#### Economics Winter Feeding

Most Kentucky farms had a good forage production year in 1979 so that feed supply will not be limited for beef cows this winter. However, winter feeding is the most expensive part of keeping a cow and the use of

good management techniques will help keep down costs.

Costs of harvest and storage constitute a major part of feed costs. Allowing the cow to harvest this winter feed supply is the cheapest method. Applying nitrogen to part of the fescue fields in late August and with drawing the cattle will allow an accumulation of forage. Accumulated fescue during fall and early winter is a very high quality feed and will provide much winter grazing. Winter must be controlled if cow harvesting of this feed is to be economical. Cattle will trample and waste much of the forage unless strip grazing is used.

Waste of feed by cattle costs of the producer may and should be avoided. Waste may take the form of improper feeding of the cow according to production requirements. Feeding of stored feeds. Nutrient needs of cows vary according to stage of production. Energy needs expressed as TDN increase with calving and protein needs

increase with lactating. Carrying and lactating cows in the same herd means that some cows are either under or over fed. In one case feed is wasted and in the other production is limited. Either one costs the producer money.

Uncontrolled feeding of stored feeds such as hay in stacks, large round bales or conventional bales will waste available supplies.

Research has shown that using racks with large round bales will decrease the amount of hay needed per cow by 33%. Wasting 1/3 of the hay supply cannot be tolerated.

Even though forage supplies may be adequate, good feeding management is still needed to make wintering cows as economical as possible.

Regions, be sure to use fertilizers which contain the three major fertilizer elements: nitrogen, phosphorus, and potassium. Be sure the mixture contains as much as or more (2-3 times) nitrogen than either of the other two elements. In most of the Bluegrass and Outer Bluegrass regions, nitrogen is the only fertilizer element needed. Ask you county extension agent for the exceptions within these regions.

Fresh planting shrubs, trees and evergreens for best results. Stake newly set trees carefully, and wrap their trunks against winter sunburn. Just before the hard freezing weather begins, mulch the soil beneath all the newly set plants. Later plantings can be made as long as the soil is not frozen or too wet.

**From the Beginning It Was Not So**

The Pharisees came to Jesus trying Him and asked a question about Moses' granting a writing of divorce for every cause, and Jesus said, "From the beginning it was not so..." Hence, Jesus makes it clear that God's design has been changed, and reminded them "whosoever shall put away his wife, except it be for fornication, and shall marry another, committeth adultery" (Matt 19:9).

These words, "From the beginning it was not so" spoken with reference to the deviation from God's law of marriage, are equally as appropriate when applied to the many departures from God's standard for the church. Here are some examples of these departures:

**Plurality of churches**  
There are hundreds of religious groups today, ranging from dignified organizations to the most radical and irrational sects, but one church (Eph. 4:4). In the United States alone, a recent census report listed 251 distinct denominational bodies. However, such division is condemned in the New Testament. (1 Cor. 1:10). While many people thank God today for division, Christ prayed for unity (John 17:20-21). Denominations and religious divisions prevail in almost every place, but "from the beginning it was not so!"

The first century those who were saved from sin were added to the same church, scripturally designated as "the church of the Lord" (Acts 20:28-29), the "church of God" (1 Cor. 1:2) and "the churches of Christ" (Rom. 16:16). The individual members wore the God-given name "Christian" instead of the names of human leaders, practices or communities today. Paul said, "For ye are yet carnal; for whereas there are among you envying and strife and divisions, ye are yet carnal, and ye are men?" For while one sath, I am of Paul; and another I am of Apollas; are ye not carnal" (1 Cor. 3:3-4) the apostle Peter writes, "Thus if

any man suffer as a Christian, let him not be ashamed, but let him glorify in God in this name" (1 Peter 4:16). While divisions exist and human names are worn in today's religious world, "from the beginning it was not so!"

**Sprinkling and Pouring For Baptism**  
Many today teach that sprinkling or pouring is acceptable to God for baptism, but according to the scripture this is another departure from the practice of the Apostolic age. The church in Apostolic times, and for many centuries thereafter, recognized only immersion as baptism. Baptism in the Scriptures was called a burial, or planting, because the person was completely submerged in water, in the likeness of Jesus' burial in the tomb (Col. 2:12, Rom. 6:3-8). The practice of substituting sprinkling or pouring for baptism is a departure, and "from the beginning it was not so."

