State Receipts Exceed Estimates

Inflation and full employment have caused state government revenues to slightly exceed estimates for the 1978-79 fiscal year, according to Maurice Carpenter, commissioner of revenue.

General fund receipts for the fiscal year ending June 30 were 15, 1698,527,239. The receipt figure is 35 million over the revised January Contributing to revenue ex-

contributing to revenue ex-contributing to revenue ex-cess with the individul income taxes collection totaling \$450.2 million, which was 1.4 percent over projections. Carpenter said he expects the income tax receipts to continue growing as a result of inflation.

Carpenter said the revenue receipts indicate Kentucky still has a healthy economy, although recent trends in the sales and motor fuel taxes could cause prob-lems.

The sales tax and the motor fuel taxes have suffered from a slower growth rate than expected during the last two months, Carp-

Carpenter blamed the de-crease in fuel tax collections on gas allocations policies.

High gasoline prices have also the sales tax, which was 2 million-1.8 percent below 6610 million.

"When people don't drive,
hey don't shop and spend money,
according to Carpenter. "More of
the Tamily budget is spent on

National economic and energy policies are very important to tax revenues, Carpenter said. "A federal policy encouraging more coal production would be a shot in the arm to Kentucky," he emphasized.

Recent trends in sales and fuel taxes will be considered in the revised estimates for the 1979-90 fiscal year. Carpenter said the projections will be ready for the legislature and the governor within the next month.

Five Young Brodhead Residents Killed in One-Vehicle Accident

Five young people were killed early Thursday in Brodhead in a one car accident on Us 150, a sixth highway death occurred Friday night on 1-75 six miles south of Mt. Vermon, bringing the total number of fatalities to 14 since January in Rockcastle County.

The five who died Thursday were Kenneth Rose, 26; Susan Cass, 21; Timothy Bishop, 21; Johnny D. York, 21; and Gwen Carey, 17. All were residents of Brodhead.

The accident occurred about 12:30 a.m. between Benge's Standard Station and Simpson Feed Mills, where the road curves to the right. According to state trooper Jack Lawless, who arrived at the scene at 12:55, the car missed the curve, knocked over three wooden posts about 10 inches in diameter, and skidded in the brush and trees nd skidded in the brush and tre and skidded in the brush and trees before it hit a dirt embankment. It hit the embankment at such tre-mendous force that the automobile flipped over several times and travelled 17 feet in the air before landing upside down near the railroad tracks.

. Legislative Report

By Rep. Harold DeMare

During the interim periods between legislative sessions, the General Assembly forms into seventy-two standing committees, subcommittees and special committees. These interim committees operate under authority sanctioned by the Legislative Research Commission (LRC).

The LRC is a sixteen membe committee chaired by the Speake of the House and comprised of th bipartisan leadership officers of both the House and Senate.

LRC met on June the 29th to conduct business pertaining to several legislative situations.

It was reported to the commission that a total of 796 information requests were received by members of the LRC staff duringthe month of May 1979. There were 195 miscellaneous requests, 37 remonth of May 1979. There were 195 miscellaneous requests, 37 requests from the LRC library, 33 requests from the public bill room, 273 requests for LRC publications and 258 requests for LRC publications and 258 requests for LRC consecutive reports and information bulletins.

and 239 requests for Life Security reports and information bulletins. The commission voted to authorize a \$6,000 personal service contract for the appropriations and Revenue Committee (AAR) to pay an economist to provide independent revenue estimates and other economic analysis. The economist has been used by A&R for the last four years to provide independent economic statistics used in the preparation of the state executive budget.

The personal service contract review subcommittee reported to LRC that during their one year existence they have succeeded in cancelling or reducing thirden separate contracts. The financial savings to the Commonwealth provided by the subcommittee's actions total \$1,027,942.

The studies will involve investigations into the policies of out-of-state travel by state employees; the bureau for the blind, especially its administrative costs, and service delivery performance, and the real estate education, research and re-covery fund administered by the Kentucky Real Estate Commis-sion.

The chairman of the Interim Joint Committee on Health and Welfare requested LRC to form a subcommittee to study the state's emergency medical services. LRC in turn authorized the appointment of a Health and Welfare subcommittee on emergency medical services which will be comprised of four senators and three representatives.

LRC received a report from the Business Organizations and Professions Committee on the dissilling industry in Kentucky with a request that the situation be studied. It seems that in recent years the number of distilleries in Kentucky has dropped from 59 to 17 and there are indications that the ad valorem tax on distilled spirits is the primary reason. LRC voted to study this situation but as yet it has not been determined which committee will conduct the study.

Also, LRC received and is still contemplating a set of rules and guidelines submitted by the Business Organizations and Professions Committee for the review of new licensing proposals. A recent study by the U.S. Department of Labor shows that more than 900 occupations make requests for licensure. During the 1978 session of the Kentucky General assembly, there were 21 bills introduced to license occupations. So it does appear that some procedure for licensing professions in Kentucky must be established. Also, LRC received and is still



Making Apple Butter
Here's a good recipe for making about 5 pints of apple butter.
Good cooking apples make the best apple butter.

6 pounds apples (about 24) 2 quarts apple juice

3 cups sugar 1½ teaspoons ground cinnamon 1 teaspoon ground allspice 1 teaspoon ground cloves

Wash and slice apples. Add juice and cook until tender. Press through a sieve or food mill to remove skins and seeds. Measure out 3 quarts of apple pulp and cook until thick enough to round up on a spoon. As pulp thickens, stir frequently to prevent sticking. Add sugar and spices. Cook slowly, stirring often, until thick-about 1 hour.

Pour hot into hot, clean pint jars. Lave ¼ inch headspace. Seal and process for 10 minutes in boiling-water-bath canner.

following proportions:
30% syrup-2 cups sugar, 4 cups
water
35%-2½ cups sugar, 4 cups

40% syrup--3 cups sugar, 4 cups water

Freezing Apples

Sliced frozen apples are handy for pie making. Select full-flavored apples that are crisp and firm. Don't use mealy-textured ones. Wash, peel, and core. Cut 12 slices from a medium-size apple and 16 from a large one. To prevent darkening, slice apples into a solution of 2 table-spoons salt to a gallon of water. Hold in this solution no more than 15 to 20 minutes. Drain. Over each quart of appled slices, sprinkle '4 cup sugar, and stir. Or you can omit the sugar. Pack apples into containers and press fruit down tightly. Leave '4 headspace, seal and freeze.


