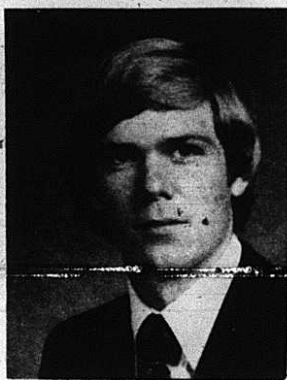

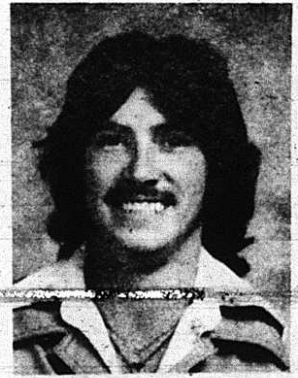

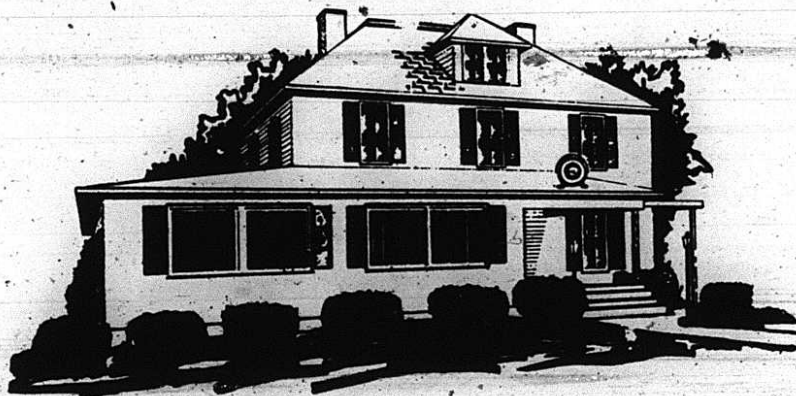

Geologists Study Rocks on I-75 In Search of Ancient Earthquake

The rocks around here are very special to geologists. In fact, last week 22 geologists from all parts of the world were studying one rock formation at the 61-mile marker on I-75, one mile from Mt. Vernon. They climbed the 30-story cliff on the opposite side of the road to view the formation better, and then they hammered out pieces of shale and lime to examine under magnifying glasses that they wore around their necks like whistles.

The experts could look at the simple dark gray shale and tell you about prehistoric animals, ice ages, and swamps that have come and gone. And when they looked at the cliff on the other side of the road, they could speculate about an earthquake that might have happened 250 million years ago in a region that covers three states.

"This particular cliff is really exotic to us," Norm Hester, University of Kentucky geologist, said. He pointed out a split near the top of the formation where the earth had been disturbed by a catastrophic event. "We think it was an earthquake, and this particular formation shows it best." The practical significance of such a quake is that it may have weakened the rocks at a certain level in the area, thus interfering with coal mining someday.

He is married to the former Phyllis Noe, also a graduate of Mt. Vernon High School. Mrs. Coffey, who has a degree from Eastern Kentucky University, will be helping her husband at his new office.

Tuesday's Primary Election May Bring Big Turn-out: Several Campaigns Generating Local Interest

Local election officials are expecting a large voter turn-out for next Tuesday's (May 29) primary. "There's a lot of interest in the governor's race," Irene Bales, County Clerk, said, "and also the one for state representative." Polling places will be open from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. at locations listed at the end of this article. Only those who have registered either Republican or Democrat can vote in this election.

Mrs. Bales said, that 5,357 Republicans and 1,562 Democrats have registered in Rockcastle County, bringing the total of 6,948 potential voters next Tuesday.

The Republican primary for state representative will decide the choice for the position, as no Democrats have entered this race. Joe Lambert, a 31-year-old Mt. Vernon attorney, is running

against Rep. Harold DeMarcus, the Republican floor leader for the past ten years and representative since 1967. The 80th District covers Rockcastle, Lincoln and part of Pulaski counties.

