He was preceded in death by one brother, one sister and one grandchild.

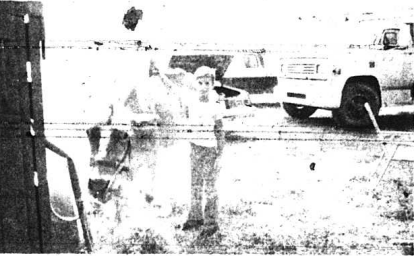

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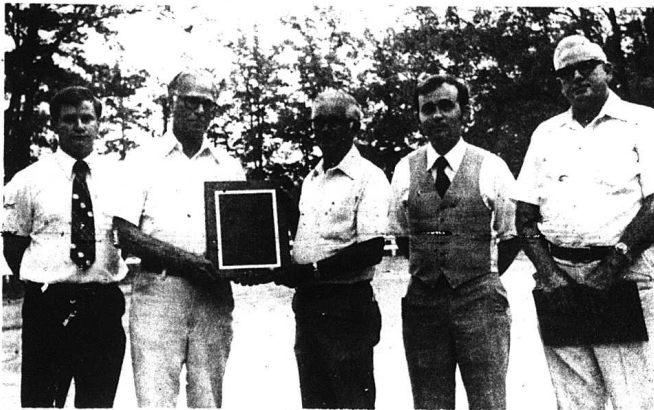

Fiscal Court Meets: Sets Tax Rate; Discusses Winter Road Damage Program

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court met Tuesday morning, and, as one of their items of business, set the tax rate for 1980. The court originally set the rate for the same as last year with the exception of the school tax which will be 9.4 instead of 9.7 as last year. However, after the meeting, Property Valuation Administrator Robert Cromer met with County Judge Executive Hubert Thacker concerning HB 44, passed by the General Assembly in the Special Legislative Session the first part of the year, and there will now have to be a called meeting of the court Saturday to amend the tax rate. Under the provisions of HB 44, only 4 percent more revenue can be collected this year from taxes than in the previous year. According to Mr. Cromer, the county's property assessment is up about \$9,000,000 and this increase in assessment would generate about 14.2 percent more revenue if the rate were left the same as last year. After being apprised of these facts, these facts, the Judge decided to hold a special meeting of the Fiscal Court Saturday to lower the general fund tax from last year's 13.8 cents per hundred dollar assessment to 13.3. This reduction, along with the reduction in the school tax, should lower the revenue collected, to within the 4 percent limit.

The new tax rate should break down as follows: general fund, 13.3; library, 1.5; health department, 4.0; agriculture, 2.0; soil conservation, .025; and intangible estate, .0025, for a total county rate of 30.7 down from 31.5 last year.

The state rate cannot be set until at least 75 percent of all county assessments across the state are in and this has not been accomplished.

At present, the state rate is not known since it cannot be set until at least 75 percent of all county assessments are in and this has not been accomplished. In other business, the court entered into a special agreement with the State Highway Department to participate in the Winter Damage Road Repair Program. Under this program, the county will receive \$80,786 to repair roads damaged by last year's severe winter. The county may use their own equipment and personnel to accomplish this work, leasing whatever equipment they may need that they do not presently have. They are being encouraged by the state to do this since the state says that with present demand, their own maintenance personnel does not have the time to assume further projects.

Wally Phillips was before the court to request that they take over 3 miles of the Old State Road (Richmond-London Road) for maintenance. Mr. Phillips said this was the road dividing Rockcastle and Jackson counties and had been accepted by the Jackson county fiscal court but no work had been done on it. He said it was in poor repair and caused difficulty for children living on it and having to catch a school bus and for people who had to travel it.

The court agreed to accept it for maintenance but was not clear as to which program it would be put under. The court also accepted a proposed supplemental agreement by the state for 5 mile of the Rock Springs Road and 3 mile of the

Brownie Road. Both roads are in Magistrate Danny Sargent's district. And, \$3,000 was allocated in matching funds to the Cumberland River Comprehensive Care Center on the request of Paul Aubrey for fiscal year 1979-80.

to 4 p.m. and 5:30 to 7:30 p.m. The county set a goal the first of January at 195 pints for the year 1979. So far, 86 pints have been donated—50 at the first drive and 36 at the second one. In order to reach this goal, 109 more pints must be donated. If this goal is reached, the entire county will be insured for blood. Another drive will be held on November 20.

Board Again Discusses Facilities Survey Report; Thermostats in Schools Will Be Changed

At Monday night's meeting of the Rockcastle County Board of Education, Charles B. Parsons, Superintendent, read to the board a letter received from Walton Luttrell, Director, Division of Local School District Administrative Services, concerning the facility survey for Rockcastle County.

