



## Girls Win Two; Boys Lose to Garrard and Somerset

The Rockcastle girls teams has now evened their season record at 2-2 with wins over Jackson County and Casey County.

Last Thursday night, the girls hosted Jackson county and handed them a 50-49 loss.

After the first quarter, when the Rockets outscored Jackson County 19-7, the game was close. At half-time, the score was 31-27 in favor of the Rockets and at the end of the third quarter, Jackson County had pulled to within 2 at 39-37. The Rockets hung on though for the final 50-49 win.

Leading scorer for the Rockets was Patricia Faulkner with 13; Libby Rupper got 10; Kay Hammonds, 7; Tracy Mulberry and Kim Howard, 6 each; Debbie Bowman, 4 and Sandra Clark and Sheila Burton, 2 each.

In Monday night's home game, the Rockets came from behind to defeat the Casey County Lady Rebels, 34-30. At the end of the third quarter, the

score was 26-19 in favor of the Rebels; however, in the fourth quarter, the Rockets outscored them 15-4 for the final 34-30 victory.

Libby Rupper led all scorers with 13 points; Hammonds got 7; Faulkner, Bowman and Burton, 4 each and Howard, 2.

Monday night, December 10th, the girls host a tough Garrard County team and then travel to Oneida on December 17.

Last Friday night, the Rockets traveled to Garrard County and came away with a 71-57 loss.

The Rockets managed to keep the game close for the first three quarters, trailing by only 6, 45-39 at the end of the third period of play. But, in the fourth quarter, Garrard County pulled out all stops and outscored the Rockets 26-18 for the final 71-57 margin.

Leading scorer for the Rockets was Matt Poynter with 12; David Mullins got 11; David

Riddle and Mike Manis; 10 each, Trent Mullins, 4 and Marty Hensley, Carl Leece, Clinton Graves, Steve Phelps and Danny Offutt all got 2 each.

In the Garrard County B Team game, the Rockets lost 45-33 with David Burdine leading all scorers with 14 points. Jeff Stevens got 8; Barry Proctor, 5 and Willie Hiatt, 6.

Tuesday night, the Rockets hosted Somerset and lost to the Briar Hoppers by a 77-46 margin.

The game was never in question as Somerset took an early lead and built it to throughout the game.

David Riddle led the scoring with 11; David Mullins got 8; Mike Manis and Trent Mullins, 6 each; Marty Hensley and Clinton Graves, 4 each; Matt Poynter got 3 and Carl Leece and David Burdine, 2 each.

The B Team Rockets blew an early lead to also fall to the Briar Hoppers.

The Rockets led through the first half but Somerset came

back in the third quarter to knot the score and then outscored the Rockets 19-7 in the final period of play.

Willie Hiatt got 13 points to lead all scoring; David Burdine had 10; Jeff Stevens, Dwight Hensley and Barry Proctor, 4 each.

The Rockets are idle Friday night and will travel to Knox Central for their next game on December 11.

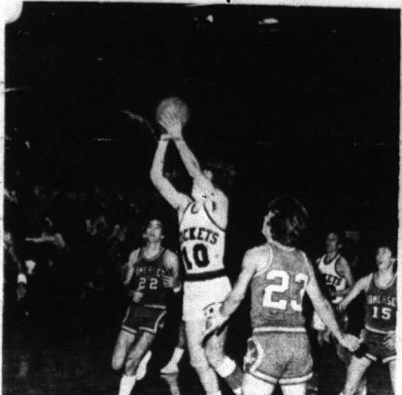

Kay Hammonds and Sheila Burton fight for a rebound in Monday night's win over the Casey County Rebels. The girls

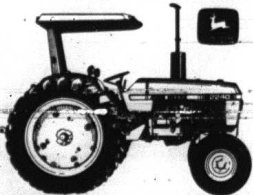

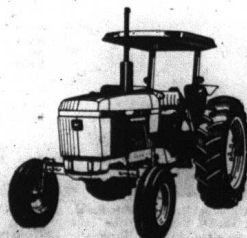

## Department of Education Approves Amendment to Facility Survey

An amendment to the Rockcastle County Facility Survey conducted in August, 1978, has been approved by the State Department of Education.