The county Republican party has not endorsed any candidates for the primary, although some of them who campaigned locally have appeared with local Republican leaders. Ray B. White came to Mt. Vernon in April, as part of his campaign for governor. The former state senator is running against Louie B. Nunn, who was governor in 1968.

Other Republican candidates are Elmer Beley, Jr. and Thurman Jerome Hamlin.

The Democrats have a nine-way race for the nomination for governor, although one candidate, George Atkins, has withdrawn, and three candidates, John Weikel, Lyle Willis and Doris Binion, are not well-known. The county Democrats have endorsed Terry McBrayer, the former state commissioner of commerce, although there has been some local support of Mr. Atkins and Carroll Hubbard. All three made campaign appearances in the county.

Mr. Hubbard is a U.S. Congressman.

Other candidates are Thelma Stovall, the lieutenant governor; Harvey Sibane, former mayor of Louisville; and John Y. Brown, a businessman.

In the race for lieutenant governor, Harold Rogers, commonwealth attorney in Rockcastle and Pulaski counties, is the lead-

Mt. Vernon Used As Example of Progress In 'Appalachian Magazine' Article

Mt. Vernon was used as an example of progress made in an Appalachian community in the April 1979 issue of Appalachian Magazine. The article, written by Doris Denkin, was written in support of the funding of the Appalachian Regional Commission, a federal agency established in 1965 and designed to help 397 counties in this part of the United States.

The part about Mt. Vernon says, "This is one story of how the people of Appalachia have reversed the trends of 14 years ago to build for themselves a future more to their liking. Similar stories have occurred all over Appalachia."

Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, population 2,500 or 3,000 if you count the suburbs has a new industrial park. A new industry has leased space in the park. "I'll mean 250 jobs at first," Mt. Vernon banker Bill James says. "Eventually it may mean on-side jobs for six or eight hundred people. There's a lot of elation here."

Down town, there's a building boom. The Bank of Mt. Vernon, on Main Street, had a facelift recently. The bank is bigger now and a lot brighter. A 30-year-old lawyer, a native, has built a new three-story (two floors plus basement) law center. And a young dentist, who settled in Mt. Vernon and recently persuaded two other young dentists to come to town to

share a practice with him, has bought and plans to renovate a building near the bank.

There are lots of farms around Mt. Vernon. The town has a new water supply, a new 20-acre recreational park, even a new Burger Queen, the first fast-food franchise in Rockcastle County.

In discussing the industrial development of the region, the writer goes on to use Mt. Vernon as an example.

Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, there is for instance needed economic diversity. Farms in the area weren't showing profits. To attract industry, Mt. Vernon citizens would have to do some unfamiliar- maybe ungenial, too-chores. They'd have to acquire land. They'd have to bring in water and sewer lines. They'd have to put together a proposal to ask ARC's help. There was some nay-saying and jobs at first," Mt. Vernon banker Bill James says. "Cintas will be the largest employer in the county. We have another prospect, too. A steel fabricator, is interested in coming to Mt. Vernon. It will employ 40 to 45 people." There are dozens of similar examples.

Dealers Receive 9% Less Gasoline For Their May 1979 Allocations

Kentucky's gasoline suppliers are receiving 9 percent less gasoline this month than they did in May 1978, but a state gasoline set-aside program has eased the crunch for some customers.

The set-aside plan for gasoline was established by the U.S. Department of Energy under the federal mandatory petroleum allocation program. Individual states are responsible for drawing up specific guidelines for the set-aside program, and Kentucky's DOE receives 3 percent of the gasoline provided to the state by 32 prime suppliers for the plan.

Kentucky's DOE energy distribution division received 100 requests in April for allocation assistance. Ralph Dennis of the distribution staff says they've heard that many appeals during the first half of May.

Damon Harrison, commissioner of DOE's bureau of energy management, said two additional DOE employees have temporarily been assigned to the distribution offices to help field calls from Kentuckians whose gasoline supplies are running low.

The 3 percent gasoline set-aside plan "so far has been adequate to take care of the problems in Kentucky," Commissioner Harrison said. Any fuel remaining in the set-aside at the end of a month is returned to the suppliers, he added.

