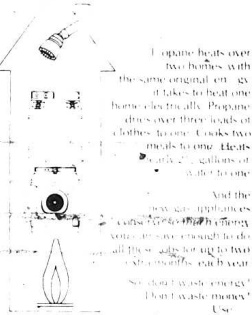

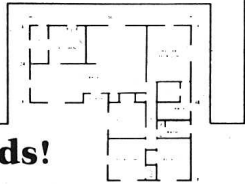

## Water Plant Problems Will Be Subject Of Aug. 27th Called Meeting of Council

The City of Mt. Vernon held their most important item of business until last Monday night at their regular monthly meeting a discussion of the city's problems with supplying the increase demand for water this summer by town residents and the outlying water districts.

The matter was brought to a head with a report to the council by Matt Powell, Jr., Water Superintendent; that the plant was pumping water to near capacity now and that on at least two occasions recently the town's water tank had run dry—meaning that water was being used faster than it could be pumped. The plant has a pumping capacity of 1,000,000 gallons a day and Mr. Powell said that Sunday, August 5th, 953,000 gallons were pumped. He also said if there had been a city fire there would have been no water with which to fight it.

Councilman Joe Young expressed deep concern over the situation and said, in his opinion, expansion by outlying water districts had created most of the problem. Water from the Mt. Vernon plant now goes into three counties (Pulaski, Lincoln and Garrard) and Northern Rockcastle Water District is in the process of expanding their lines into Madison County, Ky. Councilman Young said he felt the council was about a year late in doing something to avoid a crisis. While expressing his desire to accommodate everyone in the county who wants water, Young said that he felt the city waterworks owed it to the people of Mt. Vernon not to put them in a critical situation because of demands on the system by others.

Mr. Powell was asked by the council if it were possible to cut water off to outlying customers in order to meet Mt. Vernon's needs at times and Mr. Powell said yes. Mr. Powell also told the council that the larger line from the Rockcastle Steakhouse to the town's storage tank and two more filters at the plant would enable the plant to double their pumping capacity. This is not as simple as it sounds however, because in addition to the labor involved, the cost of a 12" water line is about \$18 a foot at present and the distance involved is well over a mile. At present, a 12" line goes from the water plant to the steakhouse, then is reduced to a 10" line for a ways and is downgraded in steps until it is only 6" line going into the tank.

The rate water districts pay for city water was also brought into the discussion and Mrs. Powell told the council that this contributed to the plant's problems because, at least one district found it cheaper to ignore leaks and pay for the water than they did to pay an independent contractor to repair the leaks. Mr. Powell also pointed out that with the plant having to be almost continuously this increased heavily to the cost of operation and maintenance.

Councilman Chester Hellard told the Council that he had done some rough calculations

that showed it cost the city approximately \$1.20 per thousand gallons to produce the water and the city was getting 45 cents per thousand gallons from the districts and he produced a news item showing that Burnside was encountering the same problem with one of their districts, Tateville. Burnside says they are getting 70 cents per thousand gallons for water and the cost of producing the same thousand gallons is \$1.37.

The upshot of the discussion was that all water district managers would be asked to attend a called meeting of the City Council Monday night, August 27th, at 7:30 p.m. for the purpose of discussing a possible increase in rates and restrictions on further expansions.

The City Council accepted two bids, for blacktop and a new police cruiser, at their regular monthly meeting Monday night. Only one bid for blacktop was submitted and this was from the Allen Co. for \$19.50 per ton. Superintendent Matt Powell said that the city crew would be patching all the streets in Mt. Vernon as soon as possible.

Three bids for a new police cruiser were received. The city requested bids specifically on a

four-door Chevrolet Malibu. Owens Chevrolet in Stanford was the apparent low bidder with a bid of \$4,525 for a 1979 Malibu. Their bid specified that if a 1980 model was desired, the cost would be approximately 3 1/2% higher. The Council accepted the bid for a 1979 model and action will be taken at September's meeting.

Once again the Council discussed the reason for water in the basement of Bryant Bros. store on Main St. Recently, the city dug up a sewer line near the store to see if it was leaking and causing the problem but it appeared to be alright. Last night, the council decided to again inject dye into the system to see if this would help locate the source of the problem. This procedure was followed once before with no results.

A draft letter to realtors in the area concerning the city's compliance with the Fair Housing Ordinance was read to the council but, the council felt that since they had already approved a Fair Housing Ordinance in January of this year, that the letter was not necessary. The matter was held until the next meeting.

## Legislative Report

By Rep. Harold DeMarcus

Since coming to the state legislature in 1964, the General Assembly has met in regular session every two years to re-view and enact the appropriation of revenues, generally under the guidelines of a governor's proposal. After serving as a member of the Appropriations and Revenue Committee for sixteen years, one particular budgetary problem has consistently occurred.

It is not a problem that is new to government, in fact, it may be government's most longstanding hindrance. The problem is a lack of vision, one of not knowing what forces will be at bay six years from now or even six months.

