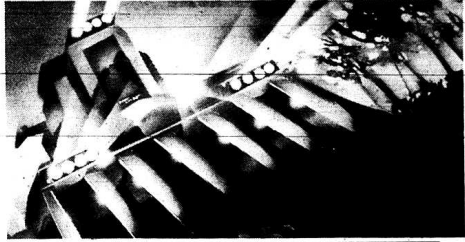

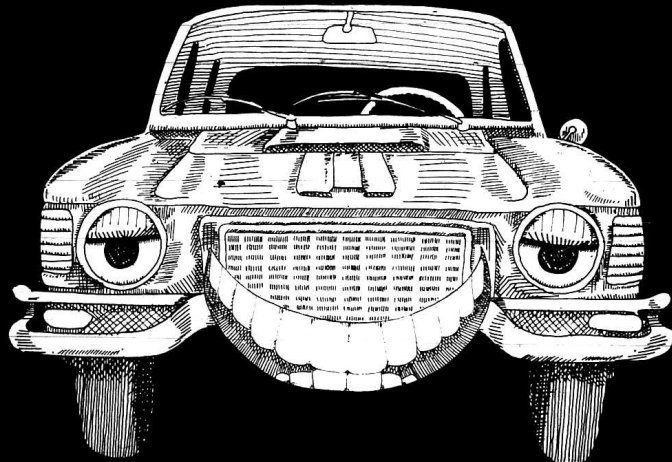

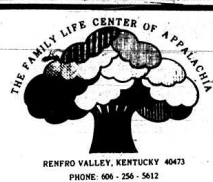

### "Handling Anger in Your Marriage" - Part I

It is said that the institution of marriage is the greatest testing ground for our personal emotional growth and stability. In what other relationship than that of marriage can two people come together over such a long period of time with such deeply felt emotions?

Anger is perhaps the most misunderstood human emotion and as a result the most ignored. There is a general misconception that anger is a sin - an affront to God. This in itself may be one reason why it is so widely misunderstood and inadequately dealt with.

The Bible says nothing about anger being a sin, but strongly states that dealing with it constructively can lead to sin and in itself be sin. It states in Ephesians 4:26 how important it is to deal with this common emotion as quickly as possible: "When angry, sin not: let not the sun go down upon your wrath." The writer of Ephesians was wise in saying this for he shows us how readily he understood our need to deal with a potentially destructive emotion.

There are a number of things to consider as we examine anger in our marriage. First of all it is important to realize that anger is normal and should not be ignored nor suppressed. If it is ignored and not dealt with constructively there will develop a stockpile of things that makes us angry with our spouse. These things will poison us emotionally and strain our relationship and can lead to hurt feelings and even physical violence. Since anger is normal

and should be dealt with constructively, how then should we deal with it? Because marriage is based upon intimacy, two people living together closely, both physically and emotionally, anger will be an inevitable part of such intimacy. With this in mind we need to give our partner and ourselves the permission to be angry - permission to have an emotional reaction to a tense situation. It is our way of saying to one another and ourselves, "I am human and recognize I have feelings. I also recognize your right as a human being to have such feelings as well."

With this liberty of mind and spirit, anger is brought out in the open enabling us to deal with it and not fear it. The recognition of this freedom, however, does not give us license to vent our wrath and possibly damage our partner - either emotionally or physically. With this freedom comes responsibility in the expression of our anger; responsibility in that the situation which causes the anger is dealt with so that all parties involved come out winners - with feelings and emotions intact.

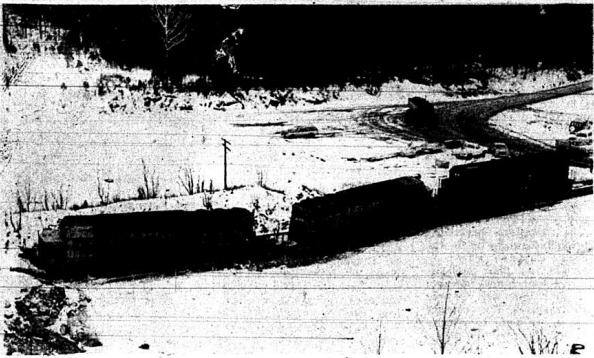

## Court Approves Supplemental Mortgage for Hospital; Will Ask for Bids for TV Cable

The Rockcastle Fiscal Court, at their monthly meeting Tuesday, approved a supplemental mortgage deed and trust in the amount of \$500,000 bringing the total cost of the new extended care facility to \$2,300,000.

