**Fishing Report**

Fishing pressure is light on Kentucky's 15 largest lakes as anglers wait for cooler water temperatures to trigger some good fall fishing. The lake-by-lake rundown, as compiled by the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources:

Kentucky: sauger fair trolling deep runners and drifting minnows over submerged ridge tops; crappie fair over drop offs in around 20 feet of water; in tailwaters, catfish and sauger fair; clear, stable, 2 feet below pool and 78 degrees.

Barkley: crappie fair over channel drop offs; in tailwaters, catfish and crappie fair; clear, stable at two feet below pool, and 80 degrees.

Barren: black bass fair casting spinner baits and artificial nightcrawlers off points; white bass fair trolling the flats; clear to murky, stable at pool and 78 degrees.

Nolin: black bass fair on spinner baits and artificial nightcrawlers off points; crappie fair over submerged cover; clear, stable at pool and 79 degrees.

Rough River: crappie slow to fair over submerged cover; bluegill slow along shallow banks; clear, falling, one foot above pool and 81 degrees.

Green: crappie slow over submerged cover; clear, stable at pool and 79 degrees.

Herrington: white bass fair in the jumps and by night fishing; black bass slow on artificial nightcrawlers off points; clear, stable at 15 feet below pool and 80 degrees.

Cumberland: crappie fair over submerged cover approximately 30 feet deep; black bass fair off points casting artificial nightcrawlers after dark and on small crawfish during the day; in tailwaters, trout fair, clear, falling, 14 feet below timberline and 78 degrees.

Dale Hollow: black bass good around submerged weed beds casting artificial nightcrawlers at night; clear, stable at pool and 82 degrees.

Laurel: trout fair night fishing off deep banks, bluegill fair to slow along shallow banks; clear, stable at 1.5 feet below pool and 82 degrees.

Cave Run: black bass slow on spinner baits and artificial nightcrawlers in timbered coves; musky casting deep runners in inlets and bays; clear, stable at pool and 81 degrees.

Buckhorn: crappie fair over deep submerged cover; clear to murky to muddy, falling slowly, one foot below pool and 77 degrees.

Dewey: black bass slow casting crank baits off points and deep banks; crappie slow around stick ups; clear to murky to muddy, stable at pool and 78 degrees.

Grayson: crappie slow over submerged cover; in tailwaters, trout fair, clear, falling slowly, one foot below pool and 78 degrees.

Fishtrap: bluegill slow to fair off shallow banks; crappie slow over submerged cover and around stick ups; clear to murky, stable at pool and 79 degrees.

County Judge Executive, Hubert Thacker today proclaimed September as "Arthritis Month" and urged all Rockcastle residents to support the 1979 Arthritis Campaign of the Rockcastle Chapter of the Arthritis Foundation.

The proclamation, issued September 11, 1979 from the Court House, stressed that arthritis afflicts one in ten Americans of all ages, including 250,000 children. Arthritis strikes a new victim every 33 seconds.

Judge Thacker pointed out that funds raised during the current campaign will aid a national research program seeking the cause and cure of arthritis. "Public support," he noted "enabled researchers to discover the polio vaccine. Hopefully, we can do the same for arthritis."

### Kentucky Afield

As expected, Kentucky's 1979 dove season got off to a somewhat slow start. During the first three days of the season, conservation officers in 99 counties checked 5,761 hunters who had taken 18,905 doves.

This comes out to 3.1 birds per hunter, as compared to last year's figure of 4.28 doves per hunter.

In addition to heavy opening day rains in some part of the state, the lack of cut silage fields contributed to the lower harvest figures.

But most sections of the state reported an ample number of doves, so as fields are cut the birds should start concentrating more and provide better shooting. So don't put away the shotgun if the opening weekend was a disappointment.

For those of us who came home with two or three empty shell boxes, a sore shoulder and just a few doves to show for our efforts, there is the consolation of knowing that we have contributed our share toward financing wildlife conservation.

There's an 11 cent federal excise tax on all hunting equipment and supplies. This money eventually finds its way back to the stores for use in wildlife restoration projects. Dove hunters, because they usually burn up large amounts of ammunition, are among the largest contributors to this fund.