How many gallons does the 3 percent set-aside give DOE for allocations? Dennis says the exact number of gallons is confidential. He said supplying gas companies are only obligated to report to DOE 100 percent of what they

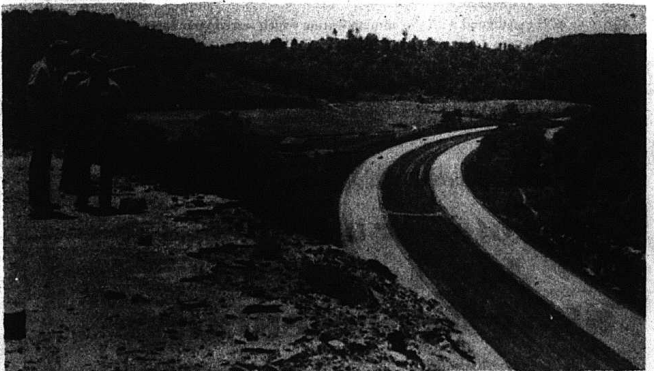
supplied to the state during corresponding months in the base period. Dennis said conceivably there could be more gas at the pumps in the commonwealth than the Department realizes.

Set-aside benefits are available to customers who buy gasoline in bulk and have storage capacities on their property. Customers requesting assistance from the allocations plan must also be allocation base period customers.

Rev. War Soldier's Grave Marked

The Rockcastle Chapter, DAR, met Sunday, April 29, on the farm of Mrs. Logan Debord near Plato in Pulaski County, for the dedication of a marker at the grave of John Evans, a Sergeant-Major in the Revolutionary War.
 The small family cemetery was located on a hillside overlooking the homestead in the valley below. Dogwood and mayapple grew in abundance where two intricately-carved stones stood attesting the spot where John and Eleanor Evans were buried. A date near the bottom of one stone indicated the marker had been erected in 1856. The headstone of Evans had been broken and lay nearby, but that of his wife was in good condition and easily read: "Eleanor wife of Capt. John Evans (he served in this capacity during the War of 1812) died the 14th day

of Sept., 1826." The bottom portion of the other stone gave his death as the 9th day of Feb., 1839.

Mrs. Debord had sought some sort of recognition for this old soldier for many years, and at last through the efforts of her daughter, Mrs. Bessie Noe, and good friend, Mrs. Mary E. Adams, the Rockcastle Chapter was contacted for substantiation of military records. The Chapter immediately found records of Evans' service and proceeded to send for the granite marker provided by the Veteran's Administration and set by Bro. Homer McNew.

A crowd of around fifty friends and neighbors of Mrs. Debord attended the dedication ceremony in addition to Chapter members and their families. Miss Thelma Cawood, Historian, Kentucky Society, DAR, and Mr. Raymond Layne, Historian, Kentucky Society, SAR, assisted with the dedication. Young people from Rockcastle County who helped in the dedication were Tim Young, James Edward Mullins, Felti Towery, Scott Henderson, Dyeche Mullins, Eric and Ethan Eversole.

Legislative News

Spring in Kentucky provides one of the most beautiful sights that can ever be seen. Nature's colors are so clearly defined, it's the time of year when it rains while the sun is shining.

Fields of a deep green hue topped by yellow wildflowers run into stands of lilac colored crab apple and soft white dogwood trees. Rivers of a clear green flow under a sky that is as blue as a cornflower sapphire.
 You can hear four or five different kinds of birds singing at the same time and the air is as fresh and crisp as a Mother's Day corsage.

There is a problem developing in the state and federal governments that is as easily recognized as the signs of spring. The problem is the massive amount of regulations and laws and the resulting expansion of government workers to carry them out that touches virtually every aspect of our everyday lives.

In addition to tax laws and moral laws, we have state and federal regulations that oversee everything from plumbers to parks and campgrounds.

The federal stripmine regulations have proven to be so complex that Kentucky coal productivity has suffered. These regulations are so complex that the General Assembly was forced to enact legislation that will provide state funds to allow Department for Natural Resources to aid small coal operators in complying with the new laws.

