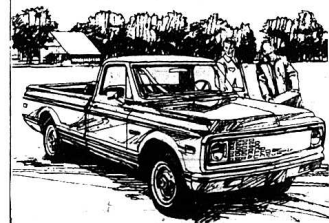

In this, our third article of the series of six, we will discuss briefly what constitutes a good home comfort system. Again, we must stress this point: be sure of the installing contractor and of the distributor and manufacturer who supply the installer. This precaution will help to assure you of an excellent installation, such as provided by Greg's Heating & Cooling, backed up by local parts and technical aid, such as provided by DECO Supply Co., and superior time proven equipment, as provided by Bard Mig. Co., established in 1914. Be wary of the well-meaning friend or part-time installer who can "get it for you wholesale." No responsible distributor or manufacturer would knowingly allow his equipment to be installed by inexperienced or irresponsible people. Again, Investigate.

An adequate home comfort system will maintain a reasonable comfort level with some mildly objectionable noise and possibly uneven temperature areas, plus slightly high operating cost. These conditions are usually caused by an improperly engineered air duct system using a minimum number of supply air openings, and only one, or possibly two, return air openings. This type of installation can result in a lower initial cost, but remember this initial economy is soon forgotten when these minor irritations occur, and the higher operating cost and shortened equipment life will soon overcome the initial lower cost.

Next week, things to look for in an excellent system.

Our fourth article will look at what constitutes an excellent home comfort system and when all is said and done, if your home is kept comfortable with a minimum amount of irritation and with economical operating cost, you have an excellent system.

Winter Slows Down Schools, Business

Winter was continue to make news in Rockcastle County, after another week of icy roads, slowed businesses, and closed schools.

After opening for four days for the first time since last Friday, Jan. 19, after a freezing rain storm. Total precipitation between Friday and Sunday here was 3.08 inches, with a 2.75 inch accumulation of snow on the ground, according to Buddy Cox, of Mt. Vernon, who keeps the official weather records.

That 2.75 inch accumulation along with freezing temperatures Monday was enough to keep the schools closed again this week. By Tuesday afternoon, the major roads had cleared but back roads were still covered with ice and hazardous for drivers.

Schools opened Wednesday, for the first time since last Thursday, then shut down at 10:30 a.m. as the weatherman predicted snow and freezing temperatures.

The State Police post in London reported 26 traffic accidents Friday in their seven-county district, with Rockcastle having four, all involving property damage. A spokesperson for the post said that although last year's week was worse than this year's, more accidents have occurred this January than last. The score is 1978-172 accidents, and 1979-205.

Rockcastle had eight traffic accidents between Jan. 16-23, all involving property damage.

You Can Still Get Help On Last Year's Winter Fuel Bills

The Emergency Energy Assistance Program has been extended through March 15, 1979, to help people pay for fuel and other bills incurred in last winter's extremely bad weather. Anyone who has received assistance already under this program is not required to apply again, according to the rules of the Community Services Administration, the agency that runs the assistance program.

The Rockcastle County Weatherization Office is in charge of the program here, according to Pat Tish, staff manager. She said the office helped several hundred people last year by giving them vouchers to pay fuel bills or otherwise make it through the weather-related emergency.

According to the Community Services Administration rules, the program is for the crisis that occurred between Jan. 1, 1978 and June 30, 1978.

"An emergency need must have existed during the 1977-78 winter, the person must have lacked (money) to meet the need, and the lack of (money) must have resulted in hardship," according to the rules. Applicants must provide proof through fuel bills and other papers.

Funds obtained through this program can be used to pay current fuel bills.

Livingston to Install Sidewalks, and Rehabilitate Some Housing

The city of Livingston will open bids for new sidewalks at City Hall this morning (Thursday). Estimated cost of the project is \$20,000.

The city is also taking bids for rehabilitation of housing, for which up to \$30,000 has been budgeted. Money for both projects comes from a grant from the federal government Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). The grant for \$109,200 was received in November, 1977, and about half has been spent so far.

A Judiciary Nominating Committee has been appointed by Gov. Julian Carroll to help appoint a judge for the 28th Judicial District, which includes Rockcastle County. Besides two members from the Kentucky Bar Association and the Kentucky Supreme Court, Justice, Gov. Carroll appointed James W. Mullins of Mt. Vernon, Tom Garland of Tateville, Jess Turpin of Somerset, and William Ragle of Nancy.

The commission will nominate three people, and Gov. Carroll

Private Developer Says He Wants to Construct Apartments for Low to Moderate Income People

A private developer is interested in building 100 apartments for moderate to low income people in Rockcastle County. The project could cost up to \$2 million, according to David Patton, Tri-County Community Development Agency.

