Soup Up Winter Meals

During the colder months, way to plan to use "extra" thick, steamy bowl of soup. It's an economical meal because it's a way, to plan to use "extra" leftour foods.

It's not difficult to prepare soup. Use a biender to process-vegetables for cream soups like bisques, thin cream soups and thick, hearty soups like chowders made from meat, pourtry, ifs and/or vegetables. You may need thicken some soup to give it more body. Cereals or flour are good choices.

When using cereals, bring the soup to a boil, and reduce the heat again to a simmer as soon as the addition has been made. Stir raw cereal into the soup during the last hour of cooking. For a lighter thickening, add to the original amount of water.

### Kit Carson: Monarch of the Prairies

Kentucky's Christopher "Kit" Carson just possibly was the best, and maybe the littlest, guide, scout, Indian fighter and guice, scout, indian lighter and soldier in the Far West during the first half of the 19th cen-tury. "Short of limb," as one eyewitness reported (5'8", 125 lbs.), for over 40 years he led parties through rough mountains, waterless deserts and hostile Indian and Mexican

and hostile Indian and Mexican territories.

Carson, one of 10 children, was born in Madison County, Kentucky, on Christmas Eve in 1809. When he was 3 years old, his family moved to Missouri. He was apprenticed to a saddler at age 16 but ran away to Santa Fe after a year. He was a trapper and Indian fighter for several years, with a reputation for being fearliess and trustworthy. Indians often stole fur pelts and horses of the hunters, but Carson would take a party of his best men and almost always recovered the goods, The Indians often stole fur pelts and horses of the hunters, but Carson would take a party of his best men and almost always recovered the goods, The Indiansoften stole fur Thief Taker.

He became the official hunter for Fort Bent, While he was there he married an

was there he married an Arapaho girl. They had a daughter whom he took to St.

Louis to be educated after her mother died. While there he met John Fremont, who hired him as guide for the United States government to explore

When the Mexican War broks out, the Americans captured many downs in the California territory. Carron was sent to carry the news to the President in Washington, D.C., but on his way he was intercepted by a General Kearney, who ordered him to return to California with Kearney party. They were attacked by

Mexicans and found themselves in desperate need of reinforcements from San Diego. Carson, Lt. Edward Fitzgerald and a young Indian boy volunteered to go for help. They traveled barefoot all the way to keep from making any sounds, By the time they reached-San Diego they were starving, exhausted and barely clothed. Carson almost lost his feet because they were filled with thoms.

Keamey's troops were saved by the reinforcements and the General went on to capture Log Angeles. Carson capture Log Angeles. Carson was sent to Washington to report to Predefient Polic While there, Carson found, much to his annoyance, that crowds would gather around him, for reports of his deeds had spread throughout the eapital, Polic gwe him leiters to take back with him. 

### **School Board Okays Entrance Age Changes Decreed by State**

A new state law has changed the entrawe age for first grade and kindergarten. Selpaol Superinter-dent Charles Parsons explained to the Röckeastle County Board of Education at its regular meeting Tuesday night. Children must be six years old 95 September 1, rather than De-cember 31, to enter first grade and five years old by September 1 to enter kindergarten in fall, 1979, he explained.

"However, parents may request their child be given a readiness test and, if the child makes the approved scores, he will be permitted to enroll this fall," Mr. Parsons said.



# Pilot Plant in Mt. Vernon Gears Up To Train Garment Workers for Factory

Twenty sewing machines, huge boits of cloth, cutting table and other machinery have been installed in the Eaton Building in Mt. Vernon by the Rockcastle Manufacturing Company. The company is setting up a pilot plant in the warehouse-type building, until its regular building is ready at the Rockcastle Multi-County Industrial Park.

Lee Gloshen, plant supervisor, said, it will cost, about
\$10,000 to set up one person as a
sewing machine operator.
"Some of these machines cost
more than a car," he said, 'and it
takes about \$3,000 to train someone."

The sewing machines are much heavier than home models and are being imported from the Pfaff Company of West Germany. Robert Matusic, vice presides of the Kennedy Sewing Machine Comping install the machines. "They are first-class and built with the comfort of the employee in mind," he said. Most of the machines can do just one operation-such as putting on buttons, hemming, or sewing pockets. They are fully automatic-they thread themselves and cut the thread after sewing.

The material is heavy-duty permanent press, mostly colored navy blue. Mr. Gloshen said that the company will be amking work pants of a sturdy variety able to

withstand 55 washings.

The pants will be worn by automobile plant workers, among others, employed in companies all over the United States. White uniforms for hospitals and bak-

uniforms for hospitals and bak-eries will also be manufactured in Mt. Vernon.
Mr. Gloshen said that the factory should be built by April 1, and will employ 200 people, most-ly sewing machine operators. There will be a cutting room with. There will be a cutting room with. Rockcastle Manufacturing will

produce 2400 pairs of work pants per day. Mr. Gloshen, a native of Kan-sas City, has had 18 years experi-ence in garment manufacture. 
