#### This Season For Holiday Baking

Nothing gives the atmosphere of the holiday season more than the spicy aroma of cakes and cookies baking in the kitchen. These baked goods not only make wonderful memories of an "old fashioned" Christmas for your children, but they also make wonderful gifts for friends and neighbors. Now is the time to begin your holiday baking. Most candies, cakes, cookies and quick breads keep up to two weeks if stored in an airtight container or package wrapping and kept in a cool place. For even longer storage, freeze them. The flavor of many quick breads and fruit cakes improves with storage.

Here are some recipes for spicy, home-made goodies to give your home that holiday feeling.

#### Walnut Honey Gingercake

- 2 1/2 cups sifted, all-purpose flour
- 1/2 cup granulated sugar
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon ginger
- 1/4 teaspoon allspice
- 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/2 cup honey
- 1/2 cup light molasses
- 1/2 cup shortening
- 1 large egg
- 1/2 cup hot water
- 1/2 cup chopped walnuts
- 2 tablespoons sugar for top of cake

Resift flour with the 1/2 cup sugar, soda, salt and spices into mixing bowl. Add honey, molasses, shortening and egg. Beat at low speed, on electric mixer, until all the flour is moistened; then for 3 minutes at medium speed, frequently scraping bowl with rubber spatula. Stir in hot water by hand, then 1/2 cup of the walnuts. Turn into greased and floured 9-inch square baking pan. Sprinkle with remaining 1/2 cup walnuts and 2 tablespoons sugar. Bake at 325 degrees for about 45 minutes, just until cake tests done. Serve warm or cold, plain or with walnut butter. Makes one 9-inch

#### square cake.

- #### Tutti-Frutti Fruitcake
- 1 cup halved candied cherries
  - 1 cup candied pineapple chunks
  - 1 cup diced citron
  - 1/2 cup diced candied orange peel
  - 1/4 cup diced candied lemon peel
  - 1/2 cup sliced dates
  - 1/2 cup raisins
  - 1/4 cup brandy or sherry
  - 1/2 cup butter or margarine
  - 1/2 cup brown sugar, packed
  - 2 large eggs
  - 1 1/4 cups sifted all-purpose flour
  - 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
  - 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
  - 1/2 teaspoon allspice
  - 1/8 teaspoon cloves
  - 1/8 teaspoon soda
  - 1/4 cup molasses
  - 1/2 cup raspberry jam
  - 1 1/2 cups large pie walnuts

Combine candied fruits, dates and raisins. Add brandy or sherry; mix lightly and let stand for an hour or longer. Line a 9x5x3 inch pan with brown paper, and grease well. Cream butter, sugar and eggs together well. Batter may look slightly curdled. Resift flour with salt, spices and soda. Blend into creamed mixture alternately with molasses and jam. Add fruit mixture and walnuts; mix well. Turn into prepared pan, and spread level. Bake below oven center at 300 degrees for about 2 1/2 hours, with shallow pan of hot water on floor of oven. Cake is done when skewer inserted in center comes out clean and dry. Cool in pan. Makes one 3 1/2 pound fruitcake.

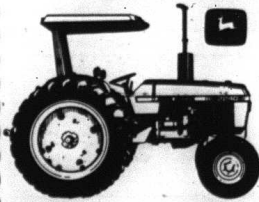

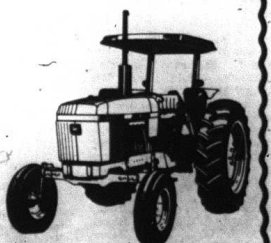

## City Council Votes To Purchase Main Street Property For Parking Lot

At Monday night's public hearing held by the Mt. Vernon City Council, the Council agreed to take the necessary steps preparatory to purchasing the Ideal Cafe property on Main Street.

Several people present at the hearing, including incoming councilmen, expressed their approval of the project which would include tearing down the building presently located on the 30x26x150 ft deep site and grading the site to be used for public parking.

The building is presently owned by R.A. Baker and, according to Mayor Mullins, Mr. Baker has agreed to sell the building for \$13,000. Of course, this figure is dependent on a H&M appraisal and a local appraisal. There is also an environmental assessment survey needed which the city will have to procure since HUD funds are being used to purchase the property. The money which would be used for the purchase are some of the city received from the sale of property behind city hall to R.A. Williams, developer of the elderly housing site now under construction.

Mayor Mullins expressed to the council his desire to perhaps sell the property to a private business or individual which would enable the city to keep the property on its tax rolls.

In other business, Mayor Mullins took a moment to express his regret at losing four of the incumbent councilmen when their term of office expires this year.

The four councilmen are Elmer Alcorn, Oscar Bullock, Chester Hellard and Joe Young. Mr. Alcorn and Mr. Bullock were defeated in the November General Election and Mr. Hellard and Mr. Young chose not to run for their positions again.

