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## Recreation Council Sets Up Summer Softball Program

The Recreation Council met Monday night to finalize plans for the annual Radio Auction and tentatively set-up the schedule for the summer program at Mt. Vernon Elementary School.

President of the Council, Tommy Hodges, told the members that facilities at Lake Linville would not be complete in time for activities there except permits for late summer slow pitch tournament.

The Council did decide to advertise for applications for a playground director and an umpire and for someone to run the concession stand on a commission basis. Applications should be given to Tommy Hodges at the Western Auto Store or mailed to him at Rt. 4, Mt. Vernon, by 5 p.m. Saturday, May 12th. Anyone interested in running the concession

stand should also inform Mr. Hodges by this date.

The cut-off date for team rosters to be turned in, also to Mr. Hodges, is Friday, May 18th. The council decided there would absolutely be no additions to the team list after that date. Rosters may contain up to 20 members per team.

Team fees were raised this year to \$100 per team for the men's league and a fee was put on the women's teams for the first time of \$50 per team.

There will be a junior softball league for girls, ages 9 thru 13 (pre-high school) if there is enough interest shown. Anyone interested in organizing a team should do so and turn that information in to Mr. Hodges by May 18th also. At least four teams will be needed before the program will be set-up.

The schedule of games thus far set-up is as follows: PeeWee league (up to 8 years of age) will play two nights a week, Monday and Tuesday, at 5 p.m. If organized, junior softball will be played on at least two of the other nights at the same time. The women will play nightly from 6 to 8 (two games) and the men will play nightly from 8 to 10. Little League and Pony League will be scheduled in the daytime and this schedule will be announced later. The men and women's teams are being limited this year to 10 each.

The dates for the Radio Auction were set for May 16, 17 and 18 from 5 to 7 p.m. over WRVK.

## Kindergarten Registration Set for May 2

Registration for first grade and kindergarten has been scheduled for each of the five elementary schools on May 2, 1979 from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m.

Children that have made application for early entrance and successfully passed the state mandatory readiness test for first grade or kindergarten, must also register at this time.

You will need to bring your child's immunization and birth certificates with you.

Children that are already in kindergarten need not register.

## IMMUNIZATIONS

All children who go to Rockcastle Co. schools next year must be immunized or be in the process of being immunized. If your children do not have the vaccinations which are now required by state law, this Friday may be a good time to take them to the Rockcastle Co. Health Department.

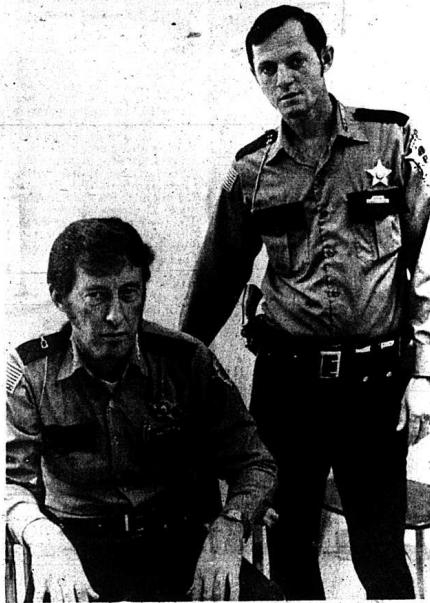
The Health Department, located in the Mt. Vernon courthouse and open between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m., is having another free immunization clinic. Children may begin the series of vaccinations against diphtheria, tetanus, polio, measles and rubella and have them completed by the time school starts. The vaccinations are given over a four-month period. No appointments are necessary.

Nancy Bradley, staff member of the Health Department, said that every child in the school system must have a Certificate of Immunization, signed by a private physician or by the Health Department nurse, that certifies that child has been vaccinated. Without the certificate, the child will not be allowed to enroll in school.

The School Board voted to take that move at their March meeting when a letter was received from the Kentucky Division of Preventive Services that was critical of Rockcastle County's immunization record. Data showed that only 60% of the children here have been immunized, when the national goal is 90%.

Mrs. Bradley said that the last few immunization clinics have been very busy, and that the Rockcastle record is probably improving.

## Sheriff Abney Says Office Is in Need of More Money

The Sheriff of Rockcastle County is having trouble making ends meet. This is affecting the number of warrants he serves, and thus affecting the administration of the District Court.

