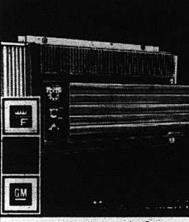

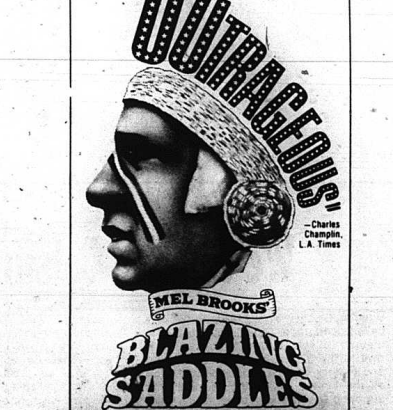

Toddlers are fascinated by an activity that requires only wooden clothespins and an empty cardboard box with a cover such as an oatmeal box. Cut a hole in the center of the cover about the size of a fifty-cent piece. Show the child how to drop one clothespin at a time into the box. When all are inside, remove the cover and the child can do it again; thus, helping to develop eye-hand coordination skill as well as a concept of relationships in the size of objects.

Infants and toddlers also enjoy looking at their images in a mirror. Seeing themselves is important in the development of their image of themselves—a part of their self-concept.

Former County Judge Charles Carter Receives Rockcastle Improvement Award

Surrounded by five generations of his family and many of his friends, Charles E. Carter was given the Rockcastle County Improvement Award for his contributions to the growth of the county during his long political career.

Roy Adams presented the award Sunday at Mr. Carter's 85th birthday party, held at the home of his son, Clarence Carter of Mt. Vernon.

Mr. Adams noted that Mr. Carter had been county judge for 20 years, as well as deputy sheriff, and a state legislator. He recognized Mr. Carter's efforts in building the courthouse and library, among other things.

Mr. Carter was born in Washington County, Arkansas, but moved to Rockcastle County at four years of age. He graduated from Livingston High School, and was studied at the State Normal School in Richmond, as Eastern Kentucky University was known to those days.

A pipefitter by trade, he won his first public office in 1929 as county deputy sheriff. He served with Sheriff Lloyd Tipton, and after his death, with Sheriff Lily Tipton, his widow.

He was elected county judge in 1933, and recalled in an interview last week the difficult days of the Depression.

"It was the worst time for the county," he said. "We had maybe 22,000 people here. Many came back from the cities because here they could raise their own food. Every cabin, every house was full. We did what we could to assist the old people with county orders, but the county didn't have the means to do much else."

In those days, the county judge heard criminal cases, including preliminary hearings in murder cases. The District Court system changed all that in 1978, after Judge Carter left office.

He recalled his terms of office in the 1960's, saying "We needed a courthouse in the worst way." The

As County Receives \$40,000 State Grant

The county has received \$25,000 out of a \$45,000 matching grant from the state to build a grandstand exhibit hall at the Brodhead Fairgrounds, Judge Ruben Thacker announced this week. The rest of the money will come when the Fiscal Court applies for it.

Judge Thacker said that work on the grandstand won't begin until the Brodhead Fair, but a second week in August, but the county may start to advertise \$500 for bids on construction.

old one was built in 1873, and was small and crowded." The current one was built in 1964 with the help of \$300,000 state grant, and \$400,000 in county funds.

Judge Carter also helped build many county roads, especially in the eastern section of the Kentucky, and several bridges. He was helpful in turning the hospital over to the county for administration, after the Baptist Association here had lost too much money to continue to administer the hospital.

The dates of his political career are as follows: 1929, elected deputy sheriff; 1933, elected judge; 1937, elected judge; 1941, lost judge election; 1945, elected judge; 1949, lost judge election; 1953, lost sheriff election; 1957, lost judge election; 1959, elected state representative; 1961, elected judge; 1965, lost judge election; 1967, lost state representative election; 1969, elected judge; 1973 and 1977, lost judge election.

Mr. Carter was married to Sudda Mae Riddle, who is deceased. Their children are, Henry Carter, deceased; Elbert McNew, Floyd Carter, Ione Parsons, Dicke Ford, Clarence Carter, Kenneth Carter and Glenna Baker, all of Mt. Vernon, and Charles Edward Carter of Ohio. He has 29 grandchildren; 49 great grandchildren; and 10 great, great grandchildren. He is now married to the former Hazel Brown.

Rabid Skunk Killed Near Willailla: May Quarantine Dogs in County

The Rockcastle County Board of Health is considering a quarantine for dogs and cats after another case of rabies was confirmed this week in a skunk killed in the Willailla area.

The quarantine would require all pet owners to keep their animals leashed at all times. Quarantines have been in effect in Madison and Boyle counties, following outbreaks of rabies there.

Steve Midkiff, county environmentalist, said he is checking with authorities in other counties to determine if the quarantine is necessary here.