**Instrumental Music in Worship**  
The use of instrumental music in the worship is another departure from the practice of the first century church. It was not introduced until the middle of the seventeenth century. In the early church only vocal music was authorized. Paul said, "Speaking one to another in psalms, hymns and songs, singing and making melody with your hearts to the Lord" (Eph. 5:19). Instrumental music is an addition to the worship, "From the beginning it was not so."

**Conclusion**  
Men need to give up and remove from the church, the things that were "from the beginning" not so. Back to the Bible is the plea of the churches of Christ.

## State Turns Down Engineers' Cost Estimate For Relocating Water Lines on 150

Howard K. Bell's estimate of engineering costs to relocate the City of Mt. Vernon's water lines on Hwy. 150 of \$14,000 was turned down Monday night by State Department of Highway engineers as being too high.

Plans by the Highway Department are to widen 150 into three lanes from the industrial park to the residence of Jack R. Craig and the state will have to bear the cost of relocating the city's water lines which run alongside the road.

However, the state decided that a \$14,000 engineering fee was out of line and Howard K. Bell agreed to rework the project to see if the cost could be brought down.

The Council heard the state's decision at a called meeting of the council Monday night. Several other items were on the agenda for consideration.

Included in these was a request by John Cox, Fire Chief, to be allowed to take the city's new fire truck back to Paul Miller Ford in Lexington to correct a faulty brake valve. There will be no charge for fixing the valve, Mr. Cox told the Council. The Council gave their permission for this trip.

During the meeting, the Council received a check from R.A. Williams, developer of the elderly housing site behind city hall, for \$16,000 in payment of the land which on which the site is located. This land belonged to the city before being sold to Mr. Williams.

While at the meeting, Mr. Williams asked the Council if they would allow City Clerk Mary McClure to take the name, address and phone number of persons wishing to work on the project and then pass them

along to Mr. Williams. The Council agreed to this proposal.

The Council also discussed the reason for Msgr. Ralph Betting not being present at the regular November meeting as requested by the Council to explain why the lease payment on the Renfro Valley Boat Dock had not been made as contracted.

City Clerk Mary McClure told the Council that she had been contacted by Msgr. Betting who told her that, due to sickness in his family, he would not be able to meet with the Council until their December meeting. The Council decided to wait for Msgr. Betting's appearance at this meeting.

Councilman Oscar Bullock brought before the Council the action of the Rockcastle County Hospital Board in erecting a gate across the street which runs between the hospital and the Gillis Craig property.

Mr. Bullock said this was a city street, deeded from the county, and he felt that City Attorney Carl Clontz should be directed to write a letter to the Hospital Board asking them to explain their action in this matter. The Council agreed to do this.

The Council also discussed the moving of the Mt. Vernon Cab Stand from its present location to in front of the courthouse.

At present, a \$72 yearly rental is paid for the space and it was decided to ask that the stand be moved at the end of the present contract period. The motion carried with Councilman Joe Young abstaining on the vote.

The question of supplying city water to a new business being built by Raymond McGuire on U.S. 25 South of Mt. Vernon was also brought up.

The Council decided they would authorize the running of two one-inch lines under U.S. 25 to the other side of the road provided Mr. McGuire would then run a 4-inch line from their to his property.

Due to the illness of the pastor of the First Baptist Church, Mt. Vernon, the revival previously scheduled for November 25-28 has been postponed until a later date. Bro. Raymond Rouden will undergo heart surgery November 30.

Dear Editor:

In the last two issues of the Signal I have read a few things which disturb me very much. It is in regard to the herd bull belonging to Mr. Lambert, supposedly killed with a bow and arrow.

In the November 8 issued Mountain Signal this appeared to be the work of highly professional hunters.

I am president of our local archery club and in my opinion this was not done by any kind of hunter. This was done by an outlaw of sorts—a true hunter and sportsman would not kill someone's cow.

The Rockcastle Archery Club was formed to help give the farmer and landowner a better working relationship toward hunting. This is our first by-law. We do not uphold such things as has happened to Mr. Lambert.

Last year our club raised 600 quail and distributed them all over the county. We didn't do this so we could take our bows to kill them. We did it because the last 3 winters have been hard on quail populations. I have also talked to Frankfort officials several times about a turkey stocking program for our county.

