Does Every Person Have A Right to His Own Belief?

It is often stated that this is so, but what does the Bible teach? If the Bible teaches this, then it is so; if it does not, it is then wrong. We should remember that a Christian has the attitude of self-surrender and submission to God's will, for this is the attitude of Jesus (Jno. 8:29). We must not be motivated in life or in religious matters by wanting to please ourselves; rather we should desire only to be pleasing to God (2 Cor. 10:18). And the only way we can know what pleases God is by what is revealed in the Bible.

Does every person have a right to his own belief?

- (1) **CAIN DID NOT.** (Read Gen. 4:3-5). Cain did not follow God's instructions and worshipped by OFINION, by his own idea (Heb. 11:4). God refused his worship.
- (2) **NAAMAN DID NOT** (Read 2 Kings 5:1-14). Naaman wanted to follow his own ideas instead of the instructions of the prophet of God, but had he done so he could not have been healed of his leprosy. Naaman, in order to be CLEANSED, had to submit to God's demands to dip in Jordan seven times. Then, and only then, was he healed.
- (3) **PAUL DID NOT** (Read Acts 26:9-19). Paul thought he had the right to continue serving God under the law of Moses after Christ's law became effective, hence he opposed Christ, and fought Christianity, and all this he did with a good conscience (Acts 23:1). But that did not make it right.

No, every person does not have a right to his own belief. Jesus Christ has all authority (Matt. 28:18), and we must believe and obey Him in order to be saved (Heb. 5:9; Mk. 16:16). If every person has a right to his own belief, then man becomes his own standard and his own savior - and the will of God is ruled out and cast aside. Those who pride themselves in being "tolerant" about all religious beliefs simply bury their heads in the sand and refuse to take the Bible as the absolute standard of what is right or what is wrong.

Harris, chairman of the awards committee, said, "Mrs. Owens has filled her life and the lives of those with whom she has worked, with the satisfaction that comes from the unselfish giving of oneself. The members of these various organizations feel that it is time to publicly recognize a lady who has quietly and unselfishly given so many years of her life in service to others."

The Rockcastle Improvement Council heard reports Monday on the following building projects:

Rockcastle Co. Hospital: Wayne Stewart, member of the Hospital Board, said the \$1.5 million addition should be ready for occupancy by October 1.

"The work is up to snuff," he said. "All outside work, such as the roof decking should be done the week after next, and the electricity and plumbing are moving along."

Industrial Park: Bill James, chairman of the Industrial Authority, said the road has been out and the state will gravel it. About half the floor on the Rockcastle Co. Manufacturing Company has been poured, and steel erection on it would begin this week.

Broadhead Fairgrounds: County Judge Executive Hubert Thacker said the skating rink had been demolished and the Senior Citizens Center is being constructed. Some roadwork has been done.

Health Department Building: The Improvement Council wrote a letter to the Dept. for Human Resources for support of the Health Department's application for a state grant to help pay for the new building to be constructed near the county library. Robert Statin, a state commissioner with the Dept. for Human Resources in Frankfort, wrote back, that some decision would be reached by July 1.

Jaycees Sponsor Blood Drive

The Rockcastle County Jaycees are again sponsoring a blood drive at the Bank of Mt. Vernon on May 24, between 9:00 p.m. and 4:30 p.m. The county needs 145 more pints of donated blood to obtain "total county protection," according to Steve Midkiff. This means that if that number of people donate blood over the course of a year, anyone in the county could receive blood in an emergency without paying extra.

If you donate blood, you receive a sort of insurance plan for yourself, spouse and family members so that should the need arise, they could obtain blood without extra charges. Everyone in the county could be under this protection if 145 pints are donated.

The last blood drive collected 50 pints, all of which was used to help three teen-age accident victims from Rockcastle County.

Grand Jury Returns 5 Indictments, Reports on Courthouse and Jail

The Rockcastle Grand Jury, ending its session last Wednesday, inspected the county courthouse and jail and filed a brief report, printed below. The Jury called the condition of the jail "excellent," but said the courthouse "could be kept cleaner, and there are places where the plaster on the walls and ceilings are cracked and deteriorating."

