The Mt. Vernon City Council took steps toward upgrading the city's sewer system at its regular meeting Monday after hearing a report from Schimpeler-Coraditio Associates, a Louisville engineer-ing firm.

Twelve Forest Fires in 1979 **Destroy 106 Acres of Timber**

The Kentucky Division of Forestry's Division Office in Pineville
recently released figures of damage caused by forest fires this
spring. According to County

fires destroyed 106,5 acres of timberjand in Rockcastle County.
These fires cost tax money to
suppress and also causes extensive
dangue. Io forest resources. Fire damage to forest resources. Fire scars on large trees soon begin toto rot, and eventually the lower bole becomes worthless. Young saillegs and seedlings, the regeneration which promises a future forest crop, are often killed by wildfire. Wildlife food and cover are destroyed. The layer of leaves which protects the soil is burned away and erosion and water pollution soon follow.

Several weeks ago the first eleven bills prefiled for the 1980 regular legislative session were discussed within this forum. Since that time an additional fourteen

bills have been prefiled.

During the interim all bills are prefiled with the Legislative Research Commission (LRC) so that all members of the legislature may have ample opportunity to become familiar with the proposed legislation.

LRC Bill 12 redefines the terms automatic adjustment clause and residential utility for the purpose of amending Chapt. 278 of the Ky. Nefised Statutes (KRS) in order to make it illegal for any utility company to use an automatic adjustment clause in determining its rate schedule for resenditial customers. If this bill is enacted the automatic fuel adjustment charge will cease to be automatic.





Tobacco can be insured a gainst all natural disasters, including drought, freeze, hail, unid, fire, disease and too much moisture. The insurance features a

poundage quota plus lease-in poundage times the current year's average support price. Premiums have not increased its guaranteed price 6.5% over rlast year's 19 cents per pound. This \$15 cents per pound and the farmer does not have to pay the premium until after he has sold his crop.

The regulations governing the taking of frogs have several unusual features, and with the season opening May 15, now is a good time to review those rules.

First, the legal "day" for determining bag limits is from noon to noon. This means that the daily limit of 15 frogs is the maximum that can be taken in any single night.

If the "day" followed the normal midnight to midnight pattern, a hunter could legally take 15 frogs before midnight, then start on another daily limit after the clock struck 12.

However, the season itself opens at 12:01 a.m. on May 15, so those who want to get an early start on frog hunting will have to

start on frog hunting will have to stay up late. License requirements are also rather unusual. If you gig frogs (the most popular method) or catch them by hand, either a hunting or lishing liceses is ok. Of you use a firearm or a bow and arrow (crossbows, by the way, cannot be used) a hunting liceses is required. However, and the control of the cont

The frog season runs prough October 31. Like most seasons, there is a flurry of activity during the first week or so, after which many froggers quit for the year. But a few wise old hands wait until the middle of summer when they have the waters to themselves.
