ORDINANCE NO. 335

An ordinance of the City of Mount Vernon, Kentucky, accurately defining the boundaries of unincorporated territory proposed to be annexed to the area of said city.

The City Council of the City of Mount Vernon, Kentucky, does ordain as follows:

Section 1. The City of Mount Vernon, Kentucky, to-wit:

Beginning on an iron stake by the road that leads to Victor Hysinger's also being the north west corner to lot owned by Kermit Bailey and being corner point no. 10 on the present City Limits Map; thence with Hysinger Road and present city map N 3 degrees 00' E, 55 feet to point no. 11; thence still with said road N 11 degrees 30' W, 255.5 feet to an iron pipe, Muther Morth's corner; thence line of same N 69 degrees E, 405 feet to iron stake in fence, thence with fence S 79 1/2 degrees E 232 feet; thence continuing with same S 83 minutes E 150 feet to an iron stake by two white oaks; thence with fence N 67 3/4 minutes E, 258 feet to an iron stake by a cedar; thence with fence S 71 1/2 minutes E, 644 feet to iron stake, also being corner point no. 2 of present City Limit Map; thence with line of same S 17 minutes 30' W, 197 feet to point No. 3; N 73 minutes 00' W, 203 feet to point no. 4; N 22 minutes 30' E, 12 feet to point no. 5; N 71 minutes 00' W, 95 feet to point no. 6; S 16 minutes 00' W, 24 feet to point no. 7; N 72 minutes 00' W, 312 feet to point no. 8; N 72 minutes 00' W, 48 feet to point no. 9; N 84 minutes 00' W, 379 feet to point no. 10, the beginning.

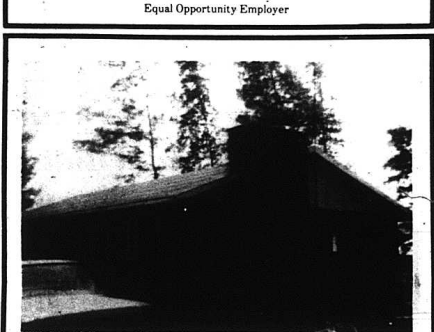

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State Asks County School Board To Reconsider its Building Plans

The Rockcastle County School Board was asked to study and reconsider its alternative plan to the state's recommendations for building priorities here after a meeting Tuesday in Frankfort between representatives of both groups.

The School Board rejected the state's proposals that a middle school be built in Rockcastle County and, instead, voted its own plan. But, after the meeting, county school superintendent Charles Parsons said that all proposals were still under discussion.

Walton H. Luttrell, whose office was active in preparing the Rockcastle County School Facility Survey last year, said that "we had a very friendly discussion, and some phases were accepted and some were not. We are asking that (Rockcastle) study its situation again and submit alternate proposals." He would not say what was accepted and what wasn't.

He also said that the people who prepared the original report would be meeting again to go over their proposals.

The meeting was held in Mr. Luttrell's office. Mr. Parsons, Garland Cummins, Tom Payne and Buford Parkerson represented Rockcastle County. Mr. Cummins is director of pupil personnel and Mr. Payne and Mr. Parkerson are both elementary school principals.

The meeting was to have been between the state group and the Rockcastle County School Board, but none of the school board members could attend.

If any building is done in the county, most of the money would likely come through the School Building Authority, a state agency. The Building Authority is authorized to fund projects approved by the School Facility report people. Right now, Rockcastle ranks 46th on the Authority's list to be funded and nineteen districts were funded last year.

The Facility Report's recommendations were as follows:

- (1) Build a school for grades 7-8 in Mt. Vernon.
- (2) The first phase of a new elementary school should be constructed on the present Mt. Vernon Elementary site to include a new cafeteria, physical education facility and 12 basic classrooms to replace the sub-standard classrooms in the relocatables and the concrete block buildings.
- (3) Build an addition to the vocational school for auto body and carpentry.
- (4) Upgrade lighting at Brodhead and Roundstone Schools.
- (5) Replace windows at Brodhead Elementary.

Permits to be Required

Applications for permits to haul solid waste will be available at the Rockcastle County Health Department after Monday, July 23, 1979.