The letter followed a meeting July 10th between Mr. Parsons and local principals and Mr. Luttrell and aides in Frankfort at which time a discussion concerning the board's wish not to build a middle school for 7th and 8th grades in the county.

The letter, dated July 17th, listed four points which the board had requested as an amendment to the August, 1978 facility survey and dealt with each of them separately.

Item 1 concerning school organization said that the survey team and Mr. Luttrell had agreed to the board's request to retain the K-8 plan of school organization for this problem. In essence, ruling out the addition of a school.

An addition to Mt. Vernon Elementary School to provide extra housing for the large number of students in attendance there, which was the board's request, was dealt with in item 2. In his letter, Mr. Luttrell said that "after considerable discussion, the survey team and I (Mr. Luttrell), do not feel that we could agree with your proposal regarding the construction of an addition to the present Mt. Vernon Elementary School. According to our information, the school enrollment at Mt. Vernon is now approaching 900 students. The size of the enrollment on the school site already exceeds the minimum regulation for this elementary school. An addition to this school will only compound this problem." Mr. Parsons told the board that the state requires a 10-acre site for the first 500 students and an additional acre for each 100 pupils after that.

Mr. Parsons said that the board was the major drawback to an addition to MVES. Mr. Luttrell has told Mr. Parsons that one alternative would be to split up the eight grades at MVES by building a new school for the kindergarten through 4th grades and leaving the other four grades at the present site. The board discussed available sites at the meeting but decided to defer the matter to future meetings and decide later what course of action to take. Item three voiced Mr. Luttrell and the survey team's concurrence with the board's request to construct 4 additional classrooms and a shower/dressing room at Roundstone Elementary School.

And, "the board's request to upgrade Livingston and Brodhead Elementary Schools was also concurred with. Mr. Parsons told the board that chances were good that Rockcastle County would be in line for funding from the newly established School Board Authority next school year and that the board needed to resolve the question in the next few months of how to alleviate the overcrowding at MVES in a manner also acceptable to the State in order to be ready to take advantage of the funds when they become available. Rockcastle, according to Mr. Parsons, is listed at a 64% rate of need which means that this percentage of construction funds would be available from the School Board Authority with the remaining 36% coming from the board's bonding ability or from any construction funds the board might have available.

The board also approved a 9.4c per hundred dollar assessment tax rate, a cut from last year's rate of 9.7c.

It's Going To Be Hotter and Colder

Students and teachers at RCHS and the Vocational School might be a little uncomfortable this year with the President's order of emergency building temperature restrictions for all public buildings.

Effective for the next nine months, these restrictions apply to all Kentucky schools, except those housing kindergartens through 6th grades as all elementary schools do, and means that thermostats will be set at no lower than 78 degrees in summer and no higher than 65 degrees in winter. Also, hot water heaters, except those servicing the dishwasher

of a cafeteria, must be lowered to 100 degrees.

Mr. Parsons apprised the school board of these restrictions at Monday night's meetings.

Bids Opened

Bids were opened at the meeting for various supplies needed for operation of the school in the upcoming year.

Southern Belle was the low bidder on all three types of milk (regular white, chocolate and 2%) at 14c per half-pint; Goodyear of Lexington was the low bidder on all tires needed; M.L. Becker Oil Co. was the low bidder on oil and lubricants and received the bid for gasolines; Multi-County Services submitted the only bid for garbage disposal at the five consolidated schools in the amount of \$537.90 per month and was accepted; a Tennessee firm submitted the only bid for school pictures (both underclassmen and senior) and it was approved; Fred Tuggle of Georgetown was the successful low bidder for hauling the coal at \$3.94 per ton; Kerns Bread Co.'s bid was accepted for all bakery supplies and Lexington Exterminating submitted the low bid for termite and pest control at all 6 schools and it was accepted.

In other action, the board hired the following substitute teachers, subject to proper certification: Paula Clark, Katherine Bradley, Hubert Hunt, Elizabeth Mullins, Patsy Morgan, John Graves, Lavada VanWinkle, Robert Hendrickson, Juanita Stanley, Ona Coffey, Edna Fain, Jeannine Cum-

mins, Regina Burton, Carla Parsons, Ryan Riddle, Connie Riddle and Diana Meade.

Charlotte Hayes was employed as part-time cook at Roundstone and Vickie Burlette DeBorde as teacher aide at RBS. Also employed was Dora Sturgill as substitute cook at Livingston School.

