Mrs. Kinser was alone but the White car was carrying three passengers: Donna F. Mason, 15, Nancy Johnson, 16 and Tony Edwin Mason, 15, all of Route 2, Livingston. Mrs. Kinser, Mr. White and Miss Mason were all taken to the St. Joseph Hospital in Lexington where the two teen-agers are listed in serious condition.



## City Council Discusses Sewer System

The Mt. Vernon City Council took steps toward upgrading the city's sewer system at its regular meeting Monday after hearing a report from Schimpfer-Cordado Associates, a Louisville engineering firm.

They voted to allow the engineers to proceed with the project, a letter from the Environmental Protection Agency regarding Mt. Vernon. The EPA made four points: (1) The city may submit a grant for further study of its

system; because EPA agrees the system needs upgrading; (2) The state of Kentucky must address itself to certain problems about the project, such as what does Mt. Vernon use for a sewer system while the construction is going on; (3) If the city does not want a lagoon, as recommended, then the city must get special permission from the federal government not to put one in; and (4) A pre-application conference must be held with the state of Kentucky about a new

facility.

Mr. Richards said that the second study of Mt. V. non facility would cost about \$1,500, with the federal government paying 75% if the city's application is approved. Mayor Roland Mullins said Mr. Richards should try to lower this cost, if possible.

Mr. Richards' company submitted a 168-page long study last summer that said Mt. Vernon's sewer system needed to be expanded to accommodate future growth, and because it was already operating under strain during wet weather. The engineers came up with eight alternative plans, including one of replacing the plant with a new \$6 million facility. The Council is trying to upgrade the current plant instead.

In other business, the Council heard from David Audia, representing Citizen Security Life Insurance, about group insurance for city employees, but no action was taken.

Doug Brock asked for an easement for electrical lines to his property near Lake Linville, and a committee from the Council will look into the situation for him.

The Council told Clyde Pittman that if he pays for materials, the city will connect his house to the sewer system, after he secures easements through neighbor's property, if necessary.

Police Chief Larry Williams said some street signs need replacements.

The Council went into closed session to discuss the hiring of a deputy City Clerk, because Perline Andarkin had resigned, but no action was taken on the applications.

## Gasoline Supply is OK Here Now; But Dealers Worry About Future

Only a few local service stations are having problems supplying gasoline this week, but most of those surveyed said that they are worried that their supply will run out before the next comes in the first week of June. They said the Memorial Day Weekend would probably be a bad time to drive because many stations would have used up their May allocation of gasoline before then and be closed.

The big oil companies are supplying the state with only 80 to 85% of the gasoline they got last year. While some parts of the country are having real shortages, Kentucky has been doing better partly because there are major oil refineries in Ashland and Louisville.

Most of the stations said they were able to carry on their business as usual, and that it is about the same volume as last year. Many local owners said they would have joined the national shut down of stations this weekend as a protest of the local oil system. However, the Kentucky Retail Gasoline Dealers Association voted not to take part in it at a meeting Tuesday night.

Most of the local station owners said they are trying to stretch their May allocation of gasoline through the end of the month, but it is hard to know whether to close or cut hours.

"If you close one day or cut your hours, then you might not sell

your month's allocation," Bentley McFerron, of Turner Exxon, said, "so it's hard to know what to do."

"If you don't ask your allocation, then you won't get as much gasoline next time," he explained.

M.L. Beeker, manager of the company which supplies 13 stations in the area and several large

commercial operations, said that business has tripled from last year, yet the allocation from his major supplier is down.

"We have been buying oil from wherever we can," he said.

He said farmers have priority and he is saving gasoline for them.

## County Gets \$45,000 State Grant to Build Exhibit Hall and Grandstand at Fairgrounds

Gov. Julian Carroll has announced the awarding of a \$45,000 grant to go toward construction of a grandstand and exhibit hall at the Broadhead Fairgrounds in Rockcastle County.

The grant from the state's local convention and community centers fund was approved by the fund's advisory board today. The grant will go to the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court, which is developing the project.

