The club's two previous bazaars have been very successful thanks to the support of many generous people. With funds from the '77 and '78

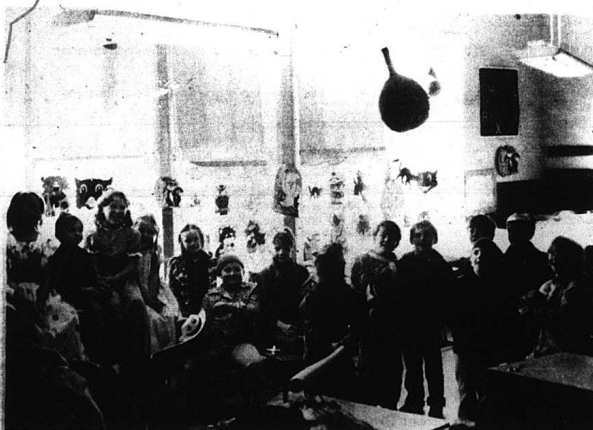

## Department for Human Resources Says "No Cut-Back in Nutrition Program for Elderly"

Nutrition programs for Kentucky's elderly will not be decreased this year, despite cutbacks anticipated by the Department for Human Resources.

The department's division for aging services, the state agency which administers congregate meal programs for the elderly, has received \$764,316 to supplement nutrition programs for senior citizens this fiscal year.

Kentucky is one of 26 states and U.S. territories receiving part of \$10.3 million to cover program costs which have occurred after Oct. 1, 1978. Larry Michalczuk, acting director of the division for aging services, said that without the additional funding, Kentucky's nutrition programs would have been decreased because of rising costs of raw food and transportation, the largest expenses in the program.

Michalczuk said the state asked for supplemental funds

"because we felt our nutrition program suffered decrease in serving levels. We couldn't serve as many meals to the elderly as we did last year."

State-funded nutrition programs served meals to about 75,000 elderly person in the 1978-79 fiscal year at approximately 220 nutrition sites statewide, according to Anita Privett of the aging services division. She said with the additional federal dollars, at least the same number of meals could be served again this fiscal year.

Privett said the state's 15 area development districts, which administer nutrition programs for the elderly on local levels, had already planned to cope with program decreases by making staff cutbacks and cutting the number of serving days per week. She said the Bluegrass area development district, which includes 17 counties, would have served 9,000 less meals during the 1980 fiscal year as compared with 1979.

Esther Rigby, nutrition project director for the Bluegrass district, has planned to cut from 247 serving days annually to 208 at the district's 21 meal sites. She said centers normally serving meals to the elderly five days a week would probably have only been open four days weekly. The additional money

makes the reductions unnecessary, she said.

The Barren River area development district would have dropped 10,000 meals served to elderly in that 10-county area this fiscal year. Bill Guthrie, aging planner for the district, said he had made plans to cut from serving 750 meals daily to 700 meals a day. He said he had already temporarily reduced some staff to half time and has asked centers to limit their hours to four to six hours a day rather than eight.

"The supplement funding has been a lifesaver for us," Guthrie said. "Our next step would have been to close one or two of our 14 meal centers altogether."

He has reinstated the staff to full time, and 750 meals are being served daily to elderly persons in that district.

Michalczuk said the federal dollars are distributed to area development districts based on the districts' population of elderly persons. The goal of the supplemental monies, he said, "is to bring the number of meals back, at a minimum, to 1979 fiscal year levels."

The federal money is administered by the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare, Administration on Aging.

### Safety Rules For

#### Wood-Cutting Equipment

With the growing popularity of wood-burning stoves more Kentuckians are becoming part-time lumberjacks, cutting their own firewood for the winter. Many are unfamiliar with the chain saws they use. Too often, accidents and injuries are the result.

Essel Moore, manager of the Department for Human Resources consumer product safety branch, estimates that 1,000 Kentuckians will be injured this fall while cutting firewood. "Chain saws by their basic nature can be very dangerous," says Moore. "Injuries related to chain saws tend to be much more severe than injuries related to most other consumer products."

