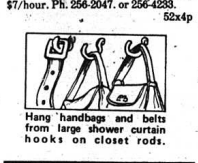

STATEMENT OF NONDISCRIMINATION

A Hamilton, Ohio man, Chester Patrick, was found dead Sunday morning near Hwy. 461 of multiple stab wounds and other injuries caused by a beating.

According to Deputy Coroner Roy Martin, Mr. Patrick, 72, had left the home of relatives late Saturday night to travel to the home of other relatives in Irvine. Mr. Patrick was reportedly driving a yellow pickup truck which is missing.

Mr. Martin said that the victim's billfold was gone but the body still contained a sum of cash pinned to the inside of his shirt and two watches.

The body was found near the Adams Veterinary Clinic by Casper McKinley. It has been sent to Louisville where an autopsy will be performed.

State Police Detective Fred Walton is investigating the murder.

Relocation of Water Lines Along 150 Discussed By Hwy. Dept. and Council

The Mt. Vernon City Council met in called session Monday night and several items wound up on the agenda.

The first item up for discussion concerned relocation of the city's water lines from the property of Jack R. Craig on Hwy. 150 for a distance of about 1700 feet west. The relocation is necessary because of the highway department's plans to widen the road primarily for expediting traffic into and out of the industrial park.

Representatives of the highway department at the meeting told the council that the actual bid letting date for the project will depend on when all the preliminaries such as relocation of utilities are taken care of and though there was no great hurry the city needed to hire an engineer and get the relocation taken care of as soon as possible.

Bill Bailey of the improvement council, who was also at the meeting, spoke up at this point to say that unless relocation of utilities could be accomplished within 2 or 3 weeks, there would be no chance of getting project completed before winter.

The city will be reimbursed for all their costs in relocating the water line by the state, including the engineer's fees. Later in the meeting, the council voted to contact Howard K. Bell Engineers to see if they would be interested in submitting a proposal for the state as to how to best relocate the water line.

Howard K. Bell is the consulting engineers for the water storage tank being planned at the industrial park and this was one reason the council decided to contact them about the engineering job on relocation of the water line. Mr. Bailey read a letter to the council from the engineering company which briefly outlined the advantages to the city of increasing the proposed storage capacity by 200,000 gallons to enable the city to take part of the load of supplying water, in this case to Brodhead, on peak water usage days. The thinking of the council was that if the city decides to go ahead with plans to increase the storage tank capacity then the newly relocated water line would have to be altered somewhat to provide water to the tank.

Mr. Bailey also told the council that the letter said the cost to the city would be no more than \$100,000. On where this money would come from, Mr. Bailey said that understood that it was too late for the city to apply this year for funds to finance the cost but that the improvement council had amended their application for funds by \$75,000 to apply to the extra cost of the expansion. This would leave the city with about \$25,000 needed. No definite action was taken on the matter by the council.

In other business, the city heard a request from Bill Bailey and Dr. Arvin concerning maintenance of the road which runs to their homes. Dr. Arvin said that the city has never maintained the street and it was his and Mr. Bailey's understanding that the street had been accepted for maintenance by the council some time ago.

The council discussed this request for some time and it was brought out during the discussion that the city's minutes did not reflect any action by this council or previous ones in accepting the street for maintenance. Mr. Bailey originally blacktopped the street at his own expense.

Later, the council went into executive session to discuss the matter along with other items and when the meeting was again opened, Mayor Roland Mullins asked the Council for a motion on the request. However, none was forthcoming from council members and the matter was dropped.

Another matter which prompted discussion in executive session was the hiring of a part-time policeman. Two applicants, Charles Lovell, Jr. and

Bill Taylor were present at the meeting to discuss their applications with the council. After the executive session, there was no motion made on hiring a policeman and Mayor Mullins told the applicants that the matter would be decided at a later date.

City water superintendent Matt Powell, Jr. told the council that he had been approached by Donald Bullock and John Singleton for permission to install a 1" water line for a distance of 1300 feet to their property behind Robert Baker's on Brush Creek Road.