Kentucky alone has over thirty regulatory boards and commissions that are funded by your tax dollars. There are some regulatory boards that are needed, such as the Kentucky board of dentistry and the Kentucky board of pharmacy. However, to exemplify one of the problem areas, this year the state harness racing commission requested a \$1,500 personal service contract to aid in the promotion of harness racing. (Cont.)

PRESCRIPTION DRUG ABUSE BY WOMEN

There are more than 5 million women in the United States that are taking mood altering prescription drugs. A government survey showed that, in comparison with men, women use twice as many valium and librium, three times as many amphetamines and 50% more barbituates.

Many factors have led up to this growing woman's problem. For one thing, women generally visit a physician twice as often as men (women in the child-bearing age usually have more genuine medical problems than men). Also, they tend to be more open than men about feelings and moods. This has led physicians to treat the tensions, moods, and daily problems a woman describes with drugs. The physicians know what they are doing when prescribing these drugs, but the patient does not know what they are doing when they don't take these drugs as they are prescribed. Always follow your prescription to the letter when taking any medication.

Cumberland River Comprehensive Care Center and the Growth and Research Organization for Women will conduct a workshop on Prescription Drug Abuse at Corbin, Ky. in June, 1979. 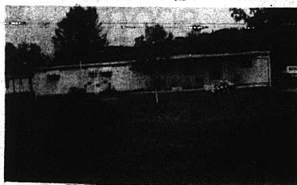

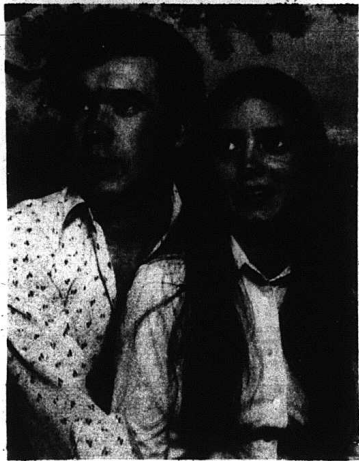

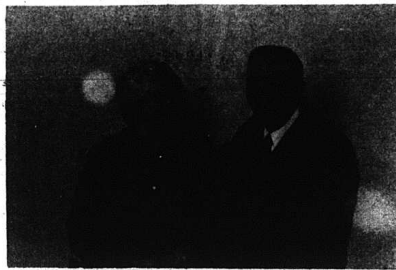

appears to have been served at the distal end of the petiole. Nothing can be done to control this pest at this stage. Even destroying the fallen leaves is useless since the larvae remains in the petiole attached to the twig. If this problem appears to be fairly severe and occurs year after year, one might try applying one of the systemic insecticides registered for control of other pests on shade trees early next spring just before the leaves begin to unroll.

Several reports of the leaves on pin oak trees being deformed into folded-up irregular masses have been received recently. This is being caused by the woolly fold gall midge. Again, no treatment is recommended at this time but you might consider the treatment described above for the maple petiole borer.

Linden looper has been reported causing heavy defoliation to oak trees in the south central area of the state. These larvae can feed on a large range of deciduous trees, including linden, apple, birch, elm, hickory, maple and oak. The larvae possess two pairs of prolegs and move with a looping motion. In general they have several thin, irregular, wavy, dark lines running down their backs, with light yellow undersides and a yellow head, although the intensity of their coloring may vary. Methoxychlor is registered for control of this pest and Malathion and Bacillus thuringiensis could also be used. European corn borer moths are beginning to emerge.

Expect problems with: Cutworms on corn, tobacco, and various garden plants; imported cabbageworms on cabbage and other cruciferas; bees swarming; Colorado potato beetles damaging potatoes; ticks and mosquitoes bothering hikers and campers.

Watch for: flea beetles on corn; armyworms in wheat; increase in face fly populations; the emergence of the Mexican bean beetle; aphids to begin infesting rose bushes; the hatching of bagworm eggs; and spittle bug problems on strawberries.