The original mortgage was for \$1,800,000, but, due to rising construction costs, the hospital board found the extra financing necessary to complete the project.

Robert Cromer, a member of the hospital's board of directors, presented the supplemental agreement to the court for approval and told the court that bonds to permanently finance the project would be sold within about three weeks and that Farmers Home Administration had committed themselves to buying the bonds at 5 percent interest which would cause the project to be paid off in the year 2009.

Mr. Cromer also told the court that yearly payments to retire the debt would amount to around \$80,000 a year and would be paid from operating revenues. Cromer said the repayment amount could be met by 72% occupancy of the 32 bed addition.

In other action, the court approved the advertisement for bids for a franchise for the

construction and operation of a TV signal distribution system, including necessary poles and lines, between Livingston and the Burr hill exit of U.S. 25 and old U.S. 25. The franchise will be for a period of 15 years with construction to begin in 6 months and completion not later than one year from date of franchise.

Bids will be opened at the March 4th meeting. David Patton of Tri-County Community Development Agency was before the Court to request the court to borrow \$4,650 to pay a bill at Lowe's Sporting Goods in London for playground equipment to be

used at the Brodhead Fairgrounds.

Mr. Patton told the court that the loan could be repaid from funds to be received from a grant given the county by the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation and which was expected within at least 8 weeks. The total amount of the BOR grant was \$20,000 and the county had to match this amount which they did with HUD funds. The money will be used for lighting the softball field, the softball field itself, the basketball court and, of course, the playground equipment. Mr. Patton said he expected the lighting to be installed and ready for use by the softball season this spring.

## Griffin Bound Over to Grand Jury Following Preliminary Hearing

Lester Griffin, charged with the January 12th murder of James L. Browning of Mt. Vernon, was ordered bound over to the March term of the Rockcastle County Grand Jury by District Judge Walter Maguire following a preliminary hearing held last Wednesday.

Griffin had been free after posting 10% of his \$50,000 bond. Judge Maguire set this aside and remanded Griffin to the

Rockcastle County Jail pending posting of the full amount of his bond.

Afterwards, Griffin's attorney, Jerry Cox, filed for a writ of Habeas Corpus petitioning Circuit Court to grant the posting of 10% of the bail previously fixed.

A hearing on the petition is scheduled for Friday morning before Circuit Judge Phillip K. Wheeler.

## School Board Meets

Two members of the Rockcastle County Board of Education were unable to attend the regular monthly meeting Monday night and the agenda was light for the meeting.

Supt. Charles B. Parsons did make a report to the board concerning additional land the board is trying to acquire adjacent to the Mt. Vernon Elementary School and owned by the Bullock heirs.

Mr. Parsons said that he had contacted a member of the family who told him that they wished more time to consider whether or not to sell. The board finally decided to authorize Mr. Parsons to be considering alternative sites should it be available.

In other business, the board:

Employed Mrs. Janice Powell Gadd as contract hauler to replace John L. Gadd effective January 16th at the same pay of \$32 per month.

Employed Mrs. Rita Kirby as a contract hauler from the Lime Plant Hollow at \$30 per month.

Employed two substitute teachers, Maggie T. Leach and Lori Stewart Mullins, subject to proper certification.

Approved a G.E.D. Certificate for Randy Curtis Thompson.

Approved the advertisement for bids for lunchroom supplies to be opened February 27, 1980 at 1 p.m. for tabulation

by a committee. The board will accept bids at the regular meeting in March.

The board also approved the application for Public Law 874 funds and appointed Mr. Parsons as the official representative of the school district and board to sign all documents and agreements for PL 874.

Mr. Parsons told the board that these monies only amount now to around \$13-\$14,000 a week, and now included payments to the board for children whose parents lived in low-income housing in Mt. Vernon. The fund was originally set up to help pay expenses for children whose parents worked at the Blue Grass Ordinance at Richmond and Lexington and lived in this county. Mr. Parsons said that with cut-backs at these depots, money to the board from this fund had decreased over the years.

## Burley Referendum Set For Feb. 25-29

By Bennett Roach

The windup of the 1978-80 burley markets coincides this month with announcement of February 25-29 as dates for the three-year referendum on tobacco quotas and price supports.