That prompted several minutes of discussion by the council since, as Mr. Powell explained it, the two men wanted to hook onto a 1" line already in use on

the road for about 1,000 feet and Powell said that if an additional 1300 feet of line were installed, there would be no water pressure to the houses to which the line was extended. The installation of a 3" line was discussed and it was felt that this would mean that the original customers on the 1" line would have their pressure drained. After some discussion, the Council directed Mr. Powell to set out, in writing, the alternatives open to the men and to make it clear what could be the result of installing a 1" line. If they still choose to do so after this, the city will grant permission for the installation, at the men's expense, and accept the line for maintenance.

Cumberland Fence Receives Bid

Three bids were received for construction of a chain link fence around the ball field at the Brodhead Playground and Cumberland Fence Co. of Science Hill was the successful low bidder at \$7,500.

The other two bidders, Lee B. Sizemore Fence Co., Manchester and Eads Fence Co., Berea, bid \$9,139.00 and \$8,910, respectively, on the project.

The court accepted the low bid and gave County Judge Executive Hubert Tucker authority to sign all papers in connection with the contract.

Ten Commandments Project Completed

The Rockcastle Association of Baptists has completed the project which began some four months ago. R.C. Flynn, Pastor of the Brodhead Baptist Church, served as Chairman for the project. He has announced that the group of Baptists raised over \$1800 for the 165 plaques placed in classrooms in the county schools and offices of the county Courthouse.

Flynn expressed his sincere appreciation for the tremendous response to the project. He further added that if any classrooms or offices in the courthouse have been omitted, it was through error and that if he was notified, there would be a plaque for the omitted classrooms or offices.

Legislative

Report

The Interim Joint Committee for State Government met in the House Chamber during the last week of August to hold confirmation hearings on the gubernatorial appointments to the full-time Energy Regulatory Commission and part-time Utility Regulatory Commission, each consisting of three members.

The regulatory agencies are the remnants of the old Public Service Commission (PSC), which was restructured by the 1978 General Assembly. The energy commission regulates the rates for most of the state's gas and electric utilities. The utility commission regulates the rates for most sewer, telephone and water companies.

In the past, PSC commissioners, after being appointed by the governor, were confirmed by the state Senate in a routine ceremony at the beginning of a legislative session. The 1978 bill which provided for the hearings by an interim committee was supported by the governor, who wanted his appointments confirmed before he left office.

The state government committee could have easily confirmed the appointments without subjecting the commissioners to a series of public hearings. But the committee realized the vast scope of utilities and saw the importance of making sure that the persons appointed to regulate utility rates are qualified and competent.

The commissioners of the regulatory boards submitted individual resumes listing their educational background, prior governmental experience and general job qualifications. Committee members asked the commissioners if they receive any income from utilities, in the form of being a stockholder or receiving anything of value, such as rebate, pass or percentage of a contract.

Also, the commissioners were required to detail any political activity or involvement on their part, while they


were serving the state as a regulatory of utilities.

For the most part, the six commissioners answered the committee's questions satisfactorily and no concrete inequities were discovered. However, some very important points were raised during the hearings.

First, the committee could only take the commissioners at their word, thus, the possibility of misinformation or non-qualifications for the job did exist. Perhaps, some type of investigation should be conducted in order to verify the commissioners' testimony.

One member of the committee asked one of the full-time energy regulatory commission (Cont'd to P-13)

Beyond these simple essentials, be guided by the "Basic" Four. And when you can, tuck in a special treat. Too, don't forget the necessities: plastic spoons or forks, salt and pepper and paper napkins.

You will find that wide-mouthed vacuum bottles are most useful for: stews, chili, baked beans and franks, soups and chowders, potato salad, fruit gelatin, milk shakes, flavored yogurts and vegetables (hot or chilled and marinated).

Something to keep in mind when you are preparing dinner: an extra serving or two might just make the right addition to the day-after-tomorrow's lunch box.

