BIBLE LESSON

"So ought men to love their wives as their own bodies. He that loveth his wife loveth himself. For no man ever yet hated his own flesh, but nourisheth and cherisheth it, even as the Lord the church." - Ephesians 5:28, 29.

If the head of the household would follow these words found in God's word the Bible there would be less bitterness between husband and wife. The facts show though that the average housewife is twice as likely to suffer bodily harm from him, inflicted by her husband, than by muggers or burglars.

Wife beating is a crime that is increasing with shocking frequency, but it often goes unreported in one American city, of 600 women applying for divorce, 37 percent gave physical abuse as the reason. Some husbands consider it their "right" to treat their wives this way but the Bible gives them no such "right". The above words show how God would have husbands treat their wives. As "no man ever yet hated his own flesh," no real man would ever physically abuse his wife but would "nourish and cherish" her.

The Bible condemns the violent person. Notice the words at Psalm 37:8-9: "Cease from anger, and forsake wrath: fret not thyself in any wise to do evil. For evildoers shall be cut off, but those that wait upon the Lord, they shall inherit the earth." As noted here in scripture the person who gets provoked into anger and wrath and does evil, as in the case of a husband who beats his wife would be cut off by God. He would not inherit the earth and the blessings that will come to those that wait upon the Lord (Rev. 21:15; Gen. 2:8-15).

Still the Bible urges married couples to work out their difficulties and remain together if at all possible. What could the wife do then? She can ask herself: Could I at times have nagged or provoked my husband into a rage, him having this weakness? Do I fan the flames during arguments, instead of keeping calm? A Bible lesson tells us "A fool uttereth altho' his mind, but a wise man to woman keepeth it in till afterwards." Proverbs 29:11.

But still a wife may do all she can and her husband does not respond. If a wife situation appears to be so dangerous or serve that something must be done, then she must decide whether to seek protection through legal action or no.

No Rate Hike Yet For Kentucky Utilities

The Kentucky Public Service Commission (PSC) last week denied rate increases proposed by four utilities companies.

The increases were sought by Kentucky Utilities Co., Bluegrass Disposal Corp., Cooper Chapel Sanitary Facilities and Salem Telephone Co.

The PSC, which has under consideration a \$25.9 million rate increase proposed by Kentucky Utilities, denied the company's latest request for an additional \$7 million increase.

The latest KU request would have brought the total proposed increase package to \$32.9 million. Part of the \$25.9 million increase proposal—an emergency \$12.5 million—was granted by the PSC Sept. 1, but is subject to refund pending the outcome of the overall rate case.

KU's request for the additional \$7 million came earlier this week and was immediately rejected by the PSC.

Ambulance Headquarters Completed: 24-Hour Duty Staff Moves Into Building

Rockcastle County's ambulance crew moved into its new quarters this week—a building adjacent to Rockcastle County hospital. The building was paid for by the Fiscal Court, which also finances the ambulance service.

Work began on the structure six months ago, and was completed this week by general contractor Preston Collins. The building includes living quarters for the ambulance crew, parking for the county's three ambulances, and space to repair and maintain the vehicles.

Fiscal Court Accepts Bid On Road Grader

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court accepted a bid of \$53,738 from Wayne Supply Company of Lexington for a road grader.

The Court met in special session Monday to consider bids from four companies, after looking over the machines themselves last week. While two bids were lower than Wayne's Supply's, the Court accepted it because their grader "best served the needs of the county."

Frank DeBorde voted against accepting the bid.

The county received \$50,000 this week from the Area Development Fund of the state of Kentucky. The rest of the grader money will come from revenue-sharing funds, County Judge Executive Hubert Thacker said.

The grader is used for a variety of jobs such as spreading gravel and removing snow. It will be the third one the county owns.

The ambulance service had been operating from the Rockcastle County Library, but moved to the hospital ground July 20, when the county took over the service. Since July, the emergency medical squad has been housed in the basement of the hospital.

