

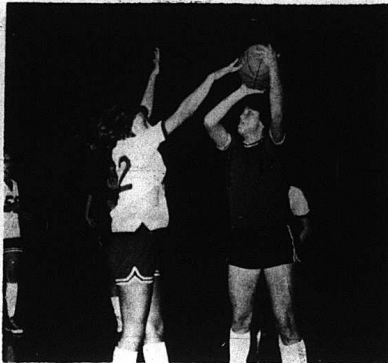

The Rockcastle Rockets got their 1979-80 basketball season off to a rocky start last week. After losing to Clay County last Tuesday night by a score of 77-45, the Rockets then hosted their annual Thanksgiving Tournament Friday and Saturday night.

In the opening round, the Rockets lost to Model, 68-63, and Lone Jack was defeated by Wayne County. In the consolation game, the Rockets won handily 59-37 with Mike Manis as high point man with 11. Marty Hensley had 10, Trent Mullins and David Mullins, 8 each, David Riddle, 7, Carl Leece, 6, Clinton Graves, 5 and Matt Poynter and Danny Offutt, 2 each.

Tuesday night, the Rockets journeyed to McCreary County and both the B and A teams fell victim to McCreary Co.

The B team was led in scoring by Jeff Stevens with 15 points, Barry Proctor got 7, David Burdine 6, Scott Henderson 4 and Dwight Hensley and Willie Hiatt each scored 2 in the 40-36 losing effort.

In the A team game, the Rockets were led in scoring by David Mullins, Mike Manis and

Matt Poynter with 8 each; Marty Hensley got 6; Trent Mullins, Danny Offutt and Steve Phelps, 4 each; David Burdine 3 and Ricky Hicky, Clinton Graves, Anthony Davidson and Carl Leece, 2 each.

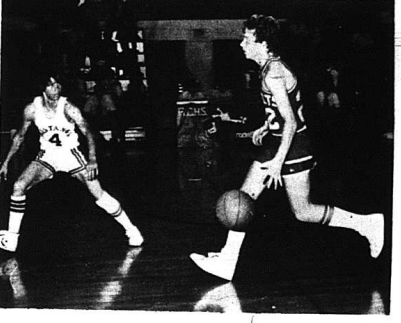

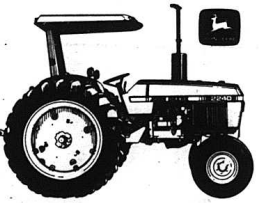

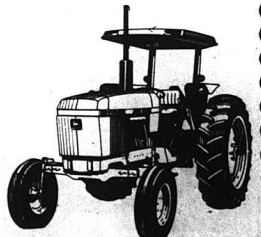

cars and jewelry are not counted.

Applicants may receive up to \$400 depending on the amount needed to obtain or retain heating service. Generally the bureau will issue a check to both the applicant and the heat supplier.

If the \$400 limit is not used and another crisis occurs, application may be made for the balance.

To apply, applicants must state the amount needed to have the fuel bill paid and provide verification that a crisis exists and that their income and resource levels are within program limits. Checks will be

issued approximately three to five working days after an application is made.

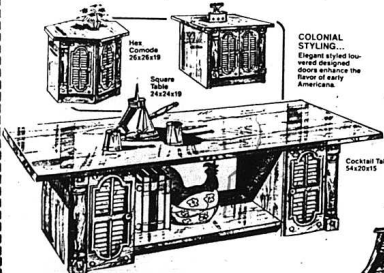

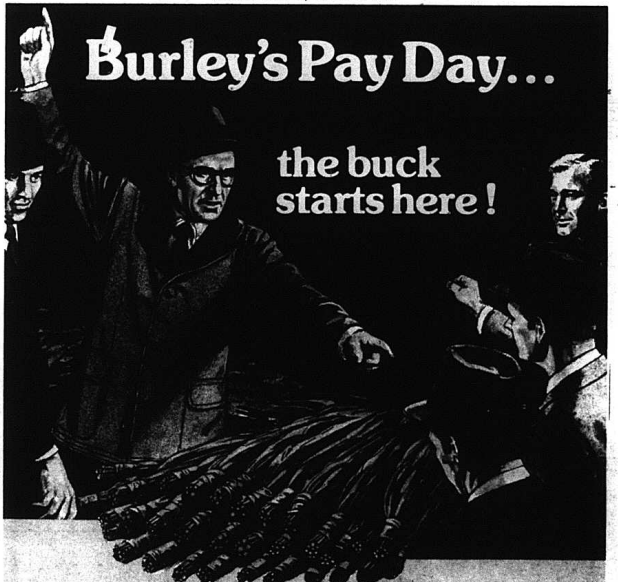

KYDOT Lists Snow Removal Priorities

Individual county maps indicating state Department of Transportation snow and ice removal priorities for this winter will be available again this year, according to state Transportation Secretary Calvin Grayson.

