Commonwealth of Kentucky To Honor Col. Jim Maret

In the very near future the Commonwealth of Kentucky will award Colonel Jim Maret with a long overdue honor when it erects an historical highway marker in the Courthouse yard. The marker will tell the story of Colonel Maret's mammoth achievement, the building of the Boone Way, Kentucky's first paved highway extending from Crab Orchard to the Cumberland Gap. The Boone Way, Colonel Maret's innovation was introduced by Col. Maret to the Mt. Vernon Commercial Club on January 2, 1913, asking for their support. Naturally, the members of the club and the town at large thought the old Colonel had "lost his marbles." Two years later work was started on the road and it was in use by early 1918.

transplant from Garrard County. He migrated to Rockcastle County on August 1, 1877. His employment station agent and telegraph operator for the Louisville and Nashville Railroad. During his forty year tenure in Rockcastle County he was responsible for many "first happenings". He brought the first typewriter, adding machine and telephone. He installed the first telephone exchange, founded the first newspaper, received the first parcel post package and sent the first air mail letter in the Bluegrass. He was probably Rockcastle's first Kentucky Colonel, received the first honorary lifetime membership in the Kentucky Press Association and was the first honorary member of the Boone Family Association. In addition to this he held honorary membership in nearly every Road Association in the U.S. as he was considered an

authority on highways and their conditions nationwide. In 1916 Colonel Maret moved on Winchester, and later in 1921 he located in Lexington where he served as executive secretary of Kentucky's Good Roads Association but he's always had a soft spot in his heart for Mt. Vernon, "Home of the Boone Way," and spoke of it as "home". When I started doing research for "The Boone Way Man" in 1971, I never realized I would uncover a wealth of material on a real 20th century pioneer, a man far ahead of his time. I'm glad now that I did for the research led to this historical marker and saved Colonel Maret from oblivion.

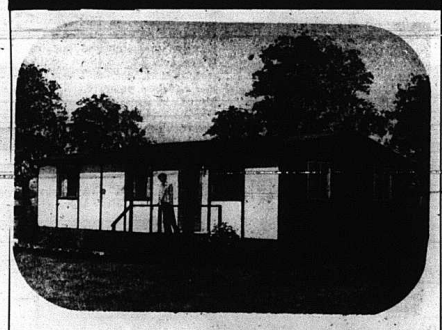

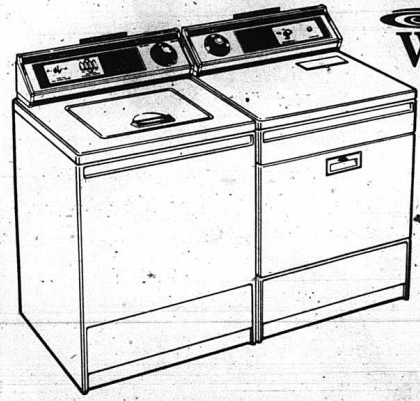

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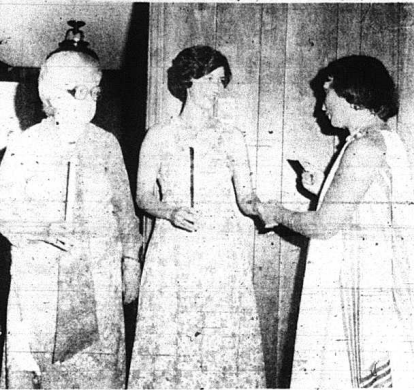

FOOD STAMP ALLOTMENTS TO INCREASE JULY 1

Low-income families will receive a 6.8 percent cost of food increase in food stamps starting July 1, Assistant Secretary of Agriculture Carol Tucker Foreman announced.

"The 6.8 percent increase is based on the increase in the cost of foods in the department's Thrifty Food Plan between sept. 1978 and March 1979", said David B. Alspach, Southeast regional administrator of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Food and nutrition Service.

It is less than the 7.9 percent increase in the cost of all foods, he added, because the cost of the Thrifty Food Plan, which uses the cheapest foods available to achieve a nutritionally adequate diet, rose at a slower rate than the increase in all foods. With the increase, food stamp users will be getting an average food stamp benefit of 35 cents per person per meal, Alspach said.

