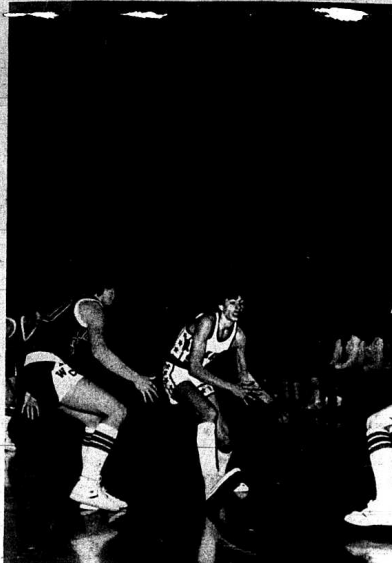

Kentucky consumers need to be alert to the pitfalls of the marketplace. Here is a list of danger signals that should make you stop and think before you act:

1. Bait and switch selling—Maybe you've inquired about a product advertised at an unbelievably low price...only to have the item degraded by the salesperson or to be told that it is no longer in stock. Once you have been "baited" by the advertiser, the salesperson tries to "switch" you to a more expensive item.

2. Get-rich-quick-schemes—If you are told you can make fabulous earnings fast—beware! Don't make any investment until you investigate those earnings claim to discover if such earnings are realistic.

3. Oral guarantees—With guarantees, the seller is legally bound by what a written contract says and not what a salesperson tells you. Don't accept any oral guarantees. Get everything in writing. Be sure you understand what the guarantee means, what it covers and how long you are protected.

4. Oral estimates—As with guarantees, get estimates in writing. In addition, get a written assurance that no additional work will be done without your consent. To be safe, obtain sev-

eral estimates and be suspicious of "special deals."

5. Golden opportunity—Don't allow yourself to be rushed into buying something because it's a once-in-a-lifetime, a last chance or a golden opportunity to get in on a good thing. You're probably the "last chance" the salesperson has to make the sale. Take your time and do comparative price-shopping before you buy.

6. Bank contracts and blank checks—Never sign a contract with blank spaces in it. Fill in all blanks with Xs, and, of course, never sign a blank check.

7. You've been specially selected—If you are told you are getting a "special deal" and that few others have this chance, be skeptical. Ask yourself why someone is offering YOU such a bargain.

In March, three teen-agers were killed and three injured in an accident just west of Mt. Vernon. Killed in this accident were: David Brown, Karen Ellison and Starla Rose. Three other teens were seriously injured.

In July five from Brodhead were killed. They were: Timothy Bishop, Gwen Carey, Susan Cass, Kenneth Rose and Johnny York.

Dr. Julian Y. Yip of Canada Opens Medical Practice Here

Dr. Julian Y. Yip will begin seeing patients at the Rockcastle County Hospital on Wednesday of this week. Although Dr. Yip does not yet have an office set up, he will be seeing patients in the new emergency section of the hospital until his offices are completed about January 15. They will be located in the basement of the new addition to the hospital along with the Dr. Greenway, who will open his practice here about July 1, 1980, and Dr. Thomsen. Dr. Yip, a general practitioner, is a native of mainland China where he lived until about the age of five when his family moved to Hong Kong. He lived there until he finished high school and then emigrated to Canada.

There he attended the University of Manitoba and graduated from that university's medical school. His internship was at the University of Toronto. Dr. Yip practiced three and one-half years in Essex, Can-

ada, in the province of Ontario. When asked what made him decide to relocate in the United States and in Mt. Vernon in particular, Dr. Yip said that he had come, to a point in his life and career when a decision had to be made as to whether to remain where he was or to try some place different. He said they decided on Mt. Vernon primarily because they were very impressed with the people here and the very warm welcome they had received. Dr. Yip also said that he felt the area needed another doctor and that he could be of some help. He said that he and his family intended to enjoy the beautiful hills, the people and the hospital.

Dr. Yip and his wife, Virginia, have two children, Vivian, 27 months, and Jason, 1. They have purchased and are living in the home of Luke Dober, former administrator of the hospital, in Countryside Estates.

Only routine items of business were before the school board at their first meeting of the new year, Monday night, January 1.