If we assume that it took an average of five shells to bag each of the 18,905 doves that the conservation officers counted over the first three days of the season, then (at 15 cents a shell) the excise tax on the ammunition alone amounts to more than \$1,500.

On a nationwide basis, it has been estimated that there are around 45 million doves harvested each year. Using the same figures, this amounts to \$33.75 million in shotgun shells and some \$3.7 million in federal aid money for wildlife.

Since doves are prolific, numerous and easy to manage, much of the money generated by dove hunters can be used for projects to help other species of wildlife, often including those which are not hunted at all.

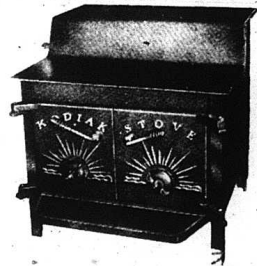

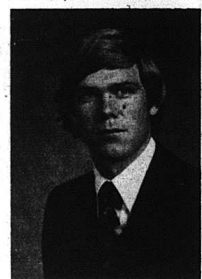

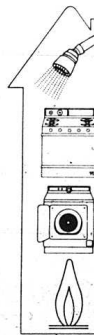

## School Board Approves \$3.8 Million Budget for 1979-80 School Year

A \$3,870,033.11 general budget was approved by the Rockcastle County Board of Education for the next fiscal year at their regular monthly meeting last week.

The budget is up from last year's \$3.43 million dollar budget and the increase is due in large part to an increase in salaries for teachers and principals and in the cost of fixed charges which includes workmen compensation, social security and county retirement.

At present, Rank II teachers with 0-3 years experience are paid \$9,780, up from \$9,330 last year and \$9,018 in 1977-78. Rank II teachers with 0-3 years experience

are paid \$11,630 as opposed to \$11,000 in 78-79 and \$9,618 in 77-78. Rank I pay rate starts at \$13,480 for the 0-3 years experience which was \$12,770 in 78-79 and \$10,218 in 77-78.

The budget, which must be approved by the State Department of Education in Frankfort, shows that the local school board expects to receive revenue from sources of district taxation in the amount of \$554,551.90 and \$3,315,481.21 from sources other than district taxation.

Of the estimated expenses listed, 2.3 million is expected to be paid for instruction as opposed to 2.09 last year; \$65,000

for administration (\$60,000 last year); \$355,573 for maintenance and operation of buildings (1978 was \$257,500); \$285,570.11 is estimated for fixed charges (\$192,000 last year) and \$490,000 for pupil transportation—a difference of only \$19,000 over last year's figure budgeted.

The big item in the receipt column of the budget from sources other than district taxation is \$2,955,208.21 from the foundation program.

## Council Will Make HUD Application For Fairground Hill Area for \$3,000,000

Jennifer Curren of Will Linder and Associates of Berea was at the Mt. Vernon City Council meeting Monday night to conduct the first public meeting concerning the city's application for a HUD grant.

It was decided at the meeting that the city would make application for the same areas as last year—Fairground Hill. The \$3,000,000 grant application will include funds for sewer, housing rehabilitation, sidewalks and street repairs and paving.

A representative of Howard K. Bell Consulting Engineers was at the meeting to discuss the city's possible use of the 200,000 gallon storage tank planned for construction at the industrial park on Hwy. 150. The council was told that the tank could be expanded to take care of any emergency the city might have with meeting the demand on their own storage tank in peak summer days if the city would be willing to pay the difference in the cost of the 200,000 gallon tank and a larger one. The council finally approved a resolution authorizing a preliminary engineering report with the cost not to exceed \$500 for the report, to expand the city's evaluation of the proposed standpipe to include possible modifications so that the tank would be of mutual benefit to the industrial park, the city and the water districts

served by the city. The council was also told that an application would be made to the Appalachian Regional Commission for funds to help construct the storage tank. It was reported that it is possible to get up to 80% of the cost granted if the application were approved.

During the meeting, the council also authorized an engineering report on the cost of constructing a sewer line to five homes on Paul Street in Owens Subdivision at the request of Stanley McClure and Kenneth Taylor.