The amendment deals primarily with priorities for capital outlay expenditures.

The first priority listed in the amendment calls for the first phase of a new elementary school to be constructed on the present Mt. Vernon Elementary School site to include a new cafeteria, physical education facility and 12 basic classrooms to replace substandard relocatable classrooms and the concrete block building.

The recommendation goes on to say that this construction is to be the initial phase of the complete replacement of the old Mt. Vernon Elementary School and should not be connected to the present school.

The second priority calls for construction of four additional classrooms and shower dressing rooms at the Roundstone Elementary School.

Priority number 3 provides for an addition to be constructed to the area vocational school to provide for programs in Auto Body and Carpentry. The business office area, two related classrooms, radio and TV area to be air-conditioned.

Extensive planning for the replacement of Brodhead and Livingston Elementary Schools is the fourth priority.

Three projects are listed to be carried out at the discretion of the district as money becomes available. They are: upgrade lighting at Brodhead and Roundstone Elementaries. A project of window replacement to be carried out at Brodhead

Elementary. And, a general program of site improvement at all permanent centers.

The amendment also provides for Rockcastle County School District to use the K8-4 plan of school organization for the immediate future and lists all schools presently being used as permanent centers, except Blue Springs which is listed as an interim center.

The report was presented to the local Board of Education at Monday night's regular monthly meeting.

Supt. Charles Parsons also told the board that the Dept. of Building and Grounds in Frankfort had agreed to accept the verification of Property Valuation Administrator Robert Cromer that the present school site at Mt. Vernon contained 12.7 acres. Mr. Parsons said this would leave the site 1.3 acres short of the required 14 acres and that this could be possibly be obtained by acquiring some adjacent land which is reported to contain about 2 acres.

## Sand Hill Residents Petition Fiscal Court for Guard Rails, Road Paving and Maintenance

A petition from residents of the Sand Hill Road was presented to the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court Tuesday asking for guard rails and paving and maintenance of the road.

The petition, containing almost 200 signatures, called Sand Hill Road, the "poorest road in the county," and went on to state that, "We hereby serve notice that we, as citizens, intend for our road to be better maintained and that we will, if necessary, follow the petition with appropriate action against those whom we feel are no longer serving in our interest."

The Court took the petition under advisement and promised to look into the situation to see what could be done to improve the road.

An employee of the Department of Transportation was also before the court to request that the Court pass a Resolution assuming maintenance responsibility for those portions of old 461 which are to be deleted from the State Primary System due to reconstruction of 461 in Rockcastle County.

It was explained to the court that with construction of the new road, several portions of old 461 will be left which will still be usable to motorists and these are the sections the state is asking the county to resume responsibility for. The court was assured that any of the sections damaged by construction of the new road would be properly repaired.

On question, the Court was

told that the new Highway 461 was now in the design stage and the next step would be right-of-way purchase with construction beginning no sooner than 1982—and that would be dependent on whether there was funding available.

It has now been decided where the center line of the road will be and if you are interested in knowing exactly where the road will be located, you may find out by visiting the District Highway Engineers office at Somerset.

County Attorney James Lambert brought before the court the problem of janitorial service in the courthouse. Mr. Lambert said he had been approached by some of those renting offices in the courthouse who complained that no janitor-

ial service was being provided. The court discussed the matter very little and no definitive action was taken.

In other action, the Court amended the 1979-80 budget to include \$862.25 surplus from the New Road Machinery account in the 1978-79 budget. The money was amended to the same account. The budget was also amended to show the receipt of \$15,567.50 in unanticipated funds from the county's share of strip mining permits. The funds were distributed as follows: \$10,000 to the road maintenance material fund; \$2,000 to the miscellaneous reserve account and \$3,567.50 to road maintenance. The court also authorized Judge Thacker to borrow \$3,400 to be repaid from receipts of the set Rural Rock program.

## Moth Ball Rumors Not True District Ranger Thiels Says

The Forest Service reports that several employees were stricken from exposure to moth balls in an attempt to drive deer into the Management Area. Not really, says Berra Ranger Leo D. Thiels who hunted Jackson County in the recent deer season.

