

There were two big losses from the county's assessment figures this year-one affects the county directly in the amount of taxes collected and the other indirectly through money re-turned to the schools by the state. One of the categories

dropped front the assessment was tax on unmined coal, an assessment last year of \$1,094,600 in the county. This assessment was done away with by the legislature and costs the state \$6,111.10 which affects the

amount of tax money the school board receives back from the state but not to any great extent. The other figure taken from the assessment was for

manufacturing machinery and manufactuers inventory of raw materials. This assessment for \$134,050 was taken from the tax rolls when Texas Pioneer Coal Co. moved their operation from the county. This loss cost the county ever \$10,000 in taxes.

The increase in homestead exemptions over 1978 were \$960,350 for farms and \$982,150 for residential. The total of the exemptions for the two are \$3,955,600 and \$296,950, respec-tively. tively.

There are 105,429 acres in the county under fire protec-tion; 133,770 acres farm land and 8,388 registered motor ve-hicles (up 387 from last year).

# Industrial Authority Receives \$164,400 Grant From ARC

Gov. Julian Carroll has an-nounced the Appalachian Re-gional Commission has ap-proved a \$164,400 grant to the Rockcastle County Industrial Authority in Mount Vernon. Development Secretary William Short said the grant will be used to build a 300,000 gallon, water storage tank, wa-ter mains and an internal access road for the Rockcastle County Industrial Park. Maddip project Will come from the Parmer's Home Adminis-tration and state and local

sources. The industrial park is adja-cent to U.S. 150 and will be intersected by the new KY 461: bypass when it is completed. The 89-acre park is expected to cost 84.5 million and provide the area with more than 600 jobs, Short said. Thirteen indus-trial sites are located on 75 areas

The Development Cabinet administers the state's ARC programs through its Office of Community and Regional Dev-elopment.

# Legislative Report

By Rep. Harold DeMarcus During the September meeting of the committee for Program Review and Investiga-tion several alarming and costly facts were uncovered. The is-sues concern the state's Crime Victims Compensation Board, Welfare\_Vendor Fraud Unit and the Public Employees Deferred Compensation System. The 1976 General Assembly created the Crime Victims Com-pensation Board to reimburse for the loss of wages, on a limited basis, innocent victims of criminal acts. Two legislative committees have been looking inter a year.

into the board's operation go over a year. Financial records show that one-half of every dollar approp-riated - to the Crime Victims, Compensation Board is spent on administrative costs. Apparent-y the Board is overstatified and is withholding information from the legislature to suppress this fact.

The only remaining alterna-tive is for Program Review to request that the state auditor's office conduct an indepth audit office conduct an indepth audit into the operation of the Crime Victims Compensation Board. It has been widely reported that because the state's welfare vendor fraud unit is adminis-tered by fhe Department of Human Resources instead of the Office of the Attorney General,

federal sanction of the pro-gram cannot be obtained. This represents \$100,000 in federal funds that the state loses for each month the fraud unit is not sanctioned by the federal gov ernment.

ermment. Program Review discov-ered this situation and re-quested the governor to apply his executive powers, place the fraud unit under the Office of Attorney General and thus ac-quirer for the Commonwealth, \$1.2 million peryear in federal funds.

Un-fortunately, now the only way to solve the problem is for the General Assembly to enact a law in 1990 which will serve to solver the the fraud unit.



## Insects Can Be Controlled In Stored Grain

Kentucky is located in a region characterized by stored-grain insect infestations every year, but farmers don't have to let insects take over their grain supplies, according to an Exten-

sion entomologist at the Uni-versity of Kentucky. Chris Christensen says in-festations can be reduced with careful attention to the bin and the graft put into it. His first recommendation is to clean bins before filling with new grain since secondary pests develop on broken grain, chaff "Gef ut all the old stored

"Get out all the old stored grain," he advises. "You may

ist. Next, sweep out the bins, being careful to clean all cracks and crevices and to remove cobwebs. In bins with perfor-ated floors, Christensen says to take up the floor to remove grain that might have filtered through.

grain that might have filtered through. Soutside the bin, all weeds should be ut to promote good air movement and to remove harborage areas for insects. Christensen adds that weeds also can be hiding piles of grain spilled outside the bin.

After the bins are clean, floors and walls, including cracks and crevices, should be thoroughly sprayed inside and out with an insecticide labeled for use before filling bins. Christensen suggests checking with county agricultural Exten-sion agents for recommenda-tions.

Stored grain infestations also may be caused when in-fested grain is brought into the bin. To prevent the spread of these primar pests, the special-ist says to treat grain with an insecticide as it is put into the


Christensen says it is im-portant to maintain the proper-temperature and moisture con-tent in the grain bin to reduce pest problems. This won't stop infestations after the grain is already infested, but it will make it easier to fumigate, according to the specialist.