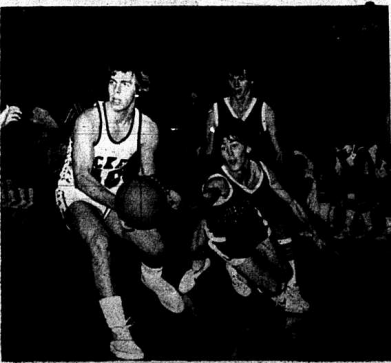

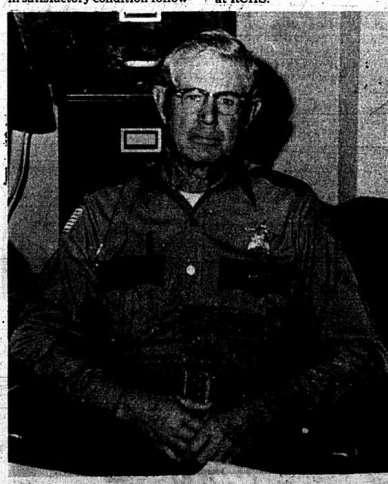

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the budget was padded in favor of lucrative personal services contracts for Friends of the executive administration, rather than becoming surplus funds which could be used in time of need, emergency medical services is a good example.

Although long overdue, the Appropriations and Revenue committee will require each agency to line-item their budget in regards to personal services contracts. Thus, before an agency will have any funds appropriated, they will be required to explain how every dollar will be spent.

Also, controls will be placed on the governor's contingency fund and the Capital construction contingency fund. For many years, these funds have been nothing more than a governor's sugar bowl, and to our loss, geared more to politics than need.

For the last couple of months the Appropriations and Revenue committee has been meeting as ten budget-review subcommittees. During these meetings each state agency has presented their budget requests for 1980 through 1982.

Now, the full Appropriations and Revenue committee will begin meeting to hear reports from the budget-review subcommittees. These full committee meetings are referred to as budget hearings and will continue until a new budget is prepared.

Sometime around the middle of January the new executive administration will submit a 1980-82 budget recommendation to the committee. Then it will be up to the committee and the legislature as a whole to compare agency requests and executive recommendations. In order to prepare and appropriate a budget that will fund state government for the next two years.

However, there has been some discussion about preparing a one-year budget with the governor calling a special session in 1980 to write another one year budget for 1982. This concept would be highly reasonable if it were not for the problems caused by the need to acquire federal-matching funds and the smooth operation of governmental programs.

At this time, the concept of a one year budget is still being

studied as is the possibility of making an across the board 10% reduction in state spending. A spending reduction of this type could be achieved, for example, by reducing state employee travel and unnecessary duplication of services.

Super Living

In this day an age when everyone who coes the house-work, cooks, cleans, cares for laundry, children, husband, wife and sometimes a job outside the home, I though you might like a little help. If you like the following please let your paper know.

SPICY CHILI

Serves 6-8

- 1 T. salad oil
- 2 lbs. lean ground beef
- 2 med. onions, cooked and drained
- 2 cups tomato juice
- 1 can (6 oz) tomato paste

- 3 cups water
- 1 teaspoon garlic salt
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 3 tablespoons ketchup
- 2 tablespoons prepared mustard
- 4 tablespoons chili powder

Heat oil in a large dutch oven. Add beef and onion and cook. Stirring with a fork to break up the meat, until beef is browned and onion is tender. Drain off excess fat. Add remaining ingredients, stirring to blend. Cook covered over low heat 1 1/2 hours.

POT ROAST

Serves 4-6

This can be cooked about 3 hours in dutch oven or right in a crock pot.

- 1-4 lb. roast
- 4 medium potatoes, cubed
- 2 small onions, cubed
- 4 or 5 carrots, cubed
- 1/2 cup some kind cooking wine
- 2 rosemary leaves
- 2 basil leaves
- 1 tablespoon salt

Cover with water and lid. Cook in dutch oven. Reduce heat from high to medium after 2 hours.

CHICKEN

Cook in Dutchoven for 4 hours or all day or night in a

- crock pot.
 - 1 small chicken, either whole or cut up
 - 1 can cream chicken coup
 - 1 cup minute rice
 - 2 tablespoons salt
 - 1/4 cup cooking wine
 - dash pepper, curry
- Put all in pot, cover with water. Cook in Dutch oven. Reduce heat after two hours.

In a hurry to get dinner? Try whipping up these quick desserts.

CHIFFON PIE

- 1 graham cracker pie crust
- 1-6 oz. bowl whipped cream
- 1 box any flavor jello
- Mix 1/2 cup hot water with Jello till dissolved. Stir in 2 cups ice cubes until jello is thick. Remove any unmelting ice cubes. Stir whipped cream into jello. Mix well. Pour into pie shell. Sit in freezer for 15 minutes.