Mr. Patton said that the developer contacted his agency, which is helping the county Fiscal Court come up with a housing program for low income people. He said the developer has selected a site in the county and would build 32 one-bedroom apartments, 20 two-bedroom apartments, and 20 three-bedroom apartments. The one-bedroom units would be for the elderly or handicapped.

At a public hearing Tuesday at the Rockcastle Co. courthouse, Judge-Executive Hubert Thacker went over the county's Housing Assistance program. The program has the goal of building 170 units within three years, of which 70 would be for elderly and handicapped, 80 for families with four or fewer persons, and 20 units for families with more than five persons. The goals were based on a population and housing study about Rockcastle County done in 1977 by the Cumberland Valley Area District Development Agency.

The goals of that study are also used by the federal government to determine how much money should be spent here on new housing.

The Administrative Office of the Courts announced today that Rockcastle County will receive an annual compensation of \$20,439.67 for the use of facilities for circuit and district court.

Legislation providing for a cost-related basis of compensation was enacted by the 1978 General Assembly. Under the provisions of the act which became effective July 1, 1978, counties and cities providing space for the use of the court system will be reimbursed in accordance with the percentage of square feet in the existing structure which is used by the court system.

There are two major components in the determination of compensation. Rockcastle County will receive 41% of the total operating expenses of the courthouse such as utilities and maintenance. Additionally, it will receive a 4% use allowance, as an

annual return on capitalized expenditures, which is also based on 41% of the total square feet in the existing structure. Payment for the first six months of the fiscal year in the amount of \$10,219.84 covering the period July 1, 1978 through December 31, 1978, has been made to the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court.

On the 22nd of January, 1979, East District court convicted Charles Fields and Robert Daugherty on two counts each for strip mining without having first obtained permits from the Dept. of Natural Resources and Environmental Protection.

The men went through Mrs. Houston's purse, and the household, apparently looking for money, and escaped. Trooper Joe Gossett is investigating the incident.

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Factory to be up by April, Manager Comes Next Week

Joe Lambert, Candidate for State Representative, Describes Himself As 'A Conservative Republican'

Mr. James said that the company will be contacting people about jobs, and people should not phone the Industrial Authority.

The Cincinnati firm did an extensive labor study of Rockcastle County to determine if enough people were interested in working in their plant. About 1100 were interviewed, and the plant may hire up to 250 this spring.

Mr. James said that four other companies are in various stages of negotiation with the Industrial Authority about building factories in the industrial park. He said that competition among industrial park is very keen.

"We are competing with any park in the United States," he said, "and there are a lot of them."

Rockcastle's industrial park is one of eight such parks being developed through a \$10 million state loan fund in combination with other state, federal and local money. When completed, the parks will occupy more than 2,000 acres and employ 20,000 people, according to Rodney Dempsey, director of the Kentucky Development Finance Authority.

The program began in 1976 with \$7.5 million. Loans are offered through KIDFA at an interest rate of 4 percent for 10 years.

Before an industrial park is developed, a study is made about the demand for industrial land in the area, the number of jobs to be created, the available labor supply, location advantages and disadvantages, and the types of industry to be attracted to the region.

The most ambitious of the current projects are the \$6.5 million Corbin Tri-County Industrial Park, which will occupy a 40-acre site in portions of Knox, Laurel and Whitley Counties, and the \$2.75 million Lincoln Trail Industrial Park, on 800 acres near Elizabethtown.

Rockcastle County is expected to provide 5,400 jobs at 30 or more industries. The cities of Barbourville.

 Students at 118 schools throughout eastern Kentucky participated in the READ-a-thon and each student read an average of 14 books during the reading period. Over \$17,000 was collected on behalf of the Society as a result of their efforts. These funds will be used to support needed services for MS patients and their families in eastern Kentucky, and research into the cause, cure and prevention of Ms.
 With the continued generous support of the eastern Kentucky community, we anticipate the day when this mysterious disease will be solved.

KU rates compare very favorably

More than 74% of 226 investor-owned electric utilities in a national survey reported higher residential bills than KU for customers using 750 kilowatt hours a month. Our cost, \$29.40, includes the recent interim rate increase and the fuel adjustment charge under the new uniform system.

We are pleased our rates compare well and are working to keep them as low as possible. However, energy costs are rising because of environmental controls, inflation, and fuel costs. Doubling of consumer use in the past 10 years has also caused higher bills.

Abolishing the fuel clause would result in increased costs to KU customers because: 1) If the time for recovering fuel costs were delayed further, KU would have to borrow money at rising interest rates to meet expense; and 2) Without the fuel clause, KU could not absorb the constantly fluctuating coal costs and would have to file additional general rate increase requests, which are costly.

