# Kentucky Afield

It's shaping up as a very productive year at the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources' Minor Clark Fish Hatchery near Morehead, according to Mike Hearn, assistant hatchery manager.

Some bass have already spawned in the hatchery ponds, and others are in the spawning process. This activity is occurring earlier than usual, a reflection of the mild spring weather we've had this year, Hearn says.

Muskellunge have also spawned, producing more fry this year at the Clark Hatchery than ever before. Walleye production is also at an all-time high, Hearn says. More than 847,000 walleye fry, the offspring of 44 fish captured from Lake Cumberland this spring, have already been stocked.

Of these, 503,000 were placed in Cumberland and 344,000 went to Martins Fork Lake. An additional 1.3 million walleye fry obtained from a federal hatchery in Ohio will be raised to an average length of 1.5 inches and will then be stocked in Lake Cumberland.

Two hybrid species, aq, also doing well at the hatchery. A recent spawn of tiger musky (a muskellunge-northern pike cross) is doing well, and 600,000 rockfish, more than 847,000 walleye fry, the offspring of 44 fish captured from North Carolina are growing nicely. These fish will soon be joined by an additional 600,000 fish from North Carolina.

Biologists are now attempting to capture brood rockfish from Lake Cumberland.

These fish will be taken to the hatchery, where they will be spawned and the young produce will be raised to stocking size.

"The arrival of the rockfish will just about cap off our busiest season," Hearn says. If they produce as well as the other species have so far this year, there would be a bumper crop of game fish for stocking in Kentucky waters.

It's already been decided where most of these fish will be stocked, Hearn says. The bass fry will be used primarily in the farm pond program and will be distributed in May. It will then take 18 months to two years for them to reach the 12-inch minimum legal size. The musky will be used to stock Cave Run Lake and musky streams around the state.

Tiger musky, which don't get as large as purebred musky but seem to be even more aggressive and willing to strike an artificial lure, will be stocked in Fishtrap, Dewey and Green River lakes. Previous stockings of this hybrid in Dewey Lake should reach the 30-inch legal minimum size sometime this summer. This will be the first stocking of tiger musky in Green River Lake.

The rockfish/white bass hybrids are destined for Lake Herrington and Barren River Lake.

This will be the first stocking of this hybrid in Kentucky.

The rockfish hybrid seems both more adaptable to some fresh water conditions and easier to catch than the rockfish, according to Fisheries Division Director Charlie Bowers. The current hybrid world record is more than 26 pounds. While it doesn't grow as large as the rockfish, it is still plenty big enough to interest anglers, Bowers says.

Rockfish raised at the hatchery this spring are scheduled for stocking in the Ohio River, Lake Cumberland and the tailwaters of Kentucky and Barkley lakes. All of these waters have been stocked with rockfish in the past.

## SCKMA MEETING

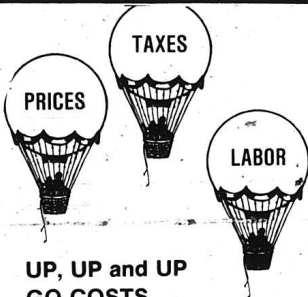
Mrs. Laura W. Durham, Librarian, Mrs. Sharon D. Lovell, Library Assistant and seventeen members of the Rockcastle County

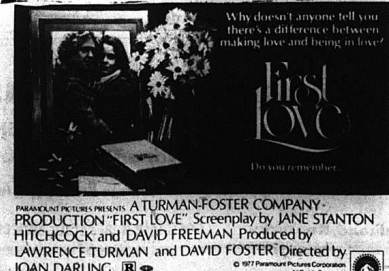



## Livingston Man and Son Killed In Auto Accident

A Livingston man and his son were killed and three people were badly injured in a head-on collision Thursday (May 3) on Ky. 1955 (Red Hill Road) about seven miles north of Livingston.

Bennie Allen, age 35, and Bobby Wayne Allen, age 5, were both killed in the accident, and Mr. Allen's two sons, Bennie, Jr., age 9 and George, age 8, were injured and taken to the Lexington hospital.

The driver of the other car, Ellis Jones Maupin, was badly injured and taken to St. Joseph Hospital in Lexington.