Using a family of four with no net income as an example, Alspach said the maximum monthly allotment will increase July 1 from \$191 to \$204. The majority of the households will receive less, however, because most households have some income and the allotments are reduced accordingly. The maximum monthly net income a family of four may have and still be eligible for food stamps will increase from \$542 to \$596.

By law the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) adjusts food stamp allotments twice a year, on Jan. 1 and July 1.

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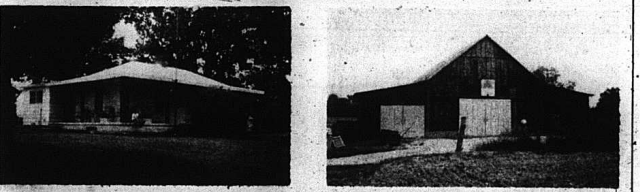

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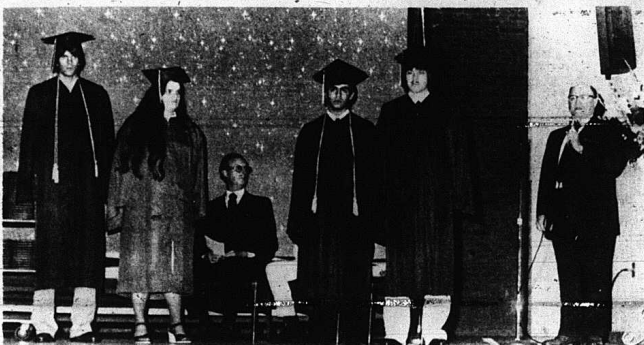

Rev. Brown Tells Graduates Secrets of Happiness in Life

One hundred sixty students from Rockcastle County High School received their diplomas Thursday in a ceremony keyed by Rev. Bob Brown of Lexington.

Special recognition was given to the four seniors who tied for academic honors: Steve Center, Ricky Leger, David Cummins and Gloria Smallwood. Mr. Center and Mr. Cummins were named valedictorian and salutatorian, on the basis of college preparatory test scores.

Other honors had been awarded one week before, in order to shorten the ceremony.

Rev. Brown addressed himself to the graduates, saying that they would need four things to become truly happy individuals.

"All the happy people I have ever known have something to do," he said. The other ingredients are something to look forward to, something to believe in, and someone to love.

He said that a job or the government or an education could not guarantee happiness, but it is something that you must work out for yourself.

"When I graduated from high school 30 years ago," Rev. Brown said, "there were three things on my mind: baseball, girls and

preaching, and in that order. I found that what was important as I got older was my dealings with other people."

He was introduced by Charles B. Parsons, school superintendent, who told the seniors, "You have done the right thing by getting your diplomas."

He graduated them and commended their parents "for making the necessary sacrifices to help your son or daughter get an education."

Cleston Saylor, principal, thanked Rev. Brown after his speech, and said it contained "fundamental truths about the good life." He thanked the students for their cooperation, and said, "Let Providence shine on all your endeavors."

The diplomas were presented by Dr. Rudolph Burdette, president of the county school board.

The "Castle Chorus" and the band performed several numbers under the direction of Robert Pybas and Margie Wilcox. Seniors in their blue and red gowns left their seats to perform with the chorus and band, and some of them were tearful as they played.

36 Pint of Blood Donated Last Week

Thirty-six pints of blood were collected May 24 at the Jaycees Blood Drive, chairman Steve Midkiff announced today.

"Our goal for the year is 195 pints," he said, "and that leaves us 110 more to collect." Fifty pints had been donated earlier in the year to help 3 teenagers from Rockcastle County injured in an automobile accident.

Mr. Midkiff said there would be two more blood drives this year, and the next would be in August.

Anyone who wants to donate blood and have it counted toward the Rockcastle goal may go to the Kentucky Blood Center in Lexington, on Waller Avenue.

If Rockcastle countians collect 195 pints this year, it means that all residents will be covered in a sort of "insurance plan" that will provide them with free blood during an emergency.