Legislative Report

 A factional group of democrat legislators have recently introduced several pieces of tax-reducing legislation. In the past, this group has steadfastly refused to support any type of tax cutting bill, to the contrary they have been more concerned with increasing the Commonwealth's taxes.
 During the first 10 days of this Extraordinary Session while the governor and Lt. governor dancel

to the tune of \$28,000 a day to see how many times each one could get in front of the TV camera, the democrat lawmakers bypassed the committee system in order to argue among themselves and to try to figure a way to avoid cutting taxes.

Instead of going ahead and taking action on Republican introduced legislation that was available in 1978 as well as 1979, the democrats chose to squander 10 legislative days that constitutes a waste of \$280,000 tax revenue dollars to suffice their political motivations.

Soon or later the tax-reducing measures will have to be acted upon. To date, the present state administration has employed every imaginable delaying tactic, now it seems that some legislative action must be taken, so their aim is to weaken the forthcoming tax reductions.

The important thing to remember is that in 1968 the executive budget was \$2.5 billion and today, thanks to Kentucky's current executive branch, it is \$7.5 billion. An increase of \$5 billion in 11 years is to say the least a less than austere figure. What's more, there is no corresponding increase in state provided services, in fact, there could well be a decrease.

Just to illustrate some of the states current services, the Department for Human Resources labeled several toys being sold on Kentucky's Christmas market as being unsafe, this was a good idea, except that this information was made public with only 5 shopping days left till Christmas.

One pertinent issue that has been raised during this special session is a concern over the stabilization of crop prices.

It is only common sense to realize that this lack of stabilization is one reason for the current havoc in consumer energy costs, especially where the automatic fuel adjustment charge is concerned. It is also reasonable to assume that the consumer has no quarrel with the fuel adjustment charge, however, the automatic fueladjustment charge is something else again.

On another note, 15 members of the House Republican Caucus have co-sponsored House Bill 29,

which would increase the standard deduction for an individual taxpayer \$200 per year for the next 5 taxable years. This measure would provide some firm relief for the hardworking people of Kentucky. It would be something that would be evident and have impact.

Although House Bill 29 is a very good and responsible piece of legislation, the democrat legislators will force it to die in committee and then hope the public will just forget. It is the belief of the House Republican Caucus that the public's memory

will not be that short. At this time, we of the House republican Caucus are preparing a bill that would be termed sunset legislation. This sunset bill would make the Commonwealth's bureaucratic agencies more accountable. It requires all the state's agencies to document and justify their existence every 5 years.

Potato Facts

- Though considered a starchy vegetable, potatoes are not as fattening as most people think.
- One medium-sized potato, cooked plain, furnishes about 90-100 calories about the same number found in the following quantities of some fruits and vegetables:
- 1 large apple
- 1/2 large orange or banana
- 1/2 large grapefruit
- 1/4 cup cooked fresh corn
- 1/2 cup cooked green lima beans
- 1/2 cup cooked green peas

Fat added to potatoes in the form of butter, margarine, gravies or sauces, however, increases the number of calories considerably, just as largely responsible for the idea that potatoes are fattening. The following data for one cup of potatoes prepared in different ways shows the increase in the number of calories when different amounts of fat are added:

- Potatoes, one cup, cooked portions: plain, no fat added, 101 calories and 2 grams fat, mashed, milk, and table fat added,

197 calories, 9.0 grams fat, french-fried, 10 strips, 4 inches long, 214 calories, 10.3 grams fat, hash browned, 355 calories and 18.1 grams fat.

For practical purposes, potatoes can be put into three groups: new potatoes, general purpose potatoes and baking potatoes.

"New" potatoes is a term most frequently used to describe those freshly harvested and marketed during the late winter and early spring. The name is also widely used in later crop producing areas to designate freshly dug potatoes which are not quite fully matured.

New potatoes are best used for boiling or creaming. They vary widely in size and shape, depend-

ing upon the variety, and are likely to be affected by "skinning" or "feathering" of the outer layer of skin. This skinning usually affects only their appearance.

General Purpose Potatoes include the great majority of round and long type potatoes offered for sale in the markets. With the aid of air-cooled storage, they are available throughout the year.

As the term implies they may be used for boiling, frying, and baking, although many of the common varieties are not considered the best for baking.

The most widely grown and best known baking potatoes is the Russett Burbank. This variety has a long oval shape, and fine, scaly netting on the skin.

The Outlaws are popular for such songs as "There Goes Another Love Song" and "Green Grass and High Tide."