## Twelve Forest Fires in 1979 Destroy 106 Acres of Timber

The Kentucky Division of Forestry's Division Office in Pineville recently released figures of damage caused by forest fires this spring. According to County Ranger, Steve Bullen, 12 separate fires destroyed 106.5 acres of timberland in Rockcastle County. These fires cost tax money to suppress and also causes extensive damage to forest resources. Fire scars on large trees soon begin to rot, and eventually the lower bole becomes worthless. Young saplings and seedlings, the regeneration which promises a future forest crop, are often killed by wildfire. Wildlife food and cover are destroyed. The layer of leaves which protects the soil is burned away and erosion and water pollution soon follow.

"It is difficult to estimate the total value of forest resources destroyed by this spring's fires," said Mr. Bullen. "But everyone loses when wildfire burns in the woods."

Development Secretary William Short said the state grant will go toward the estimated \$99,820 cost of the project. The remainder will come from the county. The grandstand will replace an existing unsafe structure which is to be demolished, he added.

The 31-acre fairgrounds site was purchased by Rockcastle County in 1978 and is being developed to be used for horse shows, a county fair, tractor pulls, community activities and recreational purposes. The grandstand will seat 650 persons and will be over an enclosed exhibit area for showing crafts, canned goods and similar items.

The local convention and community centers fund is administered by the Development Cabinet.

## Midnight Power Failure

### In Mt. Vernon Monday

About 300 houses in the Mt. Vernon area were without electricity early Monday for nearly two hours after a tractor-trailer truck hit a power line on Sand Springs Road.

Ron Cain, manager of Kentucky Utilities in this area, said that the first wire started a chain reaction and knocked out other wires, too. The incident occurred around midnight, and workmen had restored power by 1:40 a.m. Mr. Cain said, homes in Mt. Vernon, and the Sand Springs area toward Pine Hill were affected in what Mr. Cain was probably the worst power failure in some time.

## Business and Professional Association Meets To Discuss Keeping Commerce in Mt. Vernon

The Mt. Vernon Business and Professional Association will conduct some surveys about parking and shopping habits of local people and use the information to determine the best ways to keep business in the area.

The group plans to ask civic associations such as Kiwanis to conduct the surveys within the next few weeks.

Parked cars will be checked every 15 minutes during a three-day period to find out who parks where and for how long. Shoppers will be asked to answer questions like "What do you buy outside the county? What would you like to see local merchants sell that they don't sell now?"

Besides the surveys, the group intends to ask the Mt. Vernon City Council to apply for a grant from the Appalachian Development District for a city planner who would help come up with ideas to improve the town.

The Association met Tuesday with 21 people present. Formed over ten years ago, the group was traditionally only active during the Christmas season. But now

with many merchants and professionals concerned that a proposed road connecting Somerset to I-75 at Renton Valley will cut off business from Main Street and its surrounding areas, they want to face the possibility early.

They are currently meeting once a month to come up with proposals to strengthen the downtown area.

A Beres consultant firm, Will Linder and Associates, is working with the group and the Mt. Vernon City Council to help them get government grants for city improvement. It was Mr. Linder who suggested the surveys and the city planner.

The group also will ask the state Department of Transportation to study Mt. Vernon's traffic patterns.

At other meetings, the group had pointed to traffic, parking and improvements to the appearance of store fronts as the areas major problems.

Officers elected at this meeting for a one year term are as follows: John Bush, president; Minnie Lee Barnett, vice president; Billy Hiatt, secretary-treasurer; and Charles Shivel and Tony Hopkins, directors-at-large.

Joe Gibson, Danville district manager of Kentucky Utilities, spoke at the meeting about how Danville was able to keep business in the Main Street area after a bypass road was built. He said the merchants and professionals got together to eliminate clutter, make a uniform appearance by color schemes and regulation of signs, and beautify the area with trees and furniture. Danville also used promotions and advertising campaigns, plus improved street lighting to "keep it from becoming a ghost town," Mr. Gibson said.

"I think you can see from these pictures that they had success," he said, showing photos of the city before and after the improvement projects.

