

The Other King

Article 5 — Sept. 13, 1979

In Daniel 8:23, it says, "And in the latter time of their kingdom, when the transgressors are come to the full, a king of fierce countenance, and understanding, dark sentences, shall stand up."

Dan. 8:24, "And his power shall be mighty, but not by his own power; and he shall destroy wonderfully, and shall prosper, and practice, and shall destroy the mighty and the holy people."

This is talking about things in the spirit world. We must come to realize a show of great strength is being manifested in the spirit world.

This king of dark sentences has gifts and his greatest gift is discernment. This discernment is a trap. It's called a cage in Rev. 18:2. Read also Dan. 7:8 where it talks about the eyes like the eyes of man, and a mouth speaking great things. Remember this king is a spirit, and it uses people to do its work. You notice in Dan. 8:24, it says, "And his power shall be mighty, but not by his own power."

This spirit of the devil is out to get God's holy peo-

ple, Dan. 8:24. It is working right now to hide the Lord's light. Rev. 18:1.

Dan. 12:7 talks about the strength of the Lord showing forth for "time", "times" and on "half".

Dan. 7:25 talks about the strength of the beast showing forth for "time", "times" and the dividing of time.

It's interesting that the Lord and the beast both put forth a strong spirit for the same amount of time. Rev. 13:5 is speaking about the same period of time, and it says 42 months.

We are living now in this 42 months. Count the stars in the Lord's light. This is September 10, 1979. The 24th of this month, the part called "time" will be over. It was for those the Lord's light shined directly on. The angel in Rev. 18:1 was showing them the Lord's covenant. Dan. 9:27.

On September 24, we will go into the period called "times". This is for those in the last half of Dan. 12:10. It says, "And none of the wicked shall understand; but the wise shall understand." This is to the

whole world.

When the Lord came to earth before, He gave His people 3½ years' ministry. Now his light has come back down, and the Gentiles are going to have 3½ years' ministry. St. Luke 17:26, Dan. 9:27, Dan. 12:7, Rev. 11:2.

This you are reading right now is the light. For four weeks now I have been confirming the Lord's covenant. Understanding the Lord's Word is light and this light is going to shine for about 2½ more years. And then, according to Dan. 12:7, the power of God's holy people will be scattered.

Now God's holy people will have a lot of power. Only a few will believe it. There will be miracles performed, but only a few will believe it.

When the Lord raised Lazarus from the dead (St. John 11:43), Lazarus had been dead four days. And he stinked. Many seeing this believed, but some went their way and told the Pharisees. Now the Pharisees was the Godly people of that day. So the godly people decided they would put the Lord to death.

In Rev. 18:24, speaking of Babylon it says, "And in her was found the blood of prophets, and of saints, and of all that were slain upon the earth."

Who is she? "Babylon." Some say a city. A city with the blood of God's holy people on its hands. Come on now.

The Lord is coming soon, be ready. Seek him with all your heart.

You know, man is born into this world innocent. He departs it 60 of 70 years later, full of hard labor, pain and many sorrows, and sometimes debt over his head. And to most they are going out to face an eternity full of hard punishment for the life they lived.

The Lord gave me a vision. I was going in this old barn and some way I knew there were three dead serpents in this barn. Two of them had been dead some time. They were brown. The third serpent was black and had been dead a short time. Just as I got in this barn a strong mean serpent came running to attack me. When I looked down on it, there was a section of its body gone. This wound was

about 6 inches long. There was no meat on the bone. This was about three-fourths of the way back on its body. The bone looked like plastic that had melted and run back together. It was a slick bone and bluish in color.

I knew this serpent was king of dark sentences, Dan. 8:23. I also knew it was the head that was wounded in Rev. 13:3. It is called head there because it is the evil spirit that is in charge of this period of time.

It says in Rev. 13:3, "And his deadly wound was healed; and all the world wondered after the beast." This serpent is a spirit. So the world cannot see this wound. The world is wondering after this discernment. Rev. 13:5. It can tell you the future or the past. A foul spirit will get on you; if you believe it.

This foul spirit is not to be ashamed of. It gets on godly people to pull them down. This is a spirit of confusion. It puts men down and raises women up. Don't let this spirit stay on you. It grows. Get it cast off.

The Beast 666 has been found

Article 4 — Sept. 6, 1979

(I Tim. 6:10) says "For the love of money is the root of all evil which while some coveted after they have erred from the faith and pierced themselves through with many sorrows."

Now concerning the beast and the 666 connection, let us see what the Word of God says. St. John gave us the key in Rev. 13:18. He says "Here is wisdom."

God's Word is wisdom; so John is saying it's in here.