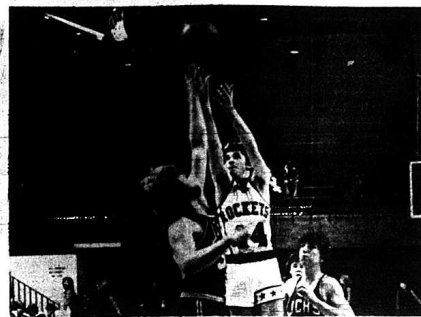
Prine and the Outlaws are sponsored on the campus by the University Center Board.

COMPUTER ENERGY ANALYSIS

There's a free service through the Homemaker Extension Office that will help you save money on your heating bills.

You fill out a form that asks 23 questions about your house or mobile home, such as type of fuel used, dimensions of the house, etc.

Then you mail the form to the University of Kentucky, where experts analyze it for you using a computer. You receive a computer print-out that shows you exactly how much money you would save by adding insulation, changing the windows, etc. The answers are detailed. For example, it will tell you how much you can save by adding 2 inches, 4 inches, 6 inches, or more extra insulation.

You can request the questionnaire by calling the Extension Office at 256-2403 weekdays, or by stopping by the office in the Mt. Vernon Courthouse.

The service is called Computerized Home Energy Analysis Program (CHEAP) and is conducted through the Agricultural Department of the University of Kentucky.

BUILDING A HOUSE

If you are building a house or planning to do so, you may want to take a six-lesson correspondence course through the County Extension Office. The fee for the course is \$3.00 which includes a plan book and housing activity handbook.

The information covered includes assessing needs of the family financing your home and applying for a mortgage, working with builders and contractors, sel-

ecting house plans, and making specifications.

Cheryl Witt, County Extension Agent, said that the course was considered excellent and might help people avoid a lot of expensive problems after the house is built.

You can register through the County Extension Office, Box 297, Mt. Vernon, 40456, before Jan. 31.

Purgatory

The Bible says absolutely nothing about purgatory. It is as silent as the tomb. Purgatory does not exist, except in the minds and doctrines of men.

The idea of purgatory is that all men (except those who are general, it is held that the period of suffering in purgatory can be shortened) by one's relatives making gifts of money to secure prayers and masses by the priest. After enough (and not one can define "enough") gifts, prayers, and masses are made, then God supposedly transports one's relatives out of the fires of purgatory and into heaven.

It should be noted that the idea of purgatory is even inconsistent with other Catholic doctrine. It is difficult to understand how, at death, a priest is summoned to administer extreme unction, at which time he solemnly pronounces the absolution of all sins. Then, after death, one must be gotten out of purgatory who went there, it is declared, because of his sins!

Of the multitude of doctrines introduced by men, this is the one that most would like to believe. However, the Bible does not support the doctrine of purgatory, nor any other doctrine of a second chance involving a change of state after death. Rather, it teaches:

(1) One cannot change his condition after death. "It is appointed unto men once to die, and after this cometh judgment" (Heb. 9:27, ASV). According to some, this should read "after death cometh purgatory." Please read Luke 16:19-31, particularly verse 26, where Jesus taught that there can be no change of state after death.

(2) One will be judged by what he has done on earth, not by what somebody does for him after he dies. "For we must all appear before the judgement seat of Christ; that every one may receive the things done in his body, according to that he hath done, whether it be good or bad." (2 Cor. 5:10).

It is regrettable that so many have been deceived into thinking that one can be purged from his sins after death, for they live in false hope. We pray that all will study The Bible, obey the gospel of God's Son, and live faithfully for Him in This Life. There will be no question about eternal life in Heaven—God has promised it.

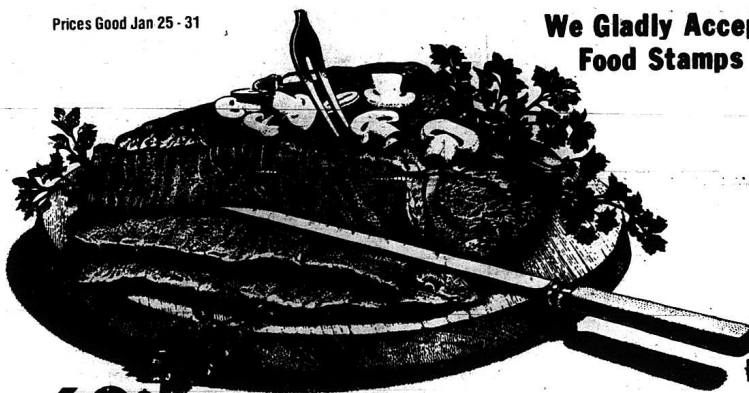