Sheriff Henry Abney and his deputy George Coleman are paid for serving warrants in misdemeanor cases only when the defendant is found guilty. The two said that their office is so strapped for cash that they would rather not serve the warrants on cases that look like losers, which take time and gasoline that might never get paid back.

One example of not serving warrants is the 40 or so warrants for littering that have been held up in Sheriff Abney's office for over six months now. Since litter cases are very hard to prove, the Sheriff said it might not be worth his while to serve these warrants at this time.

Another warrant that might be overlooked or postponed is one a wife may take out after her husband. After the couple make up, these cases usually die in court for "lack of prosecution" and the Sheriff does not get paid.

Sheriff Abney is paid from the following sources: 4% of taxes collected, about \$18,000 per year; and \$100 per month from the Fiscal Court, and \$300 per month from the state (these add up to \$22,800 a year). He also is paid \$10 for serving warrants, except when a misdemeanor defendant is found not guilty and in juvenile cases. From these sources, he must pay himself, his secretary and his deputy, as well as office and automobile expenses. He and Deputy Coleman provide their own cars.

Another problem is that the money does not always come in as it should. For example, in the month of March, Sheriff Abney and Deputy Coleman served 36

warrants for the District court, and were paid for only four.

In other counties, the Fiscal Court contributes more. The Jackson County Sheriff provided an automobile and the promise of another for his deputy. He also has one secretary. This office gets 4% of about \$25,000 in taxes, the \$300 per month mileage allowance from the state, and \$300 from the Fiscal Court. This adds up to \$20,200 per year.

Pulaski County is a bigger operation, with eight deputies and four secretaries, of which four are CETA workers paid by the federal government. The Sheriff here gets \$12,000 per year from the Fiscal Court plus 4% of a \$2.4 million tax collection, in addition to the \$300 per month allowance from the state.

Sheriff Abney thinks he should get more money from the Fiscal Court, and has appeared at Fiscal Court meetings. The judge and magistrates have promised to start paying his secretary in August. This will help, Sheriff Abney said, but he is not sure if it will be enough help.

The state legislature is now considering a bill that would put Sheriff's offices on a regular fee basis, somewhat the way the District Court operates under the new court system. But it may be months before or if this bill is passed.

But in the meantime, the Sheriffs all over the state are making do as they can, even if it means postponing a few jobs until they are paid.

## Jerry Ikerd Company Plans to Construct 75-Unit Apartment

A Somerset corporation is planning to build an apartment complex of 75 to 80 units on property near Mt. Vernon located behind the old Armour Creamery plant. The same corporation may also put 40 to 50 houses on the property which could be sold using government subsidized housing loans.

Jerry Ikerd, president of ITR, Incorporated, said that the firm has purchased part of the 80-acre tract formerly owned by the Cox family of Mt. Vernon.

"We have enough land for the apartments, and an option to buy the rest," he said.

Some of the apartments will be available to low income families through a Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) program. Mr. Ikerd said that HUD will subsidize a certain number of the apartments, so that the developers are assured of their rent even if the apartments are unoccupied. He said HUD approval for the apartments should come within the next 60 days, and once approved, ITR, Inc. will start to build the complex late this year. The apartments would be available for rent next June or July.

Mr. Ikerd is chairman of the board of The Bank of Mt. Vernon, president and owner of South Kentucky Mack-Trucks, Inc., a director of the First and Farmers National Bank of Somerset, and a former vice president of Ikerd and Bandy Coal Company.

The company is building 108 apartment units in Somerset that will be completed in August. Mr. Ikerd said there are more people applying for apartments than there are apartments available.

Mr. Ikerd said ITR, Inc. is also negotiating with Kentucky Housing Corporation, a state agency that administers government-subsidized loans. If the agency approves, certain people who qualify under government guidelines could apply for loans with a low down-payment, 30 year mortgage, and interest rates about 7 1/2%. Those who qualify are moderate to low-income families. For example, a family of four earning less than \$16,000 would qualify.

The loans would be arranged through local banks, but the mortgages would be held by Kentucky Housing Corporation.

Mr. Ikerd said that the houses in the area would start at \$29,900.

## Schools will be Checked for Asbestos

The county Health Department will be inspecting schools here for asbestos fibers, believed to be a cause of cancer in children.

Steve Midkiff, environmentalist, said that he is attending a seminar this Thursday through the Governor's Task Force on Asbestos to learn how to identify the material, and will conduct the inspections later this spring. Gov. Julian Carroll is requiring every school in the state to be inspected.

