

Local election officials are expecting a large voter turnout for net Tuesday's (May 29) primary.

"There's a lot of interest in the governor's race." Irene Bales, County Clerk, said, "and also the one for state representative."

Polling places will be open from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. at locations. Listed at the end of this article. Only those who have registered either Republican or Democrat can vote in this election.

Geologists Study Rocks on 1-75 In Search of Ancient Earthquake

The rocks around here are very special to geologists.

In fact, last week 22 geologists from all parts of the world were studying one rock formation at the formation. The geologists were from Belgium, Canada, France, Great Britiann, India, Japan, Poland, and Thailand. Over 1000 were in the United States for the Ninth International Congress of Carbonifernasis Carboniferna

The trip to Kentucky lasted six days and was led by geologists from the 'Kentucky Geological Survey, the University of Kentucky Department of Geology, and Morehead State University.

Most of those who opted to come to Kentucky were from countries similar to this region geologically.

One of them, S.Z. Stopa, a professor from Poland and an expert on prehistoric plants, was identifying fossils in the area. He said that the snake-like fossil a road crew discovered on Hwy. 25 was not a snake but a tree with a scaley bark. (That fossil was pictured in the Signal several weeks ago.)



Every bass fisherman dreams of catching a stringer full of fat and sassy three-to four-pound largemounts, with a couple of lunkers-seven and eight pound fish--thrown in for good measure. Although this dream occasion-

ish-thrown in for good measure.
Although this dream occasionally comes true, the actual situation is quite a bit different. On a national basis, according to figures compiles by the Sport Fishing Institute (SFI) and based on scientifically collected date from the various states, an average catch is one "keeper" bass for every 20 to 30 hours of fishing. Calculates that, on the average, every square foot of potential bass habitat is fished at least three times each season. If all the waters in the nation which could harbor bass were divided among all the fishermen, each angler would have to depend "upon the productivity of only % of an drer of water to satisfy his annual recreational fishing needs," the SFI som these sobering figures that enormous angling pressure is being exerted on bass populations and that some means of regulation bass harvest must be imposed if any kind of quality fishing is going to be maintained at all.

"Among the tools available to

'Among the tools available to

"Among the tools available to fisheries managers," the SFI re-port concludes, "none offers more potential for improving bass, yields and angling quality than appropriate minimum size lim-its."

its."

Kentucky is entering its second season with what the SFI considers an "appropriate" minimum size limit-12 inches. Biologist: who work closely with bass can already see the difference, particularly in smaller lakes and ponds (always the first to respond to chances in management). to changes in management).

Bass fishermen should also be

Bass fishermen should also be able to note a change, according to Kentucky's Fisheries Director Charlie Bowers. Bowers predicts that both the total number of bass caught and the total pounds of bass harvested will increase this

year.

Bowers says that anglers should notice an increase in the average size of the bass they catch this spring. Even the fish they must return to the water will be larger-10 and 11 inches instead of eight or nine, as was common under the 10-inch limit.

under the 10-inch limit.
Although the new size limit.is.
still under evaluation, bioligists
still under evaluation, bioligists
feel it is working as predicted and
the quality of bass fishing will
continue to improve.
But like other fish and game
laws, Bowers says, this one will
work only if fishermen observe it.
Keeping undersized, bass is not

Teday's consumers must be ever cautious to avoid® becoming rip-off victums. But the risk of being ripped-off in the insurance game is much greater for consumers who live in the southern and easter U.S. and have little education and low incomes.

These people can easily be taken advantage of and are often conned into buying debit or "industrial" life insurance. With this type of insurance, premiums, upon a collected than a few dollars, are collected than a few dollars, are collected to a consumer of the commission staff report. The commission staff report concludes that ownership of multiple policies is common. Since the policies are marketed primarily to low-income consumers, some buyers must skimp on food to pay their premiums.

Most of the debit industry's consumer abuses cited in the report apply to industrial policies, so named because they were originally marketed to 19th century English industrial workers. Some abuses listed in the report are:

abuse in the control of the control of

Agents convincing customers that if they cash in an old policy and use part of the money to pay the first premium on a new policy, they will have both cash and a new policy. This is misleading because if the old policy is less than 5 years old, it cannot surrender any cash benefits and the customers can lose all or part of thier old policy's investment.

Although insurance com-panies conceded that this type of abuse takes place occasionally, some former employees of the companies insist such abuses are common and in some cases the agent's bosses know about them but do nothing to prevent them.

State regulation of debit in-surance has usually been less strict than regulation of ordinary pol-cies. This is because some state regulators feel that without debit insurance poor people would not be able to get any insurance, so they are reluctant to take any action against the companies or agents. Also, most state insurance regulators have neither enough time or staff to go after the agents and companies guilty of these abuses.

ROBERT CROMER TALKS ABOUT PROPERTY TAXES

In a recent issue of the Mt. Vernon Signal, your present representative, Mr. DeMarcus, commented on property taxes in Rockcastle and surrounding counties. In that article, he failed to point out certain VERY IMPORTANT facts. To help the people of Rockcastle County better understand the property tax situation, I submit the following information from the official state records in Frankfort:

- 1. Your present representative voted for a bill which permits a 4% INCREASE in property taxes, House Bill 44.
- 2. The official record shows that he co-sponsored and voted for a law requiring the PVA to re-assess all property in his jurisdiction every two years.
- 3. The same law requires the PVA to assess all property at 100% or fair cash value, whichever is higher.
- 4. This law requires that one-half of all real property must be physically inspected by the PVA each year."

The effect of these changes, which your present representative voted for, could result in a tax increase much greater than 4%.

I have always tried to protect the taxpayers of Rockcastle County to the best of my ability and treat you with courtesy and respect. This has been difficult however with a representative who votes for property tax increases as shewn by the official record.
