Two Rockcastle residents escaped serious injury Monday morning when they were involved in a car-truck collision on U.S. 25 just south of Burr. According to State Policeman Danny Coleman, Charles Unkle of Clarksville, Tennessee was attempting to turn his tractor-trailer around in a service station on U.S. 25 when he got the trailer across the road and it was struck by a car traveling north on 25 and carrying James and Emma Ingraffia of Livingston. The Ingraffia car struck the rear left side of the trailer. Mr. Ingraffia was treated and released at the Rockcastle County Hospital. Mrs. Ingraffia is still a patient there with a broken arm. The truck driver was charged with failure to yield right-of-way.

## Rockcastle River Study Completed

Skinks and snails and striped skunk tails—that's what the Rockcastle River area is made of according to a new study prepared by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. Of course, there are a few thousand other species of animals, reptiles, insects and plants in Rockcastle, Laurel and Pulaski counties, and the study lists them, too.

## Hospital Board To Hold Open House Sunday for New \$2,300,000 Addition

The Board of Directors of the Rockcastle County Hospital will hold an Open House at the hospital this Sunday from 2 to 4 p.m. and the public is cordially invited and urged to attend. The Open House is being held to acquaint everyone with the hospital's new \$2,300,000 addition which has been completed.

Included on the tour will be a visit to the new kitchen facilities, laboratory, emergency department, inhalation-physical therapy department, nursery, recovery room and holding room and the new extended care skilled nursing facility which

increases the hospital's bed capacity by 32 to a total of 60 beds.

Department heads will explain to visitors what the functions of each department are and will answer any questions anyone might have.

The project is complete and patients can be admitted as soon as there is an inspection by Medicare and Medicaid representatives. The only areas left to be completed include renovation of existing facilities and the surgery department which will be located on the first floor of the new addition across from the offices of Drs. Yip and Thomsen. When the surgery department is relocated, the present department upstairs will be converted into an intensive

care unit. The new addition has, thus far, created the need for about 30 more employees at the hospital with the total additional employees to reach 45 eventually.

Both Congressman Tim Lee Carter and Senator Walter Huddleston have been invited to the Open House, although they have not confirmed their appearance. Both men were present for the groundbreaking in the summer of 1978. Also expected to be present are all local doctors.

Members of the board of directors are: Bill Bailey, James Lambert, Robert Cromer and Wayne Stewart. Administrator is Henry Hopkins.

## Griffin Enters Not Guilty Plea

Lester Frank Griffin, charged in the January 12th slaying of James L. Browning, entered a plea of not guilty last week and is free after filling 10% of his \$50,000 bond. Griffin was scheduled for a preliminary hearing Wednesday morning, January 23.

No plea has been entered in the case of Richard Eugene Barnes, charged with the January 11th murder of Roy Lee Goforth. Mr. Barnes filed a \$25,000 property. No hearing date has been set.

## Two Men Charged In Robbery at Exxon Service Station

Two men have been charged in connection with a late night robbery Tuesday, January 15 at the Remfo Valley Exxon.

Charged are Billy Croucher, 35, of Berea and Robert Laswell, 45, of Rt. 3, Mt. Vernon. Both men have been charged with robbery in the first degree and Laswell is also charged with auto theft.

The robbery occurred about 10:55 p.m. when, according to James Kisdwell, manager of the station, two men pulled into the station in a pickup truck, ordered gas and then, when they

went into the station to supposedly pay for the gas, told the attendant to open the cash drawer. They then, allegedly, took about \$425 from the drawer and also \$300 from a customer at the station. The two men then left the station, taking the cus-

tomers car which was allegedly driven by Laswell with Croucher driving the pickup. Later in the night, Sheriff Henry Lee Abney and State Policeman Greg Ennis spotted Laswell in the stolen car on the Clear Creek Road when, according to Sheriff Abney, they gave chase for some distance before Laswell finally left the car and fled on foot.

Croucher gave himself up to Jailor Billy Kirby early Wednesday morning and his bail was set at \$25,000.

Laswell was arrested in Lexington Monday by Metro Police and returned to the Rockcastle Jail Tuesday. Laswell is also being held on \$25,000 bond on the robbery charge and \$10,000 bond on the auto theft charge.

