Star of the show and guest-of-honor will be Kentucky-born Jimmy Skinner whose picture hangs in the country Music Hall of Fame in Nashville. He is one of the nation's best-known song writers and performers.

Also featured will be Old Joe Clark and his son, Terry Jo, from Renfro Valley (Friday night only), Johnson Grass, The Frontier Gospel Singers, Bluegrass Meditations, Earl Barnes and the PeeWees of Bluegrass, Kentucky River Grass, Ray Holiday, Dr. Carl Clark and the Kentucky Heritage Dancers, Jim and Ruby Ann Gaskin and the Frontier Folks-Walt Howard and other special guests.

The Festival will be held at the Frontier Theatre, two miles north of Stanford on U.S. 27. Festival grounds open at noon Friday, shows are scheduled for Friday at 8 p.m., Saturday at 2 p.m. and 8 p.m. and Sunday morning at 10 a.m.

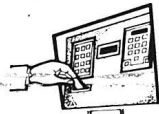

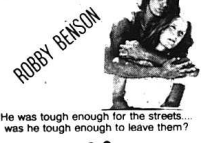

Blue Mold on Tobacco

Blue mold, a fungus disease of burley tobacco, is usually a minor disease in Kentucky. However, it is present every year in beds in the flue-cured and cigar tobacco areas of the south where it may cause extensive damage if chemical control measures are not used. Blue mold may appear at any time, but usually in the plant bed just before setting time. Under dry conditions, large irregular yellow spots on the leaves. These may have scattered dead flecks or the whole spot may slowly die. During damp, cool periods, blue mold may develop rapidly, killing large areas of the leaves and the purplish, moldy masses of spores can be seen on the undersides of the leaves, especially in the morning.

Blue mold can be controlled in the plant bed by using such materials as Ferbam (Fermate) or Zineb—either as a spray or a dust.

This year has been different from any other in Kentucky, as far as blue mold is concerned. It has become a serious problem in Rockcastle and other Counties, especially Pulaski, Logan and Simpson counties which have suffered considerable damage from blue mold. It is believed, according to a University of Kentucky tobacco specialist, that the spores causing the disease have been blown in from some of the southern states. The spores, as far as I know, did not originate in the beds but are air borne. These spores seem to be a systemic type which usually affects the

bottom leaves of the tobacco plants in the field and spreads throughout the plant. Since they are considered systemic, there is no kind of spray, to my knowledge, that will control the disease at this time. Tobacco growers have the alternative of cutting the tobacco and hanging it in the barn—where it may continue to rot and the leaves drop off; or they may leave the tobacco in the field as long as possible, and depend upon a change in weather conditions to help arrest the disease.

Freezing Sweet Red Peppers

Pick, crisp, well-developed bell or pimento peppers with a good red color. Wash, cut out stem, and remove seeds. To loosen peel, roast in a hot oven at 400 degrees, until peel is charred about 3 or 4 minutes. Peel, core, chop or cut in halves or slices. Pack dry in freezer container, leaving 1/2 inch headspace. Seal, label and freeze.

You can freeze red bell peppers without peeling them. Peppers do not need to be blanched in steam or boiling water.

Freezing Hot Peppers

Select crisp, tender green or bright red pods. Wash and drain. Package, seal, label and freeze.

You may want to string some of these hot peppers up to dry in a kitchen window or near the stove. Use them as you need

them. Insects won't bother them.

Use rubber gloves when cutting and handling hot peppers. They will burn your hands similar to boiling water, causing blisters and redness.

Freezing Homemade French Fries

Wash and peel the potatoes, then cut them into strips no more than one-third inch thick.

Heat the strips in boiling water for 3 minutes. Cool in cold, running water for 3 to 5 minutes. Pat them dry with absorbent paper toweling, package in regular bags or plastic containers, label and freeze. They'll keep at zero degrees or below for 2 months.

When you're ready to use them, spread frozen potatoes on a cookie sheet or shallow pan and place them either in a 350 degree oven for 8 to 10 minutes or under the broiler for 5 to 8 minutes. Season with salt and pepper to taste.

Freeze Melons Now For Winter Treat

While melons are plentiful in your own garden or local market, freeze some for winter meals. Watermelon, cantaloupe, and honeydew melons are all easy to freeze.

Use only top quality melons. Remove the seeds, peel and cut melon into slices, cubes or balls.

Cover with a cold sugar syrup, using two cups sugar to four cups water—or pack dry in bags using no sugar. Expel as much air as possible from the bag, seal and freeze immediately.

When using frozen melons, serve them partially thawed, especially those frozen without sugar. Melon slices frozen in a sugar syrup will maintain their texture better and be firmer after thawing.

Freeze Tomatoes for Soups

Tomatoes are easy to freeze, and they stay high in vitamin C content and other nutrients. But don't expect them to taste like either fresh or canned tomatoes.

Frozen tomatoes are a bit mushy when thawed, but they still work fine in soups and casseroles. Another advantage is that you can do small batches at a time.

