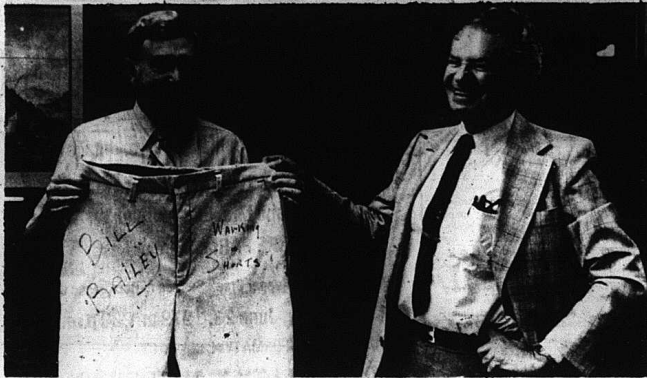

Wilderness Camping

(Sponsored by the Family Life Center of Appalachia)

Three qualified men will direct two (2) "Wilderness Camping" expeditions (June 18-23 and July 2-7, 1979) under the sponsorship of the Family Life Center of Appalachia. The campers will "backpack" through a portion of the Daniel Boone National Forest along the Rockcastle River, beginning and ending on the river about six (6) miles northeast of the London/Somerset, Highway 80 bridge.

There will also be experiences in camp cooking, setting up camp, canoeing, fishing, swimming, nature study, orienteering (use of map and compass) and cliff rappelling. There will be daily devotionals of a non-denominational, Christian nature led by staff members as part of the camping experience to help develop an awareness of God's creation and our stewardship of it. Camping equipment will be furnished.

Some specific activities include: one day hike lasting 12 miles while carrying a back-pack weighing approx. 30 lbs., occasional short distance hikes of 1 to 2 miles without back packs, swimming, cliff rappelling from a 30 ft. height, canoeing over 15 miles on a 1 day course. Due to the strenuous nature of this camping experience, a medical statement and parental permission and medical liability release form will be sent to those who qualify to be filled out and returned. Once these forms are processed you will be notified of your final approval as well as time and place of our pre-camp briefing, where we will discuss camping particulars and answer any questions you or your parents might have. The camping fee will be paid at that time.

Basic requirements for participation are as follows:
Ages 14 thru 18, male, physical ability to participate, camping fee of \$10, keen desire to participate.

Rockcastle's First Factory Plans To Open for Manufacturing in July

Construction of the clothing factory at the Rockcastle Multi-County Industrial Park is expected to be finished sometime in July, but 25 people have already been trained to work there.

Larry Portnoff, one of the managers of Rockcastle Manufacturing Company, said that some work remained to be done on the inside of the building, although the outside is finished. Access roads from US 150 to the plant are completed.

Mr. Portnoff said the staff should double once the factory is ready in July, but he is not sure how many people will be hired over the next year. He said the company will advertise for employees when they are needed.

The factory is a branch of a large firm in Cincinnati, Ohio

Fammy Shepherd, 18, Injured in Auto Accident

A local teenager is listed in critical condition following a two-car accident which occurred at 11:15 a.m. Monday, June 4.

According to State Trooper Jimmy Silver, Wanda Faye Mink, 17 of Livingston, was traveling on U.S. 25 1.1 miles South of Mt. Vernon, when a car driven by Thomas Wendell Daugherty, 19, son of Mr. and Mrs. Burgess Daugherty of Livingston, made a left turn into Mrs. Mink's pathway.

Mrs. Mink and her daughter, Melissa, 2, a passenger, and Mr. Daugherty, were all treated and released from the Rockcastle County Hospital.

A passenger in the Daugherty car, Tammy Cara Shepherd, 18, daughter of Manuel and Cleda Shepherd of Rt. 4, Mt. Vernon, was transferred to a Lexington hospital, where her condition is listed as critical.

No New Factories Announced

Bill James, chairman of the Rockcastle Multi-County Industrial Authority, said he had no good prospects for another factory in the Rockcastle Multi-County Industrial Park at this time.

The park's first factory, the Rockcastle Manufacturing Company, will open in July to manufacture work uniforms.

Mr. James said he is still contacting other companies who might want to build a factory here. The remarks were made at a meeting of the Industrial Authority last week.

75 Teens Work in CETA Jobs

Seventy-five young people will be employed this summer full-time in Rockcastle County through the federal Summer Youth Jobs program. The program was funded when the Comprehensive Educational and Training Act (CETA) was passed by Congress.

"They will be scattered around the county," said Kim Payne, director of the jobs program at the Mt. Vernon Department of Human Resources. She said that there will be CETA workers at the library, the court-house, the Renfro Valley boat dock, the Mt. Vernon playground, the elementary and high schools, the country club, City Hall and other places. Jobs have different kinds of duties such as janitor, secretary, sales clerk and so forth.

Miss Payne said that over 140 people applied for the jobs, most at the Tuesday meeting, five

State Highway Department Meets With County Fiscal Court, County to Receive \$9,250 Less than Last Year for Roads

The state Highway Department is planning to spend \$142,001 in Rockcastle County this year on certain county roads. This is down from \$151,250 spent in 1978.