Charles Parsons, school superintendent, said that he has been told in the past by the state fire marshals that none of Rockcastle County schools have asbestos fiber

used in their construction.

"Asbestos was usually mixed with wet plaster and sprayed on surfaces, especially ceilings in the 1950's."

It was mostly used between 1952-1959 as a fire retardant.

Roundstone was built in 1958.

A Department of Education survey made by the state some months ago showed asbestos present in schools in Fayette, Estill, Jackson and Jessamine counties.

The survey showed asbestos in 133 schools in 68 districts.

### Legislative News

The Committee for Program Review and Investigation held its fourth meeting on Friday, March 6th. During the initial three meetings a staff was assembled and committee procedure was clearly defined.

The committee's procedure, during the interim, will be to conduct preliminary investigations into areas of state government which will be designated by members of the legislature and other concerned citizens.

After an initial investigative report is received, the committee will decide if an indepth investigation is warranted. In order to conduct such an investigation, an authorization from the Legislative Research Commission (LRC) will be needed.

The Program Review and Investigation committee holds its meeting in the morning before the afternoon on the day that the LRC meets.

Program Review heard preliminary reports on the first four subjects ever investigated by the committee. The subjects were: Special and Vocation Education, Deferred Compensation Systems (PEBSCO), Department of Transportation's allotment of personal

service contracts and Bureau for the Blind.

House Resolution 87 of the 1978 regular Session directed the LRC to conduct a comprehensive study of Kentucky's education program for exceptional (handicapped) children and vocational education. The preliminary report allowed that funding for these programs is made in one lump sum. Therefore, if the number of students increase or decrease there is no corresponding change in the funding.

Since the special education study was mandated by a House and Senate Joint Resolution, the committee voted to continue the study and the LRC gave authorization. The next step in the investigation will be to visit a random sampling of the local school districts to review their financial records, interview personnel and visit classes.

The Public Employees Deferred Compensation System was investigated at my request, due to the fact that during meetings of the Appropriations and Revenue Committee and the Personal Service Contract Review subcommittee it came to my attention that this agency was over-staffed, over-funded, and lacked a general documentation of its work.

The investigation revealed that Deferred Compensation is being funded by \$176,300 of your tax dollars in order to oversee a \$6.5 million annual intake of state employees' investments. They take this \$6.5 million and have an Oklahoma investment company (PEBSCO) invest it in order to provide state employees with a tax shelter.

PEBSCO takes 16% of the \$6.5 million off the top to cover costs and for their fee plus \$3.00 from each investor. Even though they have a \$18,000 personal service contract from the state to cover these costs, that contract had been for \$50,000 until personal service contract review reduced it to \$18,000 because the \$50,000 price

tag could not be justified by state government or PEBSCO. Also, the Kentucky Retirement System provides a similar service for a 2% surcharge.

Furthermore, since PEBSCO is doing the investing there is no need for a Deferred Compensation staff with a \$176,300 budget. Program Review and LRC in an unanimous vote authorized a full and indepth investigation of the Public Employees Deferred Compensation System for the purpose

of making this agency useful or doing away with it altogether.

In other action the committee voted to give further study to determine the justifications and procedures the Department of Transportation utilizes to determine need for personal service contractors, primarily those for consulting engineers. Also, the committee voted not to continue to study on the funding of the Bureau for the Blind due to the fact that no discrepancies were found.

Rockcastle Co. Hospital is also announcing that a new nurse-anesthetist will be added to its staff May 9. ### TOO MANY FISHERMEN NOT ENOUGH FISH

There is not enough fishing water within the Kentucky River Basin to accommodate the number of fishermen there, according to a U.S. Soil Conservation Service (SCS) report released here today. "Our investigation disclosed that the streams, ponds, small lakes, and reservoirs of the area are now capable of providing an estimated one-half million days of sport fishing per year," says Glen Murray, SCS state conservationist for Kentucky.

"This estimate is based upon the assumption that each fisherman will catch from about one to two pounds of fish each day or the fishes," Murray explains. "However, it is recognized that some catch far more than the average amount, some a good deal less, and some nothing at all."

In contrast to the shortage of fishing water, the study found there was more than enough wildlife habitat to maintain hunter interest. The report entitled, "The Kentucky River Basin-Fish and Wildlife Resources," was done under the authorizations contained in P.L. 83-566, Watershed Protection and Flood Prevention Act, as amended. The author is William H. Casey, as SCS biologist in Lexington.

