Children from families whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced price meals or free milk. In addition, families not meeting these criteria but with unusual expenses due to unusually high medical expenses, shelter costs in excess of 30 per-cent of income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, and disaster or casualty losses are unged to apply.

and divaster of casualty iosses are urged to apply. Application forms are being sent to all homes with a letter to parents. Additional forms are available at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year. A simple statement of income and family size is required, blus a signed certification by the parent or guardian that the information provided is correct.

In certain cases foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a family hac foster children living with them and wishes to apply for such meals and milk for them, they should contact the school

If a family member becomes unemployed or if family's size and income changes during the school year, the family should contact the school to file a new application. Such changes may make the children of the family sligible for reduced orice meals, or for additional benefits such as free meals and milk if the family income fails at or below that shown on the family size and income scale.

Under the provisions of the policy, the school official will review applications and deter-mine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official, he may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis.

If he wishes to make a formal appeal, he may make a request either orally or in writing to:

Tomato Sauce and Catsup Put up some of that bounti-ful crop of teanatoes as sauce or catsup. If you're planning to put up magnetrisauce, with ur without

If you're planning to put up synghetii sauce, win ou'r without meat, freezing is the best way to go. Lobking through my can-ning books, I find no recipes for spahetti sauce. Thgt's why I recommend freezing it, or plan-ning to make it hater from your canned or frozen tomatoes.

Storing Ripe Melons You can store ripe canta-loupes up to 10 days in plastic bags in the coldest section of your refrigerator. Ripe watermelons will ast about a week at room tempera-ture. They'll keep 2 or 3 yeeks

at 45 to 50 degrees F., and from 80 to 90 percent humidity. The coldest part of an unbeated basement might be the best place to store them at your home.

home. Signs of Food Speilage Always check for the possi-bility of spoilage when you open jars of home-canned food. Don't ever use food that shows the least sign of something wrong

wrong. Look colsely at each jar of food before opening it. Bulging jar lids or a leak mean that the seal has broken and the food has spoiled. When you open the jar, look for other signs-spurting liquid, an off odor, or mold.

Boil spinach and off-odor during heating-destroy t. Keating usually makes any odor of spoilage more evident. Sterilize at once all jars that have contained yater and humanse in boiling water for lot 51 minutes.




