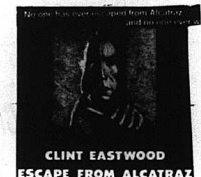

Put sugar, water and margarine in heavy sauce pan over medium heat. Cook to hard ball stage (250 F.). Spread out popcorn and nuts on cookie sheet lined with aluminum foil. Carefully drizzle hot syrup over corn, using wooden spoon to coat popcorn. Cool and separate.

1-1/4 oz. can sweetened condensed milk
1 cup sugar
1/2 cup light corn syrup
1/8 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon vanilla
6 medium apples
Mix the milk, sugar, corn syrup and salt in a heavy 2-quart saucepan. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until mixture comes to a boil and sugar is dissolved. Cook over low heat stirring constantly, to 230 degrees on a candy thermometer or until mixture spins a 2-inch thread when dropped from spoon. Remove from heat. Stir in the vanilla

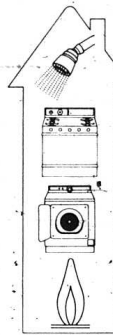

Arrest Made in Connection With September 15 Slaying of Ohio Man

Dennis A. Fisher, 23, was arrested last week and charged in the September 15th slaying of Chester Patrick, 72, of Hamilton, Ohio in this county.

Mr. Patrick was found Sunday morning, September 16th near the Adams Veterinary Clinic on Hwy. 461 by Casper McKinney. He had been stabbed several times and had other injuries caused by a beating. The victim's yellow pick-up truck was missing from the scene of the murder.

Fisher was arrested in South Carolina after being involved in a minor traffic accident involving the pick-up which he was driving. Police ran a routine check on the vehicle and found that it had been reported stolen.

Fisher was returned to Rockcastle County last Wednesday when three warrants were issued. One warrant was for

theft by unlawful taking or disposition. Ball was set at \$3,000 on this charge. Another was for unlawful use of physical force in the course of committing theft of property of Chester Patrick and ball was set at

\$10,000 on this charge. However, no ball was set on the third warrant for murder by stabbing and killing.

A public defender has been appointed, but, no hearing date has been set.

Copper Creek-Conway Road To be Resurfaced for 1.5 Miles

State Transportation Secretary Calvin Grayson has awarded 17 contracts totaling \$2.1 million for road improvements in southeastern Kentucky.

The contracts resulted from a bid letting held August 17. Statewide \$32 million was awarded for 88 contracts.

Three contracts totaling \$501,905 were awarded for improvements to several roads and a bridge in Letcher County, the largest award for any county in the region.

A \$266,178 contract awarded to Judy Construction Co., Cynthiana, calls for grading, draining, resurfacing and structural repair to the bridge over Cowan Creek on Linefork Whitesburg Road (KY 931), two tenths of a mile of KY 2035. Resurfacing on the bridge and its approaches will cover about one-tenth of a mile.

Mountain Enterprises Inc., Middleboro, received a contract totaling \$188,885 to resurface 5.6 miles of Letcher County roads. Roads in Rockcastle County include:

The Allen Co. Inc., Winchester, submitted the low bid of \$80,377 to resurface Copper Creek-Conway Road from the North Fork Copper Creek Road southwest for 1.5 miles.

Legislative Report

By Rep. Harold DeMarans

With 1980 rapidly approaching, the most pressing concern facing American is that of inflation. In that inflation is so closely linked to energy utilization and foreign policy, the source of the problem and possible solution emanates from our Nation's capital.
From September 19th to 21st, State Senator Walter Baker and myself represented the leadership of Kentucky's Legislature in Washington, D.C. at the National Symposium of Legislative Leaders. The Symposium, sponsored by the National Conference of state legislatures, provided state legislators from the fifty states an opportunity to meet with congressional leaders, cabinet secretaries and the president.