This permit is required for persons hauling solid waste in Rockcastle County after August 1, 1979.

(6) Improve the sites of each school.

(7) Blue Springs is considered a "temporary" building.

The School Board's alternate plan was as follows:

(1) Build an addition to Mt. Vernon Elementary in such a way

that the addition would become the first phase of a completely new school. The addition would be built as a permanent structure.

(2) Add several classrooms and a shower-dressing room at Roundstone School.

(3) Upgrade Brodhead and Livingston Schools.

School Board Hires Teachers and Aides, Discusses Grant for Brodhead Problem

The Rockcastle Co. School Board hired its regular help for the school year, approved the purchase of two vans, and agreed to pay for half the cost of the tile drainage project at Brodhead School at its regular July meeting July 3.

Brodhead School's playground has been filling with water when it rains, school superintendent Charles Parsons said. Cost of putting in tile and a culvert would be about \$6,000, with half paid through a federal grant. Greg Stephens, soil conservation officer, is working with the School Board and city of Brodhead to apply for the grant. The city will be paying for that part of the project that involves the city-owned street.

New teachers were hired as follows: Roger Vanzant, Lois Cameron, Patricia Midkiff, Kathy Pope, Judy McClure, Elaine Taylor, Catherine J. Baker, Geraldine Alisp and Sharon Baker Lovell. They were hired on the basis of length of time on the Board's waiting list. Those who had been on the waiting list for the same amount of time were required to draw lots for the jobs. Mr. Parsons said there were still 12 people on the list.

Bus drivers, secretaries, custodians, cooks and aides were all rehired for the school year. Salaries are: custodians, cooks and aides, \$3 per hour; secretaries, \$432 per month; busdrivers, \$312 to \$325 per month, depending on experience. Salaries for substitute teachers were set at between \$25 and \$35 per day depending on experience.

Saddle Club Horse Show Set for Friday the 13th

The Eleventh Annual Horse Show is set for Friday, July 13th at 7:00 p.m. at the Brodhead Fairgrounds. The show is sponsored by the Rockcastle County Saddle Club.

Judge is this year's show will be Sylvester Skier Kowalski of Murfreesboro, Tenn., and ringmaster will be Henry Blankenship with organizer Peggy Garrett. Information on the classes can be obtained from the horse show committee: Bonita Lay, Dewey Thomas, Joe Martin, Hoober Bullock, Joe Adams, Bobby Taylor, Russell Robinson, Oscar Chasteen, Norma Lyons, Glenn Bullock or Clay Colson, chairman.

The Board agreed to participate in federal program such as Title VI-B for handicapped children, and Title VB for staff development. A contract between Rockcastle schools and surrounding counties was agreed upon in which case that if an out-of-county child is educated in a Rockcastle school, the child's regular county will pay the usual cost per day, and the same is true for Rockcastle paying the adjoining county in similar cases.

The Board agreed to advertise for supplies necessary to start school, and to sell 6-8 used vans at public auction. The Rockcastle Co. Improvement Council and the Senior Citizens were granted permission to use school buses provided they could get insurance.

Grand and Petit Juries Return for July Terms

Judge Phillip K. Wicker of the Circuit Court is calling back the people who served on the Grand and Petit Juries last March to serve the July term. Under the current court system, a jury is allowed to serve 30 days per year, and neither jury has accumulated that length of time.

The Grand Jury hears testimony and evidence and has the power to bring indictments against any person, even the Circuit Court Judge himself. It also can investigate any public building or institution.

City Council Discusses 'Dog Leash' Ordinance, Rules that Storm Drains Must be Disconnected

The Mt. Vernon City Council discussed ordinances pertaining to dogs, boating and storm drains at its regular meeting Monday night. The storm drain ordinance was passed to be effective in September, and requires people to disconnect all storm water drains from the city sewer system or pay fines up to \$25 per day.

City water superintendent Matt Powell, Jr. told the Council at its June meeting that the downspouts were over-working the city sewer plant, and that by disconnecting them, the city could come closer to maintaining standards set by the Environmental Protection Agency. The city has been in violation of these standards for over a year.