The Jury also returned five more criminal indictments. Names of those indicted cannot be printed until the cases are before the Circuit Court, under orders from Circuit Court Judge Phillip Wicker.

"We have observed the Jail and found it to be in excellent condition and repairs and wish to commend Jailer Billy Kirtley for the cleanliness and well being of the Jail."

The rest of the Courthouse is in fair condition. The Courthouse

could be kept cleaner, there are places where the plaster in the walls and ceilings are cracked and deteriorating. There has been a leak in the ceiling of the Circuit Courtroom and this leak should be repaired and when repairs are complete the discolored roof tiles should be replaced.

We have found that the seats in the Circuit Courtroom for the Jurors squeak when sat on and we feel that these chairs should be cushioned, oiled and greased.

We have received cooperation from the Circuit Court Clerk and Circuit Judge and appreciate their co-operation. We want to commend Sheriff Henry Lee Abney for having all the warrants served and the defendants before the Court on the indictments returned in March by this Grand Jury.

Any matters not resolved by this Grand Jury can be investigated when this body returns in July.

Hospital Administrator Resigns

The Board of Directors of the Rockcastle County Hospital announces the resignation of Luke J. Dierber, Administrator at the hospital for the past two years. Mr. Dierber tendered his official resignation to the Board at a called meeting on April 17, 1979.

The resignation was tendered in order for Mr. Dierber to accept a position in the Cincinnati, Ohio area.

The Board reluctantly accepted his resignation and stated how much they appreciated his dedication to the Rockcastle Co. Hospital and also to the community. The addition to the hospital in his new employment in the Cincinnati area.

County Receives \$40,000 For Damages in Flood

Rockcastle County has received \$40,000 from the State Department of Disaster and Emergency to help pay for damages relating to the flood of December 8th, County Judge Executive Hubert Thacker announced today. The money will be used for road and bridge repair.

Judge Thacker said that he submitted a report of damages to the state after the flood and had to show cancelled checks and other proof of expenditures that the Fiscal Court had after the flood.

"We spent barrels more in the flood," he said.

Total damages were estimated by a County Emergency Board made up of local people at \$360,000 with \$250,000 of it in Livingston and Lamerco. That included losses to individuals and public buildings such as the Livingston Water Department which were covered under different insurance plans.

Skunk Killed in Brodhead Rabid, County Health Officials Take Action

A skunk killed off Old Brodhead Road last week was found to be rabid by a state laboratory in Frankfort. Rockcastle County health officials are urging the public to be on the look-out for strange behavior in animals and to make sure their dogs have been vaccinated.

Six skunks in Madison County were found to be rabid in the last month and health officers there have taken steps to protect the public and domestic animals.

"We were concerned that the rabid skunk found in Rockcastle County was not near the Madison County line," Steve Midkiff, county environmentalist, said. "We have no way to locate the disease geographically now."

Mr. Midkiff said that Mark Cummins killed the skunk with a rock after his dogs barked at it. It was unusual for the skunk to be out in the daylight, and to approach the dogs in the first place. Mr. Midkiff transported the dead animal to Frankfort for the tests, and later notified the veterinarians in the area that the skunk was rabid.

Free rabies shots for dogs will be available through the Rockcastle County Health Department. The dates of these clinics are elsewhere in this week's Signal.

All dogs are required by state law to be vaccinated after age six months and then every three years.

Mr. Midkiff said people should stay away from any wild animal that is behaving strangely.

Examples would be raccoons, animals such as foxes and skunks that are out in the daylight or wild animals that are unafraid and either approach or do not run away from humans.

Any warm-blooded animal can get rabies by contact with an infected animal, through bites or having licked an open wound, etc.

Rabies Clinics:

Dates have been set for rabies clinics throughout the county, with Dr. Rudolph Burdette and Dr. Bill Adams.