Mayor Mullins spoke of the men's efforts on behalf of the community and their unselfish devotion to the interests of the citizens of Mt. Vernon. Calling them outstanding councilmen, Mayor Mullins listed a few of the projects which have been undertaken during their tenure and told the four incoming councilmen present that they were to be commended for being willing to step out and take the leadership and do what needed to be done for the city.

Ron Cain, local ku manager and member of Mt. Vernon's All-Kentucky City Committee, was before the council to present them with the plaque which was awarded the city last year by the Kentucky Chamber of Commerce for Mt. Vernon being named an All-Kentucky City. Mr. Cain also had with him a road sign informing motorists coming into Mt. Vernon that they were entering an All-Kentucky City and asked the council to provide the labor necessary to erect three of the signs on difference routes into Mt. Vernon. The Rockcastle Improvement Council and civic organizations will bear the cost of materials to erect the signs. The council agreed.

Fred Roark, a CPA from Pineville who audited the waterworks fund for the 1978-79 fiscal year was at the meeting to present the council with his completed audit and to answer any questions the council might

have concerning the audit. One item in the report which Mr. Roark pointed out concerned the fact that he felt the city was underreporting in their depreciation account the amount from which monies would be taken in case of needed repairs to be waterworks or sewer system, used to pay the cost of construction on extensions, additions and improvements to the utility system not provided for from other sources and preventing a default in the payment of bond principal and interest.

According to guidelines, \$17,242.08 should have been transferred to this account from the revenue fund by the waterworks department but only \$13,200.00 was transferred. Since the report showed a net operating loss of \$12,360.46 as compared to last year's profit of \$12,420.00, this was primarily the reason the complete amount was not transferred to the depreciation account. Mayor Mullins pointed out to the council that the difference between 1978's profit and 1979's loss put the city operating at about even over the past two years and this should be the case in a non-profit operation. However, Councilman Chester Hellard asked Mr. Roark if, in his opinion, water rates, especially to water districts, needed to be raised based on this audit. Mr. Roark agreed that an increase in rates probably should be considered but he also pointed out that

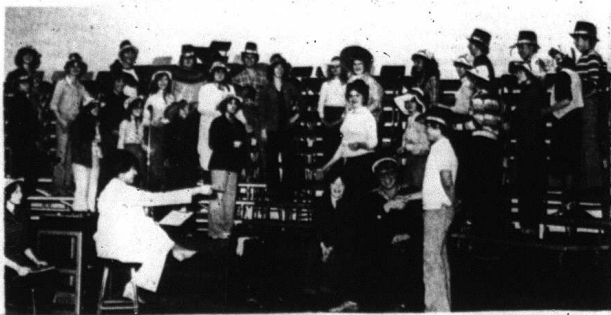
there had been a substantial increase in expenses this year over 1978 because of inflation. A complete list of revenue and expenses of the waterworks department will be found in next week's issue of the Signal.

During the meeting, the council heard a report from a committee who had inspected the lift station recently constructed at the Industrial Park. Councilman Chester Hellard said that he had visited the site with Water Superintendent Matt Powell and had found that the lift station construction had not been built to the same specifications which the city had approved earlier and on which the city based their agreement to take over maintenance of the station when completed. The council agreed to notify the industrial authority that the lift station would not be accepted until brought up to standards originally agreed to.

Smoke tests of the sewer lines in three areas of Mt. Vernon was recently carried out by Schimpeler-Corrodino Assn. and Water Superintendent Matt Powell was asked for results of the tests.

Mr. Powell told the Council the engineers had found problems with the sewer system in several areas but that the problems would be documented and presented to the council by the engineers at a later date.

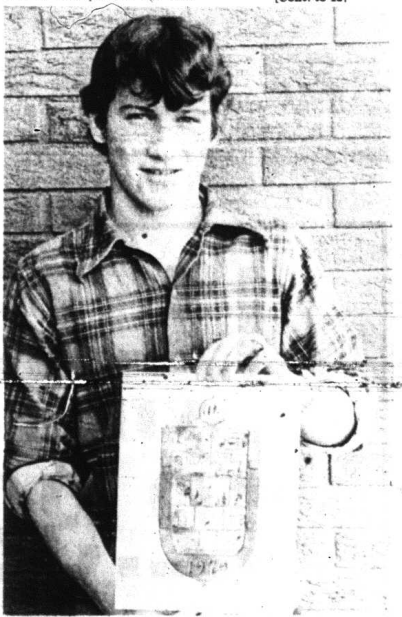

Howard K. Bell Engineers relocated the water lines on Hwy. 150 so that the road can be widened parallel to the industrial park was accepted by the council. The same engineering firm had originally submitted a contract for \$14,000 to prepare the designs for relocating the lines but the state, who is paying all costs of the relocation, turned the contract down being too high. The revised contract was for \$10,177 and the city accepted it, subject to approval by the State Department of Highways.