The County Board of Health has conducted several rabies clinics to vaccinate domestic animals last month after the first two cases of rabies were confirmed. They are not planning to hold any more such clinics.

The first two rabid animals were skunks killed on the Old Brodhead Road near Mt. Vernon in April. The latest involved a skunk killed by Denton Childress, after he was awakened about 6:30 a.m. June 13 by his dog barking.

The skunk had chased the dog, a medium-sized one used for hunting, out of his house. Mr. Childress agreed to have the dog destroyed because it might have been bitten by the skunk. Although this dog had been vaccinated, sometimes the vaccinations don't "take" and as a precaution, the dog would have had to have been isolated for 90 days to see if it had contracted the disease. Mr. Childress said there was no way he could isolate the dog completely, and he did not want to take any chances.

Four other dogs were destroyed by the dog warden in the Willailla area Saturday after another incident involving a skunk.

This skunk had been chasing a pack of about six dogs that evening, and was assumed to be rabid because of its strange behavior. Mr. Midkiff said. The skunk was killed by Don Hurst, who turned in the report to the Health Department. Mr. Hurst and John Kirby have agreed to quarantine their dogs for 90 days because they also came into contact with the skunk.

Mr. Midkiff said this skunk was not tested because the Health Department had already determined that rabies was in the Willailla area of the county.

Several people have killed skunks and other wild animals that they suspected of rabies, but the Health Department was unable to test them because they had been shot in the head. The tests are run on the brain of the dead animal.

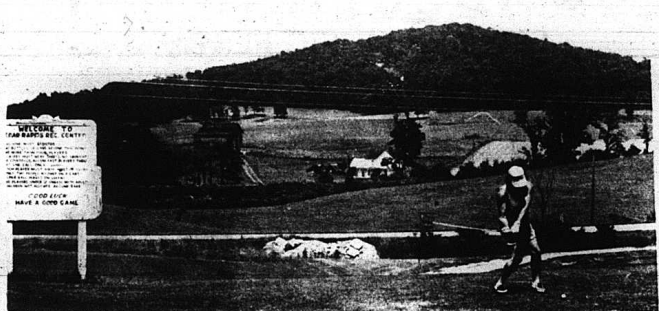
The survey will probably be conducted when the most cars are parked in town, Mr. Rush said, such as the first of the month or on Monday and Friday. It will be

People Have Been Swimming and Golfing Now For 10 Years at Cedar Rapids Recreation Center

Cedar Rapids Recreation Center celebrated its tenth anniversary this week, and its president, Tom Payne, Jr., talked about how it all began.

"A few of us from Mt. Vernon used to golf together," he said, "sometimes in Burnside, sometimes in Stanford. When we learned that Burnside had built its course using a Farmers' Home Administration loan, we thought why not try the same thing here."

The first step was to hold a meeting for interested people, and then to gather enough names for the FHA to guarantee that the county could support a recreational center. The application for the loan had over 200 names, and stockholders, Mr. Payne said. With that, the FHA loaned the group over \$200,000 over a forty-year period at a low interest rate.

With the money, the group was able to purchase 125 acres of land about four miles from Mt. Vernon. A modern building with a golf shop, restaurant facilities and

a reception room was constructed. A nine-hole golf course, tennis and shuffle board along with a good-sized, outdoor swimming pool completed the center.

"We try to avoid the world 'country club' Mr. Payne said, "because some people have the wrong idea. They associate alcoholic beverages with that, or a very expensive style of living, but Cedar Rapids isn't like that. It's just Rockcastle people enjoying a good time. Your average Joe is a member of this, and we would like everyone to join."

The Cedar Rapids Center, so named because that was the name of a piece of property the group originally wanted to buy, has an open membership. Anyone can join. Family membership are \$250 per year, and individuals pay \$150 per year. This includes complete use of all the sports facilities there, and use of the building for weddings, receptions and so forth. Private groups can rent the building for \$25 an evening. There were 165 members last year.

The Cedar Rapids group has no organized picnics and programs this year, although there is an organized swim team that competes in various meets. Between November and March, the facility is open only for golfing. The pool-one is a small wading pool for little children-are open on Decoration Day to Labor Day. Swimming lessons are given.

Some of the organizers and past presidents include: Dr. George H. and George W. Griffith, Roy Winstead, Jerry Hamm, Dr. Andy York, Donnie Singleton, Hank Hoskins, Robert Robinson, C.B. Owens, and Clay Colson.

Only about half the acreage around the center is being used for the golf course. Seldom the rest could be used for horseback and hiking trails.

"We had planned on the trails, or even another nine holes for golfers," Mr. Payne said. "Some day we may be able to do that. We feel we have a beautiful facility here that is an asset to the entire community."