District Maintenance Engineer J.D. Gilman met with the Fiscal Court Tuesday to discuss the state's road maintenance plans. The county is providing the equipment and manpower for the improvements, as was the case last year.

The roads to be repaired include all "state aid roads," which are classified separately from roads maintained by the county and roads maintained exclusively by the state.

Mr. Gilman also discussed how to spend a \$75,000 Road Aid grant, which the Fiscal Court had voted to spend on Copper Creek Road. The Court had wanted to resurface and blacktop the entire 4 mile road, but Mr. Gilman said that the state had been unable to contract for the work because \$75,000 was not enough to pay for

It suggested that only 1.6 miles be resurfaced with a 3-inch base, rather than do all 4 miles with a 4-inch base. The 1.6 mile stretch starts at the Garrard County line and goes to the creek.

The Court voted to follow this suggestion.

The Court is making final arrangements to receive \$14,433 from the state's disaster fund, due to damage in the December 1978 flood. The Court has already received \$25,866, which will be spent on road repair.

Sheriff Henry L. Abney submitted his final report, showing that he had \$8,558 in delinquent taxes this year. Over \$195,000 was collected and paid to the county, including \$11,173 for library; \$3,178 for forest fire protection; \$44,664 for health and agriculture; and \$1,869 for soil conservation. An additional \$84,025 was collected for the schools.

School Board Turns Down State's Plan To Build Middle School in Mt. Vernon

The Rockcastle County School Board voted Tuesday to reject a state plan to build a county middle school in Mt. Vernon. Board members voted instead to start a building program for Mt. Vernon area Roundstone Schools, and to upgrade Brodhead and Livingston Schools.

The suggestion for a middle school (grades 6-8) came out of a study done last fall by a team of experts from the Kentucky Department of Education. Their suggestion that the middle school become the top building priority for the county school system met with heavy opposition from local people.

At the May meeting of the School Board, a delegation of parents presented a petition signed by over 900 people in Livingston and Brodhead protesting the school.

School superintendent Charles Parsons said that he had written to state superintendent Philip Graham about the local opposition to the state's proposal. Mr. Graham had written back that he would consider public sentiment if Rockcastle County chose not to follow the state's proposals.

The School Board's alternative plan is as follows:

1. Build an addition to Mt. Vernon Elementary School in such a way that the addition would become the first phase of a completely new school. The addition must be built as a permanent structure.
2. Add several classrooms and a shower-dressing room at Roundstone School.
3. Upgrade Brodhead and Livingston Schools.

people from Livingston and Mt. Vernon rejoin Sammy Ford spoke against the proposed school. Those from Livingston were Walter Carpenter, Dale Carpenter, Bernice Carpenter, Shirley Carpenter, and Bernice Burkhart.

Mr. Ford repeated the reasons people are objecting to the school, including objections to busing children long distances; local communities are hurt economically when they lose their schools; discipline problems increase in large schools; and children get less individual attention.

"Business does not necessarily mean quality education," he said.

Shirley Carpenter said the children themselves were against the school.

Other Business

Board members adopted a school calendar which shows classes starting August 22 and ending May 15. If the schools must close again next winter, five days could be made up automatically because the Rockcastle school day is longer than the law requires. Eleven days could be made up by holding school throughout the month of May. (See calendar insert.)

Six new teachers will be employed this year. The Board voted to give the jobs to those who had their applications in the longest. Those who applied this year will draw numbers for the jobs. Mr. Parsons said there were over 20 applications.

Placement of all teachers and personnel was approved.

Personnel other than teachers, school board members and the school superintendent were given pay raises as follows: regular bus drivers, up \$25 per month; contract bus drivers, 8% increase; contract haulers (drivers furnish gasoline), 10% increase; aids, cooks and janitors, up from \$2.75 per hour to \$3.00 per hour; principals and central office certified staff members, 8% increase on extra service pay only; all others, 8% increase. Travel allowances were increased from 14 cents a mile to 16 cents a mile.

The Board accepted bids from Thompson Sanitary Supply and Kenway Chemical Company on janitor's supplies, and voted to advertise for services on the year-book and senior pictures.

People who handle money for the school system were bonded up to \$320,000 through Norton Insurance Agency. The Board renewed a \$1 million Liability Insurance Policy at a cost of \$855.

Pauline Mullins, Shirley Mullins and Garlan Cummins were appointed to audit elementary activity and lunchroom accounts. J. Courtney Horton, CPA, was hired to audit the General Fund Audit Account for \$1200.

The Board accepted the resignation of teacher Donna Coffey, and granted a year's leave of absence to Sondra Mullins, library clerk. They approved a final settlement with Preston Collins on the school bus garage, but the settlement is still subject to the approval of the State Department of Education.