The Association now calls itself "Business and Professional Association" because it is not

## Legislative Report

**By Harold DeMarcus**  
 Several weeks ago the first eleven bills prefilled for the 1980 regular legislative session were discussed within this forum. Since that time an additional fourteen bills have been prefilled.  
 During the interim all bills are prefilled with the Legislative Research Commission (LRC) so that all members of the legislature may have ample opportunity to become familiar with the proposed legislation.

LRC Bill 12 redefines the terms automatic adjustment clause and residential utility for the purpose of amending Chapt. 278 of the Ky. Revised Statutes (KRS) in order to make it illegal for any utility company to use an automatic adjustment clause in determining its rate schedule for residential customers. If this bill is enacted the automatic fuel adjustment charge will cease to be automatic.

LRC Bill 13 seeks to amend KRS to delete the condition that prescription medicines must be dispensed by a registered pharmacist in order to be exempt from the sales tax.

LRC Bill 14 seeks to amend KRS to require that the county name must be embossed on all motor registration plates, and require the spelling at length of the word Kentucky on all motor vehicle license plates.

LRC Bill 15 seeks to amend KRS to subject the minutes and records of the Kentucky State Fair Board to the open records law.

LRC Bill 16 seeks to amend KRS to permit cities of the second class with the Commission or city manager form of government to read a summary rather than the full text of each resolution or ordinance before passage.

LRC Bill 17 seeks to amend KRS to exempt foreign life insurance companies' annuity premiums from the state insurance premiums' tax.

LRC Bill 18 seeks to amend KRS to require the department of education as prescribed by the General Assembly to clearly specify the criteria for selecting textbooks for public schools.

LRC Bill 19 seeks to amend KRS to change the average daily attendance calculation for allotting units under the minimum founda-

Dear Editor:

In response to the letter from Mr. Raymond Vanant that appeared in the May 10 issue of the Mt. Vernon Signal, I would like to offer a few comments.

Kentucky's health law system has changed over the last few years. One of those changes is that there is no longer a Kentucky State Health Department. Responsibilities have been divided between several different departments.

County health department employees (not elected) such as myself, have responsibilities in certain areas by law. These include, among others, things such as inspection of restaurants, grocery stores, schools, motels, mobile home and RV parks, jails, and investigation of nuisances where a public health nuisance crosses from the property of one person onto the property of another.

The Kentucky State Department for Natural Resources and Environmental Protection has primary (first cracks at the problem) in areas such as solid waste and water pollution.

Due to a lack of sufficient personnel at state level, the Rockcastle County Health Department has tried to do something about the litter problem. I have obtained over 40 citations for the arrest of persons for littering. Due to circumstance beyond my control, these cases have not yet been to court.

Having a sewer that runs into a creek is a violation of KRS 224.060 and carries a possible civil penalty of \$5000 for each day the violation continues. If the violation continues after an order to cease the violation has become final, the offender may receive a fine of not less than \$1,000, nor more than \$10,000 or by imprisonment for not more than one year or both.

If you have information on such a case it should be reported to the Division of Water Quality, P.O. Box 955, Harlan, Kentucky 40831, ph. (606) 573-4919. Give details such as your name and address and the name, address and exact location of the offenders, as well as the nature of the offense. A signed complaint is generally legally required.

The Rockcastle County Health Department will be glad to make sure that complaints reach the responsible department. I do not believe we should be blamed when a problem is not legally ours to correct.

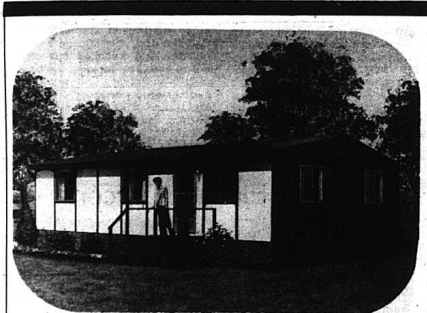

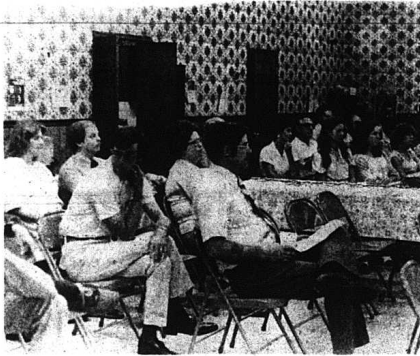

**"Caregivers" Tell About Their Agencies Programs**

People in human service jobs got together last Thursday to tell each other what they are doing in their individual agencies. The annual "Caregivers Day," held at the library and sponsored by the Cumberland River Comprehensive Care system, is designed to make coordination of services better among social workers and those in health care.