Rep. DeMarcus Wins Re-Election, Beats Joe Lambert by 688 Votes

Rep. Harold DeMarcus won re-election to the State House of Representatives after defeating a Mr. Vernon attorney, Joe Lambert, by 688 votes in Tuesday's primary. As there is no Democratic candidate, winning the primary meant winning the election.

Mr. Lambert carried Rockcastle County by 210 votes, but that wasn't enough to offset his losses in Pulaski and Lincoln counties. Rep. DeMarcus won by 299 to 90 votes in Pulaski and 917 to 229 votes in Lincoln.

Turn-out in the primary here was somewhat lighter than expected, with fewer than half the registered voters coming to the polls. About 940 Democrats (out of 1850 registered) and about 2250 Republicans (out of 5357 registered) voted in this election, which

had generated some national interest because of a highly-contested governor's race on the Democratic side.

Rockcastle voters followed some state patterns, such as their strong support of former governor Louie Nunn for the Republican nomination. Mr. Nunn got more votes than any other candidate running here, with 1,472, compared to his opponent, Ray White, who gathered 488.

Another top vote-getter here was Harold Rogers, Republican nominee for Lt. Governor. Mr. Rogers won easily here and across the state. He is known to Rockcastle voters as their former commonwealth attorney.

Another candidate with a local connection, Monroe Baker of Livingston, will have to wait a few days before he knows if he has the Republican nomination for Third District Railroad Commissioner. Results have not been tabulated in all 44 counties.

In the Democratic race for governor, Terry McBrayer, the current administration's candi-

date, did well in this county but lost across the state.

Mr. McBrayer won more than half the Democratic vote here with 535 votes, with his closest opponent being Carroll Hubbard, with 198. The winner, John Y. Brown, Jr. ran third with 105 votes.

3 Illegal Dumps Investigated

The County Health Department is cooperating with the Fiscal Court to clean up three dumps, one of which is polluting the Rockcastle River with garbage. County Judge-Executive Hubert Thacker and magistrate Joe Clark agreed to help build ditches around the dumps so that people will be unable to drive into the area and leave garbage.

Environmentalist Steve Midkiff said that he inspected the dumps Friday with Ernie Pruitt, Division of Water Quality, and Ruth Baker, Division of Hazardous Materials and Waste Management. One of the three was legal but abused, he said, because when it was filled, people were dumping the garbage into the river.

\$25,466 from Flood Fund to Road Repairs

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court took the \$25,466 received from the Kentucky Federal Disaster Assistance Administration and put it toward road improvements. Each magistrate's district received \$5,113.20 at a special meeting held May 24.

County Judge-Executive Hubert Thacker said the county will receive about \$40,000 from the

state as a result of the December 18 flood. The rest of the money should come next week.

The county spent much more than \$40,000 mostly on road and bridge repairs during the flood, Judge Thacker said. The state required that receipts and vouchers be submitted to show that it had been spent before awarding the grant.

Appeals Court Reverses in Joe Clark's Favor, Ernest Mason to Appeal to KY. Supreme Court

The Kentucky Court of Appeals reversed itself last Friday to rule in favor of Joe Clark, in the election fraud cause of Ernest Mason vs. Joe Clark, et al. Attorneys for Mr. Mason said they are appealing the case to the Kentucky Supreme Court.

The Appeals Court originally ruled for Mr. Mason, and upheld Judge Phillip K. Wicker's decision in Circuit Court. But the Appeals Court reversed itself after Mr. Clark's attorney, Carl Clontz petitioned for rehearing.

In the latest ruling in the case, written by Judge Charles Lester, the Appeals Court said that there was a "procedural error" in the original proceedings in that the trial should have been held within 30 days of the election, (it was tried 41 days after).

"It is evident that the trial judge was under the mistaken belief that because the case was

assigned for trial within the thirty-day period, it was not necessary that the court make a finding as to just cause for an extension of time beyond the statutory limitation (30 days)," the decision reads.

"The statute could not be more clearly pointing out the importance of quick decision making in an election contest."