This important event is a built-in, periodic polling of growers as a basic part of the tobacco program. It has always been given overwhelming approval.

So, what is different this year? What has changed since

the last three-year referendum in 1977, when growers registered a tobacco okay?

As viewed by the Burley Tobacco Growers Cooperative Association, here are a few developments, and reasons calling for an even larger turnout of "yes" votes this year:

(1) Anti-tobacco forces in each of the last three years have stepped up legislative efforts to end government loans for tobacco supports.

(2) The 1979 crop suffered a 20 to 25 percent setback, and

there is need now to make up for the shortage, under the program.

(3) A more equitable program has resulted from the USDA order last year ending abuses under excess-quota, or carryover, sales.

(4) Record high prices the past three years have prevailed under parity formula to allow for increased production costs. (For 1980 crop, up again about 6.9 percent)

## Legislative Report

By Rep. Harold DeMarcus

As of January 30th, 600 bills and resolutions have been introduced in the 1980 General Assembly. Twenty-two bills have been passed by the Senate and twelve bills have been passed by the House of Representatives.

When a bill is passed by both the House and Senate, it is then sent to the governor. The governor will either sign the bill into law, allow the bill to become law without his signature or veto the bill.

Should the governor veto a bill, it could still become law if the General Assembly were to vote to override the veto. The General Assembly has the constitutional authority, by a majority vote in both houses, to override the governor's veto.  
 Several of the bills which have passed in either the House or Senate are described as follows:

House Bill 11, sponsored by the House Republican Caucus, allows patients of state institutions for mentally retarded and mentally ill to fish without a license while accompanied by an employee of the institution.

House Bill 42, requires that the 60-day waiting period for testimony in divorce cases be applied only in cases where children are involved.

House Bill 98, gives the General Assembly authority of approval or disapproval over the locating, opening, closing or re-opening of nuclear waste disposal facilities located within the Commonwealth.

Senate Joint Resolution 8, directs the Legislative Research Commission, in cooperation with several state agencies, to study the feasibility of helicopter ambulance service in Kentucky.

Senate Concurrent Resolution 9, requests the Congress of the United States to propose an amendment to the U.S. Constitution to require the federal budget to be balanced. Also, requests Congress to call a constitutional convention for the purpose of proposing a constitutional amendment to require the federal budget to be balanced, if the Congress does not pass the requested amendment.

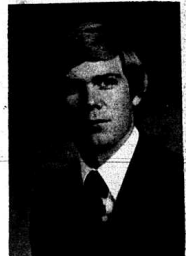
Subcommittee members, Clarke said, will chair meetings which examine the part of the budget they have been studying.

## Preventing Mending

A bit of action before use can increase the service of new clothes and save you from a lot of mending chores later on. Check over new garments, especially inexpensive ones, keeping the following "ahead-of-time repairs" in mind:

Hem-if stitches are too loose or too visible on the right

side, remove the stitches, and re-hem.

Dangling threads-Thread them into a needle, bring to the inside of the garment and tie.

Buttonholes-prolong the life of machine-made buttonholes by going over them with a buttonhole handstitch or machine zig-zag stitch.

Seams-Reinforced sleeve and crotch seams with a second line of machine stitching 1/8 inch inside the seam allowance. Use 12 to 14 stitches per inch. Narrow or crooked seams can benefit from the same treatment. Underarm seams of raglan and kimono sleeves should be reinforced with seam tape. Place tape over seam line and stitch.

## Short-cut Mending With New Fusibles

If you want to try a real timesaver, do some short-cut mending with the new fusibles. These much-improved fusibles are available as pre-cut sheets, tapes of different width, or by the yard. They come in web form or as a non-woven film.

You can use fusibles on any fabric that can be steam pressed. Put the fusing material between two layers of fabric, apply the steam iron-result is a tightly bonded product that can withstand both washing and drycleaning. The fusible doesn't make the fabric stiff. It stays as flexible as it was before.

Apply the fusible the right way, and it is permanently bonded. But if you want to undo your handiwork, just steam the area heavily, then pull the fabrics apart.

You can use the fusibles for trims, appliques, hems and to finish edges (to keep them from raveling). It can make any piece of fabric you wish into a handy iron-on patch.