State Trooper Jack Lawless said that Ms. Maupin was apparently driving at a high rate of speed when she "did not negotiate a curve in the road and went into the lane of the other driver, hitting that vehicle head-on." A Jackson County constable, Gene Maupin, was driving behind Ms. Maupin, but Trooper Lawless said no one informed him as to whether the constable was chasing Ms. Maupin or driving at a high rate of speed.

The accident occurred about 6 p.m. The age and address of Ms. Maupin were not given.

## Highway Department Tells Plans for Road Around Mt. Vernon

Highway engineers are currently putting down the route of the road that will connect Ky 461 near the Rockcastle Multi-County Industrial Park to I-75 near the Red Top Restaurant in Mt. Vernon. The map on this page shows the route the Kentucky Department of Transportation is following for the project, which will cost about \$1 million a mile. It should be complete within five years.

The purpose of the project is to provide an adequate highway between I-75 and Lake Cumberland area. The 16-mile project includes some reconstruction of Ky 461 in Pulaski County and the building of the bypass.

There will be public hearings about each four-mile section of the 16.42 mile road, and anyone will have a chance to ask questions or raise objections at that time. The hearings will be held early next year. J.W. Watkins, Assistant District Engineer for Pre-construction, said

Mr. Watkins said that an estimated 44 houses and 16 businesses will be displaced by the road based on aerial photographs taken by the Highway Department.

The portion of the road from the industrial site to the Red Top will have four lanes, but the rest will be two-lane with climbing lanes for trucks. Most public roads and streets will be connected to the highway, with some private driveway connections, but each will have to be at least 500 feet apart.

Some local businessmen are afraid that the bypass road will divert shoppers out of the Main Street area of Mt. Vernon. But Mr. Watkins said that would probably not be the case.

"We have studied the traffic coming from I-75 and going toward Mt. Vernon, and our predictions are that about half will go on to the bypass, and the other half will go to Mt. Vernon," Mr. Watkins said.

He said new highways generate new traffic when they are built, but the old road has about the same traffic as before. He said that some people in the Highway Department think that the bypass will bring more business to the Mt. Vernon area, because people will take a short-cut-Ky 461-to the

Lake Cumberland area and get off I-75 at Renfro Valley.

Mr. Watkins said that the highway designers were not thinking in terms of connecting the Rockcastle Multi-County Industrial Park with the bypass, but that local people convinced people in Frankfort to do so.

Right now the road is in the early stages of design, as engineers are determining right-of-way requirements and the effect on property. After this stage, the design hearings will be held, and if any changes are needed, they will be implemented. Once the engineers have the final design, the Bureau of Highways will secure right-of-ways and relocate utilities before they contract for the actual construction.

The federal government pays for 70% of the project, with money from federal road user taxes on fuel, oil, grease, new trucks and trailers, highway vehicle tires, and heavy vehicle use. The state's share (30%) comes from vehicle registration fees, miscellaneous collections and gas taxes.

### Second Rabid Skunk Killed

#### Near Mt. Vernon Wednesday

Another skunk killed in Rockcastle County has been determined to be rabid by the state Health Department laboratory in Frankfort. The skunk was killed off old Brodhead Road about two miles from Mt. Vernon near Purrr Rigby Road on May 2.

The first confirmed case of rabies was also a skunk, killed April 26 also on old Brodhead Road near Mt. Vernon. The county Health Department is currently having Rabies Clinics to vaccinate dogs against the disease.

Steve Midkiff, county environmentalist, said that on the good side a raccoon also tested in Frankfort was not rabid. It was killed at Willalla. Mr. Midkiff said that he has had at least six calls from people who have killed skunks shot in the head, but these animals could not be tested for rabies. He said that the Health Department will test animals suspected of having the disease, but

## L&N Cars Derail Near Mt. Vernon

Six cars of an L&N train derailed Tuesday at the first tunnel just south of Mt. Vernon, blocking the tracks for more than 24 hours. Cause of the accident is being investigated, according to Charles Castner, media spokesman for the L&N in Louisville.