Mr. Mason has charged in his suit that he should be magistrate from the Fifth District in Rockcastle County Fiscal Court. Mr. Clark holds that office.

Mr. Mason alleged in his suit that election officers actively solicited votes for Mr. Clark, that the candidate placed newspaper ads illegally and that voting machines were rigged in Mr. Clark's favor in the November 17, 1979 election. At that time, Mr. Mason had the Republican nomination for magistrat and Mr. Clark was running as a write-in candidate.

Judge Wicker ruled that there was not enough evidence to prove

the above charges, but he ruled that at least 24 voters were illegally cast because election officials did not fill out proper affidavits when they helped voters write in Joe Clark's name.

A handwriting expert testified during the trial that 42 votes, only eight were in different handwritings, make 34 votes illegal. The 34 votes would have been enough to throw the election to Mr. Mason, who lost by 22 votes.

The illegal votes were from East Livingston and Orlando. Mr. Clontz argued that under current law Mr. Clark would have to name each illegal voter individually to prove his case.

Judge Wicker wrote in his opinion that there had not been enough evidence to name any one illegal voter.

The case was originally tried December 29, 1977. About 20 witnesses appeared, including voters, election officials, newspaper editors and the handwriting expert.

At least 35 additional troopers will be added to the present force to maintain 1,005 officers next year. Brandenburg said that the statewide drive also will include a major effort to attract interested minority and female applicants. Four black and four white troopers are being assigned fulltime to identify qualified minorities and women and make them aware of the career opportunities offered by the state police, he said. The necessary forms will be available to applicants at any state police post, or the permanent driver examining centers in Louisville, Lexington and Covington, between the hours of noon and 8 p.m., Monday through Saturday, June 1 and ending June 15. The deadline for return of the completed applications to state police control will be midnight, June 30. Every applicant must meet the following minimum qualifications: Be between 21-30 years of age. Have a high school diploma, or its equivalent. Be a U.S. citizen and resident of Kentucky, and possess a valid Kentucky motor vehicle operator's license. Be at least 5 feet six inches tall without shoes, with weight proportional to height. Have vision correctable to 20/20 with glasses, and 20/50 without glasses. In addition, each applicant also must pass a medical exam and undergo an investigation of his background to insure that he is of good moral character. Applicants accepted for training will receive a salary of \$710 a month while attending the state police academy. Upon graduation, their starting salary as probationary troopers will then be raised to \$1,048 a month.

Legislative Report

The Personal Service Contract Review Subcommittee met on Tuesday, May 8th, for the purpose of reviewing fifty-seven contracts and amendments to contracts. Fifty contracts and amendments were approved, one amendment was disapproved while six contracts were deferred until the next meeting.

The one contract amendment that was disapproved was for a lawyer doing some work for the Department for Human Resources in federal court. The contract stated that the lawyer would be paid an hourly rate in accordance with the amount of time that he spent in the actual court proceedings. The actual court proceedings began at 10:00 a.m. and ended at six o'clock in the morning until the court recessed from the day. The committee disapproved this contract because federal court sessions do not begin until ten o'clock in the morning and this contract amendment would result in a daily, four hour overpayment.

When a state agency comes to the committee requesting that a contract be amended, generally they want more money to extend the contract. The extra money comes from the agency's already existing budget. This means that another of the agency's programs will suffer a reduction of funds.

During the meeting, the committee decided to require all agencies requesting a contract amendment to specifically justify their request by explaining how the program that would have decreased funding would continue to function.

All contracts with the Commonwealth of Kentucky can have a clause that permits the state to cancel the contract upon a thirty day notice.