Alfred Kahn, the president's advisor on inflation echoed a familiar theme when he told us, "The abolishment of federal regulations that are unnecessarily restrictive of free enterprises may help curtail inflation." This seems a logical assumption, considering that when airlines were deregulated the cost of air travel was significantly reduced.
At the Senate office building, the fact that Kentucky's voice in Washington is not as strong as it could be was quite evident. Senator Walter D. Hudleston remarked that he supported the Salt II Agreement and voted for the Panama Canal giveaway, because he votes for what he thinks is best, rather than what the people of Kentucky think is best.
On the other hand, Senator Wendell Ford stated that he voted against the Panama Canal giveaway and does not support the Salt II Treaty, because he votes how the majority of the people in Kentucky want him to. The fact that our senatorial delegation's vote is almost always split on important issues serves to weaken the commonwealth's voice.
On September 20th, the legislators met with President Carter at the White House from 2:00 until 6:30 p.m. Having met the last five presidents at similar meetings and spending approximately ten minutes with each one, I found the length of President Carter's meeting surprising. It would be fair to assume that the President's 1980 re-election bid was weighing foremost in his actions.
The President's meeting took the form of a question and answer session, questions about foreign policy were not permitted. My question to the President was why, after two hours of discussion, no mention had been made of converting coal into petroleum products, especially considering that Kentucky produces more coal than any other state.

President Carter apologized for a list of all industries that could convert to coal generated power, and as soon as the list was completed he would issue an order instructing these industries to make the change as soon as possible. The President went on to mention the coal gasification plant in Catlettsburg, Kentucky and expressed his support for an increase use of nuclear power.
A large portion of that session dealt with inflation, one proposal that may aid our area is a substantial deregulation of motor carriers. This bill, which has yet to be submitted to Congress, would ease entry, lift many restrictions on carriers' certificates, broaden the exemption for agricultural commodities, make it easier for carriers to lower and raise rates, and enhance service to small towns. This bill represents an estimated \$5 billion per year savings which, in a competitive industry, would be passed on to the consumer.
Aside from the historical grandeur of our nation's capitol, one impression remains most clear. It is that the people who operate our federal government, are becoming increasingly isolated from the day to day needs of the average person.
We now have a 13% rate of inflation and the very real existence of an energy crisis. But, how can these problems be solved, it seems simple, just reduce spending, cutback and become more fiscally austere.
Of course, it has been said that a simple man will have simple solutions to complex problems.

Moore says most Halloween related hazards can be prevented with a few simple precautions. He gave these suggestions to help ensure a safe Halloween:
-Costumes should be light in color or bright enough to make them clearly visible on dimly-lighted streets. As an added precaution, costumes may be trimmed with reflective tape which "glows" in the beam of a car's headlight.
-Costumes should be short enough to prevent tripping. Hats should be tied securely so they will not slip over children's eyes.
-Costumes should be flame-resistant. Parents should look for labels that say "flame-retardant", "flame resistant" or "flame-proof" on costumes, masks, beards and wigs. Moore added that such labels do not mean costumes will not catch fire, he said, it means they will only "resist" burning and must be quickly extinguished if ignited.
-Youngsters should be instructed to use sidewalks and not to walk in the street except at crosswalks or intersections. They should be reminded not to run between cars or across lawns where they can trip or run into clotheslines.
-Children should always be accompanied by an adult and should go trick or treating only in their own neighborhoods.
-Trick-or-treat candies always should be carefully inspected at home in good light before consumption.
-Outside lights should be turned on to help prevent injuries to children.

Halloween Safety Tips


Ghosts, goblins, pirates and other costumed creatures will be out and about October 31. Halloween is traditionally a time of fun for children. But for some the holiday can be tragic.
Edsel Moore, manager of the consumer product safety branch within the Department for Human Resources, says Halloween mishaps can come from a number of sources. "Injuries related to costumes that are too long or that are not flame-resistant, masks that impair vision and candy that has been 'spiked' or tampered with can turn Halloween into a bad experience," he says.

Candles placed in a hollowed out pumpkin can be dangerous when the jack-o-lantern is placed near drapes or where a child's costume might come in contact with the candle flame. Moore suggests inserting a flashlight through a round hole cut in the back of the pumpkin.

