The report was presented to the local Board of Education at Monday night's regular monthly meeting.

Supt. Charles Parsons also told the board that the Dept. of Building and Grounds in Frank-art had agreed to accept the verification of Property Valua-tion Administrator Robert Cro-

tion Administrator Robert Cro-mer that the present school site at Mt. Vernon contained 12.7 acres. Mr. Parsons said this would leave the site 1.3 acres short of the required 14 acres and that this could be possibly be obtained by acquiring some adjacent land which is reported to contain about 2 acres.

The Court took the petition under advisement and promised to look into the situation to see what could be done to improve