Paul Abney, CRVCC staff member, led the meeting, and introduced leaders from the Senior Citizens, Christian Appalachian Project, Bureau of Social Insurance, Home Health Services, and others.

Some facts not well known about the agencies came out during the meeting. Faye Thompson, representing Senior Citizens, said that "the community has the wrong idea about our agency. It is not for the financially deprived."

Anyone over 65 years of age can join the group for a hot lunch at the library community room, weekdays at noon.

Linda Whitt, of Sowder Nursing Home, said that visitors are welcome at the home anytime and they do not have to be friends or relatives of residents. The nursing home is sponsoring an Open House this Sunday.

Jack Hayne told about Christian Appalachian Project's latest program for the handicapped, which is being housed over "The Attic" store in Mt. Vernon. The program is providing a work experience for the disabled, either emotionally or otherwise, over the age of 16 years. It will have only 8 to 10 people involved at first.

Mary Jo DePew told about the activities at the Maple Grove Child Development Center, emphasizing that it is not a babysitting service but a carefully designed program to bring out the child's intelligence and learning skills.

Roland Mullins and Mr. Abney told about the work of the CRVCC system, and showed slides of the various programs. The eight-county system has outpatient service for the emotionally disturbed, services for the retarded, emergency and inpatient hospitals, summer camps, alcohol and drug abuse programs, as well

as educational services. Mr. Mullins said that the system recently had received national accreditation, the first in the state to do so. Paul Witt said that Alcoholics Anonymous meets at 8 p.m. Monday at the Comprehensive Care Building in Mt. Vernon and any-

one who is an alcoholic or a child or spouse of an alcoholic can get help with these problems. The club has about 10 members now and is trying to be registered with the national program of the same name.

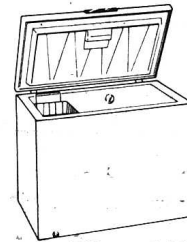

limited just to businessmen but open to doctors and lawyers and anyone interested in the area. Mr. Rush said that it was not just for Main Street but for the improvement of the entire Mt. Vernon business community.

**"GASOLINE"**  
(Cont'd from front)

He advised people to buy fuel oil now, because there may be a shortage in the winter. He also said that President Carter's action to take the controls off crude oil prices would help the situation in four to six months, because the companies can put more money into refining oil and exploration.

Only two service station managers said they were already having to take money in the gasoline shortage. Charles Bussell, Mt. Vernon Shell, said that he sold his entire May allocation by May 8, and was buying gasoline from independent dealers. He said he is closing on Sundays so that his local customers can be served during the week.

G.H. Griffin, Town and Country Standard Service Station, said that he was out of two grades of gasoline for several hours this week because he has been having trouble getting Chevron gas out of Richmond. He is cutting back his hours and closing Sundays.

The service station managers tend to blame the federal government and not the big oil companies for the current national gas shortage.

Phillip Argenbrent, of Reno Valley Chevron, said the government recently changed its own rules about gas allocation. "They were using the year 1973 as a basis to allocate the gas," he said, "but they switched to 1974 as the basis just a month or so ago, which decreased the allocation for most stations. Then they want the oil companies to start refining more fuel for heating oil two grades of waiting till mid-summer like they usually do. It's the government, really, you see, that has the controls. I send a form in to Chevron for so much gas, but that one Chevron sends it to the government for approval."

**Alcohol Program Ideas Offered Teens**

"Many young people are experimenting with alcohol today—often for the first time. Young people below the legal drinking age are faced with very real decisions. Soon they will be able to drink legally and will have to decide about if, how, and when they will drink."

"This is a very important issue—one which will affect you and your friends throughout your

lives..."