Clyde Linville Remembers Origins Of Church, Community at Scaffold Cane

Clyde Linville, a native of the Scaffold Cane Community in Rockcastle County, has had a distinguished career as a teacher, school superintendent and Mt. Vernon mayor. He received the first Everett C. Brown Award ever presented this year for his outstanding contributions to the community, and in particular, establishing the county water system

and Lake Linville. Here, Mr. Linville recalls the early history of Scaffold Cane.

The community of Scaffold Cane got its name from a certain tribe of Indians that used to live here. You see, pipe cane grew all over the area. It was very thick, and the Indians used to bury their dead in a sort of scaffold that they made from the cane, like a ham-

whites used it. The whites sat in the front on their Sunday, and the blacks would sit in the back; and then, the blacks would sit in the front on their Sunday and the whites would sit in the back.

On the third Saturday of the month, the congregation would try someone, some member of the church. In 1794, a man was tried for letting his dogs kill sheep. And in the same year, a woman was tried for living with a married man and "falling to take the church's counsel." Once the congregation fired a preacher for pitching silver dollars at a line—it was gambling, is suppose?

The church trials were like an old country court in that you came in and the church asked you to explain why you were behaving as you were. You would get counsel from the church and a reprimand, or were excluded altogether from the church.

Another ordinance of the church was the custom of "foot washing" for the Lord's supper. This one and the trials eventually were no longer practiced. By the way, all this is written in our church's history.

Scaffold Cane, as I remember, was a small community. My grandfather, who died before I was born, kept a store, and the records show that he used to sell about \$100 worth of merchandise a month in the 1880's. In those days, the adult laborer got 50 cents a day and children, 25 cents.

People in those days sometimes used "due bills" to pay at the store. It showed they were due so much money from so-and-so, and "due bills" were a sort of scripp paper, I suppose.

We had a one room schoolhouse, and I went eight years there. You used to start later, and finish at a later age. I was 17 when I finished eighth grade, for example.

It wasn't anything in those days to repeat a grade. I repeated the eighth grade. I didn't have anything else to do so I went back to school. But you might even go back and take the seventh grade twice. Some people did.

Some of the graduates would take teaching examinations and start teaching after eighth grade. They would send out a state examiner to each county seat.

I saw many changes in the course of the years, especially in my field, which is education. I saw the schools change from 79 one-room schoolhouses to three independent high schools. At this time, when we only have one demonstration one-room school and four elementary schools, and the high school.

The older I get, the more I think of the one-room school as a great institution. You had eight grades and I sat between two eighth grade students and they taught me more than the teacher. A great learning situation all the way through.

The consolidated schools have come in now, and it's good but there's something about a community school, or a community like Scaffold Cane. Our children would be here. They come from good farm homes. It was like a big family.

CAP Historic River Trip

County Extension Office Attacks

Cereal Leaf Beetle With a Wasp

With all the powerful pesticides and scientific farming techniques used today, it's hard to believe the best way to kill one kind of bug is to send another after him. But that is exactly what County Extension Agent Lee Durham did last Wednesday, as Rockcastle County participated in a statewide project aimed at killing the Cereal Leaf Beetle.

This beetle destroys wheat, oats, and other small grain crops. In its larvae stage, it feeds on the upper leaf surfaces and eats all the green parts, leaving only the lower half cuticles. Plants look as if they have frost on them when the larvae are through, and an infestation of these beetles can cut 30 percent where the beetles are common.

No sprays or pesticides have been effective on this beetle, which has spread in the last few years from Europe to the United States. It is moving all across this country, and is tough enough to survive in Florida as well as Canada.

The Dept. of Agriculture's scientists in Niles, Michigan, have developed a way of raising the beetle's worst enemy, a wasp parasite. This insect lays its eggs in the beetle's larvae, and as the wasps grow, the larvae die.

Last Wednesday morning, Mr. Durham picked up two bucketsful of wheat leaves from the Niles laboratory. The leaves had larvae in which wasps had laid eggs. He drove to the farms of John Houston and John Laswell to place the leaves in infested wheat fields; and is now hopeful that enough of the wasps will live and reproduce here in Rockcastle County.

Mr. Houston, who farms near Brodhead with William Taylor, has a large operation with 540 acres.

"We noticed that something was wrong with some of these wheat leaves," Mr. Houston said, picking up one that had a yellow appearance, "but we didn't know what it was."

The larvae look like tiny drops of black oil, except when you look closely you can see their feet and antennae. They were easy to find in the 80 acres of wheat on the Houston-Taylor farm, and the three men placed the wasp-infested wheat leaves throughout the area.

Then Mr. Durham went on to John Laswell and Calvin Morgan's wheat fields, where more were released.

"These wasps provide good control," Mr. Durham said. "They will multiply and spread on their own."

They have been so effective in

New York, that one field day schedule for the release of more wasp eggs was cancelled. The Kentucky Extension Service is hoping the same thing will happen here, and that the Cereal Leaf Beetle can be put entirely under control.

Perhaps the best news of all about this entire project is that the parasite-wasp has no stinger.

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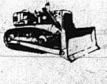