If you plan the lunch bag menu ahead, you can make a week's sandwiches at once. Wrap them individually and freeze. When ready to use, just take what you need from the freezer and place them in the lunch bag. They will thaw by noon. If you put the frozen sandwiches near vegetable relishes and the like, it will help keep the latter cool and crisp.

Tips for Packing a Lunch

Use these tips for freezing sandwiches ahead: (1) Use day-old bread (enriched or whole grain); (2) Spread a thin layer of soft butter or margarine on every slice, covering from crust to crust. This prevents the filling from soaking into the bread; (3) Fill with meat loaf, cold cuts, soft butter, chicken, turkey, ham, peanut butter and bacon, etc.; (4) Beware of mayonnaise and salad dressings—they soak into the bread. In warm weather, they may spoil, too. (5) Add tomatoes, lettuce, celery and green pepper when ready to serve. They lose their crispness in the freezer.

Here are a few fun ideas to liven up the lunch bag: (1) pack dips, cottage cheese, puddings and fruit or vegetable salads in small plastic containers. (2) Add the little extras: raisins, hard-cooked eggs, cheese and crackers, celery stuffed with peanut butter or cheese, cherry tomatoes, carrot sticks, radishes, cauliflowerets. (3) cut unfrosted cupcakes horizontally. (4) Add lunch bags with frosting—no frosting to stick to wrappings.

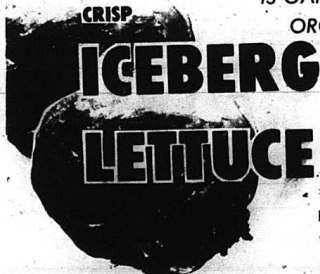

Unfortunately, to many of those same people, the method by which His blood is applied is mysterious. Consequently, though they realize that they must contact His blood, they do not know how. The Bible has the answer.

Please answer this simple question: Where is your blood? It is in your body, of course, and could do you no good outside your body. It is the life-giving substance of your body and without it, you could not live. All members of your body are sustained by your blood. So it is with the Blood of Christ; it is in His body and all members of His body are sustained by it. The next question then is: What is His body? God "gave him (Christ) to be the head over all things to the church, which is His body..." (Eph. 1:22-23).

How many bodies does Christ have? How many bodies do you have? There is one body" (Eph. 4:4). One head over many bodies is a freak - so let us not charge our Lord with malformation! There are just as many bodies (churches) as there are heads.

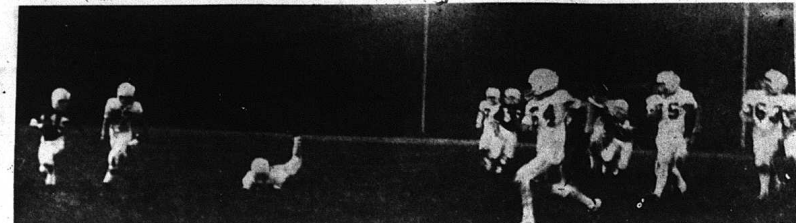

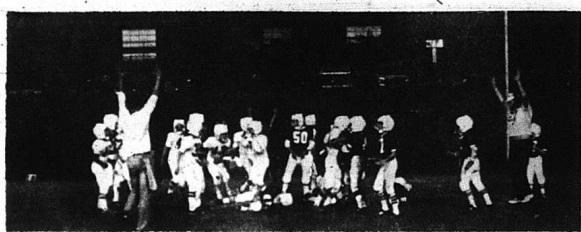

ers for his opinion on the fact that a Union Carbide plant in Paducah was utilizing some forms of nuclear power. It was revealed that the commissioner did not have an opinion because he was unaware of any nuclear usage.

Another member of the committee asked one of the part-time utility regulatory commissioners if in her opinion she did enough work to earn a \$26,500 per year salary. The response was, the hearing officers on the commission's staff did most of the work and that her position was mostly as a figurehead.

The state government committee will meet in a few weeks to confirm or refuse to confirm all or part of the commissioners. These public hearings have brought many new questions to light and it is fact, the more the public knows about government, its diversity corresponds to how it serves them.