A petition was presented to the council by Logan "Butter" Wilmott containing some

125 names of persons in support of Mr. Wilmott being allowed to leave his cab stand at its present location on Main Street.

A majority of the council voted last month to have Mr. Wilmott move the cab stand to the other side of the street in front of the courthouse the expiration of his present lease, which is February 12, 1980 according to Mr. Wilmott. Incoming councilman Tom Welch spoke up on behalf of Mr. Wilmott being able to retain his present location but no action was taken by the council so, at present the motion from last month's meeting stands.

O.P. Mullins, a resident of the elderly housing project on Lovell Lane was before the council asking that Lovell Lane be widened so that it might be

safer to travel it on foot. The council agreed that some action needed to be taken to make the area safer and agreed to widen the street by laying a tile from Richmond Street to the property of Mrs. Virginia Meece. This would then be covered, effectively widening the street. In order to do this, the council has to obtain an easement from Edna Grace McKenzie and Ms. McKenzie has agreed to sign the easement.

The council decided during the meeting to take some concrete action against delinquent taxpayers over the past several years. The amount of taxes outstanding averages something over \$1,000 per year plus penalties and it was decided to have Mary McClure, City Clerk, notify those delinquent that

legal action would be taken if the bills were not paid within a certain period of time—the time period was not definitely established by the Council.

The Council also approved a sewer extension into the residence of Marshall Bullock on Paul Street in Owens Subdivision with Mr. Bullock to provide all materials.

Mayor Mullins informed the council of a couple of grants which he was working on obtaining—a federal grant of \$6,000 to fill the sinkhole in front of Mt. Vernon Elementary School and the other a \$3,000 grant to help replace the service truck used by the waterworks department.

### Turkey Season

Kentucky's spring turkey hunting season will be longer by two days than last year's, Fish and Wildlife Commission Carl E. Kays said today.

Dates for the season, set by the state Fish and Wildlife Commission, are April 19 through April 30 and 10 counties—one more than last year—will be open for wild turkey hunting. Only gobbles with visible beards may be taken, Kays said, and hunters will be limited to one turkey per calendar year. All hunters must possess a turkey permit (cost \$5.50) in addition to a valid Kentucky hunting license.

Counties open for the spring hunt are Jackson, Owsley, Bath, Lee, Rowan, Pike (except Breaks Interstate Park), Letcher, Menifee, Butler and Harlan. Turkey hunting will also be allowed on certain wildlife management areas and those seasons, also set yesterday by the commission are: Land Between the Lakes, Trigg and Lyon counties, April 9-18 and April 26-May 4; Pioneer Weapons WMA, Bath and Menifee counties, and Pine Mountain WMA, Letcher County, April 19-30; Fort Campbell WMA, Christian and Trigg counties, April 19-30 and April 26-27; Ft. Knox WMA in Harlan, Bullitt and Meade counties will be open any or all Saturdays and Sundays in April, depending upon military training priorities, but hunting on that area will be restricted to military and civilian personnel assigned to or working on the post.

In other action yesterday, the commission approved an increase, from \$23 to \$30, in the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources' Conservation Club camp fees.

## DOT Urges Kentuckians To Have Safe, Accident-Free Holiday

If old Ebenezer Scrooge stepped from the pages of Dickens' "Christmas Carol" this month, he might be amazed at the way Christmas has changed in the last one hundred or so years. One facet of present-day life that might startle Mr. Scrooge would be Kentuckians' mode of transportation.

Modern counterparts to Bob Cratchit and Tiny Tim don't walk to church anymore; they drive. In fact, it might overwhelm poor Scrooge to know that statistically one out of every two Kentuckians owns a passenger car—and that almost all 1,801,964 of these vehicles are out on the road during the

holidays, transporting revelers to shopping malls, family gatherings and church functions.

The astute Mr. Scrooge would see how important it is, especially during the holiday season, to drive defensively, plan trips in advance and consolidate as many trips as possible.

The present-day Scrooge might mutter, "Bah, humbug to seat belts." But if the Ghost of Christmas Past took Mr. Scrooge back to the 1978 holiday weekend, he would find that 11 people were killed on Kentucky's highways. Many of these deaths might have been prevented if seat belts had been

worn and the 55 m.p.h. speed limit observed.

Kentucky Department of Transportation statistics show that these two preventative measures, safety belt use and reduced speed, could drastically curtail the number of highway deaths annually.

"Christmas is a time of joy and renewed interest in life," said Bennie Maffet, state transportation safety coordinator. "With all the additional traffic on the roads this season, Kentuckians need to remember to drive with extra care to have a safe, accident-free holiday."



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
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
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