The Council also voted to send individual letters to people on Main St. about the new ordinance.

The Council instructed city attorney Carl Conz to revise the current "dog leash" ordinance that requires all city dogs leashed or fenced. Under the current ordinance, the city police have the power to shoot any dog running loose in the city.

Judy Makin told the Council that at least 25 dogs are running loose in the Hillview Subdivision, causing property destruction and disturbance to people. Mrs. Makin, who had her young son with her, said that many mothers are afraid the dog packs will attack their children.

Other concern about dogs had been expressed to councilmen after the recent confirmation of three cases of rabies in animals killed in Rockcastle Co. Mercer and Boyle counties have imposed quarantines on dogs there because of the rabies outbreaks.

Councilman Chester Hellard said that it was time to remind the operators of the boat dock at Lake Linville that the city has ordinances against large speedboats and swimming in the lake. He said he had received complaints from local residents about noise from

boats with above-water exhaust systems. The Council voted to write the boat dock operators, employed by the Christian Appalachian Project, about the ordinances and that they might notify the police to enforce the rules, if necessary.

Christian Appalachian Project is leasing the area from the city but has not yet paid its annual rent of \$1,000, the city clerk told the Council.

OTHER BUSINESS
A bid from Fred Roark of Pineville, Ky., for \$1782 was accepted for the audit of the water works. No bids were received for audit of the general fund and revenue-sharing budgets.

There was some discussion before the budget was passed. Councilman Chester Hellard said that he thought much of the money should be spent on "desperately needed sewers," but Mayor Mullins disagreed, saying that there was some money available for new sewers in the water works budget.

The Mt. Vernon Business and Professional Association had asked that some money be set aside for their projects, which might include sidewalk replacement and

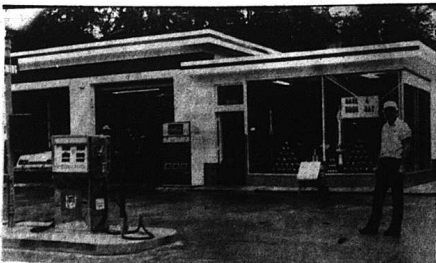
Likewise the city will advertise again for a police cruiser. It received no bids on advertisements for cruisers the equivalents of Chevetas and Novas, and only one for the equivalent of a Malibu. It will re-advertise this week for the Malibu.

The Council voted to hire Commonwealth Technology to prepare water samples and reports required by the Environmental Protection Agency. They also voted to write to that agency to see if the city could skip any steps in the construction of improvements to the sewer system. EPA is requiring many engineering plans (Cont. to 4)

Letter to The Editor

Dear Editor,

I wish to comment on the article, "Fiscal Court to Help Ambulance Service Collect Over \$60,000 in Overdue Bills," that appeared in the July 5th issue of the Mt. Vernon Signal.

Besides being a businessman in Mt. Vernon, I have worked as an ambulance attendant for a funeral home. I have been an Emergency Medical Technician since December, 1975. Emergency Medical Technician Instruction since September, 1976, studied for the Paramedic program, receiving an Associate of Science degree in Emergency Medical Care from Eastern Kentucky University in May, 1979 and am an active member of the Rockcastle County Rescue Squad and the Mt. Vernon Fire Department.

Several statements by individuals and comments by your paper leads the reader to negative opinions of ambulance services. Several explanations are needed for the readers to form an objective view of the issues.

True, our funeral homes in Rockcastle County operated ambulance services and did an excellent job for transporting and caring for the sick and injured. Our funeral homes also constantly strived for improvement. They purchased up-to-date vehicles and equipment and when the classes to train Emergency Medical Technicians was offered in the State of Kentucky, our funeral homes sent their personnel to attend them. Unfortunately, this was not the case nation wide. In those days, an ambulance was nicknamed "Meatwagon," which gave a fair report of their management of their patients.