The Kentucky River Basin Study covered 24 counties. The study area runs diagonally from

### the Kentucky-Virginia border through the heart of the Kentucky Blue Grass to the Ohio River.

Calculations based upon the average number of days freshwater anglers in the United States fishing each year indicate that this one-half million days is only one-fifth of the 2.5 million days needed to satisfy present demand," Murray points out. "By 2020 the demand is expected to increase to 3.2 million."

The SCS report attributed these shortages to growth in the total population and a commensurate increase in the number of fishermen. At the same time the amount of productive water has decreased.

Murray says, "This means that unless steps are taken to increase the amount of productive water the fisherman of the basin must accept an ever-diminishing rate of success elsewhere to fish." "Another ramification of these findings," he adds, "is the potential economic loss to the recreation industry in the basin if fishermen cannot satisfy their needs."

He thinks the shortage of fishing opportunity could be reduced somewhat by the rehabilitation of private streams, intensive management of existing private waters that are not now producing at their optimum, and the creation of new waters.

"However, this does not mean that hunters are satisfied with those rates," he said. "It simply means that they are willing to continue to engage in hunting even though their success is minimal. Most would probably welcome a doubling of the success rates. Therefore, should improved hunting success be adopted as an objective for the basin, the gap between supply and demand would be narrowed in direct proportion to the extent of the improvement desired."

Some of the actions, according to the study, that could be taken to increase hunting success are improving access to hunting areas and manipulating the habitat to create concentrations of some species.

Then a grandmother or babysitter or some other adult can bring the children in for immunization, as long as the permission slip is properly signed by the parent or guardian in person in the Health Department office.

If a child has had immunizations from a private physician or in some other county, he must bring documentation of this to school to avoid having to be immunized again. Transfer students must be immunized or in the process of being immunized before enrolling in a Rockcastle school, the Board ruled.

Parents who object to having their children immunized for religious reasons can get a form through school that must be signed by a pastor or a regular religious organization documenting the objections.

Children who are unable to take the shots because of physical reasons must document that fact through a licensed doctor. These will be the only two exceptions to the immunization rule.

### BRIDGE PROJECT APPROVED FOR LONG BRANCH

The state Department of Transportation has announced a project to construct a bridge over Long Branch, three tenths of one mile north of U.S. 150 on Cupps Chapel-Broadhead Road.

The project will be funded

with 75 percent federal funds and 25 percent county road aid money, according to Transportation Secretary Calvin Grayson. The federal share of the project cost comes from the off-system federal-aid highway program, established in 1975 to help state and local governments improve roads and bridges that previously were not eligible for federal funds.

The matching funds are provided by a portion of Rockcastle County's 1978-79 allocation under the state's county road aid program. The program, administered by the state Bureau of Highways, was established in 1936 to help local governments maintain their county road systems.



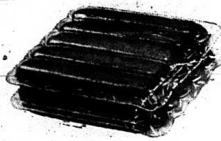

**Use Common Sense About Cents Off Coupons**

Clipping coupons can give you money, but only if you use them wisely. The old saying that states you don't get something for not-

clipping coupons can save you money, but only if you use them wisely. The old saying that states you don't get something for nothing, certainly applies to coupons. You should know that companies give coupons to promote a product, and you are paying for them. Never use a coupon unless it is for something you were going to buy anyway. It would certainly be better if manufacturers lower prices instead of offering coupons. And remember, while coupons may lower prices for well-known brands, these brands may still cost more than other brands you would find satisfactory.

**Make a List and Check it Twice**

Before you go to the store, go through your cupboards, refrigerator and freezer and write down the items you need. It is a good idea to include your family in meal planning. Once you have your list, stick to it. Some flexibility, of course, is a good thing, since it will allow you to take advantage of unadvertised specials.

**At the Store-Wh- 's in Store for You**

Every shopper knows how tempting it is to buy more than is really needed. When you shop, be aware of supermarket tactics that encourage impulse buying. Don't go shopping on an empty stomach either. Do keep in mind these suggestions.

**Use Unit Pricing-Weight Watching Pays Off**

Unit pricing is one of the most useful tools available to consumers to compare prices and determine the most economical buy. As of April 1978, ten states (Massachusetts, Connecticut, Arizona, Rhode Island, Vermont, Maryland, Florida, New Jersey, New York, and Oregon) require unit pricing by law. In addition, many stores in other states have instituted unit pricing voluntarily.