You can freeze them without heating first, except for a quick dip in boiling water and then cold water. Slip off the skins and cut them into quarters or eighths. Pack them into moisture vapor-proof freezer containers, pressing down with a wooden spoon to make enough juice to cover. Leave 1-inch headspace, seal and freeze immediately.

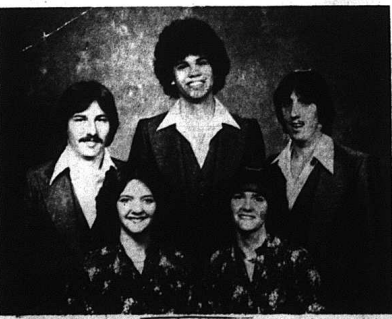

Wildcat Battlefield Listed Historically

The Wildcat Battlefield, located near London in Laurel County, is among 24 sites in the nation to be listed recently on the National Register of Historic Places, according to Eldred W. Melton, executive director of the Kentucky Heritage Commission.

The battlefield, which is situated near the Old Wilderness Road on Wildcat Mountain, was the site of the opening battle of the Civil War in Kentucky. The Battle of Wildcat Mountain, fought on October 21, 1861, resulted in the first victory of the war for Union forces after a summer of defeats and prevented the danger of a Confederate invasion from the east into the Bluegrass region of the state.

 Most Kentuckians are very patriotic. They love their country. In times of war they have sent their sons willingly to defend the U.S.A. In the past the U.S. won the war but often lost the peace by frittering away our gains, thereby making room for another and bigger war. As I well remember the words of the late FDR saying on radio in 1940: "I hate war, no American son would have to fight in a foreign war, adding, "except we be attacked". Well, politicians have been known to arrange for an "attack" if they really want into a fight. Remember Pearl Harbor?

President Carter signed away the Panama canal, and on April 18, 1978, maneuvered the

U.S. Senate to approve that "payaway" scheme. We thought from what he told us that it would cost the U.S. nothing, but later to our chagrin, we learned that Panam wanted, in addition to all we have and hold there, an additional \$4.2 billion dollars (Remember a billion is a thousand million). While members of the U.S. House of Representatives had no part in the "give-away" of Panama, yet they are the ones that do appropriate the money. About half the members of Congress were very unhappy. Mr. Carter coaxed 100 in the House to a private conference and he did some "wheeling and dealing" and then the House did vote 224 "for" and 209 "against" paying Panama the first installment. In fact this government in fact did look the other way while Fidel Castro of Cuba and Torrijos of Panama supplied guns and ammunition to the Communist forces fighting to overthrow the government of duly elected President Somoza of Guatemala in Central America. When asked by American newsmen in Pana-

ma City, Torrijos said, "Sure, I held overthrown Somoza, but isn't that what your State Department said to do? 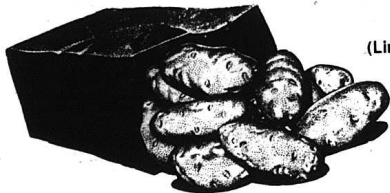

Is It Wrong For Men To Wear Long Hair?

The only passage of Scripture in the New Testament specifically answering this question is 1 Cor. 11:14-15 which reads: "Doth not even nature itself teach you, that if a man have long hair, it is a shame to him? But if a woman have long hair, it is a glory to her: for her hair is given her for a covering." In 1 Cor. 11:1-16, Paul discusses both PRINCIPLE and CUSTOMS which prevailed at Corinth. The basic principle is the relationship of the sexes: man is the head of the woman (V.3). Nothing must be done that will violate this principle. This could be done by a woman's dressing like a man, or vice-versa. It could also be violated by a woman cutting her hair like a man, or a man's letting his grow like a woman. The point is that dress and hair styles must DISTINGUISH THE SEXES.

Instructions in this passage rests upon the natural (God created) distinction between the male and the female, and which distinction is to be indicated in the dress and hair length of each. But how long is long, and how short is short? Even the casual observer must see that these terms are relative; that is, they are not absolute. These questions cannot be answered in terms of inches. If anyone thinks they can, let them tell us (in inches) how long a woman's hair is to be, and how

short a man's hair must be.

Hair styles are largely dictated by custom, and often differ from country to country. Today it is customary for both men and women to wear their hair longer than a few years ago. This is not forbidden in the above text, so long as sex distinction is maintained, which often is NOT the case today. This is wrong.

Also, long hair worn by men and boys is wrong if it is worn as a sign of rebellion. With many young people especially, it is definitely a badge of disobedience, insolence, and rebellion against civil and domestic authority (Rom. 1:30; 2 Pet. 2:10; Eph. 6:1-2). So, if men and boys wear their hair long to testify to the world that they have a rebellious heart, then both their heart and hair needs trimming.

If the hair is worn by the male to make him look like the female, it is wrong.

The Bible condemns effeminacy (1 Cor. 6:9), and this could be a form of it. I am not saying that all males who wear their hair long are effeminate, but who will deny that this is one identifying mark of a homosexual?

When all the evidence is examined, no reason can be found to justify the wearing of long hair on the male. It goes against every principle that should characterize a child of God. God says that it is a "SHAME UNTO HIM".