If your dogs and cats do not have current vaccinations, bring them to the rabies clinics sponsored by the Rockcastle County Health Department. Kentucky Law requires that all dogs over 4 months old be vaccinated against rabies (KRS 238.015).

Even dogs which are kept on private property, must be vaccinated.

If your dog is not vaccinated and does bite a human being, you could be held responsible for the cost of treatment. The cost in a recent case was over \$400.

Have your dog or cat vaccinated at a cost of \$3.00 per animal at any one of the following clinics:

Thursday, May 3, Dr. Burdette's office, Richmond St., Mt. Vernon, from 5 to 7 P.M.

Friday, May 4, Livingston Elementary School, Dr. Adams, 5 to 7 P.M.

Monday, May 7, Conway Post Office, Dr. Burdette, Vet. from 5 to 7 p.m.

Tuesday, May 8, Brodhead Elem. School, Dr. Adams, Vet., from 5 to 7 p.m.

For those who cannot get to the clinics at the times listed, animals will also be vaccinated at Dr. Adams' and Dr. Burdette's offices May 3, thru May 8, for the same \$3.00 per animal fee.

The Mt. Vernon City Council and local businessmen are currently meeting together to discuss improvements to Main Street, which could be paid for partly by the government and partly by the businesses themselves.

Will Linder & Associates, a Berea consulting firm, is working with them to develop a suitable plan and obtain government funding.

At a meeting April 17, Mr. Linder gave the Council and some of the merchants several ideas for improvements—putting in parking lots, improving the flow of traffic, stone fronts and sidewalks, and putting in apartments over stores.

CAP Tells Plans for Family Life Center and Boat Dock

Leaders of the Christian Appalachian Project (CAP) explained what they are building at Lake Liville and near Benfro Valley at a luncheon Tuesday for invited local people.

Father Ralph Beiting, founder and executive director of CAP, emphasized the importance of getting feedback from the Rockcastle community and the ecumenical nature of his organization. After introducing Jack Morris, Len Spanjers and Larry Keaton, who will all be involved with the Rockcastle projects, he said that

each represented a different Christian faith.

He said CAP wanted to get involved in business and agricultural projects and he had provided the Rockcastle Multi-County Industrial Authority with business contacts for new factories.

"We want to support your ideas, and we could help financially, too," Father Beiting said. "We can't eat it all ourselves, and we want your ideas. We can help."

CAP is building a Family Life Center on the old Parsons property and at the Scenic View Motel.

Father Beiting said. The purpose would be to enhance family life by providing a place for marriage retreats, an emergency shelter for battered wives or children, pavilions for family reunions and an outdoor recreation area.

The meeting was held in the newly-built addition to the old Scenic View Motel and Mr. Spanjers said it was the first time the community room had been used.

The addition to the motel was necessary so that marriage retreats and others have a large meeting place. Another building is currently under construction at the Parsons property and should be completed June 1. It will be an information center for the Family Life project and Mr. Keaton and his family will live there.

A third building should be completed August 1. It will be used as a foster home for between eight to ten boys who need to be placed under care because they have been in trouble with school or court officials.

The emergency shelter for wives or runaways will be up by Christmas, Father Beiting said, and the family reunion pavilions are just about complete.

Other plans for the Parsons property include fixing up an outdoor amphitheatre where the "Living Waters" music festival will be held in September and later used for outdoor drama.

Mr. Spanjers, who is director of the Family Life Center, said that he had done several studies of the Rockcastle area to determine

 One fact of my responsibility as a member of the Georgia State Department of Education, includes the coordination of and in many instances of, serving as a member of such teams in performing such services for the 187 local education agencies in this state. Kentucky is far from unique

in having districts without resources to readily finance facilities for an adequate program of education. Even so, it is not a function of the state to provide such funds. This would be a state system of education which would be in direct conflict with local control prized by so many.
 Perhaps the greatest export from Rockcastle and many of her sister Appalachian counties has been that of many of their brighter young people. Northern cities abound with their "little Appalachians."
 Small industries will continue to move to an area where the school system is considered inadequate for their upper management families. The exodus of your young will continue.

the Pennsylvania Nuclear Generating Station is the biggest news story of 1979.