According to Moore, the element most common in chain saw accidents is the inexperience of the operators. Improper use of the machines and chain saw "kick-back" are implicated in most of these injuries, he says.

Moore explained that kick-back is a sudden jerk in an upward and backward motion that usually happens when the tip of the saw strikes something or becomes jammed in the wood. He says the chain saw industry is working on a voluntary standard aimed at preventing chain saw kick-back.

"It is most important that anyone who uses or plans to use a chain saw carefully read and observe certain precautions. A person who does not understand the instructions or precautions should consult someone who is knowledgeable about chain saws," says Moore.

- Moore listed a few rules to follow to help prevent injuries:
  1. Do not use a chain saw in wet weather. It is hard to get good footing on wet ground.
  2. Never hold a chain saw over your head.
  3. Do not use a chain saw that is too small for the job.
  4. Buy or rent equipment with built-in safety features and do not remove or modify those features.
  5. Always wear goggles or safety glasses.
  6. Keep safety in mind when selecting work clothes.
  7. Never use a chain saw while alone. Having someone around to help can prevent many accidents as well as save your life if an accident happens.
  8. Avoid distractions.
  9. Make sure the chain saw is in good mechanical condition.
  10. Take breaks often to prevent fatigue.

The physical condition of the operator is important. "Operating a chain saw is strenuous work," Moore says. "An operator who is alert and in good physical condition is less accident-prone."

## COPE FUNDS EXHAUSTED

Human Resources Secretary J.E. DeShazer today announced that the Crisis Oriented Program for Emergencies (COPE) has been suspended because funds have been exhausted.

COPE offers emergency funds to individuals or families who face a severe financial crisis and who have no children living at home.

The department has instructed its Bureau for Social Insurance staff to stop taking applications for COPE as of 4:30 p.m. Monday. Applications accepted by that time will be processed, said DeShazer.

COPE was implemented

with a \$750,000 allocation from the 1978 General Assembly for the current fiscal year ending July 30, 1980. The department has been accepting applications since July 1, 1979.

During the previous fiscal year, the allotment of \$750,000 for the crisis program was exhausted within nine weeks. Changes were made in this year's program to reach more applicants with the same amount of monies, said DeShazer. To date, 4,844 households have received \$557,000 to meet emergency needs. About 700 applications are pending.

DeShazer said the department administrators other programs that offer various types of assistance and every effort will be made to extend that aid to applicants who are eligible.

### Local Youths Winners In Conservation Contest

Local youths are county winners in the Kentucky Department of Energy's statewide energy conservation poster contest open to fourth, fifth and sixth graders.

A winner from each grade level was selected by a committee coordinated by the County Extension Service Office from entries submitted by participating Rockcastle County schools.

These winners will receive a Certificate of Merit from Damon W. Harrison, commissioner of the department's Bureau of Energy Management. Their posters will be eligible for the state competition.

The Rockcastle County winners are: William Cecil Shackelford, Jr., 5th Grade, Livingston Elementary; Eva Daugherty, 6th Grade, Livingston Elementary.

A state Poster Selection Committee, chaired by the Frankfort Younger Woman's Club and composed of five members of the Kentucky State Government Committee on the International Year of the Child, will select four posters from each grade level. These winners will be announced next week.

State winners will receive the Governor's Youth Merit Award, and their posters will be published as part of a 1980 energy calendar.

The activity is being conducted as part of the public education and awareness element under Kentucky's Energy Conservation Plan.