COACHES HIRED

All coaching positions in the high school and elementary schools were filled with the same personnel as last year with head coaches (excepting baseball coach who receives \$1,000) receiving \$2,160 per year and assistant coaches receiving \$1,080 (in the high school). In the elementary schools, boys and girls basketball coaches will receive \$500 and football coaches will receive \$400.

The board also approved the Title VI-B program for handicapped children; employed Verla Scott as adult education teacher; authorized the superintendent to make necessary transfers and assignment of personnel necessary to start school, subject to approval at next board meeting; approved GED certificates for Linda D. Mason and Tammy Harrison; approved the lunchroom policy statement for 1979-80 with lunch prices to stay the same (50c for elementary and 55c for high school) except for extra milk which will be raised to 10c to offset additional cost; approved the ordering of 6 new 65 passenger school buses; authorized the advertising for bids to install a new sewer plant at Roundstone School at an approximate cost of \$50,000 (the new one will have a larger capacity) and approved employing Ben Dale Wilson to do electrical repair work as required by insurance inspectors for elementary schools.

School Calendar Released

The School Calendar for the 1979-80 school year has been released showing school to begin August 20th with an in-service day and ending May 15 as the last day for students.

The calendar breaks down as follows:

August 20, In-Service Day; August 21, Professional Day (opening); August 22, Enrollment for Students; September 3, Labor Day Holiday; October 5, C.K.E.A., October 18, In-Service Day; November 22 and 23, Thanksgiving Holiday; December 24 thru January 1, Christmas Vacation; January 22 and Feb. 22, In-Service Days; April 10 and 11, K.E.A.; may 14, Professional Day (Closing) and May 15, Last day for students.

The State Board of Education has ruled that there must be a total of 175 days taught with 4 holidays, 4 in-service days, 1 opening day and 1 closing day for a total of 185 days.

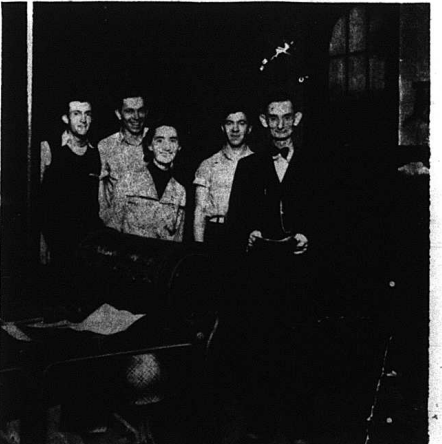
Kiwanis Club To Give Away Gasoline

Is the Mormon Church the Right Church?

If it is, then men were without the true church on the earth for over 1800 years after the church was established in AD 33 as recorded in Acts 2:47. The Mormon Church was not organized until April 6, 1830, at Fayette, New York. It is sad, but true, that the Mormon church teaches many doctrines not found in the Bible. The apostle Paul warns about those who teach another gospel (Gal. 1:8-9). The truth of the gospel, the NEW Testament, has never changed (Jude 3)-but Mormonism has changed many of its teachings. If these teachings were originally from God, as its leaders claim, why should they be changed? This question is begging for an answer.

In the early days of Mormonism, the leaders taught that POLYGAMY must be practiced for one to be exalted as a true son of God (Journal of Discourses, Vol. 11, P. 269). John Taylor, the third President of the Mormon church, said: "...we are not ashamed here in this great metropolis of America...to declare that we are polygamists...that we are firm, conscientious believers in polygamy, that it is part and parcel of our religious creed" (Life of John Taylor, P. 256). Today the Mormon leaders teach that polygamy is SINFUL. "Any who pretend or assume to engage in plural

marriage in this day...are guilty of gross wickedness. They are living in adultery, have already sold their souls to Satan, and...they will be damned in eternity" (Mormon Doctrine, pp. 322-23).

More recently President Kimball of the Mormon Church claimed that he received a New revelation from God instructing the Mormon church to receive black people into the priesthood, who, according to their former so-called revelation from God were banned from that priesthood. Surely, this farcical "revelation" received just when there was such a pressing need for it to relieve the civil and religious pressure on the organization cannot help but be embarrassing to every thinking Mormon. We know that the "revelation" came from the throne of Kimball in Salt Lake City, and not from God's Throne in Heaven.

Jesus taught that polygamy is wrong (Matt. 19:9), and the apostles taught that every Christian is a priest (1 Pet. 2:5-9). The New testament is complete and perfect (and has been ever since it was written), and needs no changing (2 Tim. 8:16-17). Therefore anyone who claims additional revelations from God is a False Prophet, and any church that claims latter day revelations is a False Church. Beware of false prophets..."