First off, there are no nuclear power plants in Kentucky but there are two in Tennessee, one in Indiana and one in Ohio, all four are now under construction. There are 30 Kentucky counties that are within a 50-mile radius of the four nuclear power plants in our border states.

Nationally there are 70 nuclear power plants with a large majority of them being located in the eastern United States. Each plant was constructed at a cost of approximately \$2 billion, due to the damage at the Pennsylvania plant, damage that is virtually irreparable, there will be a \$2 billion loss in addition to the electricity reduction.

In California, a nuclear power plant to be constructed dangerously near an earthquake fault, however, because of the Pennsylvania accident its construction has been indefinitely postponed. It has been reported that after 25 years, excluding Pennsylvania, no nuclear accidents have been reported. And America receives 13% of its electricity from nuclear power plants. Vermont gets all its electricity from these plants, while 40% of the electricity for the Chicago area comes from nuclear power.

The nuclear accident was caused by faulty construction, the

use of water to cool the radioactive elements and at least four separate human errors. Perhaps, the Pennsylvania accident can serve some purpose, it happened before America became too dependent on nuclear power and it made us all aware of the enormous danger inherent in the use of nuclear power.

It is time for America to give some thought to the possibility of making better use of its most abundant resource, which is coal. Kentucky alone has enough underground coal to rival the petroleum fields of the Middle East.

The National Energy policy should more seriously concern it.

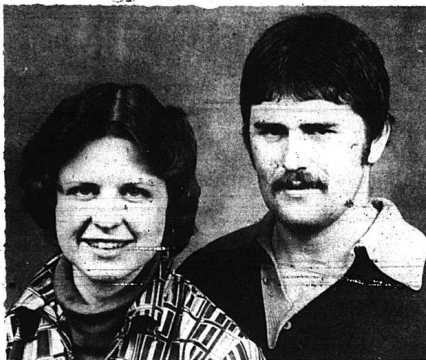

self with the establishment of more coal gasification and liquification plants. Presently, 46% of America's electricity is generated from coal, so that means that there is a 54% area for improvement.

Strong proponents of nuclear power state that the coal conversion plants are too costly. But it must be realized that it costs \$2 billion to construct a nuclear power plant and estimates have shown that the cost may double by the late 1980's. Also, the regulations that oversee nuclear power will have to become more strict, thus making plants that generate electricity from coal easier to obtain.

If America puts more reliance on coal, it would in addition to being a grand plus for Kentucky, be safer, not make us so susceptible to the demands of the OPEC nations, create more jobs and just make better use of what we have.

With the expanded use of coal and the extra tax revenue it would undoubtedly produce, the United States could refine its use of nuclear power. Perhaps by discarding the questionable use of water to cool radioactive elements and convert to the more safe gas coolant used in Great Britain.

Kentucky state government has two programs it uses as safeguards against radiation. One, is that the Department for Natural Resources and Environmental Protection has been checking the water quality of Jefferson, Fayette and Kenton counties. The program has been in effect for the last year and to date no radiation has been found. Two, the Department for Human Resources has developed a plant for the 30 Kentucky counties that are within a 50 mile radius of the border states' nuclear plants. The program consists of ongoing checks of radiation levels, checking for example the grass that milk cows eat.

The time has come for America to make better use of its coal resources and give serious thought to the uses and dangers of nuclear power. It is time for America to learn what Kentuckians already know, coal is our ace in the hole.

Allocation Received

A \$3,000 allocation recommended by the Rockcastle Coal Severance Economic Aid Board has been approved, according to Commissioner William S. O'Daniel, Department for Local Government.

Funds for the city of Livingstone will be used to purchase equipment for the city fire department.