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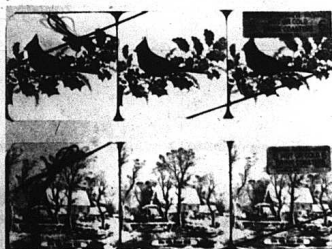
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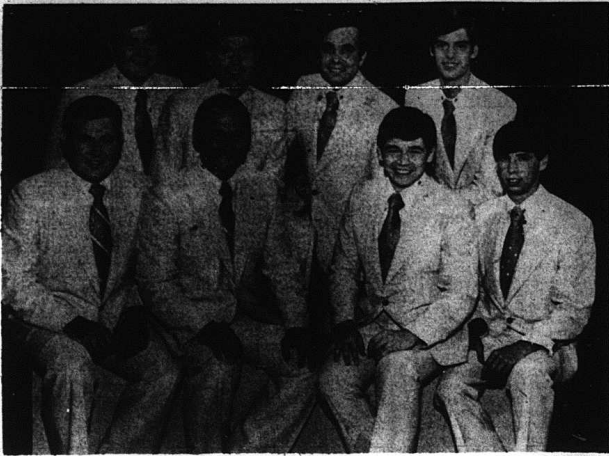

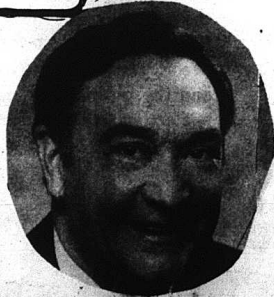

## Consumer Comments

**By Robert F. Stephens Attorney General**

The purpose of collection agencies is to actively pursue the collection of private debts. However, some collection agencies have gone overboard in trying to collect personal, family household debts.

The Fair Debt Collection Practices Act limits how a debt collector may contact you at an inconvenient time, such as before 8 a.m. or after 9 p.m., or at an unusual place. A collector

may not contact you at work if your employer objects and may only contact your attorney if you have hired one.

A collection agency must stop contacting you if you write them and ask them to stop. Collection agencies are not allowed to send post cards.

A debt collector is allowed to contact another person in pursuit of your debt, but only to locate you. He can only tell that person he is trying to locate you; he cannot say it because you have "bad debts."

In most cases, a collection agency may not talk to any persons, other than you, more than once. The agency can not put anything on the outside of an envelope which identifies it as a debt collector nor can it publish lists of debtors.

These measures are designed to prevent collection agencies from attempting to "shame" someone into paying a debt.

The Fair Debt Collection Practices Act also prohibits abusive practices, such as: using threatening or obscene language; repeatedly using the telephone to annoy someone or advertising a debt.

Also, a debt collector may not say you will be arrested or imprisoned if you do not pay your debt. He cannot give false information concerning your credit status.

If a debt collector should call you collect, you do not have to accept the charges. You also are not responsible for paying telegram fees.

Not all debt collectors are subject to the Fair Debt Collection Practices Act. It does not apply to banks or businesses which collect their own accounts. However, the act does protect consumers from possible abuse from collection agencies.

### Kentucky Afield

Some of Kentucky's hunting season have already opened and the rest of them are just around the corner. With the many different opening and closing dates, it's sometimes hard to keep track of everything.

So here's a rundown of opening and closing dates for this year's hunting, courtesy of the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources.

**Squirrel:** opened Aug. 18, will run through Oct. 31; reopens Nov. 15, closes for gun deer season (Dec. 1-3); reopens Dec. 4 and continues through Dec. 31.

**Rabbits:** Nov. 15 thru Nov. 30 and Dec. 4 thru Jan. 21.  
**Quail:** Nov. 15 thru Nov. 30 and Dec. 4 thru Feb. 17.  
**Grouse:** Nov. 15 thru Nov. 30 and Dec. 4 thru Feb. 29.  
**Furbearers (trapping and hunting):** Nov. 15 thru Nov. 30 and Dec. 4 thru Jan. 31.  
**Deer (longbow and compound bow):** opened Oct. 1, will run thru Nov. 9; Nov. 13 thru Nov. 19 and Dec. 4 thru Dec. 31.  
**Deer (crossbows only):** Nov. 20 thru Nov. 30.  
**Deer (gun):** Nov. 10 thru Nov. 12 and, in certain zones, Dec. 1 thru Dec. 3. Check complete regulation.

