





Clyde Linville Remembers Origins Of Church, Community at Scaffold Cane

Clyde Linville, a native of the Scaffold Cane Community in Rockcastle County, has had a distinguished career as a teacher, school superintendent and Mt Vernon mayor. He received the first Everett C. Brown Award ever presented this year for his out-standing contributions to the comand in particular, estab-the county water system

and Lake Linville. Here, Mr. Lin-ville recalls the early history of Scaffold Cane.

The community of Scaffold Cane got its name from a certain tribe of Indians that used to live here. You see, pipe cane grew all over the area, it was very thick, and the Indians used to bury their dead in a sort of scaffold that they made from the cane, like a ham-

mock, that they left in the trees.
Most of the families who settied this area came from Tennessee
or Virginia. It is a very old
community. The Seaffold Cane
Baptist Church was established in

became a state, which makes it the
secold oldest church in the state.
The oldest is in Harrodsburg, I
believe.

believe.
The church was established with the Silver Creek Church in Madison County and for awhile, it was called a Baptist Christian Church. We had people come from different sections of the county, and other counties. In the old cemetery behind the church, there are some slaves buried there and the graves from before the Civil

other graves from before the Civil War.

The blacks used the church one Sunday a month, and then the





whites used it. The whites sat in the front on their Sunday, and the blacks would sit in the back, and then, the blacks would sit in the from on their Sunday and the whites would sit in the back.

On the third Saturday of the month, the congregation would try someone, some member of the church. In 1794, a man was tried for letting his dogs kill sheep. And in the same year, a woman wasin the same year, a woman was tried for living with a married man and "failing to take the church's counsel." Once the congregation fired a preacher for pitching silver dollars at a line-it

was gambling, I suppose. The church trials were like an old county court in that you came in and the church asked you to explain why you were behaving as you were. You would get counsel from the church and a reprimand, were excluded altogether from e church.

the church.

Another ordinance of the church was the custom of "foot washing" for the Lord's supper. This one and the trials eventually were no longer practiced. By the way call this is written in our church's history.

written in our church's history. Scaffold Cane, as I remember, was a small community. My grand-father, who died before I was born, was a small community. My grandather, who cide before! was born, kept a store, and the records show that he used to sell about \$100 worth of merchandise a month in the 1880's. Inhose days, the adult laborer got 50 cents a day and children, 25 cents. days sometimes used "due bills" to pay at the store. It showed they were due so much money from so-and-so, and "due bills" were a sort of scripp paper, I suppose. We had a one room school-house, and I went eight years there. You used to start later, and finish at a later age. I was 11 when I finished eighth grade, for example.

If finished eighth grade, for example.

It wasn't anything in those days to repeat a grade. I repeated the eighth grade, I didn't have anything else to do so I went back to school. But you might even go back and take the seventh grade twice. Some of the graduates would take teaching examinations and start teaching after eighth grade. They would send out a state examiner to each county seat.

I saw many changes in the course of the years, especially in my field, which is education. I saw the schools change from 79 one-room schoolhouses to three independent high schools, to at this time, when we only have one demonstration one-room school and four elementary schools, and the high school.

The older I get the more I think of the one-room school as a great institution. You had eight grades and I sat between two eighth grades students and they taught me more than the teacher.

County Extension Office Attacks Cereal Leaf Beetle With a Wasp

With all the powerful pesticides and scientific farming ten inques used today, it's hard so believe that the best way to kill one kind of bug is to send another after him. But that is exactly what County Extension Agent Lee Durham did last Wednesday, as Rock-castle County participated in-a state-wide project aimed at killing the Cereal Leaf Beetle.

This beetle destroys wheat-

the Cereal Leaf Beetle.
This beetle destroys wheat, oats, and other small grain crops. In its larvae stage, it feeds on the upper leaf surfaces and eats all the green parts, leaving only the lower half cuticles. Plants look as if they have frost on them when the larvae are through, and an infested field appears withered, dry and yellow. Yields can be cut by 30 percent where the beetles; are common.

No sprays or pesticides have been effective on this bettle, which has spread in the last few years from Europe to the United States. It is moving all across this country, and is tough account. country, and is tough enough to survive in Florida as well as Canada

survive in Florida as well as Canada.

The Dept. of Agriculture's scientists in Niles, Michigan, have developed a way of raising the beetle's worst enemy, a ewasp-parasite. This insect lays its eggs in the beetle's larvae, and as the wasp eggs grow. He harvae dies.

"WE noticed that something

"WE noticed that something was wrong with some of these wheat leaves," Mr. Houston said, picking up one that had a yellow appearance, "but we didn't know what it was."

The larvae look 'like tiny drops of black oil, except when you look closely you can see their feet and antennae. They were easy to find in the 80 acres of wheat on the Houston-Taylor farm, and the three men placed the wasp-infested wheat leaves

farm, and the three men placed the wasp-infested wheat leaves throughout the area.

Then Mr. Durham went on to John Laswell and Calvin Morgan's wheat fields, where more were released.

"These wasps provide good."

released.
"These wasps provide good control," Mr. Durham said. "They will multiply and spread on their own."

They have been so effective in



New York, that one field day schedule for the release of more wasp eggs was cancelled. The Kentucky Extension Service is hoping the same thing will happene and that the Cereal Leaf Beetle can be put entirely undercontrol.

Perhaps the best news of all about this entire project is that the parasite-wasp has no stinger.