The new building has larger quarters for the men, who are on call 24-hours a day.

Nine emergency medical technicians make up a staff of the ambulance service, and two are working at any given moment.

Harold DeMarcus and Oline Carmichael, who lost the Republican nomination last May for the U.S. Senate to Louie Guenther, Jr. Harold Rogers, a Commonwealth attorney and the Fifth District Republican chairman, will also be there.

Non-Voters May Play Role In Outcome of Next Election

 Election day is Tuesday, November 7, and people working on it expect a light turnout.

County Clerk Irene Bales said that 6788 people are registered to vote this election. In the May primary, about 800 people voted. (Approximately five out of six are registered Republicans.)

Harold Rogers, Republican Fifth District Chairman, said he did not see much interest in the election in any of the counties where he campaigns, except Cumberland, where there is a race for county judge, U.S. Sen. Walter Huddleston has called voter apathy a key issue in this election.

Rockcastle County has only two local contests: school board and trustees for the city of Brodhead. K.R. Burdette, a Mt. Vernon veterinarian, is running unopposed for his third term as school board representative from District 3 in Mt. Vernon. George Poynter, a part-time minister in Livingston, is running unopposed for the seat vacated by Billy Burdine. Mr. Poynter's bid for the school board is his first political contest.

Candidates for trustee of the city of Brodhead include David Gosh, D.A. Robbins, Edwards Lamb and Terrill Chandler. Johnny Wilcox is no longer a candidate, but he withdrew too late to take his name off the printed ballots.

In state politics, Judge John D. White of Manchester is running in a non-partisan race against Judge J. Calvin Aker of Somerset. Judge White is a former Presbyterian minister and currently a member of the Court of Appeals in Frankfort. Judge Aker is the Pulaski and Rockcastle County District Court Judge, and has degrees in chemistry, zoology and physics as well as law.

Incumbent U.S. Senator Walter

"Dee" Huddleston is running for his second term. The first Democratic senator from Kentucky in 16 years, he is a member of the Agriculture, Nutrition, Forestry, Appropriations and Select Intelligence Committees.

His opponent is Louie Guenther, Jr. of Northfield. Mr. Guenther has been a state representative from a Louisville district three times, and has practiced law.

Dr. Tim Lee Carter of Tompkinsville was first elected to the United States House of Representatives in 1964, and voters in this district have re-elected

him ever since. He appeared in Rockcastle County three times since July—one for the Industrial Park Groundbreaking Ceremony, once for a town meeting and this Thursday for a Republican dinner. He has served on the Interstate and Foreign Commerce Committee, and the Small Business subcommittee.

Last Widow of Civil War Veteran, Mrs. Rachel Lunsford, 85, Dies

The last known widow of Civil War veteran in Kentucky died Monday at Rockcastle County Hospital after a long illness.

Mrs. Rachel Lunsford of Brodhead, 85, was the widow of William Beatty Lunsford, a Confederate veteran who died in 1927.

Mrs. Lunsford never talked very much about his wartime experiences, according to his granddaughter, Mrs. Hazel Wren of Brodhead. She hauled ammunition between Crab Orchard and the Cumberland Gap," she said. "We know too that he was captured near Wildcat Mountain."

Mrs. Wren said she did not receive any special military funeral when he died. The state of Kentucky paid Mrs. Lunsford \$150 every three months since his death.

Mrs. Lunsford lived with her only child, James, Sr., and his wife in Brodhead. After the death of her daughter-in-law, Mrs. Lunsford took over the rearing of their two children, Mrs. Wren and her brother, James. "She was like a mother to me," Mrs. Wren said. "She was talkative, and could cut up and tell jokes. Her mind was very good even toward the end."

Mrs. Wren said her grandmother contracted pneumonia in 1975, and even since has not been completely well. Mrs. Lunsford's study has been reported several times in the Signal, The Louisville Courier-Journal, and the Lexington Herald. She was interviewed by John Latr, when he was writing the history of the county.