PUDDING

- 2 tablespoons corn starch
 - 1 teaspoon vanilla
 - 1 egg yolk
 - 2 cups milk
- Mix egg yolk and corn-starch. Add milk. Cook, stirring until thick. Add vanilla. Makes 4 servings.

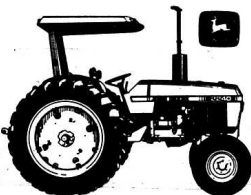

When designing a reach-in closet consider the dimensions to keep garments from being crushed. The Federal Housing Administration standard for minimum depth is 24 inches. But this space will crush the shoulders of many adult garments. A 28-inch depth is a better choice.

For the best use of space, the closet rods should be installed at different heights. Add 6 inches to the length of the longest garments to determine placement. For a child's closet, the rod height can be made adjustable for use now until adulthood.

Shelves above the rods and if the closet is long enough, a tier of shelves in the center of the closet increases the amount of things that can be stored. Shelves should be mounted 2 to 3 inches above the rod for clearance of hangers. Add more shelves above the rods while the children are small and the rods are lower.

The front of the closet should open completely; that is, no more than 6 inches of the rod on either end is concealed when the door is open. Doors may be hinged, folding or sliding, only if the closet is exposed when sliding doors are used. A

full-width swing door requires a lot of floor space for clearance. 91-fold doors suspended from tracks are good choices for most closets.

For lighting, use fluorescent tube fixture. Deluxe (ool white tubes match daylight, while deluxe warm white tubes match incandescent lighting for selecting clothes.

A United Press release in a midwestern city told of a hospital where officials discovered that the firefighting equipment had never been connected. For 35 years, it had been relied upon for the safety of the patients in case of emergency. But it had never been attached to the city's water main. The pipe that led from the building extended four feet underground... and there it stopped. The medical staff and the patients had felt complete confidence in the system. They thought that if a fire broke out, they could depend on a nearby hose to extinguish it. But that was a false security. Although the costly equipment, with its polished valves and well-placed outlets, was adequate for the building, it lacked the most important thing—WATER.

This illustrates the condition of many people when it comes to the matter of salvation. Many denominational people teach that you can be saved without baptism, that salvation comes before baptism. 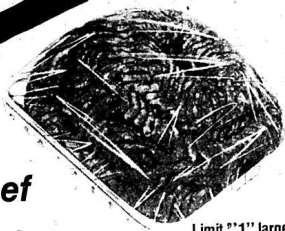

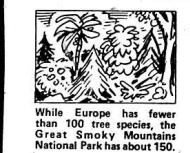

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Kentucky Afield

A special commercial fishing season opened Nov. 1 on Kentucky and Barkley lakes, a season which allows holders of a \$50 permit to use gill and trammel nets through March 31. Results from the first month's fishing are now in and it looks like most of the 19 fishermen who bought these special permits are doing quite well. The average monthly earning per permit was \$2,983, according to Charlie Bowers, director of Fish and Wildlife's fisheries division. One fisherman reported sales of \$12,242 for the month.

Although the money from commercial fishing can be good it certainly doesn't come easy, Bowers points out. This special commercial season, open only during the winter months to separate it from summer recreational use of the lakes, means that these fishermen have to brave long hours on cold, rough water where nets freeze as soon as they are pulled aboard and where ice slickened boats and winter storms can create downright dangerous conditions.

The total catch for November was 29,412 fish weighing 235,793 pounds, Bowers says. These fish sold for \$56,678, according to reports the fishermen are required to submit to the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources.

More than half the fish taken, both in number (17,967) and weight (132,217lbs.), were buffalo. Reducing the number of these and other rough fish was one of the primary reasons why the use of gill and trammel nets was authorized on these lakes.

"We'd hoped that these commercial fishermen would remove around a million pounds of buffalo by the end of March," Bowers says, explaining that reducing the number of buffalo, carp and other rough fish, creates additional living space in the lakes, space that can be partially filled by game fish.

In addition, Bowers says, these fish represent a potential source of both food and income that can only be effectively

tapped by commercial netting. If the first month's catch rate is projected through the end of the season, these fishermen will take more than one million pounds in the months to come. These fishermen are required by law to report any game fish caught in their nets and to release these fish back into the lake. During the first month, only 221 game fish were reported caught. Sauger and crappie led the list with 94 each. Twenty-one black bass were caught and released, as were five white bass, four yellow bass, two rockfish and one walleye.