These words appear in the opening chapter of a new "idea book" on alcohol abuse prevention aimed at high school students as produced by the National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism. The book, "Is Beer a Four Letter Word" suggests 12 projects that young people can conduct to promote alcohol education and prevention in their schools and communities.

Like "The Whole College Catalog About Drinking", an earlier NIAAA prevention guide aimed at college students, "Is Beer a Four Letter Word" was written with the help of youth. The publication is intended primarily for use by youth, but should also prove helpful to teachers, youth group leaders, and other adults who work with youth.

Among the suggested projects are an exploration of "drinking or nondrinking roots" of a particular ethnic group or nationality; involving a radio or television disc jockey in an alcohol education campaign; operating a "dry disco" for youth where only nonalcoholic beverages are served; and producing a creative school assembly.

One chapter discusses carrying out one of several community prevention projects, ranging from managing a booth in a shopping center to organizing a service for driving intoxicated persons safely home. Other projects focus on peer pressure, drinking and driving, and legal issues involving alcohol and youth.

Included in the project descriptions are names and addresses of organizations or schools that have implemented similar projects in the past, as well as suggestions for getting help from local resources such as community groups, government and business.

The book also contains chapters on planning and evaluation and useful resource lists of media materials pamphlets, the state alcoholism authorities, and national organizations involved in alcohol abuse prevention activities.

Many of the planning and project ideas for the book came from an advisory board composed of young people, particularly student representatives from the National Association of Student Governments (NASG), and adults representing groups such as Aleteen, the National Parent Teacher Association, and the National Association of Secondary School Principals (NASSP).

## May 21 is Deadline

### For Tobacco Insurance

May 21 is the deadline for farmers to apply for federal crop insurance for burley tobacco. The insurance is issued through the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIA), a non-profit organization of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Tobacco can be insured against all natural disasters, including drought, freeze, hail, wind, fire, disease and too much moisture. The insurance features a

65% guarantee of the farmer's poundage quota plus lease-in poundage times the current year's average support price.

Premiums have not increased its guaranteed price 6.5% over last year's 79 cents per pound. This year the guaranteed price is about 84.5 cents per pound and the farmer does not have to pay the premium until after he has sold his crop.

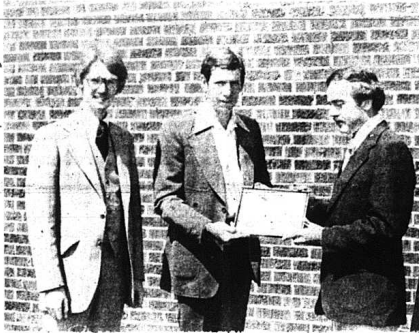

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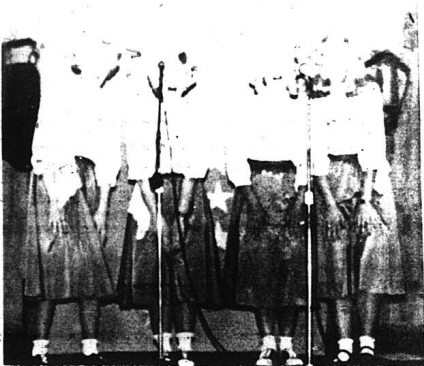

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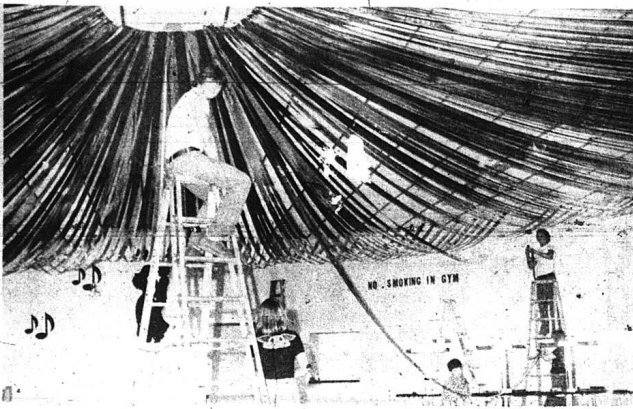

## Fishing Report

Fair to good bluegill fishing was reported from several of Kentucky's larger lakes this past weekend, along with generally fair catches of black bass and crappie. The lake-by-lake run-down, as compiled by the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources:

**Kentucky:** crappie fair over submerged cover and around stick ups; catfish fair still fishing along rip rap; in tailwaters, catfish fair, white bass, crappie and sauger slow to fair; murky to muddy, falling, one foot above summer pool and 70 degrees.