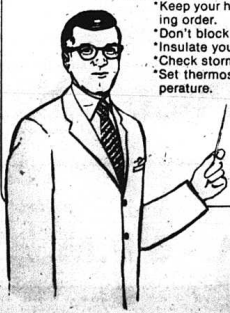

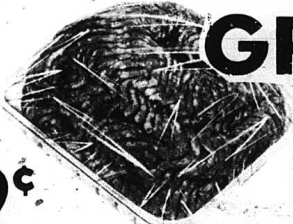

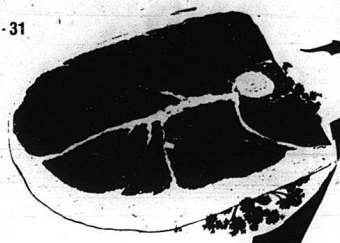

Nolin: black bass fair casting medium runners in coves; clear, falling, 10 feet above pool and 66 degrees.

Rough River: no activity, clear to murky, falling, 19 feet above pool and 67 degrees.

Green: black bass fair on spinner baits and crank baits off points and deep banks; crappie fair over submerged cover (8-10 feet deep); clear, stable at pool and 65 degrees.

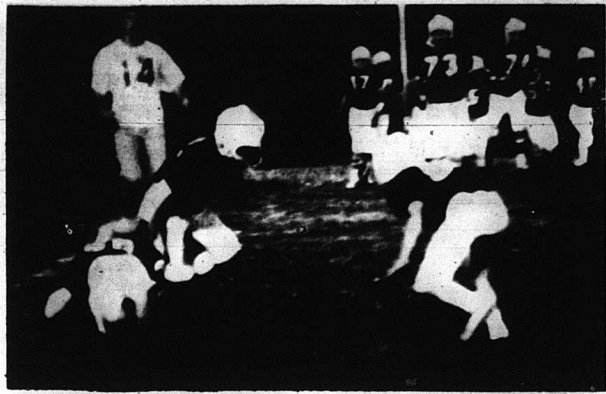
Herrington: bluegill slow along deep banks; clear, falling, five feet above pool and 66 degrees.

Cumberland: crappie fair to good still and drift fishing in coves (10-15 feet deep); black bass fair still fishing crawfish off points; in tailwaters, trout good with some limits; clear, falling, 21 feet below timberline and 67 degrees.

Dale Hollow: walleye fair trolling deep runners along points; black bass fair still fishing crawfish off points; clear, falling slowly, at pool and 68 degrees.

Kentucky Afield

Kentucky had nine reported hunting accidents, seven of them fatal, in 1978. All of them probably could have been avoided by observing just a few rules of safe gun handling, according to Marion Mattingly, the senior hunter training officer for the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources' conservation education division.

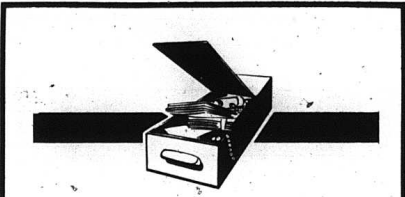
"Three of these nine mishaps occurred because the victims were in the line of fire," Mattingly says, "and the other six, including four self-inflicted casualties, were caused

by careless gun handling."

A rifle was involved in only one accident and shotguns in the other eight. "Some hunters seem to think that shotguns aren't as dangerous as rifles," Mattingly says, "so they tend to handle shotguns carelessly. But at the close ranges involved in most accidents, shotguns are perhaps even more deadly than rifles and deserve at least as much respect."

None of the accidents involved deer hunters, although deer hunting has the unearned reputation for being particularly risky.

GRANT

The Appalachian Regional Commission has approved a \$22,500 grant to Kentucky Mountain Housing Corp. for site-rehabilitation work at 30 homes in Clay and Jackson counties. Gov. Julian Carroll announced last week.

William Short, secretary of the Kentucky Development Cabinet, said the funds will be used for drilling wells and installing water and septic systems for the houses, which are on scattered sites throughout the two counties.

The houses are occupied by low-income families and are scheduled for rehabilitation under the Farmers Home Administration's home repair program. The work ranges from addition of one room to complete remodeling, depending on the condition of the home and the family's needs, Short said.