I was really surprised that many hunters actually believed that the Forest Service or Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources would waste the taxpayers' dollars or do such a

foolish thing. Any of us would be glad to sit down and discuss game management goals and objectives with any hunter or hunting group and would be open for suggestions, Ranger Thiels announced.

He said that he hoped that the people in Jackson and surrounding counties would not think that we would pull such a dirty trick.

## Automobile Accident Claims Life of Johnny Ray Allen, 23

The accident occurred 5 8/10 miles south of Mt. Vernon on Ky. 1250 (the Splro Road). Mr. Allen was alone in the car.

State Trooper Guy Blevins, who worked the accident, said Mr. Allen's small truck left the road in a curve, hit an embankment and overturned. He was taken to the Rockcastle County Hospital and then transferred to St. Joseph Hospital in Lexington.

Mr. Allen was born in Wayne County, Indiana on January 30, 1956, the son of Quentin and Joanna Norton Allen and was a member of the Army National Guard, the Ottawa Baptist Church and a 1975 graduate of Rockcastle County High School.

Besides his parents, Mr.

and Mrs. Quentin Allen of Brodhead, he is survived by two brothers, Jerry Allen and Larry Allen both of Rt. 1, Brodhead; two sisters, Mrs. Connie Wilson of Junction City, and Miss Diane Allen of Rt. 1, Brodhead; his maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Jess Norton, and his paternal grandmother, Mrs. Mayme Allen of Rt. 1, Brodhead.

Funeral services were held Tuesday, December 4, at the Ottawa Baptist Church by Rev. Marlon Brock. Burial, with full Military Honors, was in the Ottawa Cemetery.

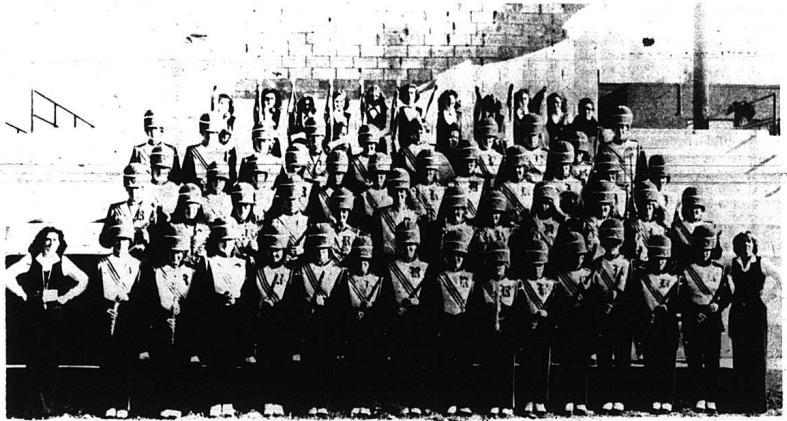

It was with a great deal of sadness Monday afternoon that I stood back and watched the lovely four-bedroom home of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Raines in Mt. Vernon burn to the ground. The blaze was detected by one of their daughters, Lisa, very early, and damage could have probably been held to a minimum if there had been a fire department to answer Lisa's call for help. But, there was none. Although the Raines home is adjacent to the city limits, the City Council has forbidden a city fire truck to be taken beyond the city.

The Council has good reasons for this. For one, they have been told by insurance companies that if a fire should break out in town, while the fire truck is beyond the city limits there could be a problem with insurance.

Perhaps more than anything, the Raines fire points up the crucial need in this community for a county fire department. Granted, a fire 15 miles deep in the country would be pretty far gone by the time an engine got there from any of the three towns but the chance of saving property just outside the city limits would be greatly enhanced.

Perhaps the Fiscal Court might take some concrete steps toward looking into the form-

ation of a county fire fighting unit. It wouldn't cost anything to set up a committee to study other fire departments in counties comparable in size to us and there just might be a way to obtain a county department for Rockcastle...

