**Pay Attention to Pasture Improvement**

With beef prices the best they have been in several years, cattle producers need to pay close attention to pasture improvement, says John Houston, a local conservation district leader.

"Grass is the cheapest source of good nutrition for beef and other grazing animals, but we need to keep a close watch on pasture stands and out fertilization programs," says John, chairman of the Rockcastle Conservation District.

"Low cattle prices and high fertilizer costs in recent years have caused many of us to let our pastures deteriorate," Mr. Houston says. "Quite simply, it was too expensive to maintain pastures while losing money on cattle."

"This cost-price squeeze also caused many producers to plow up sloping pastureland to plant corn, soybeans, and other row crops," John says.

We think the time is now ripe to fertilize, renovate, reseed, and improve pastures for a good source of economical feed for cattle, and for conservation," Mr. Houston says. "We are particularly keen on this

right now because a well-managed pasture-of all conservation practices-is one of the most effective means of conserving soil and water, and keeping our streams and ponds clean.

"I estimate that there are 16,000 acres of pasture in Rockcastle County, that are showing problems from insufficient management," the chairman of the Conservation District said. "As cattle prices are once again favorable, these pastures should get attention this fall or next spring."

According to Mr. Houston there are many pastures in the county which have good grass but few or no legumes (cloves). He said "this problem could be corrected by seeding these fields to red and ladino clover and adding lime and fertilizer according to John, is to sow the grass in the fall and sow the clover in late winter or early spring. Again lime and fertilizer should be applied according to a recent soil test.

For detailed information on a specific field technical assistance is available from the Soil Conservation Service to help livestock producers solve their pasture improvement problems.

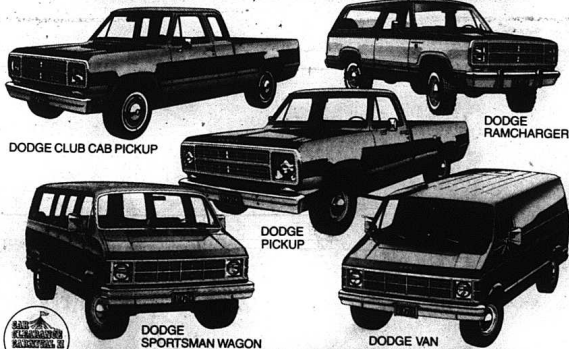

# Fishing Report

In spite of last week's heavy rains, most of Kentucky's larger lakes are reporting fair to good fishing. The lake-by-lake rundown, as compiled by the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources:

**Kentucky:** crappie slow over channel drop offs (20-22 feet deep); black bass slow on spinner baits off rocky points and over stump beds; in tailwaters, heavy discharge, no activity, clear to murky to muddy, falling slowly, one foot below pool and 72 degrees.

**Barkley:** crappie fair over submerged cover (10 feet deep); in tailwaters, catfish fair, murky to muddy, falling slowly,

one foot below pool and 75 degrees.

**Barron:** black bass fair to good on spinner baits and artificial nightcrawlers around flooded cover; crappie fair along edges of flooded areas; clear murky to muddy, rising, 16 foot above pool and 70 degrees.

**Nolin:** black bass fair to good on spinner baits and artificial nightcrawlers along flooded shoreline brush; in tailwaters, trout fair; rising, 21 feet above pool and 72 degrees.

**Rough River:** black bass slow on spinner baits along shoreline brush; crappie slow over submerged cover; clear to murky to muddy, rising, 26 feet above pool and 74 degrees.

**Green:** black bass fair on spinner baits off points and over submerged cover; crappie fair over submerged cover (8-10 feet deep); in tailwaters, trout good; clear to murky to muddy, rising, six feet above pool and 68 degrees.

**Herrington:** black bass slow casting deep runners off points during the day and by casting spinner baits after dark; crappie fair over submerged cover (20 feet deep); in tailwaters, trout good; clear to murky to muddy, stable at 19 feet below timberline and 71 degrees.