The State Department of Energy in conjunction with the federal government has a hydrocarbon research contract with several na-

tional oil companies. This contract provides the state's funding portion for a coal liquefaction plant in Cattlebluffs, Ky. Ashland Oil, the major company involved with the demonstration project, wanted to halt the project due to the thirty-day cancellation clause because they felt Kentucky might withdraw from the project in midstream. The committee ruled that this project was not under its jurisdiction, therefore, we referred it to the Capital Construction Fund Committee. In other action the committee approved two state fair board contracts totaling \$90,000. The contracts will provide all the advertising needed to promote the Kentucky State Fair, including a promotional hot air balloon. Also, the committee approved a \$14,400 contract for the Department for Natural Resources to acquire a Kentucky water quality study by purchasing NASA satellite pictures beamed to a computer in Michigan which will show the types and amounts of chemicals being inducted into our water resources from the land. It is the feeling of the Personal Service Contract Review Subcommittee that the intent of govern-

ment should be to serve the people. More than any other bill that has become law in the last few years, House Bill 110, which formed the committee, has served this purpose. It has performed this service by reducing state spending. The financial impact of the committee is twofold. First, the agencies of state government have decided not to request several

questionable contracts for fear the committee would disapprove them. Second, even though the committee has been in effect for less than one year, through the reduction and cancellation of personal service contracts, the committee has reduced state spending by \$800,000. This can only be a plus for the hardworking taxpayers of Kentucky.

Celibacy

Pope John Paul II has affirmed the importance of celibacy for Roman Catholic priests. A recent article in the Louisville Courier-Journal reported that "The Pope acknowledged the shortage of priests in the world; a situation blamed partly on the celibacy requirement, but he said the tradition would not change."

According to the dictionary, celibacy means: "A person is under a vow not to marry; one who abstains from sexual intercourse." In the Explanation of Catholic Morals, page 149, the following is stated: "All celibates are not chaste; celibacy is not necessarily chasty-one who takes the vow of celibacy does not break it by sinning against the sixth commandment (adultery); he is true to it until he weds." This quotation implies that more importance is attached to the priests' remaining unmarried than is given to his indulgence in fornication or adultery. We are not suggesting that the Catholic Church endorses fornication by their priests, but they apparently consider it better than his marrying, since they declare that he "has not broken his vow of celibacy" by engaging in this sin!

Paul, an apostle of God, writing by inspiration, said just the opposite. He indicts fornication and adultery as "works of the flesh" and affirms that "they which do such things cannot inherit the Kingdom of God" (Gal. 5:19-21). On the other hand, "Marriage is honorable in all," said the Hebrew writer (Heb. 13:4). To the Corinthian church, "to avoid fornication," Paul wrote, "Let every man have his own wife, and let every woman have her own husband" (I Cor. 7:2). Even at a time of distress in Corinth, when the apostle thought it inadvisable to marry, he said, "It is better to marry than to burn" (with lust). (I Cor. 7:9).

Another office in the Catholic church is that of "Bishop." Of a bishop, the Bible says he must be the "husband of one wife" (I Timothy 3:2).

God, in His infinite wisdom, saw this problem and warned that it would be one of the earmarks of "falling away from the faith" by bidding to marry, and commanding to abstain from meats." (I Timothy 4:1-3).

In binding celibacy (or at least his interpretation of celibacy) on the clergy, the Catholic Church has been grossly deceived. Such is always sinful and is never good. We should all choose God and His way and not allow the traditions of men to become law. "In vain do they worship me, teaching of doctrines the commandments of men." (Matthew 15:9).

Rockcastle County's Soil Erosion Problem

Not as Urgent As Other Parts of State

A report from the Kentucky Department for Natural Resources and Environmental Protection says soil erosion in this state is a major problem that will cost \$953 million to correct. It says the major cause of soil erosion is farming activity, which disturbs more land than construction, mining and forest activities combined. But Rockcastle County is in better shape than other areas of the state, and is not among the top priority areas listed in the report. Nevertheless, Soil Conservation officers Gregg Stephens says there are some problems here, and that in certain parts of the county soil is eroding at a rate of 4 to 10 tons a year.

He said land here averages 6 inches of topsoil, and that at that erosion rate, farmers are losing about 1/16 of it per year. The

solution lies in soil conservation methods such as contour farming.

Mr. Stephens said he expects the government to encourage more soil conservation, and that in the distant future, certain methods of farming may even be enforced by law.