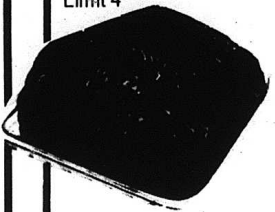

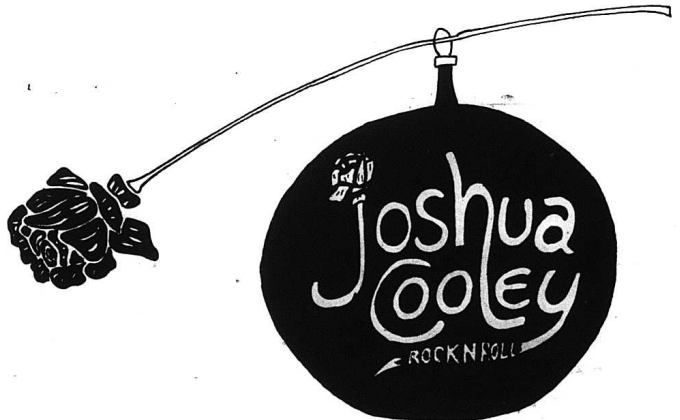

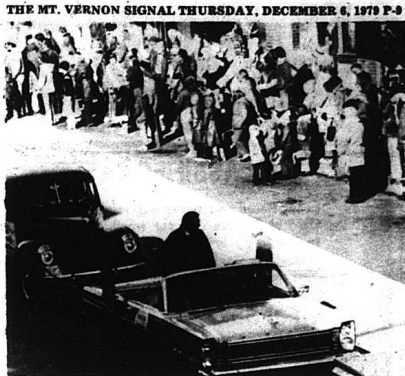

- Wire pine boughs together and tack to a piece of sturdy ribbon. Place a cherub, bells or other decoration in the center.
- In your front porch has pillars, wrap them with red ribbon and garlands of greenery.
- Trim an S-shaped piece of greenery with gingerbread men and small ornaments.
- Set basket of gaily wrapped boxes beside the front door. Trim with ribbons and greenery.
- Hang 3 wreaths in graduated sizes -topiary fashion-on the front door.
- Cut 4 1/2" x 24" panels out of cardboard and cover with red olecloth. Paint on NOEL and hang on front porch.
- Make a giant kissing ball by filling a 10" styrofoam ball with wood wool. Add fresh oranges and berries with floral picks. Trim with ribbon.
- Use an outdoor concrete urn and styrofoam base to create an apple tree. Apples and greenery are attached with florist picks.

**THE BIBLE SPEAKS**

### What is a "Born Again" Christian

We hear a great deal of talk about "born-again" Christians, but few seem to really know what it means to be "born again".

Nicodemus, a ruler of the Jews, recognized that Jesus was "a teacher come from God" because "no man can do these miracles that thou doest, except God be with him." (John 3:1-2). Jesus knew that Nicodemus was a Jew, and by reason of his physical birth under the Law of Moses, was a child of God. However, Jesus told him, "except a man be born again, he cannot see the kingdom of God" (John 3:3).

Nicodemus did not understand the Lord. He knew that his physical birth constituted his citizenship in the family of God (Jewish family) under the religious system in effect at that time. Consequently he thought Jesus meant he would need to "enter the second time into his mother's womb, and be born" (John 3:4), and he knew this was impossible. Therefore Jesus explained, in very simple terms, what he meant by "You must be born again." "Except a man be born of water and of the Spirit, he cannot enter into the Kingdom of God" (John 3:5).

We use a very simple illustration that can easily be understood:

In the physical birth, one is begotten by the father and born of the mother. The same is true in the spiritual birth; one is begotten (the seed is planted) by the Spirit (the seed is the Word of God-Luke 8:11), and born of the water (baptized). The Spirit directed the men to write the New Testament and when one believes it he is "begotten by the Spirit" and when he is baptized, he is born of the water. (See Romans 6:3-4, Mark 16:15-16, 1 Peter 1:23.) At that point, he becomes a Christian and the Lord adds him to the church (Acts 2).

All Christians are "born again" Christians because one cannot be a Christian at all without having been born again.

The New birth is not a complicated operation; it is simply obedience to the gospel of the Son of God.

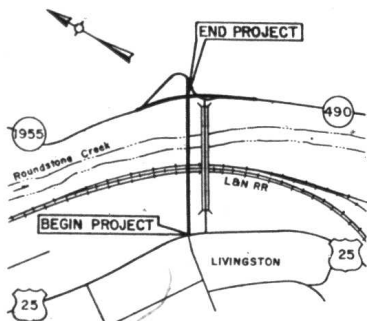

**WATCH OUT FOR SLICK HIGHWAYS.**

Almost everyone over the age of 16 who wields the power of a driver's license has at one point or another found himself skidding out of control on a slick street or highway.

