being paid more than the governor's salary of \$35,000 per year. The Kentucky State Racing Commission had planned a 20 percent raise for their senior racing steward, this would put his salary to \$45,000 per year under a personal service contract. The committee requested that the Racing Commission withhold the raise until such time when the governor's salary will be \$50,000 per year.

The Racing Commission does not have to abide by the Committee's request. But if it refuses, the contract

will be further reviewed by the Appropriations and Revenue Committee. If the Appropriations and Revenue Committee objects to the contract, it will be presented to the 1980 General Assembly.

The third item concerns another Racing Commission contract, where in the state para-mutual supervisor was hired under a personal service contract because he is past mandatory retirement age. Allowance of a contract that was issued specifically to get around the mandatory retirement law would serve to defeat the whole purpose of the committee. At this time, the situation is still to require further discussion.

The next meeting will be held on October 10th and 11th. This two-day meeting results from the fact that there will be around 200 contracts to be reviewed. Most certainly other questions will arise from the committee's functions, but it is safe to say that House Bill 110 is paying off in remarkable fashion.

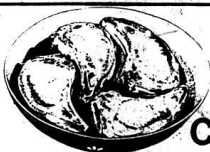

## County Agents Notes

**Host Parasite Reaction in Cattle**  
You may be wondering why we recommend that you treat for cattle grubs as soon as possible after the adult fly activity ceases. The sooner you treat, the less likelihood there is that your cattle may suffer a host hypersensitivity reaction (HPR). This problem occurs when large numbers of the common cattle grub are killed in the area of the esophagus or large numbers of the northern cattle grub are killed in the area of the spinal column. As you know, cattle grub larvae migrate through the animal's body for 8-10 months. Much of their time is spent in the area around the esophagus or spinal-column during the 5th, 6th and 7th months. That is usually November and December in Kentucky.

Sometimes when grubs are killed in these areas the host's tissues will become severely inflamed and cause the esophagus to swell shut or put pressure on the spinal column.

Symptoms for the first type of HPR is swelling in the neck, difficulty in swallowing drooling of saliva and bloat. HPR caused by killing the northern cattle grub causes stiffness in the hindquarters, imbalance, or the inability to lift the hind feet. HPR is more common among younger animals since they usually have a heavier grub load.

If these symptoms are observed, keep the animal moving and consult a veterinarian. Do not treat with Atropine since this HPR Syndrome is not the result of Organophosphate poisoning of your cattle. Antihistamines or corticosteroids are recommended. If severe bloat is encountered the bloating symptoms should be relieved using a trocar or heavy needle rather than a stomach tube. Administering anti-bloat agents

such as mineral oil may also help. Information developed by Bayvet indicates that if you must treat cattle late then be aware that HPR may be a result. For best results treat cattle while they are "empty and active". In other words, treat them as soon as you unhook them and before they are put on feed.

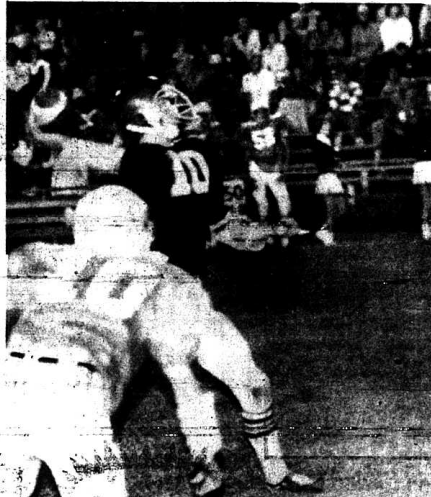