**Barkley:** crappie fair, along brush line; black bass slow and improving on spinner baits in inlets and bays; in tailwaters, catfish and white bass fair; murky to muddy, falling, one foot above summer pool and 68 degrees.

**Barren:** bluegill good in inlets and bays; crappie fair over submerged cover; black bass slow to fair on crank baits off points and in inlets and bays; clear, falling, 5.5 feet above summer pool and 68 degrees.

**Nolin:** bluegill good off rocky banks; black bass good on crank baits and artificial nightcrawlers off points and along shallow banks; clear, stable at summer pool and 70 degrees.

**Rough River:** bluegill fair in inlets and bays; crappie slow in timbered coves; clear, falling, 12 feet above summer pool and 69 degrees.

**Herrington:** white bass fair during the day trolling medium runners with trailers and at night off deep banks; bluegill fair off deep banks; clear, stable at three feet below summer pool and 73 degrees.

**Green:** black bass fair on surface lures and artificial night-crawlers off points and over drop offs; crappie fair over submerged cover; in tailwaters, trout fair; clear to murky, stable at 11.5 feet above summer pool and 72 degrees.

**Cumberland:** black bass fair on surface and shallow runners in inlets and bays; crappie slow to fair over submerged cover; white bass and crappie fair night fishing off rocky points, in tailwaters, trout fair to good; clear, to murky, stable at timberline and 69 degrees.

**Laurel:** trout good night fishing off deep banks; black bass slow and improving on artificial nightcrawlers off points and in timbered coves; clear to murky, stable at 1.5 feet below power pool and 72 degrees.

**Dale Hollow:** bluegill good around willow bushes and drift piles; walleye fair still fishing nightcrawlers over points and mud flats; clear, falling, 1.5 feet above summer pool and 68 degrees.

**Cave Run:** musky fair casting medium runners off shallow banks, crappie fair over submerged cover and around stickups; clear to murky, falling, two feet above summer pool and 70 degrees.

**Grayson:** crappie fair over submerged cover and around stick ups; bluegill fair in inlets and bays; in tailwaters, trout slow; clear to murky, stable at summer pool and 70 degrees.

**Dewey:** crappie fair around stick ups; bluegill fair in inlets and bays and along deep banks; clear to murky, stable at summer pool and 70 degrees.

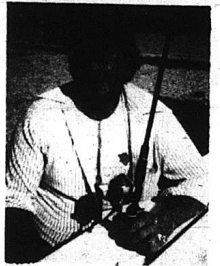
**Fishtrap:** crappie slow around stick ups; bluegill slow in inlets

and bays; clear, stable at summer pool and 67 degrees.

**Buckhorn:** black bass on crank baits off shallow points; crappie fair off shallow banks; in tailwaters, catfish slow; clear to murky to muddy, stable at summer pool and 72 degrees.

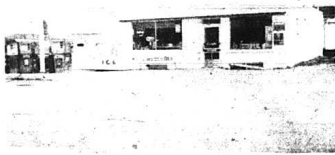

Three Legislators Deserve Siberia

No doubt some unrelenting skeptics around Kentucky will raise an eyebrow over the proposed trip of three state legislators to the Soviet Union at a cost of \$3,300 to state taxpayers.

After all, these skeptics will contend, trips abroad by U.S. congressmen are bad enough. Trips abroad by state legislators smack of nothing more than vacations at public expense. What can these men possibly learn that will help Kentuckians?

That's a fair question. An examination of the answers should leave these skeptics - and the state's taxpayers - with little doubt about the value of the trip.

The trip could also be a boost for the state's economy. The Russians, of course, are known for their vodka. Perhaps they would be willing to take advantage of Kentuckians' expertise with bourbon and set up a vodka distillery in Frankfort. Naturally, the distillery would provide employment for state residents... Like former state legislators drummed out of office for vacationing at taxpayers' expense.