Since the first hazardous conditions of winter arrived this week, the state Department of Transportation offers a few tips on winter driving that will not only save you a few gray hairs, but might also save your life.

Although the vast majority of people who find themselves in a perilous skid can maneuver their way out of it, Transportation Department statistics show that in 1978 more than 30,000 motorists were not so fortunate. Many of these accidents could have been prevented if drivers had known techniques for combating the skids.

If you find yourself skidding on the pavement, perhaps the most important rule to remember is to keep calm. Take your foot off the gas pedal and steer in the direction of the rear of the car is sliding. Next, straighten the wheels out quickly and remember not to brake or accelerate until the car is

headed straight ahead again.

Studies have been conducted by the National Safety Council's Committee on Winter Driving Hazards on the best technique for handling a car on ice and snow. The following are tips offered by the committee:

-It takes from three to nine times as far to stop on snow and ice. Decrease your speed and increase your braking distance.

-Brake gently to test the pavement for slickness. Always accelerate slowly.

-Pump your brakes to slow down or stop.

-Think ahead. Plan your moves in advance before accelerating, turning and braking. And avoid any sudden motions.

In this time of increased demands on our scarce natural resources, including trees, it is becoming more and more important that American agriculture produce food and fiber at peak capacity. Up to the present time Rockcastle County has had an abundance of high quality timber but those days are rapidly fading. As the woods were harvested only the poorer trees were left and after several log-

ging operations many of the county's forested lands were left with the worst trees to make the next crop. As a result many of these acres are producing timber at only a fraction of their potential. But unlike other agricultural crops which are produced in a rather short time span trees take several years to produce a crop. That is why the timber crops of the future must be cultivated today and in Rockcastle County which is 65% forestland that means TSI. Tim-

**Timber Stand Improvement**

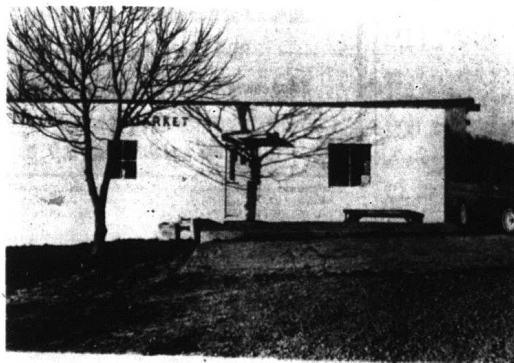
Timber Stand Improvement is similar in principal to hoeing a garden. The main objective is to select the future crop trees and "hoe-out" or kill the "weeds."

The "weeds" in a forest situation are vines, poor quality trees, trees that crowd the future crop trees. In Rockcastle County we are fortunate to have people who do this type of work

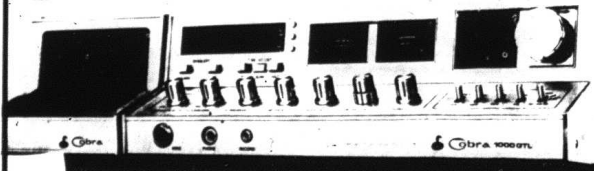

## John Y. Brown, Jr. To Be Inaugurated December 11

John Y. Brown, Jr. will take the traditional oath of office as Kentucky's 55th governor on the steps of the state Capitol at 2 p.m. December 11.

### County Judge Executives

#### Must Inspect Jails

County judge/executives must inspect their county jails at least once a month but do not have sole authority to either close the jail or prosecute rule violations, according to an attorney general's opinion.

The fiscal court would have authority to close a jail since the court establishes the rules and has continuing responsibility to furnish the facility, said Charles Runyan, assistant deputy attorney general and author of the opinion.

If a jail is closed, however, the fiscal court must provide another jail within a reasonable time as determined by the court, said Runyan.

The district court would have authority to prosecute violations of jail rules, according to the opinion. A violation of jail rules can only involve a fine of up to \$250 but no imprisonment since the offense is outside the penal code, said Runyan.