I would like to ask every sportsman whether he be a hunter or a fisherman, when he sees a violator—whether it be a deer killed out of season or someone killing a farmer's stock, report him because he is taking money out of your pocket when he does this and probably causes the landowner to lose his land and therefore limit the places you can hunt. Did you realize that your license fee and tax on fishing tackle and hunting gears are what keeps you game to hunt. The Department of Fish and Wildlife has no government help whatsoever. So really everytime someone kills a rabbit, squirrel, deer, etc. or keeps a game fish under size limit, they are taking a game or fish that you helped pay for.

Almost every time a so-called hunter takes his hunting privileges on private land he is abusing his hunting privileges. So let's all get together and help our game officers and give our landowners the respect they deserve—if he's good enough to let you hunt on his land, take care of his fences and fields, and stock. Also if you kill 3 or 4 rabbits, give him one to show your appreciation. Remember hunting on private land is a privilege, not a right.

## Legislative Report

In the wake of this month's gubernatorial election, there has been increased media speculation about the future of Kentucky's Republican Party. The Republican Party is not finished, because if it were, the two-party system would be finished. Without the Republican Party, there would be no two-party system. No provision for checks and balances which would result in a form of government that is democratic in name only. The voters of Kentucky rejected individual candidates rather than the Republican Party and what it stands for.

Considering that the Republican Party is based on a philosophy of conservatism, an imminent return to power is altogether conceivable, especially since very few would doubt that a widespread conservative movement exists in America today.

A Republican victory in the 1980 Presidential election is not out of the realm of possibility. In that the world's profile is one of intense strife, the public appears to want strong and conservative leadership.

The Commonwealth has always learned a conservative philosophy of government. In all frankness, the manner by which the average Kentucky Republican or democrat views governmental issues is very similar.

This was the main reason an open primary bill was prefiled for the 1980 legislative session. If a voter is a registered independent, democrat or republican, he or she should be able to vote in a primary for the candidate that will most amply represent their philosophy of government.

In my estimation the state-wide democrat victory may be attributed, at least in part, to the fact that the democrats wholeheartedly adopted a Republican platform of reduced spending and less waste in government. Every candidate was running against the \$7.5 billion budget and 40,000 state employees.

Although the Republican Party suffered a terrible defeat in the governor's race, there were some bright spots. Three seats were gained by the House Republican caucus, one seat was gained in the Senate Republican Caucus and twenty-two Republican legislators were re-elected.

Further, Constitutional Amendment #2 was approved by Kentucky voters, which changes the years that state legislators are elected and gives them more control over legislative sessions. The amendments will make the General Assembly more independent which should allow for more input by Republican legislators.

In 1964, Lyndon Johnson won the presidency in a landslide over Barry Goldwater, the Republican Party did not die. In fact Kentucky Republicans were resilient enough to elect a governor, two U.S. Senators, three U.S. Representatives and in 1968 the Republican presidential candidate carried Kentucky.

When the Republicans are in power they will govern, when out of power they will serve the system of checks and balances.

In the future, Republicans will win and lose elections, but the party of Abraham Lincoln will survive, as will the party of Thomas Jefferson, because the two-party system ensures the principle of majority rule.

## KSP OCTOBER ACTIVITY REPORT

During the month of October, the Kentucky State Police Post at Longton report the following activity:

740 motorists were issued citations for moving hazardous violations; 433 motorists were issued citations for other traffic violations; 793 persons were issued warnings for faulty equipment and different traffic violations; 220 motorists were assisted with breakdowns, given tourist information, etc.

A total of 233 traffic accidents were investigated. Of these, 167 were property damage only accidents; 63 were personal injury accidents; there were 3 fatal accidents; 107 per-

sons were injured and 3 persons were killed.