The report was issued this month, and is the result of months of study by the Dept. of Natural Resources, with help from the Divisions of Water Resources, Conservation, and Forestry; the Ky. Extension Service, and the U.S. Soil Conservation Service.

Rockcastle Countians participated in a workshop last fall, and their recommendations were part of the report.

According to the report, soil in Kentucky is being displaced, and sediments are moving into the water supply. As more houses and roads are built, there is less soil to absorb rainfall and thus increased

flooding. The report even lists dust storms as a future consequence of soil erosion.

Farming is causing the soil erosion because:

1. "Conservation practices... adopted in the 1950's and 1960's have been abandoned."

2. "Crop rotations formerly used have been abandoned to continuous cultivation."

3. More soybeans are being grown and soybeans are an erosive crop if not carefully managed."

4. Kentucky farmers have doubled row crops production in the last 12 years, responding to changes in federal agricultural priorities and international trade markets.

As a result, soil erosion is happening at rates exceeding Dust Bowl areas of the 1930's. Pesticides and other chemicals are entering the water supply.

Besides agriculture, the report goes into the consequences of mining, construction and forestry activities.

Areas most affected are the counties around Louisville, and Lexington, the Lake Barkley and Kentucky Lake Area, the area near Henderson and Owensboro, and that near Hazard. Some of these counties have erosion rates of 20 tons per year.

The 77-page report includes a list of recommendations. Most of them involve more education and technical assistance, with some monitoring and evaluation of farming, mining and construction activities.

Three local postal workers were awarded pins of recognition from the United States Post Office. The pins were for accumulated sick leave hours, time that could have been taken for illness but instead the employees showed up.

Louis D. Nicely, Route 1 carrier in Mt. Vernon had 512 hours; Jack Noe, Route 2 carrier in Mt. Vernon, 832 hours, and postmaster James Smith, 1921 hours.

The accumulated time can count toward retirement pay, Mr. Smith said. The awards were based on 500 hour units.

Farmers Can Get

Diesel Fuel Says Harris

State Agriculture Commissioner Tom Harris, last week, notified Kentucky farmers that they are entitled to full supplies of diesel fuel necessary for agricultural production through a special emergency order issued by the U.S. Department of Energy.

The assignment of agriculture to a high priority in federal mandatory fuel allocations, Harris said, was a response to President Carter's concern that farm production could be disrupted by fuel shortages.

Rainy spring weather in many parts of the nation resulted in

recent heavy demands for diesel fuel by farmers forced to compress normal six-week plowing and fertilizing schedules into a three-week rush period, Harris said.

Individual retail customers as well as wholesale consumers of diesel fuel should receive 100 percent of their requirements by certifying their needs with their regular fuel suppliers, Harris said. Dealers will obtain necessary supplies from other distributors if short shortages occur, he explained.

Kentucky farmers who experience problems obtaining sufficient amounts of diesel fuel for agricultural production should call the U.S. Department of Energy's toll-free hotline: 1-800-372-2978.

If additional diesel fuel is needed for production, farmers should obtain necessary forms from their local Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) office. The forms will increase demand.

Reduced diesel fuel refining, heavy winter consumption and interruption of crude oil imports also contributed to the diesel shortage, Harris said.

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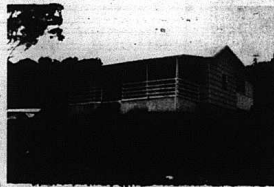

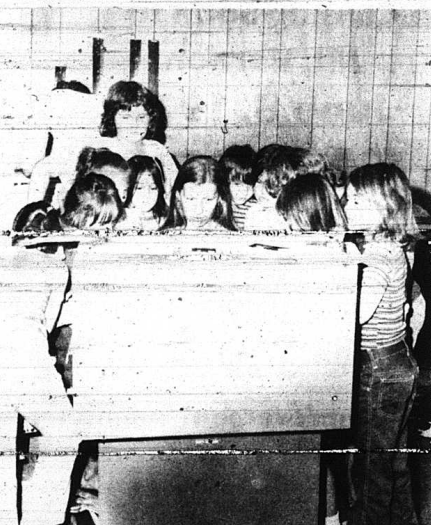