The General Assembly approves a two year or biennial budget and invariably, due to the fact that no recalculation of the budget may be done during

that two year period, one agency is appropriated more money than it needs while another agency or program is not appropriated enough, and tax reductions are indeed rare.

Common sense relates that it is not to alleviate some of these problems would be to change Kentucky's appropriation method from a biennial budget to an annual budget. A one year budget could quite possibly result in fewer padded agency budgets and personal service contracts, fewer unstudied initiatives and yes, less waste.

1979's special legislative session showed that many state agencies have padded budgets and the personal service contracts. The subcommittee has proved indisputable fashion that many agencies allot service contracts for twice the needed amount of funds in order to ensure a program's continuance

for the second fiscal year of a biennial budget.

August's meeting of the Personal Service Contract Review Subcommittee will be held for two days instead of one and over two hundred contracts will be reviewed instead of the normal fifty to seventy-five. During its first year the subcommittee reduced contract spending by over one-million dollars and, with continued support from the press, we fully expect to reduce fiscal year 1979's contract spending by two million dollars.

The abnormal glut of personal service contracts are due to the fact that we are barely six weeks into a new fiscal year, and many old contracts are seeking renewal. And because the present governor, nearing the end of his term, is seeking to commit state revenue funds to the programs supported by his administration.

Many of these commitments will serve to usurp a substantial amount of the Commonwealth's 1980 revenue. Revenue estimates indicate that the state is embarking upon a recession period, thus it is safe to assume that the appropriation of revenue by a new governor, and the 1980 General Assembly must be of an astute nature.

hold a special session in 1981 for the exclusive purpose of preparing a one year budget. The concept of a one year budget raises many questions but the questions deserve careful scrutiny.

## ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF MOUNT VERNON, KENTUCKY AMENDING ORDINANCE NUMBER 89, AND PROHIBITING DOGS RUNNING AT LARGE WITHIN THE CITY.

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person to permit any dog to run at large in the City of Mount Vernon, Kentucky.

Section 2. Any person who violates Section 1 of this ordinance shall be fined not less than twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars nor more than one hundred (\$100.00) dollars. Each day of violation constitutes a separate offense.

Section 3. Any dog permitted to run at large in violation of this ordinance shall be subject to capture, impoundment and destruction.

Section 4. This ordinance shall be effective upon publication.

# Frank Arneson, Rockcastle Countian

## Remembers "The Duke" John Wayne

In 1943, Frank Arneson was a young member of the Navy's Construction Battalions: the

Seabees, when he spent three months in California with 185 other sailors filming "The

### Fightin' Seabees.

The movie starred John Wayne and Mr. Arneson as an amateur photographer, took many pictures of the actor and filming of the movie. He showed these pictures and told his story to the Signal, because the death of John Wayne had moved him deeply.

"I don't want to sell this stuff, or make a penny off of it," he said. "But I want to do this article in memory of John Wayne. I wish you could tell people what he meant to the servicemen in those days and after the War."

The Navy apparently thought John Wayne's war

movies were effective propaganda for the Allies, too, because the Navy gave Republic Studios its complete co-operation during the filming. Mr. Arneson received his Navy pay (14 a month) the whole time he was an extra.

Mr. Arneson's company built a camp on location where the men ate and slept in tents.

"John Wayne was regular fellow, and he was not stuck up at all," Mr. Arneson said. "He smoked maybe five packs of cigarettes a day, and drank some whiskey, but I remember too that he spent a lot of time playing chess. He really enjoyed that game."

Three months of filming produced only about 30 minutes of movie time. The part of "The Fighting Seabees" that featured Mr. Arneson's company was the end of the movie, in which John Wayne dies. That particular sequence, which was very complicated and called for a lot of smoke and fire, had to be shot five times.

Although the camp was only 30 miles from Hollywood, Mr. Arneson recalled how the place was made to look like a south sea island, with simulated palm trees everywhere. Stuntmen on chicken wires flew through the air before they died on screen.

The movie was directed by Harold Yates and also starred Susan Hayward, Dennis O'Keefe, Grant Withers, Paul Fix and Roy Barcroft. It is sometimes shown on late-night television.

Mr. Arneson is planning to donate his picture collection to the Seabees Museum in Gulfport, Miss., but as a gesture to John Wayne, he is sharing them with the public first.

"I would like people to realize what a great man he was," Mr. Arneson said. "There will never be another John Wayne, that's for sure."

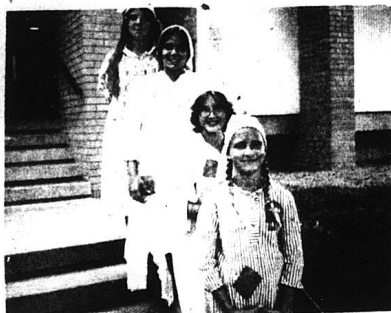

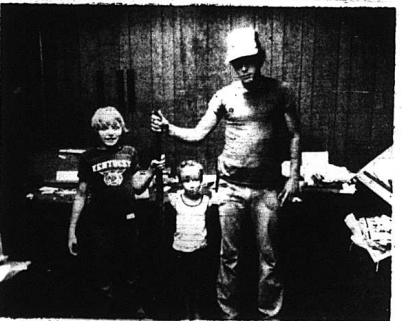

**Food Preservation Clinic**

**Tomato Sauce and Catsup**  
Put up some of that bountiful crop of tomatoes as sauce or catsup. Recipes for canning these products call for enough vinegar so that they may be safely processed in your boiling-water-bath canner.