Legislative Report

The Program Review and Investigation Committee held its fourth meeting on Thursday, June 7th. Two very interesting subjects developed, both dealing with a lack of action and a breakdown in bureaucratic communication.
 Acting on a request from Senator John Rogers of Somerset, the committee received a report on the investigation of welfare vendor fraud. In the past, emphasis has been placed on welfare fraud, as an example is Senate Bill 11 of the 1978 Special Session which makes welfare fraud in excess of \$100 a Class D felony.
 However, a preliminary investigation revealed that there are 7,000 Kentucky welfare vendors (hospitals, pharmacists, nursing homes) which do \$250 million worth of business with the state each year.
 Basically there are two state agencies wanting to be the exclusive investigator of welfare vendor fraud, when one should be sufficient. A breakdown in communication revealed that the agencies was the issue at hand.
 It seems that the Office of the Attorney General and the Office of Inspector General within the Department for Human Resources could not agree on which agency should do the actual investigations into proposed fraud cases. Since there is this lack of agreement, the federal department for Health, Education and Welfare (HEW) will not certify Kentucky's welfare fraud investigation program, which in effect, makes us ineligible for federal funds and further compounds the state's financial burden.
 Program Review directed the agencies to reach an expeditious agreement, hopefully, in favor of the Office of Attorney General and thus acquire the HEW certification.
 The second issue, one of much importance, regarded the commit-

tee's refusal to authorize an investigation into a subject that was proposed and supported by the Republican members of the committee.

The proposed subject deals with a problem developing in the 120 Kentucky counties, their property tax rate and its assessment ratio. Taking the commercial ratio for 1977-78 as example, an obvious dispersion between county to county ratios becomes evident.

Owen County's commercial assessment ratio is 58.5% (of 100% of the fair cash value) while Grayson County has a ratio of 133.9. Quite simply, we wanted to know why there exists such large gaps from one county ratio to another. Of interest are the commercial ratios for the 80th legislative district: Lincoln 85.1, Pulaski 92.7 and Rockcastle 117.7.

In a vote of 4 to 3 the democrat members of the committee defeated the proposed investigation, stating that it was a problem for the Appropriations and Revenue Committee (A&R) and not relevant to the budget and Program Review and Investigation.

That, in totality is the problem and the main issue at hand. It is fact that the General Assembly through A&R intends to propose an independent state budget for 1980.

It is also fact that the A&R committee staff is one of the most qualified and efficient within the Legislative Research Commission. But in dealing with a state budget where areas of such varied natures as highways, health care and education exist, A&R will have to draw from all its resources, such as the investigative expertise of Program Review.

Now, the Program Review Committee is a step towards representative and astute state government. Although, in its first opportunity to strike a blow for an independent and united legislature, program review has clearly not met its obligation. Hopefully, the committee will take more time to contemplate, discuss and investigate future problems than was displayed on this occasion.

Consumer Comments

With gas prices seemingly soaring daily, many customers are finding it difficult to keep up with current legal price ceilings.

Actually, price ceilings may vary from station to station, depending on each station's selling price on May 15, 1979, which is used as a base price.

According to Edwin Mampe, director of the Petroleum Price Regulation Division of the Department of Energy, how often the legal ceilings change depends on how volatile the world oil situation is. The average customer, however, may not be able to keep up with the day-to-day changes in the oil market.

That's why the stickers you see on the gas pumps may reflect one legal selling price while the pumps actually register a higher price. Each station is responsible for keeping those stickers up-to-date.

To help consumers who believe they are being unjustly overcharged for gasoline, or home heating oil, the Energy Department has established a toll-free hotline.

"If consumer complaints indicate there are unjustified price increases or unexplained shortages of home heating oil, the department will evaluate the industry's performance to determine what regulatory response is necessary," an Energy Department employee said.

If you have a complaint about an unjustified gasoline price increase or unexplained shortages of heating oil, you can call the Department of Energy toll-free Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Eastern time. The number is 1-800-424-9246. At night and on weekends a recording device is in use.

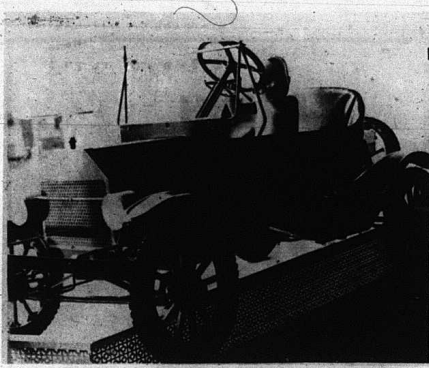

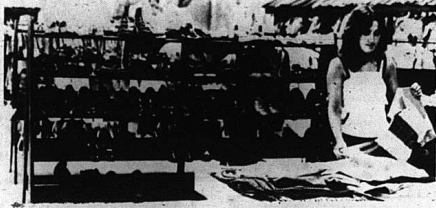