The Council also awarded the bid for auditing HUD funds to Ollie Green, Jr. of Louisville who submitted the low bid of \$885.

The Council also agreed to a change in the order for the new police cruiser from Owens

Chevrolet. The order originally called for a small V8 engine but Owens Chevrolet said that if this size transmission were purchased then the car would have to have automatic transmission and power steering. The city changed the order to a 6 cylinder engine with manual transmission.

After going into executive session for about half an hour, the council reported that they were in agreement to make Larry Williams Chief of Police at a raise of 5%. Williams had been acting chief since the death of Clifford Pittman.

There will be a called council meeting Monday night, September 17, when the council will meet with members of the Department of Highways to discuss the widening of Hwy. 150 and relocation of water lines along the road.

## PeeWee Football Begins Sept. 17; Two Games Will Be Played Weekly

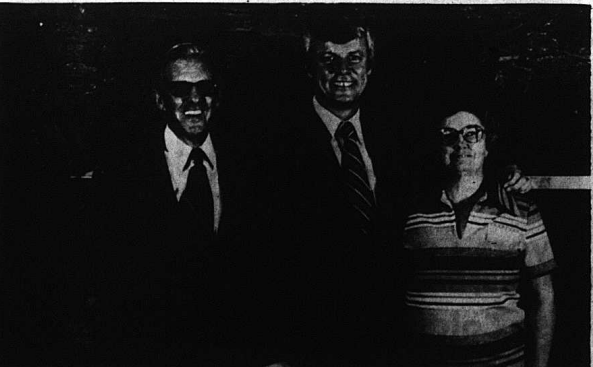

## Letters to the Editor

To the Editor:

I would like to express my profound disappointment that the recent Lion's Club sponsored blood drive at the Bank of Mt. Vernon netted only 19 pints of blood.

The fact of the matter is that anyone, anytime can suddenly find himself in need of blood through accident or illness. If you have to pay for the blood it will probably cost over \$50.00 a pint if it is available at all.

The only way to make blood for human use is in the human body. It must be donated. The availability is further reduced by the fact that people can only receive certain types of blood based on their own blood types. There is also the fact that not everyone can give blood. Donors are carefully screened to reduce inadvertent illness in the recipient.

When an accident occurred earlier this year in Rockcastle County, three young people suddenly found themselves in need of blood. On very short notice, a blood drawing was organized and some very good people donated 50 pints of blood.

This shows that people are fully willing to donate when there is a need. What most people don't realize is that the need is always there. Accidents occur frequently and people do need operations. There are some unfortunate persons who need a frequent and recurring source of blood or they will die.

Those who can give blood can give up to five times a year. Most of the adult population can donate blood.

If a person donates, his or her spouse, the husband's parents, and wife's parents, any children under 18 and the donor are covered by the blood donor plan for a full year. This means that if any of those people need blood during the year after the donation, anywhere in the continental United States, that person will receive the blood at no charge for the blood itself.

In addition, the donor can name a group such as a church with a minimum number of members and if 20% of the members give blood, all members are covered by the plan.

When we in Rockcastle County get 195 people to give in a year, all people in the county are covered by the plan. If over 12,000 people in this county can't come up with 195 pints of blood in one year, I have to conclude that the people

of Rockcastle County don't care much for each other. Whatever happened to the Good Samaritan?

There will be another blood drawing at the Bank of Mt. Vernon on November 20, 1979. That is just before the Thanks-giving holiday. Do you care enough to give just one pint of blood and 45 minutes of your time to save a life?

## Legislative Report

The concern over property taxes found its political origin with California's Proposition 13. Since that time, due in part to inflation, there has been much discussion, a little action and the concern continues.

No one questions the need for taxation, however, it must be clearly defined and administered in an equitable fashion, the sales tax may be defined in this manner. Perhaps the most difficult tax to administer, at least for Kentucky, is the property tax.

The Interim Joint Committee for Appropriations and Revenue has realized that the center of the property tax controversy is the lack of equity in assess-

ments across the state. By a majority vote, the committee authorized its staff to draft several bills relating to property taxes.