And then Rev. 13:18 says "Let him that hath understanding count the number of the beast for it is the number of a man."

We notice Rev. 13:18 said "Let him that hath understanding count the number."

See, it didn't say "them". It said "him," and let is spelled with a capital letter. This is talking about someone with a special gift of understanding — and this is spiritual understanding.

And talking about the beast it continues to say (Rev. 13:18), "And his number is Six hundred, threescore and six." That is 666.

I found out about the beast while reading in I Kings 10:14. It said, "Now the weight of gold that came to Solomon in one year was six hundred threescore and six talents of gold."

I had read this before; but when I read this about three months ago, it just came up to me and I knew it was the beast. I couldn't prove it to anyone. Then about a month later I ran into Rev. 13:18. I had read this verse in Revelations many times but this time it handed me the key. You notice it talks about wisdom, understanding, man, number.

Remember John was in the spirit, and spiritual things have more than one meaning.

Everyone has heard of the wisdom of Solomon. God gave him wisdom and

understanding, and he had the right number — 666. The number was about the right thing, "gold," — "money".

Now that we know the beast in the spirit world stands for money, in this world, let us see what the image of the beast is.

It used to be if you had your picture taken, they would say you had your image taken. In other words, it takes the place of the real thing.

We find the beast is actually money; so we are looking for the image of money. It says in Rev. 13:16, that this image will cause all to receive a mark or number or name in their right hand or in their forehead. And no one may buy or sell without this number.

We know in our day all large accounting is handled by computers. So this image of the beast is a computer and you will have a computer number instead of money.

Now let us see what the

Word of God says about people that do receive and those that don't receive this mark or number or name of the image of the beast.

Rev. 14:9, "And the third angel followed them saying with a loud voice, if any man worship the beast and his image, and receive his mark in his forehead, or in his hand."

Rev. 14:10, "The same shall drink of the wine of the wrath of God, which is poured out without mixture into the cup of his indignation; and he shall be tormented with fire and brimstone in the presence of the holy angels, and the presence of the Lamb."

Rev. 14:11, "And the smoke of their torment ascendeth up for ever and ever; and they have no rest day nor night, who worship the beast and his image, and whosoever receiveth the mark of his name."

You see there is a great punishment for those that receive this mark.

Rev. 13:15, "And he had power to give life unto the image of the beast, that the image of the beast should both speak, and cause that as many as would not worship the image of the beast should be killed."

Cut out these articles I write and keep. When the mark of the beast comes, you will need all the faith you can muster. It will seem like such a small thing. In fact, it may seem like a blessing at the time, but the price tag is high.

Daniel 12:10, talks about many. Rev. 13:18, says him. But they are talking about the same people. These people are many but only one in a place like unto Psa. 16:6.

In New Guinea there is a man. His name is Ken Jenkins. This man is getting the tribesmen there converted to the Lord. The Lord showed me this in a vision last week. They are really getting saved. Could the Lord be saying, "I had to go to the heathen again?"

Is Any Sick?

Article 6 — Sept. 20, 1979

The Word of God says in James 5:14, "Is any sick among you? Let him call for the elders of the church; and let them pray over him, anointing him with oil in the name of the Lord."

James 5:15, "And the prayer of faith shall save the sick and the Lord shall raise him up; and if he have committed sins they shall be forgiven him."

This is what the Lord says for Christians to do when they get sick. Who do you call when you get sick?

The Lord is coming soon and He has anointed many people, Dan. 12:10, to confirm His covenant, Dan. 9:27. The Lord is showing us that we need to go back and read the Word of God again and simply believe it.

These elders this is talking about have been ordained by the church. They have met a qualification, Titus 1:5 through 9. And let us say you are sick and you are a Christian. You are going to depend on the Lord for your healing. Because He said to and He said to call for the elders. So you call for these elders, believing that if they will come and pray over you like the Lord said, you will receive healing from the Lord. This is your act of faith. If the elders will come and pray over you and anoint you with oil, believing in the Word of God, this is their act of faith. Now it is the Lord's turn. He may heal on the spot or He may choose to heal slow; maybe a period of one or two weeks. After all, you probably got sick to be healed, so your faith would be stronger. God will heal the way that will strengthen your faith the most. You may have got sick so your neighbor you have been praying for could see your faith or how great God really is.

Now I know that sometimes a sickness is unto death. But death can be made easier. One night I felt like I should go to the hospital and see a friend, and when I walked in his room, I felt death. He asked me to pray for him. There were three more people in the room. I asked them to have a prayer in their heart. I anointed him with oil and prayed down in my heart. I asked the Lord to heal him. The Lord didn't heal him, but there was a peace that

came in that room that you could feel. And the suffering left that man's face, and a peace came over him; you could see it. He died the next morning, but there is a blessing even in death.

