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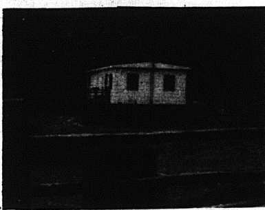

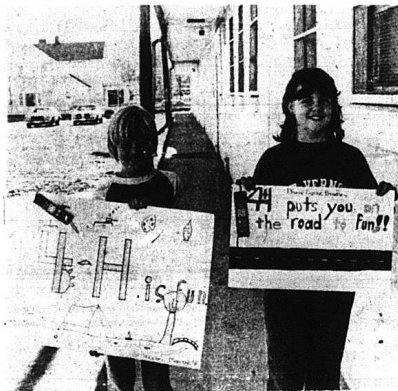

Democrats Sweep State Offices; Incumbent Councilmen Defeated

Rockcastle Countians gave a 97.2 vote margin to Republican gubernatorial candidate Louie B. Nunn Tuesday, in a light turn-out, but state-wide, Democrat John Y. Brown, Jr. swept into the governor's office with a landslide victory and, along with him, the entire Democratic slate.

Wednesday mornings daily papers reported that with over 90 percent of the vote counted, Brown had received 59% of the vote so far to Nunn's 41%.

Predictions were that when all the votes were counted, Brown's vote would surpass the 192,000-vote margin of Gov. Julian Carroll in 1975.

In addition, in another state wide vote, two constitutional

amendments were both approved by voters.

The Fifth District, local, a Republican stronghold, only gave Nunn a strong vote majority as compared to 40,000 when he last ran for state office in 1967.

Locally, the largest vote-getter was Harold Rogers, running on the Nunn ticket for Lt. Gov. Rogers, got 2,570 votes to his opponent, Martha Layne Collins' 1,239.

In the three council races, two incumbents on the Mt. Vernon City Council were defeated for re-election: Oscar Bullock and Elmer Alcorn.

Elected were, in order of

votes cast for them: Ernest Stanley, incumbent Bob Jasper, Roger McClure, Ernie Tolle, incumbent Conrad Parrett and Tom Welch.

In Livingston, Mayor Bertie Rice was defeated. That council will now be made up of Bobby Wilson, Donald Jones, Michael Robbins, Danny Bullock and Curtis McHargue.

There were only five candidates for the Brodhead Board of Trustees. Elected were: Ronnie Cash, Billy B. Bussell, D.A. Robbins, David Cash and Johnny Wilcop.

In unofficial results, Monroe Baker of Mt. Vernon was defeated in his bid for Railroad Commissioner of the 3rd Dis-

trict by about 10,000 votes.

Although both constitutional amendments were defeated locally, they won statewide.

An unofficial tabulation, by precinct, appears inside this week's Signal.

Large Reward Being Offered For Poachers of Black Angus Herd Bull

On Thursday, October 20th, Wesley Lambert, who farms in the northern part of the county, shifted his Black Angus herd to pasture fields north of his home to an area of which part is accessible only in dry weather.

Over the weekend, Mr. Lambert noticed unusual activity around his farm but assumed it was due to early "Halloweeners." This assumption was only partly true. When a positive cattle count could be made on Wednesday, October 31, it was found that Mr. Lambert's herd bull had been killed and the most valuable parts of the bull stolen. A continuing search revealed a somewhat stunted, but unharmed, cow in the woods.

Part of the bull carcass was in an open area about 150 yards west of the interstate, and reasonably visible from the road, Mr. Lambert said. Approximately the rear third of the animal had been removed to a brushy spot along a small stream and about 30 yards from where the animal collapsed.

The hind quarters were dressed out there and a front shoulder was also taken. A broken aluminum hunting arrow with a black shaft was found near the scene. Otherwise, little evidence was left. Mr. Lambert said the job appeared to be the work of highly professional hunters who knew what they wanted and came prepared to get it. "They were probably at least three or four in number," Mr. Lambert said.

The animal was a young bull weighing between 950 and 1,000 pounds, and was not insured. The loss was estimated by Mr. Lambert at \$1,000 and possibly \$1,500 since the animal was nure-bred.

The Sheriff and State Police are continuing their investigation and a cash reward has been offered.

"This type of poaching is becoming more commonplace, especially in Florida and other southern states and if higher meat prices continue, the situation is bound to worsen," Mr. Lambert said.