The maps, prepared and distributed by the department's Bureau of Highways, show which roads receive attention first according to four priority categories. After a request from Governor Julian Carroll to the Department of Transportation following two straight hard winters, county maps were made available for the first time last year. Grayson said snow and ice removal priorities were available only on a statewide map prior to 1978.

Grayson explained that with Kentucky's 25,000 miles of state maintained roads, "limited manpower and equipment requires a priority system by which the most heavily traveled roads are cleared first."

"The county maps were developed to inform Kentucky residents which roads are scheduled to be cleared first in their own county," he added.

Kentucky's roads are classified as follows:

Priority One: Interstate highways, parkways (toll roads) urban, expressways, and any other state maintain road of exceptional traffic volume.

Priority Two: State primary roads (such as U.S. 60, U.S. 127), expressways, by-passes and other access roads with slightly lesser traffic volume.

Priority Three: State secondary roads such as Ky. 52, rural secondary roads, other

roads of equal traffic volume.

Priority Four: All remaining state maintained roads not included in one of the first three categories.

Roads classified as priority one, two, or three are to be maintained through plowing, salting and sand spreading often enough to keep them safe for travel, according to Russell Romine, assistant state highway engineer.

Priority four roads will be maintained whenever other roads are clear, Romine said, adding, "we plan to get to all roads we're responsible for."

Romine explained that the priority system is not absolute, and that local officials have some flexibility concerning which roads are cleared. "If the county foreman or district engineer feels a road should receive extra attention due to an emergency, whatever work is needed may be authorized to improve a road's condition," he said.

Romine said city streets and county roads not part of the state maintained system are not

included in the road maintenance plan.

Copies of county maps may be obtained from the Bureau of Highways district office or by writing the Department of Transportation in Frankfort.

Do applicants for the state's Energy Cost Assistance Program have to be faced with a crisis before they can qualify for aid?

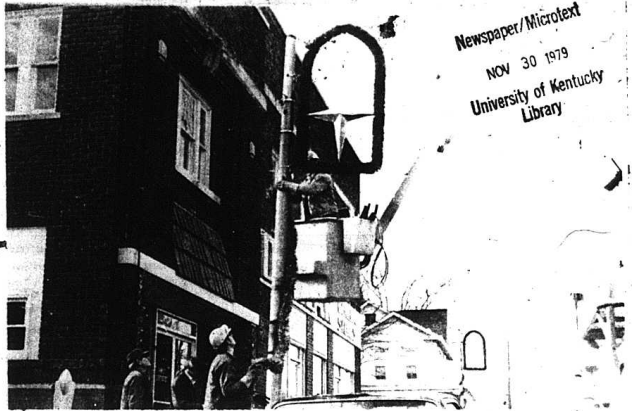
According to the Department for Human Resources, the answer is no.

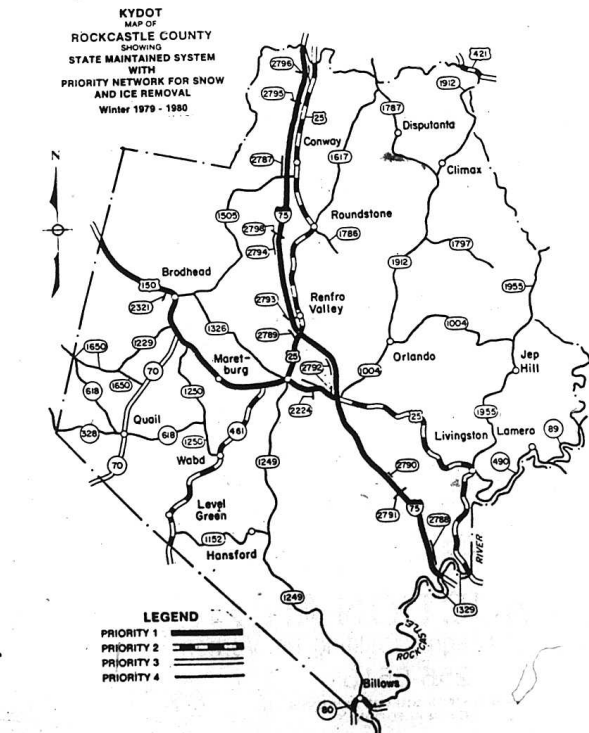
Blood Drive Nets 61 Pints; County Has Total Coverage