In supermarkets with unit pricing, you will notice labels on the shelf showing you the unit price and a unit price. The store has done the multiplication and division for you. They have broken down the cost into a basic unit to show the price of the product per pound, quart, 100 count, square foot, or other even unit of measure. All the shopper has to do is compare the unit price of varieties of the same product to determine the most economical brand and size.

**What's In a Name?**

Most large supermarket chains sell "private label" foods and household products. These private labels or "housebrands" are usually less expensive and equal in quality to national

brands. In many cases, supermarkets purchase their house brand goods from the same companies that manufacture nationally advertised brands. The cost of advertising and sales promotion are included in the price you pay for brand name goods. House brands, which are less heavily advertised, can be sold for less. For example, you may like a private label vegetable at 35 cents just as much as a name brand competitor which sells for 49 cents. Not all private label merchandise is the same as its name brand competitors, nor is it always significantly less expensive. Personal preferences will ultimately determine which brand you buy. But do check them out.

## Fishing Report

With good weekend weather the fishing pressure and angler success is improving in Kentucky as crappie fishing is fair statewide and air fishing for black bass is reported at some locations.

**Lake-by-lake rundown, according to the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources:**  
**Laurel:** White bass good casting; crappie off rocky and sand points; crappie good around stick ups; clear to murky to muddy, falling slowly, 1.5 feet below power pool and 59 degrees.

**Cumberland:** white bass fair and improving on spinners and do-jigs at the heads of large tributaries; crappie fair around bushes and brush (2 to 6 feet); rockfish slow on dollies in Beaver Creek; in headwaters, white bass good on Rockcastle and slow on Laurel; in tailwaters, trout fair; clear to murky to muddy, rising slowly, 1.5 feet below power pool and 59 degrees.

**Barren:** Crappie fair to good around willow bushes; black bass casting spinner baits and jigging nightcrawlers off deep banks on the upper lake and off shallow, brush banks on the lower lake; in headwaters, white bass good in Holland area; clear to murky to muddy, stable, 16 feet above summer pool and 58 degrees.

**Dale Hollow:** black bass fair and improving casting spinner baits and live nightcrawlers off shallow banks and at the heads of inlets and bays; white bass fair on spinners and dollies at the heads of large tributaries; clear to murky to muddy, stable, three feet above summer pool and 58 degrees.

**Cave Run:** crappie fair over submerged cover and around stick ups; musky slow to fair casting medium runners off deep banks; clear to murky, falling slowly at summer pool and 58 degrees.

**Herrington:** crappie fair over submerged cover and around stick ups; black bass slow casting crank baits and jigging nightcrawlers off points and in inlets and bays; in headwaters, white bass slow early and late on Dix river; clear to murky to muddy, stable, nine feet above summer pool and 51 degrees.

**Green:** Crappie fair over submerged cover; black bass slow casting crank baits and spinner baits and jigging nightcrawlers in inlets and bays; in tailwaters, crappie slow, murky to muddy, falling slowly, 6.5 feet above summer pool and 51 degrees.

**Grayson:** Crappie fair over submerged cover; bluegill slow still fishing worms in inlets and bays; in tailwaters, crappie fair; murky, falling slowly, one foot above summer pool and 57 degrees.

**Fishtrap:** Crappie fair over submerged cover and around stick ups; in tailwaters, trout fair to good, murky to muddy, stable at summer pool and 58 degrees.

**Nolin:** black bass slow casting spinner baits at the heads of tributaries and jigging nightcrawlers in inlets; crappie slow over submerged cover; muddy, rising slowly, 16 feet above summer pool and 58 degrees.

**Kentucky:** crappie slow and improving around buck brush (2 to 4 feet); black bass slow on spinner baits and crank baits in inlets and bays; in tailwaters, catfish slow; murky to muddy, rising slowly, 7.5 feet above summer pool and 62 degrees.

**Barkley:** crappie slow to fair and improving around buck brush at the heads of inlets and bays; in tailwaters, crappie slow; murky to muddy, rising slowly, 7.5 feet above summer pool and 58 degrees.

**Buckhorn:** crappie slow to fair over submerged cover; in tailwaters, trout fair to good, white bass fair; murky to muddy, rising slowly, five feet below summer pool and 58 degrees.