Economic aid funds were established by Gov. Julian Carroll in 1976 and approved by the 1976 and 1978 legislatures with \$10 million allocated coal severance money each biennium.

Funds are allocated to the 47 coal-producing counties on a formula that includes population and per capita income. An economic aid board in each county selects the projects to be presented from its allocation to the Department for Local Government.

Funds are administered by the Department of Finance which has final approval of all projects following a technical review.

Inflation Fighting Ideas-Part 2 No Frills-Lower Bills

In the past year, many supermarkets have begun to offer generic, plain wrap or no-label foods. Packaged generally in plain white with black letters, these foods are most often of lesser quality than either national or house brands, but they are perfectly safe and nutritionally equivalent. The difference is that fruits and veget-

ables are standard, rather than fancy grade. They may not be uniform in size or color, or may contain an occasional stem or seed. No-label paper goods are generally lighter in weight, unperfumed and not as soft as the more expensive brands. Soap products are weaker. But, savings can be high as 40 percent on certain items.

Let's Get Fresh

In season, fresh raw foods usually cost less than canned or frozen varieties. Depending on the time of year and your personal preference, it is a good idea to do a comparison shop between different forms of the same food. For example, according to U.S. Department of Agriculture researchers, fresh carrots usually cost less than the canned or frozen varie-

ties. But, frozen spinach generally costs less than fresh. Always compare and watch for sale prices as well.

What Cost Convenience?

Modern food technology has provided us with many convenience products that can save us time, but consumers should consider the trade-offs. Many convenience foods cost more because the manufacturer has simply collected the ingredients for you and put them together in one box. By taking a few extra minutes of your time, you can eliminate the need for this "service." In some cases, preparing foods "from scratch" can actually cost you more. For example, when food companies prepare vegetables in cream sauce, they may substitute less expensive additives and flavorings for ingredients you would use yourself. As a result the processed product may cost you less. In general, however, you will save money on whatever you add or do yourself, and you may be getting better quality. If you have the time and storage space for ingredients, consider the advantages.

Soda Pop is Expensive

Colored Water and Sugar
Ever read the ingredients on a soda pop bottle? Water, sugar, artificial flavor and color. It water costs little and soda pop is about \$2.50 gallon, you're paying a great deal for sugar, artificial color, carbonation, and artificial flavor. Try drinking something else, such as lemonade or orangeade made with fresh fruit or even ice water. By mixing your own fruit mixes rather than buying the pre-sweetened varieties, you'll pay less for the sugar and may find that you prefer a less sweet mixture than manufacturers offer.

The ABC's of Vitamins

If you eat a variety of whole foods (fresh fruits and vegetables, dairy products, grains and protein products) you are likely to get all the vitamins you need. You should be aware of the prices you are sometimes paying for vitamin fortification. For example, a popular brand of wheat flakes can sell for as much as 30 cents less per box than the identical size of fortified wheat flakes made by the same manufacturer. The only difference between the two is that the fortified flakes have been sprayed with about a penny's worth of vitamins.

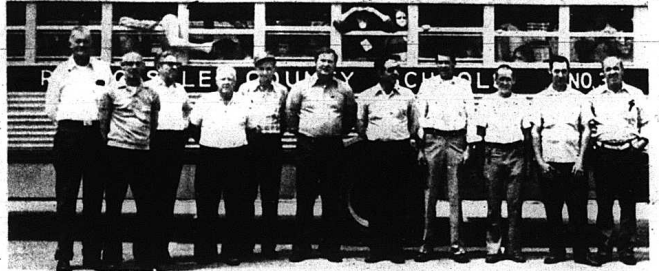

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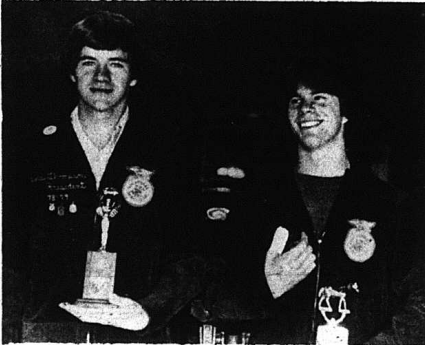

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Archery Club Attempting

Re-Establishment of Quail in County

Today the 600 baby quail in James Bowman's backyard are one week old. That means the temperature of their "brooder" will be changed from 95 degrees to 90 degrees. The temperature will be gradually lowered until the little creatures can tolerate an outdoor cage and special run.