Mr. Lambert also gave a

word of warning to other local cattlemen in that he reported most homeowners and farmowners policies do not cover livestock, unless specifically listed. Therefore, it would be wise for cattle owners to check their insurance policies and keep an ever-watchful eye on all livestock and that of their neighbors.

School Bus Cost up \$2400 Board Told Monday Night

The cost of six new school buses purchased by the Board of Education this year, will run \$18,551.77 each, up \$2,400 per bus from last year's price. Members of the Board of Education were told Monday night at their regular meeting. The buses are bought under a state bid. The buses will be set-up on an eight year depreciation schedule with the state returning one-eighth of the purchase price to the board each year. Of course, operation and maintenance plus the cost of the driver's salary is paid for from the local budget. The new buses are 65 passenger Fords.

Also during Monday night's meeting, the Board approved having an attorney check title clearance to all deeds to Mt. Vernon School property including the proposed plot to be purchased. They will be to see if there is a total of 14 acres which is required by the state if the board decides to build a new school on the present site. The 2.2 proposed plot is presently under discussion by the board and no negotiations have been made as yet with the owners.

Another Rabid Skunk Killed

Another rabid skunk has been killed in the county near Roundstone School and a suspected case was killed on Chestnut Ridge.

In both cases, the skunks were killed by dogs but the skunk on Chestnut Ridge had been dead too long to confirm rabies.

Steve Midkiff, Environmentalist for the Rockcastle County Health Department, said that rabies were again on the increase across the state following a slump for a couple of months. He also said that more rabies clinics for dogs were being planned but nothing definite had been decided.

In these last two cases, the dogs had not had rabies shots and will now have to be quarantined for a period of 6 months. Even if a dog who has had rabies shots is in contact with a rabid animal, the quarantine

period is 30 days. Mr. Midkiff said that pet owners should remember that if an animal in quarantine cannot be produced after the quarantined period is up to be checked then the owner could face legal problems.

Legislative Report

By Wm. Harold DeMarcus

The two year term of Kentucky's General Assembly is rapidly approaching culmination. The most progressive steps taken by this legislature were enactment and formation of special committees for personal service contract review and program review.

The Personal Service Contract Review subcommittee in the past sixteen months has reviewed 1,091 state personal service contracts. The committee has no power to cancel a contract, only the ability to discover inequities and then make them public.

Whenever the committee found contract inequities, the press reported them and public scrutiny was directed at the state agency responsible for the contract. Because of this legislative press-public association, thirty contracts were cancelled or reduced which served to reduce state spending by approximately \$1.4 million.

Primarily, the only problem the committee has is with contracts that have already been paid out, if anything is amiss, nothing can be done because the contract is already terminated. I have had a bill drafted which will allow the committee to review all contracts before they become effective, if the full committee agrees, legislation to solve the problem will be introduced at the 1980 session.

While the program review and investigations committee has had some accomplishments, it has been plagued by problems that have severely limited its impact. Most of this committee

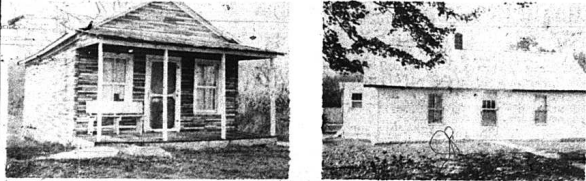

tee's staff was brought in from other states, thus, they have no insight into the scope of Kentucky state government.
Secondly, the committee chairman is closely aligned with the present executive administration and is reluctant to authorize indepth investigations. Also, the committee has failed to use its' power of subpoena even when it became obvious that information was being suppressed.
However, Senator John Rogers of Somerset must be commended for his work in uncovering the lack of administration in the state's welfare vendor fraud unit. Senator Rogers distinguished himself by being an intelligent and aggressive committee member. He is an input that has not gone unnoticed.
In that I was privileged to be the only legislator to serve on both committees, I decided to observe how each committee would react to the same subject. Hence, both committees spent a great deal of time studying the Public Employees Deferred Compensation system.
On four separate occasions, Personal Service Contract Review questioned Deferred Compensation officials about a contract with an Oklahoma investment firm. State officials and representatives of the Oklahoma investment firm could not justify their \$50,000 contract and because of the committee's diligence in compromise, the contract was reduced by 42%.
Program Review conducted a preliminary investigation into the Deferred Compensation system and found that an indepth investigation was warranted. After six weeks of study the committee proved that Deferred Compensation was over-staffed, over-budgeted and extremely lax in its administration.
Although the most alarming fact uncovered by the investigation is that funds invested by Kentucky school teachers into Deferred Compensation are being held, on a short term basis, in bank accounts unauthorized by the State Treasurer, and not gaining interest payments. At present, the committee is investigating to find out if any other state agencies are maintaining unauthorized bank accounts.
The committees for Personal Service Contract Review and Program Review have had problems that may be attributed to their state of infancy. But, these committees have served to reduce state spending, identify waste and make the state working in the state government more accessible to the public which is a progressive step in the right direction.