Physicians and legislators saw the need for trained professional personnel to care for and transport the sick and injured to the medical facility for treatment. They felt that having trained personnel and the necessary equipment in the field would decrease the high death rate occurring enroute and also, with proper management of the patient, further injury to the patient would be minimized, thus lessening recovery time and permanent injury. Thus emerged a new member to the medical profession - "The Emergency Medical Technician." Since this time, the death rate has decreased and the patients today are arriving at the medical facilities in much better condition.

True, government regulations governing the equipment and per-

sonnel to manage an ambulance service forced funeral homes out of the business. Another fact is that funeral homes wanted out and these regulations simply helped their cause. Funeral homes somehow had to provide manpower 24 hours each day to operate the ambulance service, hire extra personnel, be on call to their business without rest, purchase their vehicles and equipment without any federal or state aid, buy insurance, maintenance and the list goes on. As your paper reported, mostly for free. Funeral homes suffered with the burden and expense of maintaining an ambulance for years on end. Funeral homes suffered more than any organization should ever in an emergency. We should be thankful that the funeral homes provided an ambulance service as long as they did and let them pursue their appointed vocation in peace, keeping in remembrance of the good that they gave to humanity.

The article gave me the impression that the expensive equipment and two Emergency Medical Technicians to operate an ambulance were unnecessary. Nothing could be more from the truth. When the Emergency phone rings, no one knows what they will encounter when they arrive at the scene. It could be anything from someone suffering from a cold or a mass casualty disaster. Two E.M.T.'s are required for this reason and also the equipment on the vehicle takes two to properly use. There is not one piece of equipment on our Emergency Care units that is unnecessary or eventually having to be used to properly care for the sick and injured. The best way that this question can be answered is for your paper to research what is an Emergency Medical Technician and find out what the equipment is that they use. After this, let the reader know with an article. I'm sure most will find it excellent reading and very informative.

Rockcastle County has one of the best ambulance services in the state. Although maintenance and equipment could be improved, Rockcastle County has adequate equipment. The Emergency Medical Technicians that man the units are excellent in their field. Rockcastle Countians can be secure with the thought that when their need arises for medical needs in time of emergencies, they have one of the best to come to their aid.

Our county of doctors, nurses, hospital staff, hospital board and Emergency Medical Technicians have done much to provide Rockcastle County with the best possible ambulance service and medical facility.

There can be no price put on life. Firm support by all citizens for our ambulance service is imperative. Without the Emergency Medical Technicians to man the units or regulation vehicles and equipment, emergency medical care will go back to the "Meatwagon" days. The ambulance service now faces the possibility of losing their E.M.T.'s due to CETA funds that pay them running out. How this will be dealt with remains to be seen.

Affirmative action by the county government and public support for our ambulance service is the only way to secure a confirming ambulance service capable of rendering professional emergency care to the sick and injured.

2. REFUSE TO CONTINUE STEADFASTLY. "And they continue steadfastly in the apostle's doctrine and fellowship, and in breaking of bread, and in prayers." (Acts 2:42)
3. REFUSE TO PROCLAIM THE LORD'S DEATH BY PARTAKING OF THE LORD'S SUPPER. "For as often as ye eat this bread and drink this cup, ye do shew the Lord's death till he come." (1 Cor. 11:26)
4. NEGLECT TO OFFER SPIRITUAL SACRIFICES. "ye also, as lively stones, are built up a spiritual house...to offer up spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God by Christ Jesus." (1 Pet. 2:5)
5. SUBJECT THEMSELVES TO FEARFUL JUDGMENT. "But a

certain fearful looking for of judgment and fiery indignation, which shall devour the adversaries." (Heb. 10:27)

When Christians do not attend church services, people question the importance they attach to their religion. It indicates pretense on their part and makes others weaker in the faith. It also hinders seriously the important work of the Lord and the zeal of others. In addition, one is less fortified against the devil for the week ahead. Then too, those who miss church services have denied themselves of spiritual food which is necessary for spiritual survival. It makes some think that they regarded their spiritual welfare and that of others as a matter of small concern. It makes some who are not Christians think they too could go to Heaven without obeying God. (Neither can).

This is a far more serious matter than many realize. The Lord commanded members of the church of Christ to assemble together for worship (Heb. 10:25) and then warns that failure to do so is "willful sin" (Heb. 10:26).