Mr. Bowman is keeping the quail, which are about the size of a man's thumb, inside a shed near his home at Orlando. They are being fed lettuce and chickenfeed, purchased by the Archery Club.

After about six weeks, they will be ready to be set free. Mr. Bowman said that quail's mortality rate is very high—the county would be lucky if 60 survived the year. Natural enemies include house cats, snakes, mice and other animals, but they are especially vulnerable to cold and rain.

"The mother does the best she can to protect them," Mr. Bowman said, but a good rain or drop in temperature can kill them all. They nest on the ground.

Many cannot find food, which is seed and bugs. They grow to the size of a Banty chicken and Mr.

Bowman is hoping that many will survive and populate in Rockcastle County, as they did years ago.

Mr. Bowman is raising the quail in connection with a project sponsored by the Archery club, the Rural Development Club, and the Fish and Game Club. Each group is committed to increasing the wildlife in the county and its chances of survival.

The Archery club and the Fish and Game Club each applied for quail from the Department of Fish and Wildlife, which gives them away free to organizations willing to raise them. Mr. Bowman, president of the Archery club, took over all 600 quail last week because the Fish and Game Club could not find anyone to raise them. Last year Gary Burdette raised quail for the club, which won a state award for this and other efforts in wildlife conservation.

The Fish and Game Club purchased bicolor lespedeza, a flowering bush that is good cover for quail and other animals, and the plants are being distributed through the Rural Development

club. Harold Ballinger, who is in charge of distributing the lespedeza will provide the Archery Club with names of people who

took plants. These same people may want the quail to live on their property, when the quail are old enough to be set free.

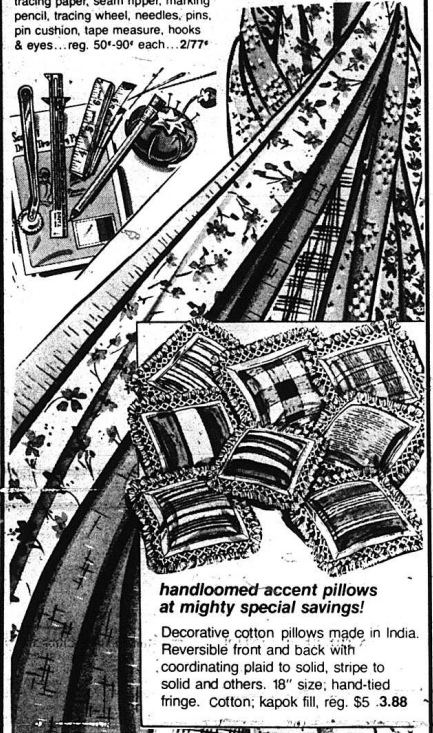

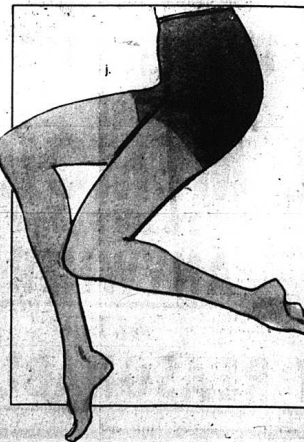
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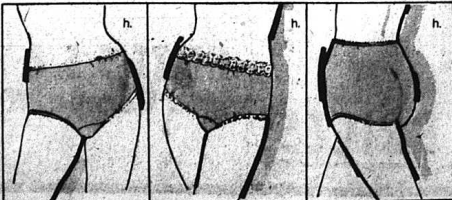