Primarily aimed at making assessments more equitable, the bills seek to establish an education-incentive program and mandatory education for property valuation administrators. Also, to create new sections of the Kentucky Revised Statutes to reduce the assessors' workload and change the property tax calendar.

It is important to note that these bills have not been prepared and they have yet to face a detailed and in-depth study. In other action concerning property taxes, the committee requested the state department of revenue to study the feasibility of computerizing property tax assessments across Kentucky, in an attempt to eliminate inequities.

The Department of Revenue, in conjunction with its bureau for computer services, will study the cost of implementing a statewide computer property inventory and valuation system and report its findings to the committee in October. Presently, Fayette is the only county using a computer system in property valuation.

The Commonwealth already has the necessary computer equipment to implement the program. Further, the concept of recording property characteristics and storing them in a computer would allow property valuation administrators to keep up with changing values. Generally, only property that has recently changed hands is valued at 100 percent fair cash value.

Although Kentucky's property taxes are lower than several other states, many people in the Commonwealth are clearly dissatisfied. But, it would be unrealistic for a legislator to attempt repealing the state property tax, especially considering that the tax is required by the state's Constitution.

There are many who feel that House Bill 44, enacted during the 1979 special session of the legislator, which limits property tax rates, has failed to affect the real problem, that being the lack of equity in assessments.

House Bill 44 and the question of property tax assessments and assessors are sure to be a paramount issue during the 1980 legislative session. The General Assembly must take carefully studied steps toward this issue, if we are to solve the

real problem, and not simply shift emphasis or create new problems.

# REACT's Labor Day Week-End Efforts Termed Big Success

Approximately 3500 to 4000 men, women and children took advantage of Rockcastle County hospitality-React style, during the Labor Day Weekend and helped prevent traffic accidents into the bargain.

Travelers from 26 states as far away as Anaheim, California, were among those who stopped for free refreshments during the three days of the React accident prevention project. The React Safety Break planned and operated by the Rockcastle County Line React, was located at the 62 Exit of I-75, Renfro Excon. Free coffee and other refreshments were served to road weary travelers, 24 hours a day from Friday afternoon until Tuesday morning about 3:00 a.m.

In addition, the React monitors handled 10 calls for emergency and motorists assistance on Channel 19 of the Citizens Band Radio service. Rockcastle County Line React provides a 24-hour monitor service for this purpose.

The local group is one of more than 1,700 affiliates of React International, who sponsors the nationwide safety break program with support of American trucking associations.

"We are convinced, however, that just getting people off the highway long enough for a break is a contribution to accident prevention." "If accidents should happen, we contact the proper authorities immediately. Our two-way radio communications save time to save lives. Many travelers expressed appreciation for the chance to get out of their vehicles to refresh themselves."

There were two accidents reported on I-75 in Rockcastle County, and Rockcastle County Line React assisted with both of them.

Our team worked hard and long hours. We all enjoyed every minute of the safety and it was a great success. We would like to

express our appreciation to Griffin Pie Co., Burger Queen and those who donated. Thank you all so much.

## Price Support Request Deadline For Baled Tobacco is September 28

William R. Vincent, State Executive Director, of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, Lexington, Ky. reminds farmers who wish to sell 1979 crop tobacco under the marketing experiment, allowing sale of untied baled burley tobacco with price support must file a request with their local county ASCS office by close of business September 28, 1979.

Vincent advises there are only four changes from last year program, they are:

Each producer would be guaranteed price support on the larger of 1,500 pounds or 20 percent of the farm marketing quota (instead of 5 percent last year).

Any untapped quota would be apportioned to producers desiring to sell more than 20 percent of the farm marketing quota from a State pool instead of a county pool.

Sales opportunity would be available on each sales day instead of on only five specified days.