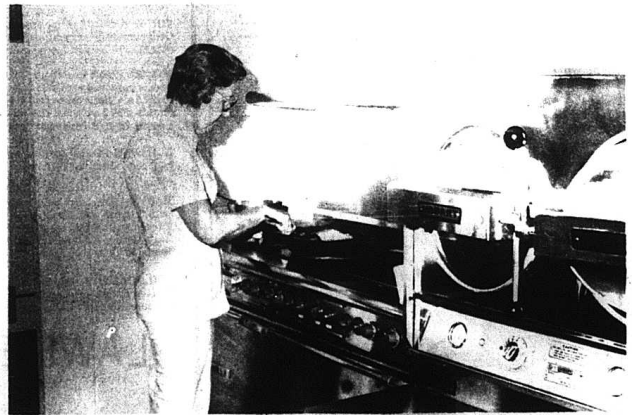
The new kitchen and adjacent dining area is located on

nurses to dispense. Mrs. Stevens says that when the new addition is completed and serving patients, the capacity of the kitchen should double and this will require the hiring of a new employee.

In addition to new surroundings, the kitchen also has all new equipment with two huge walk-in refrigerators available for food storage and there is an area, separate from the food preparation and serving area, where the dishwashers are located.

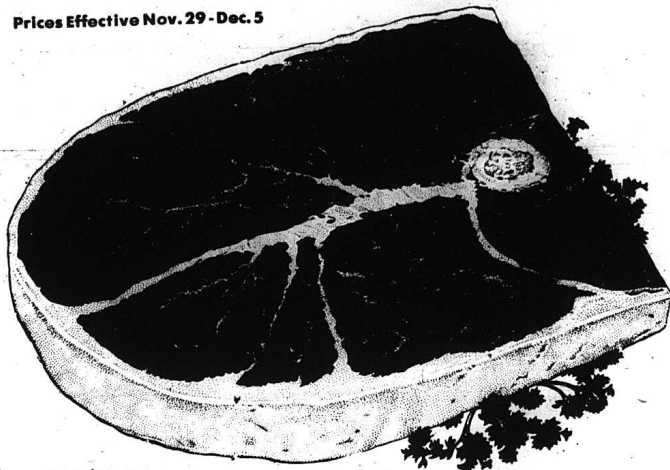

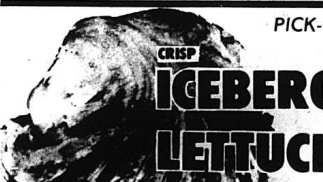

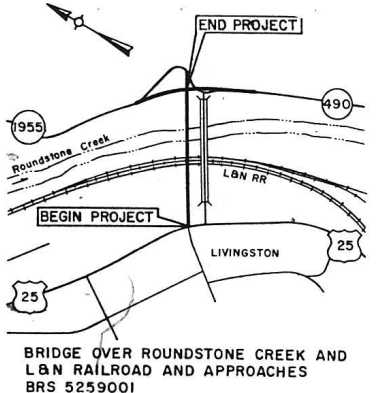

consumers who meet the program's guidelines to apply for assistance before a crisis comes up," he said.

Generally a household qualifies if any household member is age 62 or older or is blind or disabled and receiving either Supplemental Security Income or state Medicaid benefits.

Waddell said the federal Energy Crisis Assistance Program will serve emergency cases and will not have any requirements relating to age or disability. The Bureau for Social Insurance will take applications for the federal program beginning Dec. 3.

Most questions asked during the workshops concerned eligibility factors and the application process. The following are sample questions and answers from the meetings:

Q. What kinds of proof are required to establish age?

A. Usually, an applicant will be receiving Medicare benefits and can use his blue ID card. If other identification is required, the bureau will accept a drivers' license, birth certificate, family Bible or any other official record of age.