## Frankfort Watchline

Last week's meeting of the 1980 Kentucky General Assembly was unusually short, due to a four day week-end in honor of Dr. Martin Luther King's birthday.

Many career merit system state employees in Frankfort and in offices around Kentucky are disappointed with the new administration and the General Assembly. Merit system employees are disappointed because of the large number of their ranks who will be laid off and/or fired in order to meet the proposed 1980-82 budget requirements. In addition, many state employees are disgruntled by their low salary levels with no prospect of any future raises. According to this reporter's source in the Department of Human Resources in Frankfort, a study by the Office of Inter-Governmental Personnel Programs in Washington, D.C., all categories of employees covered by Kentucky's merit system ranked no higher than 48th out of 51 in terms of average salary paid.

Concerning other reactions, Gov. Brown has threatened to veto proposed legislation which would give the General Assembly's Personal Service Contract Review Subcommittee power to cancel a contract.

The Senate passed measures to increase the terms of board members of state-supported universities and members of the Council on Higher Education from four to six years. The Senate also passed measures to expand Kentucky's "Good Samaritan Law", to include public school personnel who render first aid on school grounds. The language in the state workmen's compensation insurance law was voted on by the to be neutralized by changing workmen's to jointers. The Senate adopted a work resolution calling for the appropriation of \$12,000 to study the feasibility of helicopter ambulance service in Kentucky.

Governor Brown re-affirmed his support for professional negotiations for teachers last week. However, Gov. Brown did say that even if teachers in Kentucky got the right to professional negotiations, there would be no pay raises within the next two years. There may be problems

in getting the professional negotiations for teachers through the General Assembly. The majority being, Senate Majority Leader John Berry (D-Turner Station) is opposed to Professional negotiations for teachers.

The eyes of the nation will again be on Kentucky General Assembly as it meets in Frankfort. Majority Leader John Berry will be able to get his so called "bottle bill" passed. This would require a deposit of five cents on all bottles and cans. This could be done in an effort to reduce litter in the state. Similar laws have been passed in Oregon, Michigan and Maine.

Senators Easterly, Meyer and Garrett have introduced Bills to either reduce or eliminate the state's price controls on milk prices. This action stems from the recent milk price war started by the Lexington area. Presently it is illegal to sell milk below cost in Kentucky as A&P and other stores were doing.

In other political news around the Commonwealth, Jerry Moss a building contractor from Florence filed papers in Frankfort last week to seek the Democratic nomination for the 4th District Congressional seat now held by Republican Rep. Gene Snyder. Many members of this session of the General Assembly are actively running in the May 1980 primary for Congress or are expected to announce soon. Some of these members include Senator Tom Easterly (D-Frankfort) who is seeking the Democratic nomination for the 6th Congressional seat. Senator John Rogers (R-Somerset), Rep. Elmer Patrick (R-Williamsburg) and Rep. Ray O'Quinn (R-Liberty) are just a few of the many contenders for the 5th District Congressional seat being vacated by Tim Lee Carter. As of this writing, no one from either party had filed or announced their intention to oppose: U.S. Senator Wendell Ford in his bid for reelection.

# Big Brothers-Big Sisters of Rockcastle County is Organized

Big Brothers and Big Sisters of Rockcastle County is now in operation with the formation recently of a board of directors and 10 sponsors.

Mrs. Carolyn Morris, a county team manager and family service worker with Comprehensive Care and also a member of the Big Brothers-Big Sisters board of directors, said the new organization would basically be a "helping organization" designed to provide a stable one-on-one relationship with an adult for boys and girls, ages 8-16, from single parent families.

The youngsters will be referred to the organization from Comprehensive Care and the Bureau of Social Services. Sponsors must be at least 18 years of age and the organization will try to make an appropriate match between the interests of the child and his sponsor.

Sponsors are asked to make a commitment of 2 hours per week, every week, for one year to the same child. Mrs. Morris also said that Big Brothers-Big Sisters preferred that instead of sponsors spending money trying to entertain the child during their time with them that the time be used to provide companionship, maybe a little assistance with homework, as a sounding board for the child's problems and especially in fun activities which are free such as fishing, hiking, etc.

At present, Mrs. Morris said that the local chapter, which does not intend to affiliate itself with the national chapter is being operated strictly on a volunteer basis since there is no funding available and there would be no funds solicited from any city or county government or from the public in the near future.