**Dale Hollow:** walleye fair trolling deep runners along rocky banks and points; black bass slow casting deep runners off deep points and banks; clear, rising slowly, at pool and 74 degrees.

**Laurel:** trout slow night fishing off deep banks; black bass slow on spinner baits and artificial nightcrawlers off points and in timbered coves; clear, falling, slowly, three feet below pool and 71 degrees.

**Cave Run:** musky fair trolling deep runners along channel drop offs and by casting in timbered coves; black bass slow at night on spinner baits and artificial nightcrawlers off deep banks; clear to murky to muddy, rising, two feet above pool and 68 degrees.

**Buckhorn:** crappie good over submerged cover (12-14 feet deep); clear to murky to muddy, falling, one foot above pool and 72 degrees.

**Dewey:** crappie slow a round trestles and stickups; murky to muddy, rising, one foot above pool and 72 degrees.

**Fishtrap:** bluegill fair along shallow banks; crappie slow over submerged cover; clear to

murky to muddy, falling, at pool and 71 degrees.

## City Resurfacing and Patching Streets With Funds From Municipal Aid

City of Mt. Vernon employees have been busy the past couple of weeks patching and resurfacing streets in the city limits.

The city received \$8,946.00 from the Municipal Aid Program with which to purchase materials and city employees furnished the labor.

Several streets received

complete resurfacing jobs. They were: Barnett Road (Barnett Subdivision), Williams Street beginning at Poplar Street and ending at Lovell Street. The city also plans to resurface the street between the Post Office and the Bank of Mt. Vernon.

The county paid for materials to have the street alongside the courthouse blacktopped and the one going to the library.

## County's Assessment Grows to \$93 Million

75 new homes and businesses contributed to theover \$8,000,000 increase in assessment for the county this year, pushing the total assessment for all taxable tangible and intangible property to \$93,178,950. There were 67 new homes and businesses constructed in 1978.

There was an almost \$5,000,000 increase in residential lots, land and improvements; farm land and improvements were up a little over 2 million; commercial and industrial property rose by about \$600,000 and value oil, mineral and timber rights dropped from \$116,790 to \$98,300 for a total real estate assessment of \$63,728,945 as compared to \$56,168,405 last year.

Motor vehicles were up \$1,879,550; aircraft assessment increased to \$63,000 from \$55,500 and watercraft was up to \$242,400 from \$144,610. Also showing an increase was merchants inventory and manufacturers finished goods to \$2,588,065 from \$2,286,965 and professional trade tools and business furniture also increased to \$1,451,130 from \$1,024,265; however, drilling, mining and construction equipment dropped to \$766,135 from last year's figure of \$1,190,600. Mobile homes offset this drop somewhat by increasing in assessment to \$2,137,130 from \$1,746,350 and other tangible personal property stayed the same, \$16,500 for a total tangible personal property assessment of \$21,238,560 as compared to last year's \$18,549,440.

There were two big losses from the county's assessment figures this year—one affects the county directly in the amount of taxes collected and the other indirectly through money returned to the schools by the state. One of the categories dropped from the assessment was tax on unmined coal, an assessment last year of \$1,094,600 in the county. This assessment was done away with by the legislature and costs the state \$6,111.10 which affects the

manufacturing machinery and manufacturers inventory of raw materials. This assessment for \$134,050 was taken from the tax rolls when Texas Pioneer Coal Co. moved their operation from the county. This loss cost the county over \$10,000 in taxes.

The increase in homestead exemptions over 1978 were \$960,350 for farms and \$982,150 for residential. The total of the exemptions for the two are \$3,955,600 and \$296,950, respectively.

There are 105,429 acres in the county under fire protection; 133,770 acres farm land and 8,388 registered motor vehicles (up 387 from last year).

## Industrial Authority Receives \$164,400 Grant From ARC

Gov. Julian Carroll has announced the Appalachian Regional Commission has approved a \$164,400 grant to the Rockcastle County Industrial Authority in Mount Vernon.

Development Secretary William Short said the grant will be used to build a 300,000 gallon water storage tank, water mains and an internal access road for the Rockcastle County Industrial Park.