The train, #265, was going from Louisville to Corbin at 8:15

a.m., the time of the accident. Of the six cars that derailed, Mr. Castner said that one was fairly easy to rerail because only one set of wheels was off the track. All the other five were completely derailed and some of these were leaning against the tunnel, causing the 20 or so workmen from Corbin some problems in removing them.

Two of the cars were empty. Others were carrying grain, fertilizer, paper and plywood.

### Cass Brothers Charged

#### In May 3rd Shooting

Mr. Cass is charged with shooting Winkler three times in the leg with a pistol on Thursday, May 3.

Bill Cass, 51, of Brodhead, is free on \$10,000 bond after being charged with first degree assault against Carl Mackey Winkler, 17, of Brodhead.

Mr. Winkler's father, also named Carl, has taken out a warrant against Mr. Cass's brother, James, charging that James encouraged Bill Cass to commit the assault against his son by "words or deed." James Cass is free on \$5,000 bond.

Patti Clay Hospital in Richmond confirmed Wednesday that a Mike Winkler, 17, of Brodhead is being treated there now.

### State Tax Report Says

#### Rockcastle's Are High

A report from the state shows that property evaluations for tax purposes are higher in Rockcastle County than anywhere in the state.

The report shows that Rockcastle countians are taxed at 112.8 for residential property and 117.7 for commercial property. This means if you had a house that sells for \$100,000, it might be evaluated here for tax purposes at \$112,800. The ideal figure in the report would be 100.0, but few counties have that ratio. Most are below: Pulaski, 80.0; Madison, 79.5; Clay, 84.6; Lincoln, 85.8; Laurel, 91.3; Garrard, 89.5; Jackson, 100.6.

## Brodhead's R.C. Anderson Dies Monday, Was President of Bank for Many Years

Raymond C. Anderson, who was president of the Citizens Bank of Brodhead, died Monday morning at age 77. He had been treated at Ephraim McDowell Hospital in Danville for the past seven weeks.

He was born June 23, 1907 in Rockcastle County, the son of the late Baylor and Lucy Jane Miller Anderson. He joined the Bank in 1920, working the first year without pay under A.M. Hiatt just to learn the business. Mr. Anderson helped see the Bank through the Depression of 1929, when it became one of the few financial institutions not to close its doors during that crisis.

Funeral services were held Wednesday, May 9, at the Brodhead Christian Church by Bro. O.O. Cloyd and Bro. Roger Carr. Burial was in the Piney Grove Cemetery.

## Legislative Report

By Rep. Harold DeMarcus

The Personal Service Contract Review subcommittee met on Tuesday, April 10th for the purpose of reviewing 12 contracts and 8 amendments to contracts. The committee approved 61 contracts and 8 contracts amendments while disapproving one contract.

The personal service contract that was disapproved was for \$265,000 to be paid to Library Interface Systems of Wayata, Minnesota. The contract was to be the first phase of a \$500,000 project aimed at putting all library book cards on tape and establishing a book loaning system among Kentucky libraries.

The State Division of Library and Archives is requesting the project in order to phase out Kentucky's library card catalogue system by establishing a statewide library computer system. For \$500,000 the state library would receive two computers and a software program listing all the books in Kentucky libraries.

Superficially this seems like a harmless contract until several important points are realized. When the spokesman from the Department of Libraries and Archives was asked if this computer system would result in less jobs, the reply was not less jobs but less work.

The committee rejected this contract because there was not a cost analysis study made to determine if the project would ever pay for itself and because the new library project was merely an attempt to increase another bureaucracy that would serve to remove all local control from community libraries.

Another interesting point that was raised from the library project was the fact that for \$300,000 a software computer tape program and two computers could be acquired.

This is interesting in that a couple of months ago the present state administration informed us that for the legislature to get a terminal hookup with one of the Commonwealth's larger computers, it would cost \$10 million. From this it is evident that the Executive Branch in conjunction with the state bureaucracy is distorting the truth in order to stop the General Assembly from gaining access to the state's information systems.

The committee also met with the state's Attorney General to discuss the inordinate amount of personal service contracts that state agencies are requesting for legal services. The committee

wanted to know why the Attorney General's office could not provide the Commonwealth with required legal services.