The water and septic systems are needed to make the rehabilitation project feasible, he added. The state's ARC programs are administered by the Development Cabinet.

Kentucky Mountain Housing Corp. a non-profit organization based in Manchester, has aided in the construction of 61 FHA-financed homes for low-income families and the repair of another 400 homes for low-income families and individuals since it began operation in 1973.

Kentucky Tales for Halloween

Kentuckians with ties to the "Old Country" have been brought up on stories of eerie misty glens and old castles with their stairways haunted by dim figures which travel only in the midnight hours.

At Halloween, however, most Kentuckians look no further for their stories of ghosts and strange apparitions than the dark hallways of the commonwealth's old mansions, the untraveled side roads or the log houses still standing in the fog-shrouded Highlands.

Most realists tend to destroy good ghost stories by rationalizing, validating or shredding the stories into bits of fancy and hysteria.

But anyone who says he has seen a ghost, heard a haunt rattling chains on stairs or watched a door open and close without human help will stand by the stories.

There is supposed to be an invisible horseman and his steed who ride the roads in Morgan County. They reportedly have been heard countless times galloping along the Licking River Road, past a few scattered farmhouses, only to stop suddenly beneath a tree that might have been the scene of a hanging during the Civil War.

It is said that during the war a tree in the area was used for hangings. One time a rope was looped around a huge limb of the tree to hang a Northern

sympathizer.

Capt. John T. Williams heard of the incident and left West Liberty to stop the killing. He supposedly arrived just in time to save the man, even though they fought on opposite sides.

There was the boundary tree in the Kentucky Highlands that disappeared overnight, taking its trunk and roots on its ghostly journey and healing the spot where it stood.

The late Henry P. Scalf told about men marking timber in the area, including the tall tree, for cutting. The next day the crew returned to find everything as if the great tree had never existed.

In the Ashland area, one resident is reluctant to discuss mysterious music he frequently hears about midnight. The soft tones of a cello sound over the broad Ohio River. Sometimes sounds of laughter accompany the music, "but on occasion the woman is heard sobbing," the Ashland man says.

Try as he might he has never seen a boat or anything to indicate the source of the sounds, he adds.

Jouella Jewell of Fulton said a man he knew well was hunting and fishing in the Murphy's Pond section in Hickman County when he discovered enormous footprints. He didn't hang around too long, but returned home to get a friend, Jewell said.

The two men went back to the spot in the pond area armed with guns. They saw the creature which they described as large, hairy, manlike. They didn't shoot because they were not being harmed and in return did not want to injure or kill the creature. They left to report their finding to the sheriff's office.

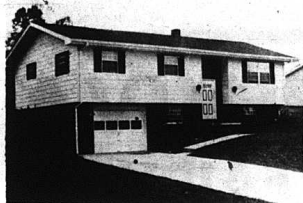

Rockcastle Archery Club member, Jack Bowman, took the first crossbow Whitetail Deer of the 1979 season. He shot it at 35 yards with a "Safari" crossbow drawing 125 pounds and a wasp-3 head. He took it at Kentucky's Pioneer Weapons Hunting Area near Salt Lick.

Crossbow Hunting Season Approved for November 20 - 30

Jack Bowman, formerly of Orlando, took Kentucky's first crossbow deer of the 1979 season. However, an estimated 2000 crossbow hunters will have the opportunity to pursue the whitetail this fall. This is due to the efforts of three Rockcastle Countians that first requested a crossbow season in 1977.

James Bowman, Jack Bow-

man and Charles Bunch requested a crossbow season and after repeated meetings with the game department and other

wildlife personnel secured the ten day statewide season for 1979.

The crossbow, as a sporting arm, has been legal in the Pioneer Weapons Area of Menifee County for several years. The statewide season, including Rockcastle County, is new for this year.

The November 20 to 30 season is for crossbow hunters only. Crossbow must have a minimum pull weight of 100 pounds and be equipped with a working safety. Arrows must weigh a minimum of 380 grains and be fitted with barbless arrowheads at least 7/8 inches wide. Antlered or antlerless deer may be taken.