# Kentucky Afield

By John Wilson

The regulations governing the taking of frogs have several unusual features, and with the season opening May 15, now is a good time to review those rules.

First, the legal "day" for determining bag limits is from noon to noon. This means that the daily limit of 15 frogs is a maximum that can be taken in any single night.

If the "day" followed the normal midnight to midnight pattern, the hunter could legally take 15 frogs before midnight, then start on another daily limit after the clock struck 12.

However, the season itself opens at 12:01 a.m. on May 15, so those who want to get an early start on frog hunting will have to stay up late.

Licensing requirements are also rather unusual. If you gig frogs (the most popular method) or catch them by hand, either a hunting or fishing license is ok. Of you use a firearm or a bow and arrow (crossbows, by the way, are not used) a hunting license is required. If you attempt to catch them on a hook and line, you must have a fishing license.

If you have both a hunting and a fishing license or a combination license, you can use any of the above methods.

The possession limit on bullfrogs is after two or more days of hunting. A person may not have more than the daily limit (15) in possession while in the field.

The frog season runs through October 31. Like most seasons, there is a flurry of activity during the first week or so, after which many froggers quit for the year. Until the middle of summer when they have the waters to themselves.

Bullfrogs are distributed throughout Kentucky and can be found just about wherever there is water—ponds, streams, swamps, large springs, lakes or even big drainage ditches.

Although some public waters are a lot of fun with froggers, it should be possible to scout out several untapped sources of fresh frog legs. Just be sure to ask permission before entering private property. A landowner who has to get up in the middle of the night to investigate strange lights down by a pond isn't going to be in the best of moods.

A final word of caution—if you hunt frogs with a 22, remember that these bullets can ricochet off the surface of water and travel up to a mile. Shot shells for 22 firearms are available. These are not only safer but also less the changes of missing the frog.

**Recipe for Homemade Calf Scours Remedy**  
Beef cattle producers and dairymen can mix up their own remedy for treating newborn calves that get sick with diarrhea.

The homemade formula recommended by Extension veterinarians in the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture, is made from ingredients off the grocery store shelf. Ingredients for one treatment costs about 75 cents. The recipe: 1 1/2 oz. (1 pkg.) fruit pectin, 1 tsp. Litesalt, 2 tsp. baking soda, 10 1/2 oz. (1 can) beef consommé and enough water to make 2 quarts of mixture.

It is an effective calf scours remedy because the formula replaces lost fluids, restores a normal acid-base balance and furnishes nutrients to the body.

Fruit pectin contains dextrose for energy and pectin to soothe the calf's inflamed gut. Litesalt supplies the electrolytes—sodium, potassium and chloride. Baking soda supplies more sodium plus bicarbonate ions and neutralizes excess acid. Beef consommé, a concentrated soup, is a ready source of amino acids and additional electrolytes.

The formula is palatable, and most calves will voluntarily nurse it from a bottle. Recommendations are that two quarts be fed two or three times daily to a calf weighing 80 lbs. or more, with the frequency depending on the degree

of scours. Fresh water should be provided for the calf at all times. The formula diet should be continued for 24 hours after diarrhea stops. If the calf has been nursing a cow, milk the cow out

just before returning her calf. A publication, containing more information about diarrhea of newborn calves, is available at the County Extension Office. It is VET-22, written by Duane Miksch, Extension veterinarian in the University of Kentucky College of

Agriculture. The publication includes the homemade remedy formula, explains the principles used in treating calf scours, and preventive measures. It emphasizes the following points: Diarrhea of newborn calves has varied and complex

times complicated origins. Microbial and environmental elements are often interrelated. The first line of defense is to make sure the calf gets colostrum. Primary output of treatment is maintaining normal physiology. Antibiotics and vaccines

should be used only as prescribed after a diagnosis by your veterinarian. A catch for armoring larvae to begin showing up in wheat fields; increasing mosquito and tick problems as people move outdoors.

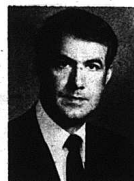