Additional funds for the \$300,300 project will come from the Farmer's Home Administration and state and local

sources.

The industrial park is adjacent to U.S. 150 and will be intersected by the new KY 461 bypass when it is completed.

The 89-acre park is expected to cost \$4.5 million and provide the area with more than 800 jobs, Short said. Thirteen industrial sites are located on 75 acres.

The Development Cabinet administers the state's ARC programs through its Office of Community and Regional Development.

## Dr. Yip of Canada Will Practice Here

Dr. Julian Yip, 27, of Ontario, Canada, will begin the practice of medicine in Mt. Vernon some time in the near future.

Dr. Yip is a native of Canton, China and moved from there to Hong Kong when he was five where he lived until his immigration to Canada in August, 1968.

He is a graduate of the University of Manitoba and did a rotating internship at Toronto Western Hospital in 1975-76.

Dr. Yip is a General Practitioner including the practice of obstetrics and gynecology. His office will be located on the lower floor of the new addition to the Rockcastle County Hospital.

His wife, Virginia, who is a native of Hong Kong has worked as an industrial food scientist for Campbell Soup. The couple have two children, Vivian and Jason.

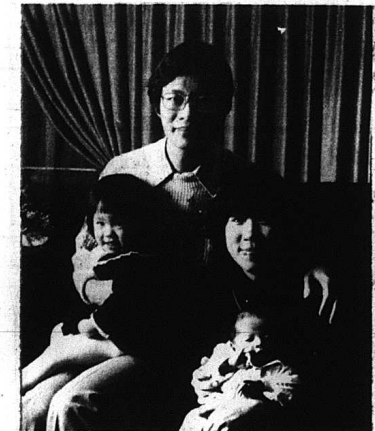

## York Re-Elected Young Republican President

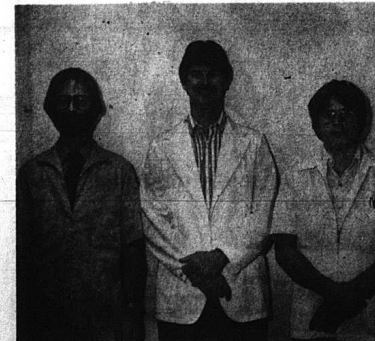
Albert York, son of Mr. and Mrs. George York of Mt. Vernon, has been re-elected president of the Berea College Chapter of the Young Republicans.

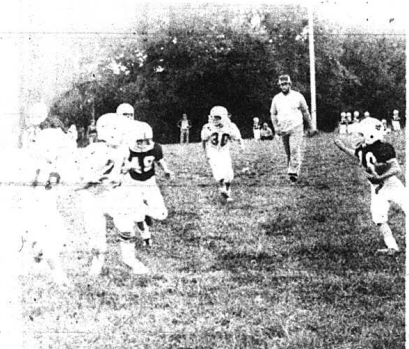

**Flavorful Pork**  
Pork is one of the few dishes that almost everyone likes. It is hearty, rich, flavorful and lends itself to many preparations. And now is the perfect time to try different ways of cooking this nutritious meat because, according to marketing specialists with the USDA, pork is now in plentiful supply.

Here are some suggestions for bringing out the unique taste of pork.

**Curried Pork Chops**

- 6 pork chops
- 1/2 cup flour
- 1 Tbls. fat or oil
- 3 cups sliced mushrooms
- 1/2 cup sliced mushrooms
- 1/2 cup chopped onions,
- 2 Tbls. butter
- 1 1/4 tsp. salt
- 1/8 tsp. pepper
- 1 tsp. curry powder
- 1 1/4 cups milk

Coat chops with flour; set aside any remaining flour. Brown chops in both sides, in fat, in an oven proof skillet. Remove pan from heat and pour off fat. Cover chops with mush rooms. Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Cook onion in butter until golden brown. Stir in remaining flour and seasonings. Stir in milk slowly. Cook until thickened, stirring constantly. Bake, covered, for 1 hour.