The only thing holding up placing children with the 10 sponsors is the need for more sponsors. If you are interested in becoming a sponsor, you should contact Mrs. Morris at the local Comprehensive Care Center for more details or meet with the board at their next meeting on February 12th at City Hall.

sponsors already available is that official permission has not been obtained from the state office of Comprehensive Care but this permission is expected by the February 12th meeting of the board of directors.

## Time and Energy Management For Better Health

Is there any homemaker who isn't interested in streamlining her daily tasks? Probably not. Every homemaker wants more time for things beyond the routine work of the house and home. Also the manner in which a homemaker uses her time and energy affects her mental and physical health. In addition to lose homemakers who want to streamline their tasks to allow more time for other things there are those who must limit the amount of energy they use because of heart conditions or advancing age.

If you seriously want to save time and effort you must be willing to: (1) admit that here may be room for improvement; (2) look for a way to improve; and (3) try a new way and enough to make it a habit. The new way may be awkward at first but with practice it will become natural.

**Body Mechanics**

It is the way you do things as well as what you do that is important. One of the easiest ways to save energy is to use your body properly. Most persons must train themselves to do this. Correct body mechanics is the art of distributing the work over several sets of muscles and using the stronger ones. This helps you to use less energy, have fewer accidents, and feel fresher at the end of the day.

**Acquiring good habits in the use of muscles**

- Keep back straight, bend at hips, don't twist.
- Keep knees straight forward, slightly bent for better balance and better weight distribution on arches.
- Carry packages close to body.
- Distribute loads on both sides.
- To get up from chair—move forward on chair first, then lean forward to rise.
- Avoid tension in shoulders and neck by relaxing shoulders and head, the "going limp" with head forward and back in rotation.

**Relaxation: Mental & Physical**

Vary your work from sedentary to active and vice versa. Use music, lively for stimulation, soothing for quiet relaxation.

Encourage family teamwork. Work at your natural pace.

Control your mental activity. Learn to turn off your mind. Don't worry about the things that you cannot change.

Allow time so there is no need for rush. Plan ahead.

**Time Management**

The way we use our time is as important as how we use our bodies. Unlike other resources, time is one thing that each person has the same amount of—24 hours a day.

One of the most effective tools in good time management is a time plan or an itinerary. Making a written time plan takes only a few minutes and it helps you to accomplish more of the important activities during the day and helps to eliminate rushing. Rushing causes fatigue and hasty thinking and hasty working seldom accomplishes what you want.

A good time plan should have the following characteristics:

- A balance of work, rest, and leisure (they are equally important).
- Flexibility to allow for those little emergencies that so often occur.
- A realistic estimate of the amount of time that it will take to accomplish the tasks.
- Distribution of heavy and light tasks.
- Don't count time but make time count.
- Substitute headwork for footwork.
- Back bending is back breaking.

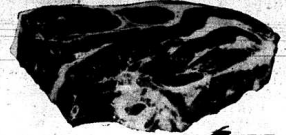

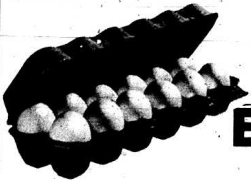

Hide an object in their room and as they straighten their room, let them search for the object. The one who does the best cleanup job and finds the object will get a reward. Like an old pair of earrings, a necklace, bracelet or an old pair of cuff links, the clasp. These things should be good enough that they are proud of them but not expensive enough that they are really valuable. What a small price to pay for a clean room and some peace and quiet.

Combine ¼ ounces each lemon lime juice, 6 ounces water, ½ ounce of simple tincture (not compound) of benzoin, add 5 drops green food coloring. Shake, refrigerate in 8 ounce bottle.

Now how to use these products. After washing face and rinsing well, before applying makeup, take astringent from refrigerator. Shake, pour onto cotton ball, swab face in an upward stroke. Refrigerate the bottle. Let face dry and apply make up.

1 beaten egg  
1 cup cornbread mix  
3 Tbsp. milk  
2 Tbsp. dried parsley flakes



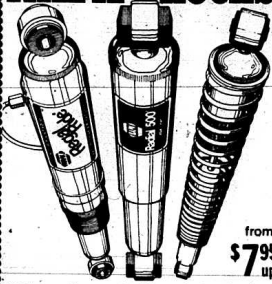