**Ducks:** opened Sept. 1, will close Oct. 31, reopens for a short season Dec. 8-16.  
**Ducks:** Nov. 21 thru Nov. 25 and Dec. 7 thru Jan. 20.  
**Geese, Bats and Gallinules:** Nov. 12 thru Jan. 20.  
**Woodcock and Snipe:** Oct. 6 thru Nov. 30 and Dec. 8 thru Dec. 16.

**Frogs:** opened May 15, will close Oct. 31.  
**Falconry:** small game hunters may begin hunting with birds of prey Nov. 1 and continue through the regular season for the species sought.

Remember that these dates are for the statewide seasons. Certain wildlife management areas or federal installations may have different dates or other special regulations, particularly for deer or waterfowl hunting.

### Labor Force At All-Time High

Kentucky's labor force reached an all-time high in September, the Department for Human Resources announced today.

The state's labor force numbered 1,606,600 persons during September. That is 20,700 more than the number of persons working or available for work in August, says Robert MacDonald, chief labor market analyst for the department.

The preliminary unemployment rate for September was 5.3 percent of the labor force, down 0.3 percentage points from August.

The number of unemployed Kentuckians in September dropped 5,700 from August, primarily because of increased hiring by government and trade and agriculture industries, says MacDonald. "Manufacturing employment, primarily in the metals, apparel and chemical industries, continued on a downward trend," he says.

Unemployment during 1979 has been at about the same level as during 1978, MacDonald says the rate of growth of new jobs apparently has been sufficient to take care of persons entering the labor force but not great enough to reduce the overall level of unemployment.

The national unemployment for September was 5.6 percent.

## Loss Estimated at over \$300,000 in Kentucky Casket Fire

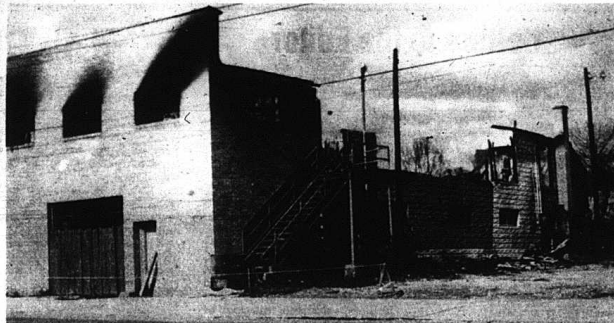
Loss has been estimated at over \$300,000 in a later afternoon fire which destroyed the Kentucky Casket Co. at Livingston last Friday.

Monroe Baker, owner of the company, said that no cause had yet been determined for the blaze which broke out after all employees had left about 4:30 p.m. The fire was discovered about an hour afterwards and fire-fighting units from Livingston, Brodhead, Mt. Vernon and East Bernstadt responded

to a call for help to fight the fire. The firemen did an excellent job in keeping any surrounding property from being damaged. Livingston only last year organized a volunteer department.

Mr. Baker said about 20 employees had been put out of work because of the fire and at this time he was not sure whether or not the business would be rebuilt. There was only a minimum of insurance, Mr. Baker said.

Baker bought the business 20 years ago from Mrs. Landa Webb. In the past, casket shells had been purchased by the company and finished in their operation. But, in the past two years, Mr. Baker said he had invested about \$100,000 in installing welding supply equipment so that the complete process could be done at Livingston. Around 300 finished and unfinished caskets were lost in the fire.



No injuries were sustained in the fire last Friday afternoon which destroyed the Kentucky Casket Company at Livingston. Three out-of-town fire departments and Livingston fought the blaze and kept it from spreading to adjoining buildings.

## State Rep. Archie Romines Instrumental In Securing Lighting for 909 Exit of I-75

State Representative Archie Romines, Sr., (D-Valley Station) has notified the Signal of a commitment by the Department of Transportation to light the 909 interchange of Interstate-75.