Pest News Alert

Be Aware That: A fungus disease is infecting alfalfa weevil larvae in epidemic proportions in many areas of the state. Anyone still considering treating for the alfalfa weevil should examine their fields for dead larvae that have turned very dark brown and are hanging on or draped over the leaves and stems on the alfalfa. Treatment would not be required if the incidence of the disease is fairly high or appears to be increasing.

The maple petiole borer is causing the leaves of various types of maples to discolor, wilt and eventually fall off. Upon examination one finds that the leaf

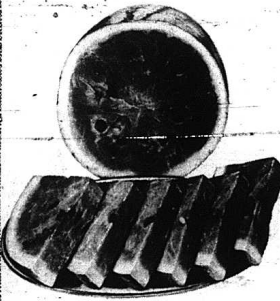

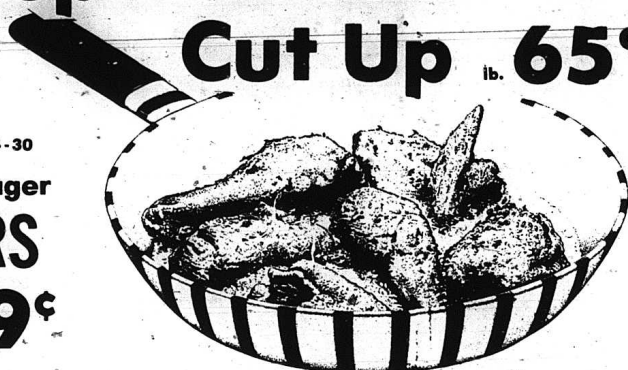

Fishing Report

Fishing for black bass and bluegill continues to improve with good catches for both to be found in several locations. The lake-by-lake rundown, according to the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources:

Green: crappie fair over submerged cover and around stick ups; bluegill slow off gravel points; in tailwaters, crappie and trout fair; clear, stable, 1-3 feet above summer pool and 74 degrees.

Rough River: bluegill slow and improving on the south fork in inlets and bays and off deep banks; crappie slow around stick ups; clear to murky, falling, eight feet above summer pool and 72 degrees.

Dewey: crappie slow to fair over submerged cover and around stick ups; clear to murky, stable at summer pool and 70 degrees.

Fishtrap: crappie slow over submerged cover and around stick ups; in tailwaters, white bass slow; clear, stable at summer pool and 74 degrees.

Barren: bluegill good in inlets and bays; white bass good at night off rocky points and deep banks on the lower lake; crappie fair on the upper lake over submerged cover; clear, falling slowly, four feet above summer pool and 74 degrees.

Nolin: bluegill good off shallow banks and over submerged cover; white bass good at night off rocky points and medium deep banks; black bass slow to fair on artificial nightcrawlers off medium deep banks; clear, stable at summer pool and 73 degrees.

Laurel: bluegill good off shallow banks; trout good at night still fishing nightcrawlers off deep banks; clear, falling slowly, two feet below power pool and 73 degrees.

Dale Hollow: bluegill good still fishing worms off deep banks and drift piles; walleye fair still fishing big minnows and nightcrawlers off points and deep banks; clear, falling slowly, six inches above summer pool and 72 degrees.

Herrington: White bass good at night off rocky points and deep banks; crappie fair to good at night off rocky points and deep banks; clear, stable, four feet below summer pool and 74 degrees.

Buckhorn: black bass fair to good on crank baits off rocky points; crappie fair casting small spinners and still fishing minnows over submerged cover; in tailwaters, catfish and trout slow; clear, stable at summer pool and 76 degrees.

Cave Run: black bass fair on medium runners off deep banks and around stick ups; musky fair casting and trolling medium runners over channel drop-offs; clear, stable at summer pool and 72 degrees.

Grayson: crappie fair over submerged cover and around stick ups; bluegill fair in inlets and bays; in tailwaters, crappie fair; clear, stable at summer pool and 73 degrees.

Cumberland: black bass fair on the lower lake on surface lures

and buzz baits off points and in inlets and bays; white bass and crappie slow to fair off deep banks; in tailwaters, trout fair to good; clear, two feet below the timberline and 71 degrees.