The Attorney General replied that he thought all the state's legal services could be consolidated under his office, but it would take a larger staff and increased funding. The committee has requested the Legislative Research Commission staff to implement a study to determine if hiring additional staff attorneys would lower per-

the tests cannot be performed if the animals were shot in the head. "Aim for the heart," he advised.

The Health Department particularly wants to test suspicious animals killed in areas other than where the two skunks were found, so that it can be determined where the disease has spread geographically. Thirteen rabid skunks and two rabid dogs have been discovered in Madison County.


The Health Department will test any animal that has bitten a person. Mr. Midkiff said that people should stay away from skunks, raccoons and foxes that are too friendly or otherwise behaving in an unusual manner. It would be unusual for a skunk, for example, to be out in the daytime. Mr. Midkiff said the Health Department appreciated the telephone calls from people reporting such animals.

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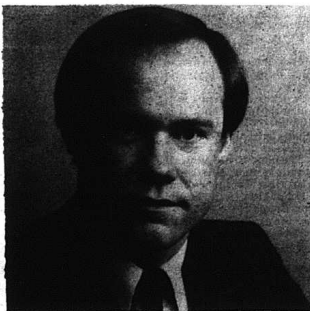

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## Fishing Report

Crappie fishing is now generally good on the state's 15 major lakes and the black bass angling fair, but white bass runs have ended. The lake-by-lake rundown, according to the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife.

**Green:** crappie good over submerged cover and around stick ups; black bass fair on surface lures and spinner baits off points and in inlets and bays; in tailwaters, trout slow; clear to murky to muddy, falling slowly, one foot above summer pool and 68 degrees.

**Buckhorn:** crappie good on the lower lake fair over submerged cover; black bass fair on crank baits off

rocky and shallow banks; clear to murky to muddy, rising slowly, three feet above summer pool and 70 degrees.

**Dewey:** crappie good around stick ups; bluegill fair in inlets and bays; murky, stable at summer pool and 66 degrees.

**Laurel:** trout good at night still fishing nightcrawlers under lights on the lower lake; crappie fair around stick ups; clear to murky to muddy, rising slowly, 1.5 feet below power pool and 65 degrees.

**Dale Hollow:** Bluegill good around willow bushes and drift piles; walleye fair still fishing minnows and nightcrawlers off mud-flats; in low banks and points; clear to murky to muddy, rising slowly, two feet above summer pool and 68 degrees.

**Cumberland:** Walleye fair to good on the lower lake on medium deep runners off mud flats; rockfish fair to good on spinners on Beaver Creek; black bass fair to good on the lower lake on bass bugs, surface lures and shallow running crank baits off points; crappie slow on the upper lake in inlets and bays and over submerged cover; in tailwaters, crappie and trout fair; clear to murky, rising slowly, four feet below the timberline and 68 degrees.

**Nolin:** bluegill good off rocky points and banks and in inlets and bays; black bass slow on spinner baits and crank baits off shallow banks; clear to murky, stable at summer pool and 64 degrees.

**Grayson:** black bass fair on medium runners over stump beds and off muddy banks; bluegill fair in inlets and bays; in tailwaters, trout good; black bass fair; clear to murky to muddy, rising slowly, two feet above summer pool and 65 degrees.

**Cave Run:** crappie fair around stickups; black bass slow on spinner baits and crank baits off shallow banks; clear, falling slowly, 1.5 feet above summer pool and

65 degrees.

**Barren:** crappie fair to good in inlets and bays; over submerged cover and around stick ups; black bass slow on spinner baits and crank baits off points and over weed beds; clear to murky, falling slowly, nine feet above summer pool and 68 degrees.

**Barkeley:** crappie fair to good along the brush line, black bass slows (1.5 to 2 feet); catfish slow in inlets and bays; in tailwaters, catfish and white bass good; clear to murky to muddy, rising slowly, three feet above summer pool and 65 degrees.

**Kentucky:** crappie slow to fair around brush and willow bushes (1.5 to 2 feet); catfish slow to fair still fishing minnows, worms and nightcrawlers off rip rap; in tailwaters, catfish fair; murky to muddy, rising, three feet above summer pool and 64 degrees.