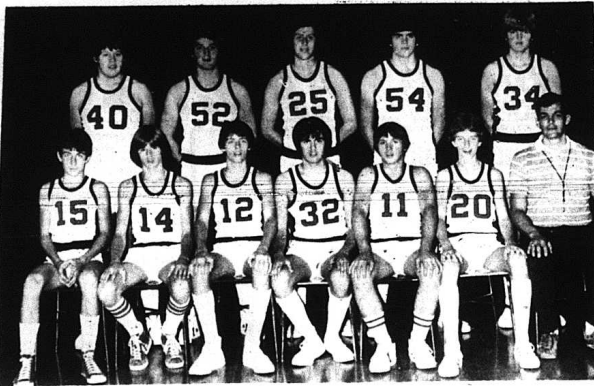

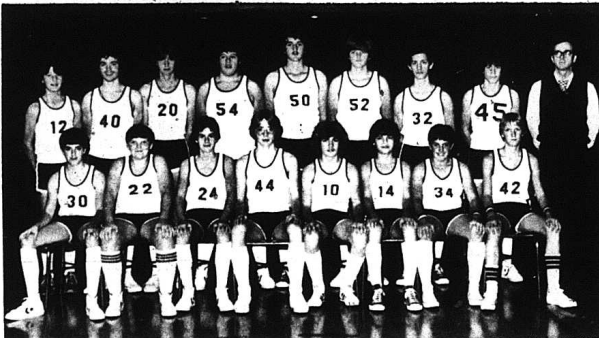

## Kentucky Afield

William Tell used a crossbow to shoot an apple off his son's head, but that's not the recommended way to practice for Kentucky's first statewide crossbow deer hunt scheduled for November 20 through November 30. This hunt is for crossbows only—other bows or firearms may not be used during this 11-day period.

Prior to this year, crossbows were legal only in the Pioneer Weapons Area of the Daniel Boone National Forest. This year, the crossbow season is open in all but 10 of Kentucky's 120 counties. These counties, which are closed to all deer hunting are Estill, Floyd, Johnson, Knott, Lincoln, Magoffin, Martin, Perry, Powell and Wolfe.

Several wildlife management areas are closed to all deer hunting and several more do not allow crossbow hunting, so check the 1979 Deer Hunting Guide (attached to your deer permit) carefully before you take off for a crossbow hunt.

Also check your crossbow itself—it might not be legal this year. In the past, those hunting on the Pioneer Weapons Areas could use crossbow with a minimum pull of 80 pounds. But this year, all crossbows used in Kentucky must have a minimum pull weight of 100 pounds.

Crossbow must have a working safety device, and the bolts (that is, crossbow arrows) must have a minimum weight of 380 grains and be fitted with barbless broadhead points at least 7/8 inch wide. Bolts may not be chemically treated nor carry attachments containing chemicals.

Like other archery hunters, crossbowmen (crossbowmen?) may not carry any kind of firearm while actually hunting, but must have a valid annual license and deer permit in their possession.

Crossbow hunters are not required to wear hunter orange clothing, but they must have the deer they take checked at the nearest check station or by a conservation officer.

Of course, if you've already

taken your deer during the first phase of the archery season or the Nov. 10-12 gun hunt, all this is academic, because you're limited to one deer per year (except under certain conditions on some wildlife areas), no matter what method you use to take it. After the crossbow season ends Nov. 30, the second phase of the gun season opens Dec. 1 and runs through Dec. 3. Again, check your deer hunting guide, because many of the counties that were open for the November gun hunt will be closed in December.

After the gun hunt, longbow and compound bow hunters will have the woods to themselves again until Dec. 31, when all deer hunting will cease until next fall.

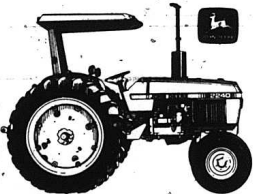

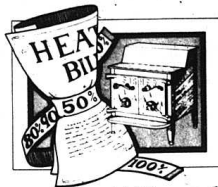

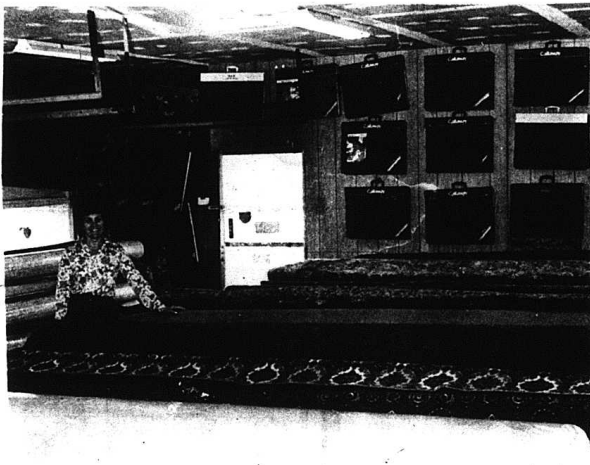
