



SSI Payments to Kentuckians

Supplemental Security Income (SSI) payments of \$135,000,000 were paid to some 93,000 needy aged, blind and disabled people in Kentucky in 1979, according to Bob Anderson scele security. disabled people in Kentucky in 1979, according to Bob Ander-son, social security manager in Richmond.

son, social security manager in Richmond.

Aged recipients received \$50,000,000 of that amount while \$4,000,000 was paid to the bilind, and \$81,000,000 to the disabled.

The SSI program is a Federally-administered program that provides a basic cash income to people in financial need who are 65 or older, billed or disabled. Currently, SSI provides up to \$208.20 for one person and \$312.30 for an eligible couple in monthly benefits. "Not every person qualifying for SSI will receive that a mount," Anderson said. "Some may get less because they have

other income, while some may get more if they live in a State that adds money to the Federal

that adds money to the payment."

SSI is not the same as social security, even though the program is administered by the Social Security Administration. Money for SSI checks comes nom general funds of the U.S. Treasury, while social security benefits are paid for payroll

benefits are paid for payroutants.

Preventing Mending
A bit of action before use
can increase the service of new
clothes and save you from a lot
of mending chores later on.
Check over new garments, espcially increpansive ones, keeping the following "ahead-oftime repairs" in mind:
Hem-fl, stitches, are too
loose or too visible on the right

side, remove the stitches, and re-hem.

Pangling threads-Thread them into a needle, bring to the inside of the garment and tie. Buttonholes-prolong the life of machine-made button-

holes by going over them with a buttonhole handstitch or ma-

buttonhole handstitch or ma-chine zig.zag stitch.

Seams-Reinforced sleeve Seams-Reinforced sleeve and crotch seams with a second line of machine stitching 1/8 inch inside the seam allowance. Use 12 to 14 stitches per inch. Narrow or crooked seams can behefit from the same treat-ment. Underzam seams can benefit from the same treat-ment, or the seam of the seam of the seam of the seam tage. Place tape over seam line and stitch.

How SS Disability Claims Are Processed

Many people have the mis-taken idea that employees in the social security office decide whether an applicant for dis-ability benefits is able to work or not, Bob Anderson, social security manager in Richmond

security manager in Richmond said recently.

This just is not so, Anderson said. People at the solid security office do decide if a person meets non-medical requirements, such as whether having worked long enough and recently enough under social security to be eligible for checks.

security to be eligible for checks. But the information an applicant provides about his or her medical condition, including names of doctors or hospitals who did examinations or provided treatment, and his or her work experience is sent to the Kentucky disability determination unit in Frankfort, Ky. There, a team of professionals, one of whom is a doctor, reviews the claim. This team decides if the applicant is disabled within the meaning of the law and whether the person's condition prevents him or her from working; for a year or more

from working- for a year or more.

The team obtains medical reports from doctors and other sources of treatment or examination. If more information is needed, they may refer the applicant to a physician, clinic, or some other facility for another examination or test. In addition to deciding if the applicant is disabled, the State agency considers whether a may expect and rehabilitation.