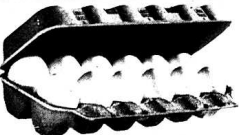

## Consumer Comments

By General Steven L. Beshear

Have you ever felt a need for legal advice or representation but were afraid it would cost too much? You may save yourself a lot

of time, money and trouble if you know what a lawyer can do for you, what to expect in the way of charges and when to contact him for assistance.

The best time to consult an attorney is before, not after,

you have a legal problem. Many people wait until trouble arises, rather than preventing it through legal means.

Generally, you may want to consider contacting an attorney before you get involved in such matters as buying or selling a home or real estate; executing written contracts with major financial provisions or consequences; tax problems; executing wills or resolving estate problems; going into business or organizing business associations; settling upon accidents involving damage to persons or property, domestic matters, and any course of action which will substantially change your economic status.

Should you decide you require legal assistance, reach an understanding about the cost of the attorney's services during the first interview.

Attorneys change in different ways for different kinds of work, and you should find out in detail how the changes will be computed and just what to expect on the final bill. A thorough understanding of this aspect of your relationship with the attorney is important to both of you.

You can do a few things which will both hold down costs and help the attorney. Write down the names, addresses and telephone numbers of all persons involved and all the facts pertaining to the case. Do this at home, before you go to the attorney's office.

Also, when you go to your first interview with the attorney, take any papers relating to the case. Make all interviews brief and to the point and hold phone calls to a minimum.

Make a full and honest disclosure to the lawyer of all the facts—bad or good. They are essential to making a sound legal evaluation of your situation.

Your statements should be as accurate and concise as possible. Don't let your emotions distort the facts you give the attorney. The lawyer is required by a code of professional ethics to keep anything you say in strictest confidence.

If you have a consumer complaint, write to the Attorney General's Division of Consumer Protection, Frankfort, Ky. 40601. Office personnel have found that they can most effectively deal with written complaints, and they encourage you to write when you have a complaint.

arguing that all growers participate this year. In previous elections the turnout has been below the desired level, sometimes less than 70 percent of those eligible to vote.

As for the 1979 crop, with returns now completed from almost all markets, except for a few more sales at Lexington and clean-up auctions there later in February, the Burley Association has taken 6,016,333 pounds under in this season.

The percentage of poor consignments reached the highest point of the season, said Alvin R. Beckley, executive secretary-treasurer, with the week ending Jan. 25 showing 16.04 percent taken under loan for that period.

In the least total "take" in

many years, the Association has received only 84 percent of total sales of 366,960,891 pounds in its area of price-support operations, the states of Kentucky, Indiana, Ohio, West Virginia and Missouri.

## How SS Disability Claims Are Processed

Many people have the mistaken idea that employees in the social security office decide whether an applicant for disability benefits is able to work or not. Bob Anderson, social security manager in Richmond said recently:

This just is not so, Anderson said. People at the social security office do decide if a person meets non-medical requirements, such as whether having worked long enough and recently enough under social security to be eligible for checks.

But the information an applicant provides about his or her medical condition, including names of doctors or hospitals who did examinations or provided treatment, and his or her work experience is sent to the Kentucky disability determination unit in Frankfort, Ky.

There, a team of professionals, one of whom is a doctor, reviews the claim. This team decides if the applicant is disabled within the meaning of the law and whether the person's condition prevents him or her from working for a year or more.

The team obtains medical reports from doctors and other sources of treatment or examination. If more information is needed, they may refer the applicant to a physician clinic, or some other facility for another examination or test.

In addition to deciding if the applicant is disabled, the State agency considers whether or not vocational rehabilitation

services could help the person return to work. More information about disability benefits, as well as other social security programs, can be obtained at the Richmond social security office, located in the University Shopping Center in Richmond. The telephone is 623-5856.

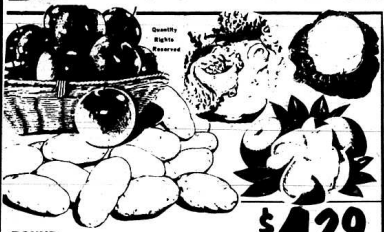

## UK Travels to Alabama

The Kentucky Wildcats face two of the hottest teams in the Southeastern Conference race this week when they host Mississippi Wednesday and then visit Alabama Saturday.

Tippoff time for the Ole Miss game is 7:30 p.m. EST, while the Bama game will be featured on the SEC TV network at 2:30 p.m. EST.