**Rough River:** crappie slow along the brush line; murky to muddy, stable, 21 feet above summer pool and 57 degrees.

**Dewey:** no activity, muddy, stable at summer pool and 56 degrees.

Watch for the emergence of face and horn flies from overwintering sites. If forest-use dustbags and backrubbers are going to be used to control these pests, they need to be placed in the pastures now. Don't wait until mid-summer when flies are abundant, since to be effective in suppressing face fly numbers, controls need to be initiated before the flies become established and start reproducing.

### Maple Bladder Gall

April is the time to treat maple gall mite problems that will not be noticed until later in the year, but at which time it will be too late to apply controls. After the galls form, no chemical spray will make them disappear. Sprays can be applied before bud break up to the time the leaves are half

expanded. Kelthane, Sevin, Diazinon or Durban are choices available to home owners. Commercial operators may also use Guthion, Azodrin, Systox or D-D-Syston. Kelthane is the safest choice for the sake of honey bees which will be working maples at this time of year.

### Ration Changes For Dairy Cattle Needed In Spring

As winter supplies of corn silage and hay begin to dwindle, dairymen will be shifting cows to pasture this spring and to green chop feeds in early summer.

To maintain top milk production, changes in forage feeding should be made gradually and the entire ration should be checked for nutritional balance, according to an Extension dairy specialist.

"Wait until pasture grasses

are 60-80 inches high before turning cows into graze," recommends Perry Clark with the UK College of Agriculture. "Then limit grazing time to several hours a day while continuing to feed stored forages during the first several days on pasture so cows have time to adapt to the new feeding program."

Generally, the protein level in the grain mix can be reduced when cows are on high quality pasture in the spring, according to the specialist. However, pasture quality declines during the summer and production will go down if adjustments are not made in the grain mix or forage program.

Whenever a change is made in the forage program, Clark recommends checking the entire ration to make sure cows are getting the protein, energy and minerals they

need. Pastures can be managed to avoid a decline in quality during summer months, either by clipping excess growth or by using a rotational grazing plan.

Small grains such as wheat, oats or barley harvested as green chop or silage should be cut in the boot to early head stage for dairy cattle. Cutting at later stages of maturity will increase the dry matter yield per acre but forage intake and milk production will decline.

For alfalfa, established stands should be cut during the bud to one-tenth bloom stage. New seedlings for storing energy reserves in the roots and should not be harvested until full bloom for the first cutting.

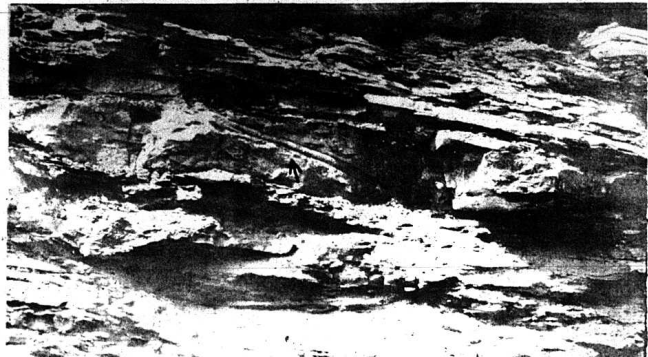
#### Pest News Alert

Be Aware That: It is now time to begin watching alfalfa fields for alfalfa weevil damage. Growers should check fields closely since egg numbers appear to be varying greatly from one field to another. Expect problems with swarming termites; mite pests emerging from overwintering sites in homes and leaving red spots when they are smashed on walls and floors.

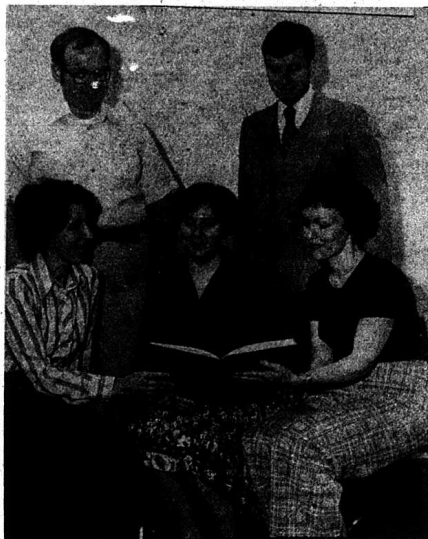

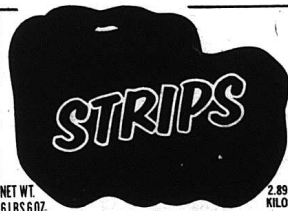