Nov. 1 marked the beginning of a new kind of fishing season on three of Kentucky's lakes. On this date, commercial fishermen began using gill and trammel nets on Kentucky, Barkley, and Rough River lakes under a newly instituted "special permit" system of commercial fishing.
The holders of these special permits have paid \$500 each for them, in addition to the regular commercial fishing licenses (\$62.50 resident, \$125.50 non-resident) for themselves and the one assistant each permit holder is allowed.
These fishermen are required to fish at least 800 yards of nets for at least 25-percent of the season, which runs through March 31, 1980.
Gill and trammel nets were banned on most Kentucky waters in 1976. However, these nets

remain the most effective means of harvesting certain kinds of rough fish, according to Charlie Bowers, director of the Fish and Wildlife Department's fisheries division.
"The high populations of carp and buffalo, particular in Kentucky and Barkley lakes, need to be controlled for the good of the ecological balance in these waters," Bowers says. "Without some check on their numbers, sport fishing could suffer."
The carp and buffalo in Kentucky and Barkley represent a potential resource worth \$4 million, Bowers says, a resource which could represent new income for the local areas around the lakes. So, according to Bowers, this commercial fishing should help both the sport angler and the local economy.
By setting this season during the winter, we hope to avoid most interference with sport fishermen," Bowers says, adding that the netting will be carefully monitored. The permit

holders are required to keep daily catch records and mail these, along with copies of receipts for all fish sold, to the Department of Fish and Wildlife each week.
"In a study conducted on Kentucky Lake by the U.S. Department of Commerce and the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources, 296 gill nets, 100 yards long each, caught 954 fish," Bowers says. "Of these, only 30 were game fish—57 crappie, 22 sauger, one largemouth bass and one yellow bass."
"All game fish taken by commercial gear must be returned to the water immediately," Bowers says.

To date, 19 of these special permits have been issued, Bowers says. They are valid for only one season, and in future years additional lakes may be opened or closed as the biological need arises.



Consumer Comment

If you're over 65, some

insurance salesman would have you believe that your Medicare health insurance coverage is inadequate.

Salesmen may tell you that Medicare leaves large gaps in your coverage in order to encourage you to buy additional insurance. Contrary to what

you might have been told, Medicare provides generous health care coverage for senior citizens.

Although there are gaps in Medicare coverage, many older citizens don't need to supplement their Medicare coverage with additional insurance. No amount of coverage will completely eliminate all health care costs.

However, many older people, in an attempt to be completely covered, buy much more insurance than they need.

There are two main parts to Medicare coverage: hospitalization and medical services. The hospital coverage includes at least 60 days in a hospital and 100 days in a skilled nursing home. For the first 60 days of hospitalization, you pay only \$160.

For confinement to a skilled nursing home, Medicare pays a cost during the first 90 days, and for the next 80 days, you must pay \$20 per day.

The medical services part of Medicare covers doctor services, outpatient care and part-time home health care. After you pay the first \$60 of reasonable expenses incurred in a calendar year, Medicare will pay 80 per-

cent of your remaining costs.

Medicare does not cover all health-related costs. Perhaps the biggest gap in Medicare coverage is custodial nursing home care. Other exclusions include private duty nursing, routine check-ups, glasses and hearing aids, dental work and self-administered drugs.

It is these loopholes in Medicare coverage that elderly people often try to supplement with what is commonly called "medicap" insurance. However, medigap policies typically leave the same gaps as Medicare coverage while needlessly duplicating other coverage.