The Wildcats are tied with LSU for first place in the SEC with a 9-3 mark and are 19-4 overall. And the momentum definitely should help the Cats following scintillating wins over Auburn (64-62 on a last second shot by Dirk Minniefield) and a rousing, old-time win over Tennessee (83-75 at Rupp Saturday) that broke a four-game Vol win streak.

But the Cats will need all the help they can muster, for Ole Miss, despite its 12-8 overall record and sixth place SEC mark of 6-6, must rate as the league's "Most Improved Team" after winning six of its last seven games. The single loss in that string was a six-point loss at LSU. The Rebels' came from 15-points down in the second half at Tennessee to whip the Vols and then knocked Alabama out of a first place tie Saturday with a finely executed 71-65 win at Oxford.

Kentucky's trip to Tusca-

loosa falls into a "must win" category since the Tide dealt out UK's worst defeat in Rupp Arena Jan. 12 with a 78-64 win. One thing in the Wildcats' favor is the fact that Bama cannot afford to look past its Wednesday foe, LSU, which the Tide defeated at Baton Rouge in early January. The Tide is 12-8 overall and 6-4 in the SEC.

Kentucky leads Ole Miss 54-4 in a series that began in 1925. Ole Miss is 1-27 at Lexington and 0-3 in Rupp Arena. UK coach Joe B. Hall is 14-2 against Ole Miss and 7-0 against Reb coach Bob Weithich. The Wildcats won by a 79-73 margin at Oxford last month and were paced by Kyle Macy,

who scored a season high 29 points. The Rebs' John Stroud, the leading scorer in the SEC with a 24.7 average, popped in 27 points for the Rebs, who lost two starters and their top sub to personal fouls.

Kentucky leads Alabama 64-19 in a series that began in 1923. The Cats are 17-11 at Tuscaloosa and last won there in 1977. Hall is 10-6 against the Tide and Bama coach C.M. Newton, a UK alumnus.

The Tide had its best shooting night of the year in its win in Rupp, a 54.9 percent effort, while the Cats were suffering their worst game, a 38.3 percent mean. The Tide was led by Robert Scott and Eddie Phillips with 25 and 23 points respectively, while Phillips cleaned the boards with 13. Macy and Fred Cowan scored 18 and 14 for UK, while Same Bowie led rebounding with only six.

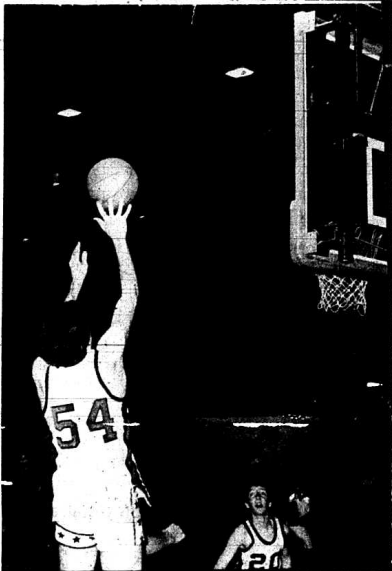
### Short Shots

Tennessee left-overs: Kentucky's team free-throw percentage, which has been ranked No. 1 in the SEC and near the

top in the nation. All faltered against the Vols when the Cats made only 31 of 46 attempts, including misses on six bonus attempts in the second half, for a 67.4 percentage or 10 percent below their average... "If we had made our free throws, it would have been a beautiful game for us," said Hall following the game. As it was, it put pressure on our game at both ends of the court, but I was mighty proud of the way we played tonight. It was the best effort we've had since December..." Freshman Hooster Tom Hertz, who had played 50 minutes in 16 games prior to the UT game, gained his most playing time this year with 16 minutes against the Vols, scoring three points... Senior guard Jay Shidler, who has started eight games, but who seemingly has a penchant for coming off the bench regained his shooting eye and scored a season high 14 points on 5-7 FG shooting—Shidler, who had missed only two of 22 FT attempts, missed three Saturday to drop his average to 82.8—said Shidler, "I lost my concentration on the shots because I was thinking about staying in the 90 percent cate-

gory—I reckon I just put too much pressure on myself..." Tennessee coach Don DeVoe on Macy, who scored 22 points and dealt out 10 assists—"Macy was very much in control. He hurt us the most. He was the difference. We can't seem to get him in foul trouble."