Rep. Romines said in a telephone call Monday that he had been made aware of the problem at the interchange through his job of driving a truck for the Mason-Dixon line in this area. He said one day while passing through, a lady on the CB found out that he was a State Representative and informed him of the fact that the interchange had never been

lighted and was a rather dangerous place to be because of this. Romines said he then talked with the owners of Laurel Lodge, located on the interchange, and they referred him to Mr. and Mrs. Carlos Carlotis, owners of Fort Sequoyia, also located near the interchange. Mrs. Carlotis is a member of the Governor's Tourism Committee and she and her husband supplied Rep. Romines with a petition bearing 305 signatures of persons from the area in support of the lighting project.

Romines said he then con-

tacted the Department of Transportation and asked for a traffic count and survey. When this was completed, the department agreed there was justification for the lighting and the project is now in the planning and design stage.

Mr. Carlotis said Tuesday that he had been in touch with Steve Reeder of the DOT who had told him that funds had been allocated for the project (of approximately \$100,000) and construction should begin by the Spring of 1980. Of the \$100,000 cost, 90% is federal money.

## General Election is Next Tuesday; All Three Towns Have Races on Ballot

Each of the three towns in the county will decide on their representatives to the Town Board, Board of Trustees or City Council, as the case may be, in next Tuesday's General Election.

These are the only local elections in this year's general election of state officers.

Of course, most of the attention has been on the race for the governor's mansion between former Governor Republican Louie B. Nunn and a new-comer to politics Democrat John Y. Brown.

Brown pulled a surprise in the primary by entering the campaign late and then beating the administration's hand-picked successor Terry McBrayer.

An area man, Commonwealth Attorney Harold Rogers is Nunn's running mate and Brown has the former clerk of the court of appeals, Martha Layne Collins, on the Democrat side of the ballot.

Other races pit: Frances Jones Mills, Rep., against Rowe Harper, Dem. for Secretary of State; Rep. Steven L. Beshear and Dem. Ron Snyder for Attorney General; Rep. Dr. James B.

Graham and Dem. Mary Louise Foust for Auditor of Public Accounts; Rep. Drexell Davis and Dem. Dr. James G. Wilhite for State Treasurer; Rep. Raymond H. Barber and Dem. Frank J. Groschell for Superintendent of Public Instruction; Rep. Alben W. Barkley against Dem. Roy C. Gray, Jr. for Commissioner of Agriculture and Rep. Jimmy Turner against Monroe Baker of Mt. Vernon for

Railroad Commissioner, Third Railroad District.

Unopposed on the ballot are: John Rogers of Somerset for State Senator, William H. DeMarcus of Stanford for State Representative and Daniel J. Venters of Somerset for District Judge.

In the town races: the City of Mt. Vernon has 10 candidates for the six seats available on the

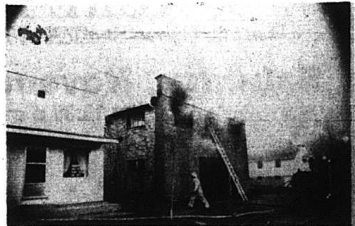
## City Eligible For \$139,000 Grant

According to a news release from Secretary Frank Harscher of the Department for Natural Resources and Environmental Protection, the City of Mt. Vernon will receive \$139,000 in federal grant money to improve its sewage treatment system. The release goes on to say that the city will provide funds to make a total expenditure of \$186,000 in 1980.

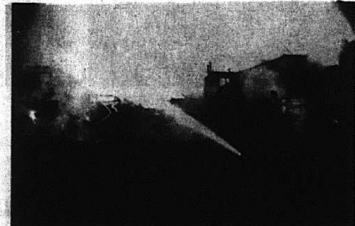
The funds are part of the \$49.7 million received by the state from the \$3.4 billion Congress appropriated for urban water quality improvement.