Fears that commercial netting will harm game fish populations are completely groundless," Bowers says. "While a few fish might not survive being netted and released, most can be returned to the water without harm. And even in the unlikely case that none of them survived, the number would still be insignificantly small."

Nor is there much danger of commercial fishermen, at the rate they're going now, depleting rough fish populations. "These lakes could easily sustain a 25 percent catch rate year after year," Bowers says. "But at the current level, fishermen will remove only about one percent of the estimated 13 million pounds of buffalo in Kentucky and Barkley lakes this year."

Finally, Bowers points out, a sustained annual yield of 25 percent of the carp and buffalo in Kentucky and Barkley would be a million-dollar yearly industry for the local area.

Buy Fertilizers Now
The ground is frozen and this year's crops are barely out of the fields, but an economist in the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture says it's not too early to buy fertilizer for next year's crops.

Stephen Q. Allen, farm management Extension specialist, says the price of fertilizer is going up and farmers who wait until spring to buy might have difficulty getting delivery.

The price of all fertilizer will probably increase 10-15 percent by spring. Inflation and a change in supply will be the main reasons for higher prices, according to the specialist. Some of the county's ammonia plants have closed because of the rising price of natural gas and production in others has slowed.

Allen noted that some farmers anticipate good grain prices next year, and this could prompt greater use of fertilizer. Also if farmers decide to grow more corn and less soybeans, the demand for fertilizer would be driven up.

Also affecting the fertilizer supply for U.S. farmers is the reduction in production and rail transportation problems in Canada where the U.S. gets about 75 percent of its potash.

Farmers should remember that purchasing feed and fertilizer in advance should not materially distort yearly in-

come. However, the economist said the Internal Revenue Service allows up to \$200 in purchases when there is no sound business reason behind the purchases. "There is a sound business reason in this case," concluded, Allen.

Problems With Ice
Ice may be a problem on steps, walks and driveways. Streets are often cleared with a chloride salt. This material can cause problems if used on the home, drive, walk, or steps where drainage is toward shrubs and grass. Ammonium nitrate can be used to melt ice in these spots. When it flows toward your shrubs and grass, it also fertilizes them. If ammonium nitrate is not readily available, commercial fertilizers that are high in nitrogen and potassium may be an effective alternative.

Unless there are many icy spells, there is little danger in using ammonium nitrate or complete fertilizers. Use only what is needed to melt the ice.

Do not shovel wet, heavy snow from drives, walks and steps onto your shrubbery. Packed snow can smother evergreens while naturally loose snow is a good "mulch."

SPOTLIGHTING DEER IS VIOLATION OF STATUTES

Spotlighting deer, even when not in possession of a firearm, is a violation of state statutes, according to an attorney general's opinion. However, according to Assistant Attorney General David K. Martin, "to cite a person for violation...may cause some difficulties of proof at trial. It may be necessary to produce competent testimony concerning the effect of the spotlights on deer in order to prove that a deer was molested."

The opinion was requested by a state conservation officer who said he had witnessed persons spotlighting deer in a field at night, causing one or more deer to bolt and run. The officer said deer do not quickly recover from the temporary blindness caused by spotlighting and are likely to injure themselves.

The attorney general's opinion said spotlighting could be considered an attempt to molest a deer, which would make it a prohibited action under state statute.

Martin, however, said in his opinion that to prevent any problems in enforcing this prohibition, it would be preferable for the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources to enact a regulation which identifies some of the conduct that constitutes the molesting of a deer.

In another attorney general's opinion, Assistant Deputy Attorney General Walter Herdman said he could foresee no conflict of interest or incompatibility to either the secretary of the Development Cabinet or one of his employees serving on the board of directors of a land bank.

A state official serving on the board of a land bank to assist private organizations acquire land for development purposes would not in itself obligate the commonwealth in any manner, nor would it cause a conflict of interest, said the opinion requested by Ralph Coldiron, executive director of community and regional development in the Development Cabinet.

MAJOR SCIENCE-FICTION FILM PREMIERES ON KET

"The Lathe of Heaven," premieres on KET, Wednesday, January 9 at 10 p.m. (ET), 9 p.m. (CT).

dream again and again in the speculative fiction. In 1973, she received a National Book Award for "The Farthest Shore," the third volume in her "Earthsea Trilogy."