Speaking of Macy—The senior, All-American who has set UK career- and season assists records and consecutive free throw marks, is a strong candidate for the March 29 East-West Pizza Hut Basketball Classic and has already been selected for the 12th Annual Aloha Classic at Honolulu April 3-5... Macy ranks No. 2 in the nation in free throw percentage at 85.8 on 69-78 his string of 32 that ended against Indiana this year was a UK record—he followed that streak with 18 more before missing against Florida, and now has hit 25 in a row... Macy now has scored 1,230 career points and just passed #18 Bill Spivey (1,219) on the all-time ladder and needs only nine points to pass Tom Parker... Macy's 10 assists against UT enabled him to regain the assists lead from Dirk Minniefield.

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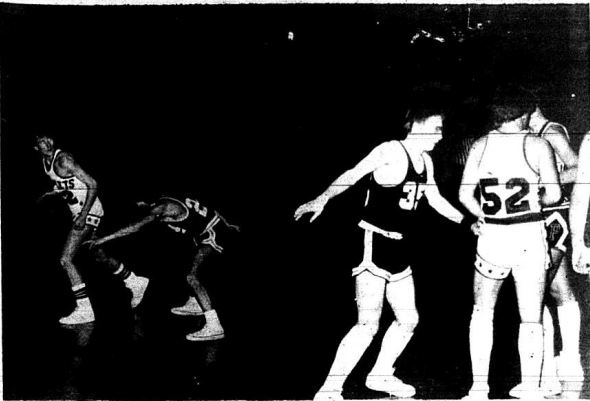
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# Rockets Lose to Pulaski Co.

a poet living in England, but if Eliot had been a Kentucky outdoorsman he would surely have cast his vote with the rest of us in declaring February the worst month of the year.

And this February is going to be worse than usual, at least in one respect. It's a leap year, so there's more of it.

Besides the fact that February is cold, dreary, snowy (when it isn't raining) and just generally unpleasant, the big problem is that there often isn't enough going on to keep the hunter or fisherman from coming down with a bad case of cabin fever.

In case you're not familiar with this malady, cabin fever is brought on by excessive confinement indoors. Its symptoms include restlessness, irritability and a compulsive desire to organize tackle boxes. The only cure is the coming of spring and news that the white bass are running.

But there are some things the outdoorsman can do to relieve the symptoms of cabin fever. Reading a good book on your favorite outdoor topic will help and may even teach you something you didn't know about bass fishing, for example, or wing shooting. There are a lot of entertaining and informative books down at your local library that's the large stone building on the left, three blocks down from the bait shop).

Sorting, cleaning, repairing and organizing all your outdoor equipment will take up several hours. If you have any items need to be sent away for repair, now is the time to take care of it, so you have them back before spring season get into full swing.

While you're at it make lists of all the equipment you'd like to purchase. Then go through the list and mark out all the items you can't afford. Then show the list to your wife and work out what you're actually going to buy. This process (particularly the last step) can be highly entertaining.

Actually, these measures should only be last resorts, to be saved for those long spells of weather so bad that it's impossible to get outdoors. If conditions are just normal February miserable, there's no excuse for not being out and doing.

Quail season will remain open through Feb. 17 and you can hunt grouse through the last day of the month. Chasing grouse up and down some of those Eastern Kentucky mountains will warm you up even on the coldest day.

You can even get in some positive fishing in February. Walleye and sauger are beginning to move into their spawning areas and will start getting restless at the first hint of a rise in water temperature. A trip to the Big South Fork of the Cumberland could yield some



# Cawood Comments

**Dear Cawood:** I am a sixth grade teacher and am assisting students in preparing for a 4-H speech contest. One of my students would like to base his speech on the U.K. Basketball program. We would appreciate any assistance you can give us. *Carol Patton, Hardinsburg, Ky.*

**Dear Carol:** Kentucky's great basketball tradition did not have a very auspicious beginning. According to U.K. records the first Kentucky team in 1903 won only one game and lost two. Those early Kentucky teams didn't play very many games but at the end of the first three years U.K. had won 3 and lost 10. Things improved and in 1912 Kentucky won all 9 games on its schedule.