**Rough River:** black bass fair to good on the south fork over submerged cover and slow on the north fork around stick ups and brush; clear to murky to muddy, falling slowly, 13 feet above summer pool and 68 degrees.

**Herrington:** White bass slow to fair at night off rocky points and deep banks; crappie slow in inlets and bays; clear, stable at 6.5 feet above summer pool and 69 degrees.

**Fishtrap:** crappie slow around stick ups; bluegill slow in inlets and bays; clear to murky to muddy, stable at summer pool and 68 degrees.

**The Acidity of Tomato Varieties**  
Food with a pH of 4.6 or higher is considered low-acid and must be pressure canned. Otherwise there is danger of botulism poisoning.

Tomatoes, fruits and berries are considered high-acid and are canned by the boiling water-bath method.

The acidity of twelve varieties of tomatoes commonly grown in Kentucky was measured by Drs. C.R. Roberts, J.R. Hartman and Tom Kemp of the UK College of Agriculture during three summers: 1974-76. The 1976 results are listed below in pH units which are the averages of three pickings. The smaller the pH unit, the more acid there is in tomato sample.

Listed are amounts of pH in certain varieties of tomatoes:  
Ramapo, 4.4; Better Boy, 4.4; Jet Star, 4.3; Manalpa, 4.4; Super-sonic, 4.3; Beef Steak, 4.4; Big Boy, 4.5; Beef Master, 4.3; Fantastic, 4.5; Marglobe, 4.3; Rutgers, 4.5; Winsall, 4.3.

Acidity of a given variety changes from one year to the next. This is because the soil and weather conditions can affect the acid-

ity of tomatoes. The acid content is also influenced by the degree of maturity; as tomatoes mature, acidity decreases (pH increases).

The familiar warning, "don't can overripe tomatoes," is based on this observation: A tomato whose pH measured 4.5 in a test plot could be higher if canned slightly overripe.

Although none of the varieties tested by Roberts, Hartman and Kemp had pH value above 4.5 studies by other states and by USDA have shown that tomatoes can have a pH value above 4.6. So you can add bottled lemon juice or citric acid-salt canning tablets to increase the acidity of home-canned tomatoes. Studies have shown that flavor and acceptability of canned tomatoes are not harmed by these additions.

Can only firm, ripe tomatoes. Do not can overripe tomatoes and those with decayed spots or blemishes.

### Energy Information Available

Free information and special services are available to help people conserve energy from several agencies in Rockcastle County.

Want your house analyzed by computer to see if you can change it for an energy savings? A free computer analysis is available through the County Extension

Service in the courthouse, or Kentucky Utilities will arrange a home visit by an energy expert if you prefer the Jackson County RECC also makes home visits on all new total-electric homes to advise on proper insulation and wiring. They will also advise people converting their house from some alternate form of energy to electricity.

What if the experts tell you that the house needs repairs or insulation? If you are a member of a low income group you may qualify to have it done free by the Home Weatherization Program. They will provide insulation, repair and caulk windows, repair walls, underpinning of trailers, etc. to qualified families. If you are over 65 and willing to furnish the materials for the home repairs, the Senior Citizens Project will furnish free labor.

The Farmers Home Administration offers loans to low income family to repair or build homes. Loans to senior citizens to purchase or repair homes with interest rates as low as 1%; and loans to eliminate water in family health-up to \$7000 repairs.

The do-it-yourselfer can learn how by reading free pamphlets. The Extension Office has six on subjects like "How to Save Electricity, Gas and Oil," and "Saving Fuel with Storm Windows and Insulation." Kentucky Utilities has "Insulation Guidelines for Efficient Energy Utilization." If you are interested in saving energy by proper farming methods, the Soil Conservation Service has booklets on energy saving for livestock producers, field crops producers, poultry farmers, vegetable and orchard growers and dairy farmers.

How about letting your club

in on the free information? The Rural Electric Cooperative has a speaker and slide presentation for groups on proper ways to conserve energy.

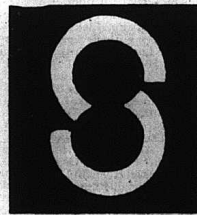
