Blue Mold on Tobacco
Blue mold, a fungus disease
of Burley tobacco, is usually a
minor disease in Kentucky.
However, it is present every
year in beds in the flue-cured
and cigar tobacco areas of the
south where it may cause extensive damage if chemical control
measures are not used. Blue
mold may appear at any time
but usually in the plantare of the
total conditions, large irregular yellow-spots on the leaves. These
may have scattered dead flecks
or the whole spot may slowly
die. During damp, cool periods,
blue mold may develop rapidly,
killing large areas of the leaves
and the purplish, moldy masses
of spores can be seen on the
undersides of the leaves, especially in the morning.

Blue mold can be controlled
in the plant bed by using such
materials as Ferbam (Fermats)

or Zineb-either as a spray or a

dust.
This year has been different from any other in Kentucky, as far as blue mold is concerned. It "far as blue moid is concerned. It has become a serious problem in Rockcatle and other Counties, especially Pulaski, Logan and Simpson counties which have indicated considerable damage from blue moid. It is believed, according to a University of Kentucky tobacco specialist, that the spores causing the disease have been blown that the spores are proposed to the states. Freeze Melons Now
For Winter Treat
While melons are plentiful
in your own garden or local
market, freeze some for winter
meals. Watermelon, cantaloupe, and honeydew melons are all easy to freeze.

Use only top quality melons. Remove the seeds, peel and cut melon into slices, cubes or

cut meion into sample balls.

Cover with a cold sugar syrup, using two cups sugar to four cups water-or pack dry in bags using no sugar. Expel as much air as possible from the bag, seal and freeze immediately.

bag, sear and arely when using frozen melons, serve them partially thawed, especially those frozen without sugar. Melon silices frozen in a sugar syrup will maintain their texture better and be firmer after thawing.

Freeze Tomates for Soups

Tomatoes are easy to freeze, and they stay high in vitamin C. content and other nutrients. But don't expect them to taste like either fresh or canned tomatoes. Frozen tomatoes are a bit mushy when thawed, but they still work fine in soups and casseroles. Another advantage is that you can do small batches at a time.

You can freeze them without heating first, except for a quick dip in boiling water and then into cold water. Slip off the skins and cut them into quarters

then into cold water. Silp off the skins and cut them into quarters or eighths. Pack them into moisture vapor-proof freezer containrs, pressing down with a wooden spoon to make enough juice to cover. Leave 1-inch headspace, seal and freeze im-mediately.

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