The single most important event in Kentucky's rise to basketball prominence happened in 1930. The University hired a young high school coach out of Freeport, Illinois, named Adolph Frederick Rupp. He spent the next 42 years as Kentucky's basketball coach, winning over 82 percent of his games, four N.C.A.A. Championships and 2 N.I.T. Championships. His teams made the University of Kentucky synonymous with championship basketball.

One of Coach Rupp's former players, Joe B. Hall, took over the program when Rupp retired in 1973 and has continued U.K.'s fine program winning one N.C.A.A. Championship and one N.I.T. Title.

Kentucky plays in Rupp Arena which is the largest basketball arena in America. The school holds both the national record for the largest average crowds to watch college games and the largest total attendance for a season. Kentucky began this season with 1238 victories more than any school in this country. 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# Super Living

I was looking through a magazine several days ago and found the following and wanted to share them with you.

**Helpful Hints**  
Drop handful of whipped cream on cookie sheets. Place cookie sheets in freezer. Let whipped cream freeze. When frozen, remove from sheet, place in plastic bags, tie and store in freezer. When serving coffee, hot tea or cocoa, put a frozen blob in cup. Give it a rich flavor.

Take a large plastic freezer box or two quart pitcher with tight cover. Place leftovers in the container, such as corn, peas, Pinto beans, green beans, kraut, mashed potatoes. Anything in the vegetable line which isn't enough to serve again. When making soup you will have plenty of vegetables for them.

Place leftover cake and cookies in freezer bags. Freeze. After frozen, crush. Sprinkle over pudding. Make a tasteful treat for children after school. When there isn't enough cereal in the box, add a few bowl, place in plastic bags with ends of bread, store in freezer. Use as filler for meat loafs and stuffing.

Use your large coffee jars, shortening buckets to store products in. Wash containers good, dry. Place any item you buy that comes in a box or plastic bag in them. Cover. This keeps out mice and bugs. Items that can be stored like these are: macaroni, oats, cream of wheat, popcorn, sugar, flour, meal, rice, dried beans. On the package when you think you won't remember how to cook the product, clip out the directions and place in container with the item stored. Then you can read the directions when ready to prepare.

If your table, and counter-top is spotted where you've spilled things, try this. Take a pint of water or club soda, add a little bleach on the counter. Rub over counters and tables. Wait a few minutes and wipe with clean wet cloth. When your dresser drawers, night stand drawers, chest drawers are hard to pull out, take the drawer completely out. Turn upside down. Take a bar of soap, or an old candle and rub the ends of the drawer with the wax and the inside of the chest, dresser or cabinet. This will make them easier to pull out. Also if you have a door that is hard to open or shut, rub the wax of the door, and the side with wax. Also run the bottom of the door frame, the side and the top. Also the hinge area, with wax or 3-in-1.

It will soon be time to spring clean. One of the first things to clean are your window screens. Here are a couple of ways to do this. Vacuum them with a wet squeegee. If you don't have a squeegee, brush them with the hand brush you use in your car or truck. This broom is really handy in the home. Brush the backs and sides of your chairs and sofas. Help keep down some of the dust. Use it on the grooves in your stereos and T.V. Brush your lamp shades with it, also.

You think you're going to have to paint and can't afford it. Try washing the walls and ceilings. Use one cup bleach, two gallons of water, 1/2 cup PineSol, wash the wall with this. Then rinse with clean water. Clean water rinse: 2 gallon water, 1/4 cup liquid lysol and 1/4 cup of liquid bluing. And lots of cleaning rags. These two above items

should clean a room that is 12 1/2 feet and 7 feet tall. But if it is a larger room, you'll probably have to change the first water once or twice.

Keep a toothbrush or basting brush or even a small paint brush with your sewing machine. Use to brush out the lint that gathers inside machine when cleaning it.

When you have small children, then there is sure to be lots of toys scattered around. Put all but 4 or 5 in a large box or bag and put them away. After several weeks, take 4 or 5 you left out and trade them for some you have stored. This helps keep down clutter, and the children enjoy and play with their toys more.

If you have a pickup truck and you have to go to the laundry mat or store when it's raining, try this: For the laundry mat, line the inside of your back seat with garbage bags, fill with clothes and tie. Helps keep them clean and dry. For the grocery, keep a box of garbage bags behind the seat. When you're ready to leave the store, give you bags of groceries and place in plastic bags and tie. Keeps the food dry and clean.