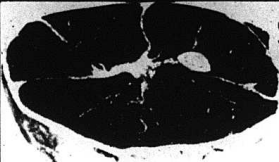

The Council voted to raise salaries for city employees by 7.5 percent this year.

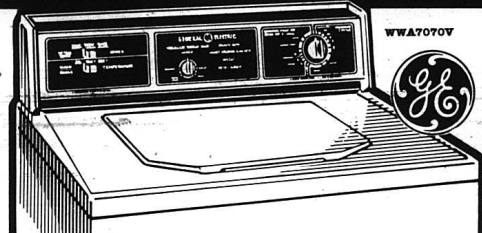
SEWER CONNECTION ORDINANCE

An ordinance of the City of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, taking notice of concurrent proceedings of the city council of said city to undertake the construction of a municipally owned sewer system; requiring all sources of flowable sewage to be connected therewith if connection is available, or as soon as a connection is made available, as herein defined; declaring all unconnected sources of flowable sewage, where sewers are or may hereafter be made available, to constitute a public nuisance which shall be abated; establishing penalties and establishing effective dates.

Section 9. It shall be unlawful for any person to place, deposit or permit to be deposited in any unsanitary manner upon public or private property within the City, any garbage or other objectionable waste, or to discharge to any natural outlet within the City, any sewage, industrial wastes, or other polluted water, except where suitable treatment has been provided under the supervision of the Superintendent of the municipal sewer system or other duly authorized City official.

Section 12. Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance, or failing or refusing to comply with same, whether or not he, she or it shall be the owner or the occupant of the premises involved, shall be fined not less than Five Dollars (\$5.00) nor more than Twenty-Five Dollars (\$25.00) for each offense. Each day that such person, firm or corporation fails to or refuses to connect the sanitary sewer drain from any property or building owned or occupied by him, her or it with an available sewer line, each day any privy, well, vault, pool, cistern, septic tank or similar contrivance into which such sewage is cast or permitted to be disposed of, is kept or maintained in violation of this Ordinance, each day any storm water drain remains connected to any separate sanitary sewer, and each day that any other provision hereof is violated, shall constitute a separate offense. This city is giving the people with this problem 60 days to correct.

Teenager from Venice, Italy Tells Impressions of USA, Mt. Vernon

Andrea Oibolato's big blue eyes and light blonde hair give no clue to her home. The pretty eighteen-year-old, visiting in Mt. Vernon this month, is from Venice, Italy, the famous city of islands and gondolas.

"I would be such a pity if we lost our gondolas," she said, explaining that they are in some danger of extinction because young Venetians do not want to run them anymore. "They all like the motorboats now."

Venice is a city of islands, and travel there has been traditionally by foot or by gondola. Andrea explained. The city is also famous for its art, and one of the most famous museums is run by American Peggy Guggenheim, the only person in Venice with a private gondola.

The teenager is a student at a Catholic girls' school, S' Caterina da Siena. She attends class from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. and then comes home to study. At the end of the year she must pass three days of written examinations and four days of oral ones, or repeat the year.

Italian students enroll at age 7, and then may quit after 8 years, if they desire. Many of the poor children do quit, Andrea said, but others enter secondary school which is a five-year course. Not only me, but for everyone around. He was always smiling, never a frown. I could go on and on but when I got done, I'd wind up saying, "I'm proud to be his son."



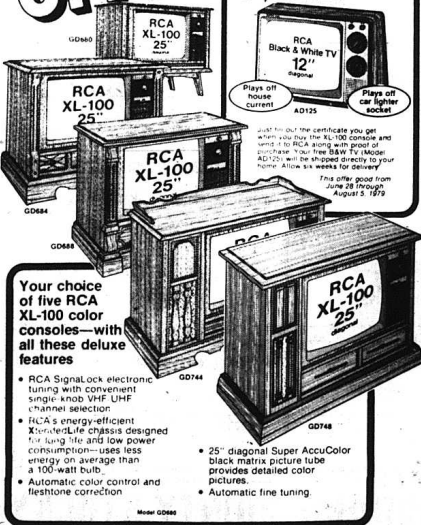