Individual bales in a lot must be identified. Tobacco graders with the Department's

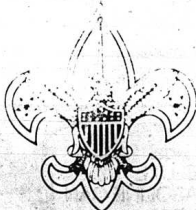

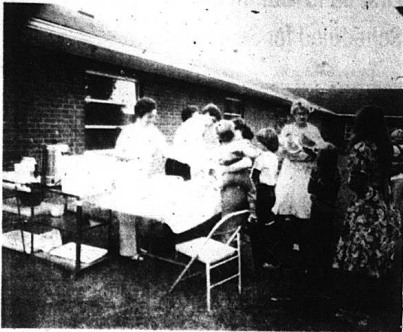

Drying Apples in Kentucky  
Most Kentuckians dry their

apples without sulfurizing, and the fruit gradually darkens during drying and storage. That's why they like their dried apples. So that's the method I'll give here.

Use Cooking Apples. Fall and winter cooking apples are best for drying. Wash, peel, core and trim out blemishes. Cut into

slices or rings about 1/8 inch thick.

Spread slices one layer deep on drying trays. You can make drying trays from screens or from wood slats attached to a frame. Some people just use cookie sheets but they're not as satisfactory. Cover your drying trays with clean cheesecloth, or other thin cloth that will let air circulate.

Spread apple slices on the trays. If you're going to sun dry, place another layer of cheesecloth over the food to help keep out dust and insects.

**Sun Drying**

Successful drying depends on heat, low humidity, and good air circulation. Because of the humidity, you may need to use a combination of sun drying and oven drying, or trust the whole job to the oven. Some people oven-dry foods inside a car parked in the sun, keeping windows open for ventilation.

To sun dry, place loaded trays on a roof or other high surface, away from pets and small children, and away from traffic exhaust, and dust. Bring the trays in at night. If it's not too humid, 3 to 5 days of sunshine should do the job.

**Oven Drying**

This takes anywhere from 4 to 12 hours, and you need to keep a close eye on the apples.

Preheat oven to 140 or 150 degrees. If your treatment can't be set that low, set it as low as possible. Then check it with a thermometer so that you can turn the oven off if it gets too hot.

Put in the trays of food no more than 4 to 6 pounds of prepared apples at a time. Prop the door slightly open. It's good to keep air circulating with an electric fan, if possible. Stir and turn the foods every half hour or so and shift position of trays.

**Doneness Test**

To test, let apples slices cool first. They should feel tough and leathery and shouldn't be sticky.

**Pastuerize and Package**

Heat treat trays of sun-dried apples in a 175 degree oven for 15 minutes before packaging. This helps protect them from insects during storage.

Spread dried apples out to cool on a clean cloth. Don't package them until they are completely cool.

Use dry, scalded, insect-proof storage containers. Large glass jars and metal can with

tight lids are good. It's handy to fill up small (quart size) plastic bags with the dried fruit first, then put these in the jars or cans.

Store them in a cool, dark, dry place. If possible, if the weather stays humid, check the apples from time to time. If you find moisture, reheat for 15 minutes, cool and repackage. If you have extra room in your freezer, you could store your containers of dried apples there.

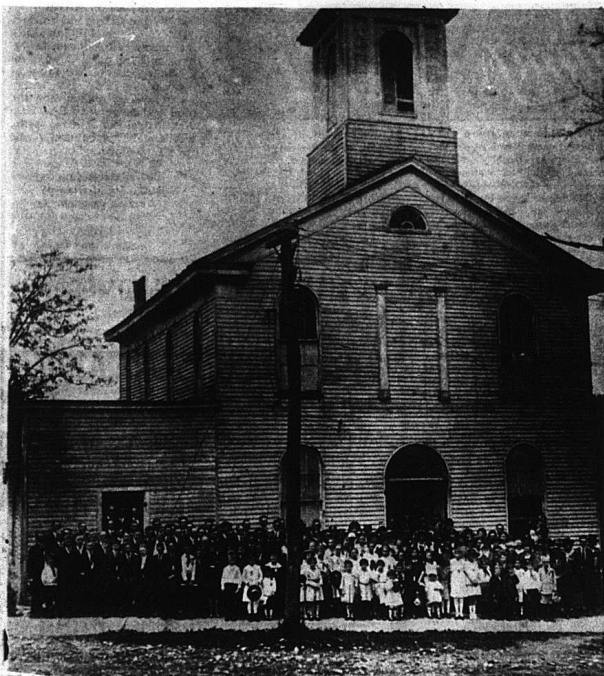