Green: crappie fair over submerged cover and around stick ups; bluegill slow off gravel points; in tailwaters, crappie and trout fair; clear, stable, 1-3 feet above summer pool and 74 degrees.

Rough River: bluegill slow and improving on the south fork in inlets and bays and off deep banks; crappie slow around stick ups; clear to murky, falling, eight feet above summer pool and 72 degrees.

Dewey: crappie slow to fair over submerged cover and around stick ups; clear to murky, stable at summer pool and 70 degrees.

Fishtrap: crappie slow over submerged cover and around stick ups; in tailwaters, white bass slow; clear, stable at summer pool and 74 degrees.

period in Kentucky is Nov. 1, 1977 thru October 31, 1978. The amount of gasoline purchased by a customer in one month of the period is guaranteed to the customer during the same month of subsequent years.

Most of the requests for additional gasoline have come from the commonwealth's farmers who, along with the Department of Defense, are eligible to receive 100 percent of the fuel they currently require.

Harrison attributes the strain on the agriculture industry to a late planting season. Due to an unusually wet and chilly April

most farmers began the bulk of their plowing and field work this year in May.

Last year, during the allocation base period, the planting pattern occurred in late March and April, causing an increased demand for fuel during that time. While Kentucky's fields are being plowed and planted this year during May, demand for gas on farms is high while allocations are small when compared with last May's supplies.

The second group eligible for set-aside benefits are those guaranteed 100 percent of their base period allotments. Allocations, however, may be reduced by a fraction as set by the supplier. Included in this class are emergency services, medical and nursing buildings, sanitation services, energy production companies, transportation services including school bus systems, aviation ground support, transportation of perishable foods, telecommunications services and cargo freight and mail transportation.

The fraction by which a customer's gasoline supply is cut is determined by the fraction by which the supplier's stock is reduced by the company. Kentucky's DOE is using set-aside gasoline to assist hardship cases affected by the fraction reduction.

Dennis said the state's set-aside supply "is more than adequate now to lessen the strain on customers whose gas suppliers have been cut, although federal energy guidelines do not require them to do so. "There may come a point in time where we won't be able to do that (make up the reduction fraction through set-aside)," Dennis said.

Customers in the third class are those who are eligible to receive only their base allocations which are subject to fraction reductions. They include industry, commercial businesses, government and social services.

Dennis says several retail gasoline outlets have requested allocations assistance. "The only way we can help them is if they are receiving less than 50 percent (of their base period) allocation."

Many of the gasoline stations in the state have been placed on 80 percent allocation by their suppliers, one-fifth less than the amount of gas they received this time last year. Dennis says DOE will only provide assistance to retail outlets in special instances, such as rural areas who are served by one or two stations where supplies are low. "We won't let an area go without the product," he said.

So far, propane and gasoline are the only two fuels on allocation. The propane allocation plan establishes a supplier-purchaser relationship and determines pricing for the product. There is not priority classifications or eligibility standards yet for the propane set-aside program. "There's plenty of it around," Dennis said. "So

there's no problem."

Kentucky also participates in a voluntary set-aside program designed by USDOE for fuels not on allocation. The state's DOE sets aside 4 percent of all No. 2 oil, kerosene and diesel fuel brought into the state.

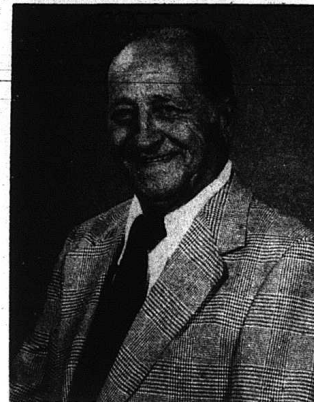

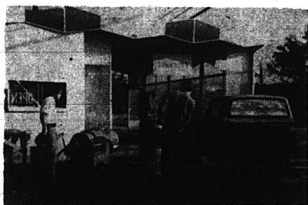

During the month of April, the Kentucky State Police Post at London reports the following activity:

A total of 189 traffic accidents

78 motorists were arrested for driving while under the influence of intoxicants; 94 criminal investigations were made resulting in 240 criminal arrests; 28 stolen vehicles were recovered; 1,118 persons at tended 33 safety programs conducted by the Kentucky State Police.