Q. How many times can a person apply for benefits?

A. Only once each winter.

Q. Who can apply if the applicant is unable?

A. Anyone who knows the applicant and can produce the necessary proof of age and income. A designated representative can apply for more than one applicant if necessary.

Q. Can persons apply who rent and have their utilities included in their rent?

A. Yes. Persons living in public housing also are eligible.

Q. How long will it take to receive a check?

A. A check should be received by the applicant, in most cases, within 7-14 working days after the application is made.

Q. Does a designated representative have to bring proof of designation from the household?

A. No. The designated representative will be required to sign the application and, if necessary, the household will be contacted.

The state workshops were attended by more than 700 persons who are in positions to assist or refer people who can benefit from the program.

The bureau expects the \$8 million in grants to serve nearly 40,000 residents.

Payments of \$100, \$150 and \$200 will be available to qualified applicants beginning Dec. 3. The amount of payments depends on the applicant's income and size of household.

Waddell suggests that anyone with a question contact his local Bureau for Social Insurance Office for information or assistance.

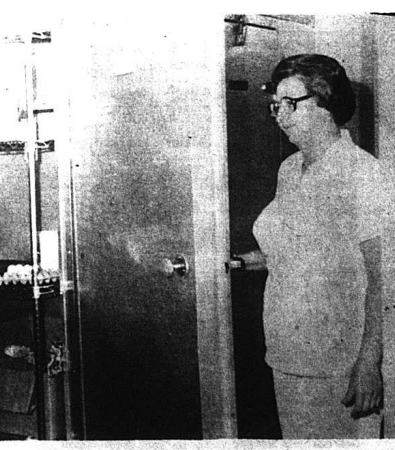

...tive, judicial and legislative.

Ideally, a democratic form of government functions best when no one person has too much power and multiple avenues for the expression of opinion exist. From the very nature of each area of the Commonwealth providing an elected representative, the legislative branch serves to more aptly reflect the views of the people.

Kentucky's Constitution provides for a General Assembly or legislature which consists of a 100 member House of Representatives and a 38 member Senate. 1980's legislature will be composed of 75 democrats and 25 Republicans in the House and 29 democrats and 9 Republicans in the Senate.

There will be 6 first-term Senators and 19 first-term Representatives serving with 113 incumbents. Representatives must be at least twenty-four years old and Senators must be at least thirty years old.

The Constitution stipulates that all revenue raising bills must be introduced in the House of Representatives. Although there is no statutory directive

EXTENSION HOME ECONOMICS

Port-A Southern Mainstay
Port-A has been a familiar dish on southern tables for centuries for everyday meals as well as for social festivities.

Pork is plentiful supply according to marketing specialists in the U.S.A. So southern hosts and hostesses will want to take advantage of the abundant supply this fall and throughout the holidays.

Today's consumers are luckier than those of yesterday

because the pork now offered at most meat counters is lean and tender. Another advantage is that a pork sold at retail is inspected before, during and after slaughter. This means that the danger of trachinae has been practically eliminated.

To be sure that your pork is cooked sufficiently to control any harmful bacteria, you need to cook fresh pork until the internal temperature reaches 170 degrees.

For a tasty meal during these crisp, autumn days, you can't beat fried pork chops with gravy, rice, turnip greens and cornbread. But for a special occasion you might want to bake a ham.

The secret of tender, succulent ham dinners is dry roasting in a moderate oven 300 to 350 degrees. No liquid and no cover is needed; just slow cooking. Place ham, fat side up, on rack in open roasting pan. If you use a meat thermometer, insert it in the center of the ham, being careful that it does not rest on a bone or fat. Allow about 18 to 20 minutes cooking time per pound.

Glazes can add just the right flair to make a ham look elegant. Try one of the following glaze recipes the next time you fix ham.

Pineapple Glaze—combine 1 cup crushed pineapple, 1 cup brown sugar and 2 cups honey. Cook until thickened and spread over ham about 30 minutes before removing from oven. Garnish with apricot halves filled with red jelly.

Orange and Pecan Glaze—combine orange marmalade with finely chopped pecans. Spread over ham about 10 minutes before removing from oven.