A jailer who is breaking more than one rule is still only charged with one offense—violation.

## Boston Pops, With Henry Mancini, To Appear in Lexington's Rupp Arena

The internationally acclaimed Boston Pops, which probably has a larger audience than any orchestra in the world, will make an historic visit to Lexington Feb. 16 for its first-ever appearance in Kentucky.

The orchestra will appear with special guest conductor and soloist Henry Mancini in Rupp Arena at 8 p.m. The program is in benefit of the Lexington Council of the Arts, Inc., to assist in the Council's activities and community services.

Announcement of the event was made today by Dick Pardy, special event coordinator for Lexington Center Corporation,

at a news conference. America's long love affair with the Boston Pops was shown in dramatic fashion on July 4, 1976, when a crowd estimated at 500,000 turned out for the rousing American Bicentennial outdoor program. The stirring, patriotic music performed by the Pops and the

spectacular fireworks show seemed to be the quintessence of America's celebration of its birth.

The orchestra has produced a series of best-selling albums, now numbering almost 200, which have sold a phenomenal 50 million copies the world over.

The Boston Pops is now 94 years old, having begun in July of 1885 with a series of summer concerts intended to bridge the gap between season of the Boston Symphony. From the beginning, members of the Boston Symphony have played in the Pops.

Informality has been the keynote of the orchestra's musical offerings from that very first concert in 1885 which was "made up largely of light music of the best class."

Trying to categorize the Pops' repertoire of music is risky. However, the orchestra has used selection from light classical, dance suites, waltzes, marches, tunes from Broadway, Hollywood and Tin Pan Alley, and rousing patriotic music to entertain audiences both young and old.

A typical Boston Pops program consists of three selections. In the first part is usually found well-known pieces from the standard light symphonic collections, beginning with a march to quieten the audience down and get its attention.

The middle section usually features a soloist, which for the Lexington concert will be Henry Mancini and members of his group. The final section will include musical novelties that may mean medleys, Broadway musicals, burlesques of popular songs of the day, and always concluding with a bright-and-sassy, send-'em-home-with-a-laugh finale.

From the beginning, the Boston Pops has offered to patrons both music and refreshments, an idea which Bostonians welcomed as an enjoyable summer night's entertainment.

Combining a symphonic orchestra with informality was a new idea in 1885, and one which caught on quickly. The result is something like going to a theater party, with good music, good food and drink, and good company.

Seating for the Lexington

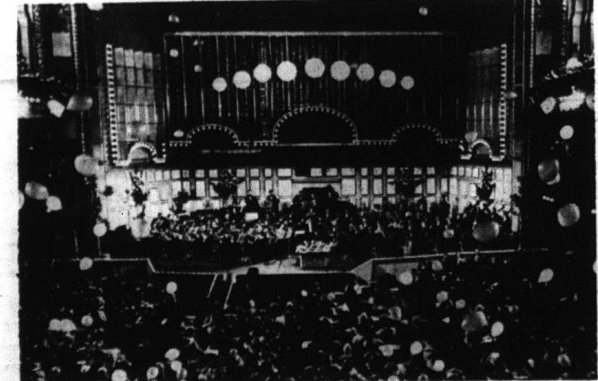
concert will be modeled after the arrangement in Symphony Hall in Boston, where the Pops appears before an audience seated at tables, enjoying food and drink along with the music. It is planned for the tables to be set with champagne and a picnic of fruit and cheeses.

The late Arthur Fiedler, conductor of the Boston Pops from 1930 until his death in July of this year, once summed up the immense popularity of his orchestra's approach to entertaining by saying, "Everybody seems to love a musical picnic."

An essentially light-hearted and musically uncomplicated evening's diversion is the theme of the Boston Pops. Above all, the idea is to have fun.

Only mail orders for tickets can be accepted at this time. Gold Circle Tables on the arena floor, seating eight, are available for the Lexington concert for \$240. Table seats for couples are available at \$60 per couple. Reserved seats in the lower arena will be \$15, \$10 and \$8 depending on location.

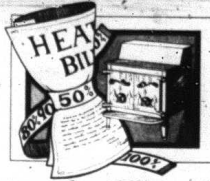