Medigap coverage is not always necessary, especially if you can afford to pay Medicare deductibles out-of-pocket. You should consider putting money into a health fund each month instead of buying additional insurance.

Make sure you know exactly what your present insurance covers, so you can avoid paying for duplicate services. Before signing an insurance contract, talk over your health-care package with someone who knows and understands your needs.

Repent or Perish

One of the hardest things for men and women to do is to repent of their sins. Repentance is a direct challenge to man's will power. It demands that he humble himself before God, and give up everything that is contrary to His will. The holy demands of repentance have kept many of "the billions outside of the kingdom of God."

Repentance is a duty imposed upon all mankind. It is a plain command of God and no man can refuse to repent without bearing the responsibility that must come upon him. When Jesus gave the world-wide commission, He said, "That repentance and remission of sins should be preached in his name among all nations..." (Luke 24:47). Paul said that, "God...now commandeth all men everywhere to repent" (Acts 17:30). Can anyone read these scriptures and conclude that he can be saved without repentance? Surely not.

Repentance is Not:
Let us clear away some of the misunderstanding about repentance by learning what it is NOT. In the first place, repentance is not simply being afraid. Paul convicted Felix of his sins. Felix trembled with fear but he did not repent and turn (Acts 24:25). There are many people today who are afraid when they think of their sinfulness, but they, like Felix, refuse to repent and die without hope.

In the second place, repentance is not simple being sorry that one has sinned. The murderers of Jesus sorrowed on Pentecost at Peter's preaching. They were pierced in their hearts by godly sorrow. Yet there were told to repent (Acts 2:38). Their sorrow was godly because it was produced by their faith in gospel preaching; but it was not repentance.

Repentance is:
Simply stated, repentance is a change of mind, or will, based upon godly sorrow (2 Cor. 7:10), and resulting in a manner of life directed by Christ (Acts 26:20).

Our Lord gave us an example of repentance which we can all understand. He said, "A certain man had two sons, and he came to the first, and said, Son, go work today in my vineyard. He answered and said, I will not: but afterward he repented, and went" (Matt. 21:28-29). This boy began to reflect on what he had done, and he realized that he had disobeyed his father. He became conscious of the fact that he sinned against his

father, who was responsible for his very existence, and when he came to himself, he acknowledged that wrong, and then corrected it. He changed HIS MIND (repented) and did that which he said he would not do. Jesus said that was repentance.

Christ said to the Pharisees that "The men of Nineveh shall rise in judgment with this generation, and shall condemn it: because they repented at the preaching of Jonas; and, behold, a greater than Jonas is here" (Matt. 12:41). Jesus here says that the men of Nineveh repented at the preaching of Jonas. The Bible says: God saw their works, that they turned from their evil way..." (Jonah 3:10). The preaching of the prophet of God changed the mind of the Ninevites, and this change led them to turn from their evil way. This change of mind was repentance.

Why repent?
The Lord has given men two motives as the means of leading them to repentance. The first motive is fear. The Bible writers say, "We must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ; that everyone may receive the things done in his body, according to that he hath done, whether it be good or bad" (2 Cor. 5:10-11). This statement, and the warnings in the Bible are intended to move us to repent of our sins.

The second motive God uses to bring about repentance is love. The Bible says, "...knowing that the goodness of God leadeth thee to repentance" (Rom. 2:4). The goodness of God is revealed in the life and death of His only Son, Jesus Christ. As we study the life of our Lord, and see the beauty of holiness manifested through His earthly pilgrimages, then follow him to Calvary and watch Him suffer there, dying for our sins, making it possible for poor sinners to be saved and to become children of God, we ask why all this flow of love, why all this display of goodness? What wouldst thou love? And the answer comes back in the Bible: "The goodness of God leadeth thee to repentance."

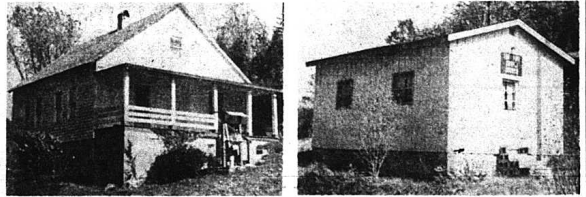