Richard Moore of Schimpfer, Corrodino Assco. of Louisville, the firm presently conducting a 201 Facilities Survey for the City, said the release meant that Mt. Vernon must now make application for the \$139,000 early in 1980 before the money is actually released.

Mr. Moore said the application will be made for design of the renovation and expansion of the present sewer plant and for possibly some interceptors (main lines to the plant). Actual grant money for construction would have to be filed for later.

## Dedication Set For Saturday At New Park on Lake Linville

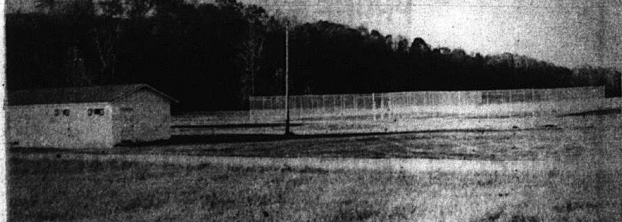

brought to Kentucky, which indicates an ability to attract new industry. It is well known that Governor Nunn built and resurfaced more roads in Kentucky than any other governor, which displays a desire to upgrade the quality of life in rural Kentucky.

Never having a budget that exceeded \$2.5 billion, Governor Nunn made sure that 66.4% of those budgets were appropriated for educational needs. His administration made great strides in the fields of juvenile corrections, senior citizens and mental health, the Oakwood facility in Somerset is a good example.

John Y. Brown, Jr., the democrat candidate, has no experience in government, thus his is an unknown quantity. Further, the fact that Mr. Brown was twice purged from Kentucky voting registers in the last five years indicates that he is not aware of the problems that face rural Kentucky, because he has simply not been in the state.

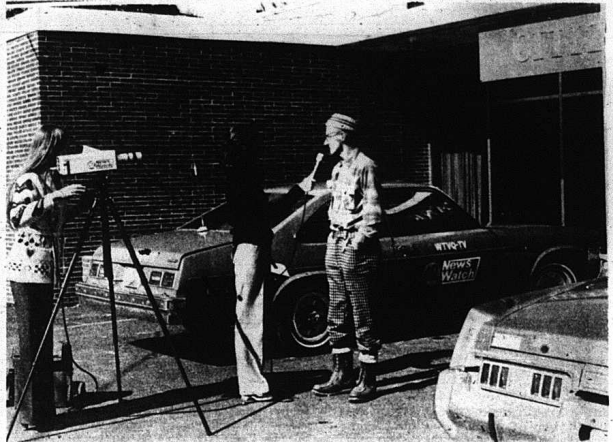

Unemployment in the eastern Kentucky area increased from 20,932 in August to 21,991 in September. The rate of unemployment climbed from 6.9 percent to 7.1 percent.

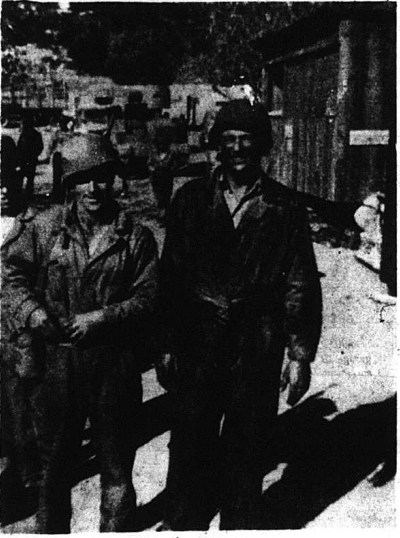
According to Robert MacDonald, chief labor market analyst for the state's Department for Human Resources, the increase in unemployment was due primarily to layoffs in the area.

Unemployment rate dropped from 5.6 percent in August to 5.3 percent in September. The national unemployment rate was 5.6 percent in September.

In the eastern area, Menifee County had the highest unemployment rate at 17.2 percent, while Martin County had the lowest at 3.7 percent.