Brown Sugar and Cloves
This glaze is added before cooking begins. Remove rind from ham and score fat into diamond shapes. Rub brown sugar into the fat and stud each diamond with whole cloves.

Your Rockcastle Conservation District has been working several years in conserving our natural resources. Areas of most work have been in land and water. We have seen much improvement in improved soil by using better land practices such as contour farming, soil grass ways, lime and fertilizer, water and legumes and overall much higher production with all these practices. In the last few years no till planting conserved many tons of soil that would have washed away with the old method of conventional tillage.

We have a much better water supply and much cleaner. Your Rockcastle Conservation District is also concerned with the solid waste disposal we have facing us today with the greatly increased use of plastics, disposable bottles and many other things to be disposed.

There are several on the water, land and resource committee in the eight-county area representing finances. In most of the meetings we have had the state Department of Solid Waste Disposal was there to present ways and means of waste disposal. But I have not

heard them or anybody on committee with a much better plan than the "Green Box" which we are using in Rockcastle County. It has some better things to be desired. But the biggest fault is the boxes themselves. We have a few citizens who will use the boxes and areas around them to dispose of old bed springs, freezers, chairs, dead animals and just about anything. Rubb trash can be loaded by the garbage truck.

Now is the time for educating people in using the boxes for only solid waste and this will take all good citizens reporting those who misuse the boxes.

The Rockcastle Conservation District would like for as many clubs, organizations and private citizens to contact our state senator, Mr. John Rogers, Senators and Representative Harold DeMarcus, Stanford, urging them to support a bill taxing alldrinks put up in bottles and cans. This would provide funds to help keep our highways cleaned up. Some states such as Oregon already have laws like this and are working to keep the state clean. Why can't we do the same? It would be a hard fight because the beer, liquor and soft drink companies have the money to fight it with.

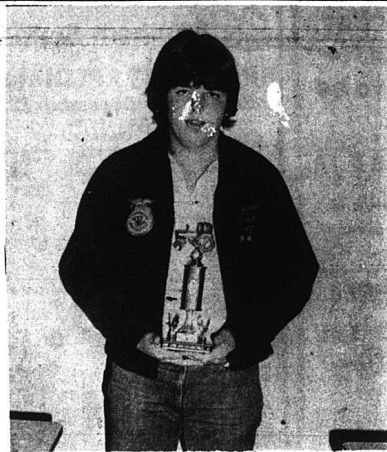

Just over \$1200 was made on the project and this money will be used primarily to pay part of the cost of the new bleachers which the club built at the grade school this past summer.

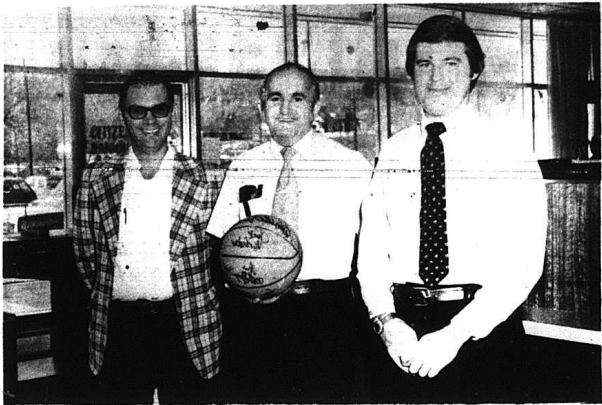

Financial Assistance

For Families

Low-income families faced with a loss of heat this winter can apply for financial assistance under the federal government's new Energy Crisis Assistance Program.

Grants totaling \$3.5 million have been approved for the state and are expected to become available to crisis-needy families by December 3.

Administration of the program will be carried out by the state Department for Human Resources, Bureau for Social Insurance.

Unlike the state's Energy Cost Assistance Program, the federal money is not tied to age or disability requirements.

According to Jack Waddell, bureau commissioner, people may qualify who have an income at or below 125 percent of the poverty level and who are without or will be without heat within 15 days.

The program limits the amount of money a qualifying individual may have in checking and savings accounts. A single person is allowed to have cash assets up to \$1,500 while a couple may have up to \$2,250. Real property such as homes,



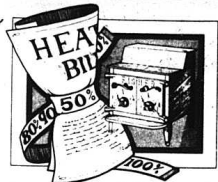