If you're planning to put up spaghetti sauce, with or without meat, freezing is the best way to go. Looking through my canning books, I find no recipes for spaghetti sauce. That's why I recommend freezing it, or planning to make it later from your canned or frozen tomatoes.

**Storing Ripe Melons**  
You can store ripe cantaloupes up to 10 days in plastic bags in the coldest section of your refrigerator. Ripe watermelons will last about a week at room temperature. They'll keep 2 or 3 weeks

at 45 to 50 degrees F., and from 80 to 90 percent humidity. The coldest part of an unheated basement might be the best place to store them at your home.

**Signs of Food Spoilage**  
Always check for the possibility of spoilage when you open jars of home-canned food. Don't ever use food that shows the least sign of something wrong. Look closely at each jar of food before opening it. Bulging jar lids or a leak mean that the seal has broken and the food has spoiled. When you open the jar, look for other signs: spurting liquid, an off odor, or mold.

**Boil Vegetables Before Tasting**  
For safety's sake, boil all home-canned vegetables at least 10 minutes before you even taste them. Boil spinach and corn 20 minutes. If the food looks spoiled, foam or has an off-odor during heating, destroy it. Heating usually makes any odor of spoilage more evident. Burns spoiled, food is thrown it away where there is no chance it might be eaten by humans or animals. Sterilize at once all jars that have contained spoiled foods—wash in hot soapy water and immerse in boiling water for 10 to 15 minutes.

**Test the Seal After Canning**

Test the seal on jars with porcelain-lined caps by tilting each jar over in your hands. To test a jar that has a flat metal lid press center of lid, if lid is down and will not move, jar is sealed. Or tap the center of the lid with a spoon. A clear, ringing sound means a good seal.

If you find a leaky jar, use unspiced food right away or can it again. Use another jar, a new lid, and pack and process food as if it were fresh. Before using old jar or screwband again check for defects.

When jars are thoroughly cool, take off the screw bands carefully. If a band sticks, covering it for a moment with a hot, damp cloth help loosen it. Before storing canned food wipe jars clean. Label to show contents, date, and lot number (if you canned more than one lot a day).

Wash bands, store them in a dry place so that they won't rust.

Children from families whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced price meals or free milk. In addition, families not meeting these criteria but with unusual expenses due to unusually high medical expenses, shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, and disaster or casualty losses are urged to apply.

Application forms are being sent to all homes with a letter to parents. Additional forms are available at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year. A simple statement of income and family size is required, plus a signed certification by the parent or guardian that the information provided is correct.

In certain cases foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a family has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for such meals and milk for them, they should contact the school.

If a family member becomes unemployed or if the family's size and income changes during the school year, the family should contact the school to file a new application. Such changes may make the children of the family eligible for reduced price meals, or for additional benefits such as free meals and milk if the family income falls at or below that shown on the family size and income scale.

Under the provisions of the policy, the school official will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official, he may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis.

If he wishes to make a formal appeal, he may make a request either orally or in writing to:

for a hearing to appeal the decision. The policy on file in each school and in the Superintendent's office contains an outline of the hearing procedure.

In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of his race, sex, color, or national origin.

Each school and board of education has a copy of the completed policy, which may be reviewed by any interested party.

## Low Interest Loan Program Established by Governor

Gov. Julian Carroll has announced the establishment of a low-interest loan program to aid in the development of land for housing in Kentucky Appalachia.

He said loans will be available through the Kentucky Appalachian Housing Program, which is administered by the Kentucky Housing Corp. under the direction of the Development Cabinet.

This month the Appalachian Regional Commission, a federal-state agency, approved a grant of \$500,000 to set up the loan development.

The loan program represents another step in finding incentives to spur low- and moderate-income housing development in Eastern Kentucky, said Ralph Coldiron, executive director of community and regional development in the Development Cabinet.

Eligible developers will receive the loans at 5.5 percent interest for a maximum period of two years. Loans may be used for housing improvements such as water lines and water supply installation, sewer lines and sewage disposal installation, gas and electric lines and installations, roads, curbs, gutters and recreation areas and sidewalks.

The maximum amount for a loan will be based on the value of the property to be developed. Proposed projects must contain between 15 and 50

dwelling units to qualify for the program. The Kentucky Housing Corp. will consider loans for larger developments in areas where there has been rapid growth as a result of coal production.

New developments of single-family units will be the principal housing type considered for the loans. Existing developments may receive loans for improvements only if they are substantially extended or enlarged.