Mrs. Lunsford's funeral was last Thursday at Brodhead Church of Christ. Arrangements were made through Watson Funeral Home in Brodhead. She is survived by Mrs. Wren and her children: Sandra, Debra, Mike and Tony; and her grandson, James, who now lives in Stanford. She was a great aunt to Ellen and Raymond Wilson of Brodhead.

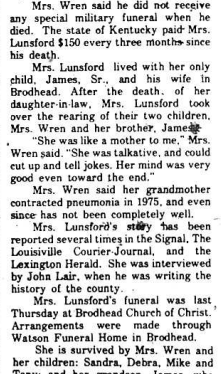

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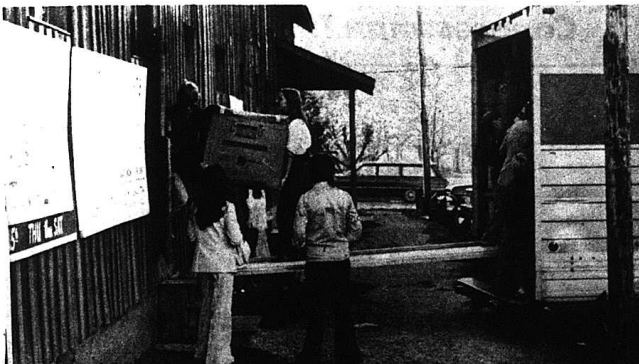

 I plan to attend the next city council meeting (Monday, Nov. 6, at 7:30 p.m.) and will be asking for a lease for the third time. At this meeting we will find out if the city council is concerned about the welfare of the town or if they are only interested in making this a third meeting place. Therefore making the well-housed city council in the Commonwealth of Kentucky and denouncing the birth of a new business.

Legislative Report

By Rep. Harold DeMaras

Kentucky's Consumer Protection Division (CPD) under the supervision of the Attorney General was established by legislative mandate in 1972. The division's duties, entitled under the Consumer Protection Act are the reviewing and investigation of fraud, presentation of litigation, utility intervention and consumer education.
 Consumer protection's source of power arrives from the enforcement of that portion of the Consumer Protection Act which prohibits "unfair, false, misleading, or deceptive acts or practices."
 There are 28 members of the consumer protection staff; ten attorneys, three investigators, three consumer specialists, and twelve secretarial type workers.

In 1977, the CPD received 4,449 complaints from consumers. Nineteen cases were filed under the unfair practices section of the Consumer Protection Act and litigation continued on another thirty-six cases that were filed prior to 1977.
 Also, the utility section assumed responsibility for intervening on behalf of the consumer before the Insurance Regulatory Board. Intervention was made in eleven cases involving requested increases on insurance premiums.

Consumers in Fayette County lodged 615 complaints to CPD, representing the largest per-county ratio, while Robertson County had only one complaint listed. In 1977, there were 44 complaints in Pulaski County, 38 in Boyle, 18 in Lincoln, 11 in Garrard and 5 in Rockcastle.

Many times when the problem is brought to the attention of the business in question and the rights and responsibilities of both parties are discussed, a fair resolution becomes apparent and the matter is settled satisfactorily by the parties themselves. During the last year, less than one third of consumer complaints were left unresolved.
 The CPD's consumer education program is directed by a consumer education specialist. The approach has

involved extensive use of mass media; personal presentations; publications, a booth at local fairs; work with local consumer groups and correspondence with interested consumers.
 The CPD coordinated the development of the Small Claims Court brochures with the Administrative Office of the Courts. The brochures are available to circuit court clerks for distribution to consumers and businesses.
 Since unfair business practices damage not only the consumer but the business majority that prides themselves on ethical conduct, the Consumer Protection Division serves to benefit the consumer and the honest businessman.