**Barbecued Spareribs**

- 3 pounds spareribs
- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 1/2 cup chopped celery
- 1 Tbls. fat or oil
- 1 Tbls. sugar
- 1 Tbls. vinegar
- 1 Tbls. lemon juice
- 1/2 cup catsup
- 2 tsp. dry mustard
- 1/2 tsp. worcestershire sauce
- 1/4 cup water

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Place spareribs on a rack in a shallow roasting pan. Roast for 1 1/2 hours or until tender. Remove rack from pan and remove excess fat from pan. For the sauce, cook onion and celery

in the fat in a small pan for about 5 minutes or until lightly browned. Add remaining ingredients and simmer for about 10 minutes. Pour sauce over the meat. Return to oven and bake, uncovered for about 30 minutes. Serves 6.

To complete the meal, serve scalloped potatoes, green beans, cole slaw and sherbet.

**Chicken Salad: The Summer Dish That's Perfect All Year Long**

If you've made a delicious roast chicken and are now "stuck" with leftovers, don't worry. Chicken, one of the most versatile and nutritious foods, lends itself to many leftover preparations, none of which are more refreshing in the summer than chicken salad.

Now is the perfect time to try chicken and other poultry

products in many different ways because, according to marketing specialists with the USDA, poultry is now in plentiful supply.

Here are two suggestions for chicken salad. One-half hour before serving, combine the following: 2 cups cooked, chunked chicken; 1/4 cup cooked sweet corn kernels (canned or frozen will do, but 'fresh is better') 1/2 cup broken walnut pieces, 2 mushroom caps, finely diced, and 1/4 cup salad dressing. Serve on lettuce leaves. This makes four servings.

For a flavorful, crunchy salad, try this combination of ingredients: 2 bunches of water cress, torn into pieces; 1/2 cup chopped celery; 2 slices crisp crumbled bacon; 1/4 cup walnut halves; and 6 ounces cooked, sliced chicken or turkey. Chill. Just before serving, toss with an oil and vinegar salad dressing.

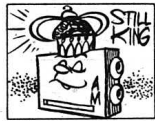

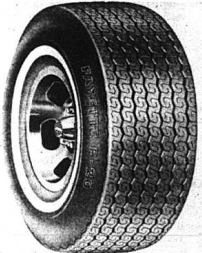

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# County Agent's Notes

## Insects Can Be Controlled In Stored Grain

Kentucky is located in a region characterized by stored-grain insect infestations every year, but farmers don't have to let insects take over their grain supplies, according to an Extension

entomologist at the University of Kentucky.

Chris Christensen says infestations can be reduced with careful attention to the bin and the grain put into it.

His first recommendation is to clean bins before filling with new grain since secondary pests develop on broken grain, chaff and fines.

"Get out all the old stored grain," he advises. "You may

want to feed it or, if you have too much for that, you might need to sell it," says the specialist.

Next, sweep out the bins, being careful to clean all cracks and crevices and to remove cobwebs. In bins with infested floors, Christensen says to take up the floor to remove grain that might have filtered through.

Outside the bin, all weeds should be cut to promote good air movement and to remove harborage areas for insects. Christensen adds that weeds also can be hiding piles of grain spilled outside the bin.

After the bins are clean, floors and walls, including cracks and crevices, should be thoroughly sprayed inside and out with an insecticide labeled for use before filling bins. Christensen suggests checking with county agricultural Extension agents for recommendations.

Stored grain infestations also may be caused when infested grain is brought into the bin. To prevent the spread of these primary pests, the specialist says to treat grain with an insecticide as it is put into the bin.

"This usually becomes nec-

essary in years when grain has been standing in the field for a long time, such as when fields are too wet for harvest," says Christensen. Grain with a high moisture content carries a higher risk of infestation, he adds.

Grain also may be fumigated once it is in the bin to prevent insect infestation.

Christensen says it is important to maintain the proper temperature and moisture content in the grain bin to reduce pest problems. This won't stop infestations after the grain is already infested, but it will make it easier to fumigate, according to the specialist.