86 motorists were issued citations for moving hazardous violations, 15 motorists were issued citations for other traffic violations; 51 motorists were issued warning for faulty equipment and different traffic violations; 42 motorists were assisted with tourist information, breakdowns, etc.; 21 total traffic accidents were investigated; 7 were personal injury accidents; there no fatal accidents; 15 persons were injured and no persons were killed.

Six motorists were arrested for driving while under the influence of intoxicants; 9 criminal investigations were made resulting in 18 criminal arrests; one stolen vehicle was recovered; 353 persons at tended 14 safety programs conducted by the Kentucky State Police.

Consumer Comments

Today's consumers must be ever cautious to avoid becoming rip-off victims. But the risk of being ripped-off in the insurance game is particularly high for consumers who live in the southern and eastern U.S. and have little education and low incomes.

These people can easily be taken advantage of and are often conned into buying debit or "industrial" life insurance. With this type of insurance, premiums, usually not more than a few dollars, are collected weekly or monthly for policies offering limited protection, according to a Federal Trade Commission staff report. The report concludes that ownership of multiple policies is common. Since the policies are marketed primarily to low-income consumers, some buyers must skimp on food to pay their premiums.

Most of the debit industry's consumer abuses cited in the report apply to industrial policies, so named because they were originally marketed to 19th century English industrial workers. Some abuses listed in the report are: "Overloading," where insurance agents encourage policyholders to buy more insurance than they really need or can afford. Even with multiple policies, many buyers' total insurance coverage is well below the national average.

Agents advising parents to buy life insurance policies for their children's education, but neglecting to mention that the policies usually don't pay back as much as is invested and that the full face amount is paid only if the child dies.

Agents convincing customers that if they cash in an old policy and use part of the money to pay the first premium on a new policy, they will have both cash and a new policy. This is misleading because if the old policy is less than 5 years old, it cannot surrender any cash benefits and the customer can lose all or part of their old policy's investment.

Although insurance companies conceded that this type of abuse takes place occasionally, some former employees of the companies insist such abuses are common and in some cases the agent's bosses know about them but do nothing to prevent them.

State regulation of debit insurance has usually been less strict than the regulation of ordinary policies. This is because some state regulators feel that without debit insurance poor people would not be able to get any insurance, so they are reluctant to take any action against the companies or agents. Also, most state insurance regulators have neither enough time or staff to go after the agents and companies guilty of these abuses.

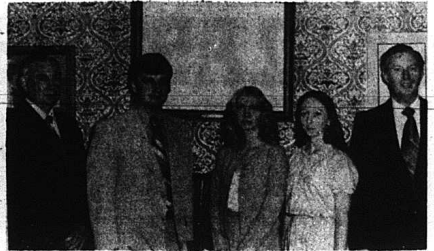

ROBERT CROMER TALKS ABOUT PROPERTY TAXES

In a recent issue of the Mt. Vernon Signal, your present representative, Mr. DeMarcus, commented on property taxes in Rockcastle and surrounding counties. In that article, he failed to point out certain VERY IMPORTANT facts. To help the people of Rockcastle County better understand the property tax situation, I submit the following information from the official state records in Frankfort:

1. Your present representative voted for a bill which permits a 4% INCREASE in property taxes, House Bill 44.
2. The official record shows that he co-sponsored and voted for a law requiring the PVA to re-assess all property in his jurisdiction every two years.
3. The same law requires the PVA to assess all property at 100% or fair cash value, whichever is higher.
4. This law requires that one-half of all real property must be physically inspected by the PVA each year.

The effect of these changes, which your present representative voted for, could result in a tax increase much greater than 4%.

I have always tried to protect the taxpayers of Rockcastle County to the best of my ability and treat you with courtesy and respect. This has been difficult however with a representative who votes for property tax increases as shown by the official record.