Now there are churches that believe in elders and ordain elders like the Word says. They put them over the church and they are over everyone that comes in that door, because they are the elders over that church.

Many churches ordain elders and go out of county or state for a preacher they hardly know and put him over their elders. Ungodliness never runs much deeper. If one of their members gets sick, they will naturally call for the highest official in their church. You can guess who they call for. Christ is head of the church, and the church is a body. The elders are the backbone of that body and the head fits on the backbone. When a church group lowers the backbone and puts something between it and the head, you have cut the head off.

There are people that have the gift of healing; the Lord gave it to them because they had compassion on the sick.

You know what I am trying to do. About 18 months ago, the Lord gave me a vision. And He drew a map. He told me to go around this map and try to put the gifts in a church. This map started at Science Hill, Ky., and went to Stanford to Junction City to Liberty to Russell Springs to Monticello to Burnside to Somerset and back to Science Hill. I was really proud of this map the Lord gave me. And I would go around and draw it for people and tell them the Lord wanted me to try to put the gifts in a church. No one was interested enough to ordain elders in the church and let them be in charge.

Believing elders is the first requirement. In fact, that is the only requirement. For when you set God-fearing men that know the will of God, they will set the rest in order. And that is the way God wants it to be.

I am not a preacher. I don't claim to belong to any church group. I have been a member of two different groups, but didn't believe in either one. I don't believe in men's doctrine, so I don't have a doc-

trine of my own. I am just trying to get people to believe the Word of God. If people knew how the Lord can bless and all the gifts He wants to give them, they would demand a change. Now they will not get the change, because the Lord has showed me a year ago that a group of people in a church don't own the church. It is owned by its doctrine and the people just keep it up and improve it from time to time.

In the early church days, they had to have church around in homes. As long as a year and a half ago, I was feeling real strong like we were going to start having church in homes again. The prayers were in secret. I would ask my wife if she thought they would come back again, and she would say, maybe someone will.

Holy Train

Article 15 — Jan. 1980

When the Lord increased my territory and made it so large, I worried about how would I be able to tell people what the Lord was showing me. When I had just the small map, I was publishing articles in six papers and it was costing about four hundred a week. But when I was shown the large map, I could see I needed to put an article in about forty papers. And to, I thought when I publish this in these forty papers, the Lord may increase the territory again, because the whole world has to be warned that the Lord is coming. So one night I was really worried, but I got the idea if I put all of the articles together and put them in an insert like this, I could save half, and I wondered if the Lord would be pleased with that. And I knew I was going to put this paper in only about half of the homes in this territory and I worried about that.

So that night the Lord gave me two visions. The first vision I saw a Bible laying and it had ten and twenty dollar bills hanging out of it, and I was caused to know the Word of God was more precious than money. My wife and I had give all we have to the Lord. I still feel responsible to make it work all it will to fight the devil all we can as long as we can.

And the second vision was this. There was someone with me. We were out

Holy Temple

Article 14 — Jan. 1980

Thanksgiving week the Lord gave me a vision. I was standing in a huge temple that was being built. It was a spiritual temple. There was clouds inside of this temple. The roof was clear with a tint like tinted glass in a windshield.

There were decorations in this roof. This consisted of a plaque that was 12 x 24 inches. This was maroon in color and had two diamonds in it about 2 or 3 inches across. They were set about six inches from each end of this plaque. You could see them from either side. They seemed to represent the Old and New Testaments.

While looking up at this roof the steeple to this

temple passed overhead above this temple. This was breathtaking. This was a big thing, and it had some of those decorations on it. This steeple was laying on its side, big end in front, and there was a worker laying longways against one corner. He had on a cream colored robe that looked so clean and pure. It came down to the knees. There was a wide belt and one end hung down. He was guiding this steeple and making it go. He seemed to be controlling gravity. His clothes were not moving in the air, and he was laying down, and it seemed to just float across, going to the center of the temple. (Read Malachi 3:1.)

in the mountains. We were standing in a county road at the bottom of a tall, steep mountain. This mountain seemed to start trembling a little. We look up, and about halfway up that mountain we saw a train coming around that mountain. A new train. A big train. And we got scared. This train was making its own road through those trees, across those hollers, over those ledges of rock. It was staying on the contour of this mountain and when it would come to a hollow, the front of this train wouldn't drop down, it would just stick way out in the air and we would get scared. But then it would just swing back to the mountain, in those trees again. We couldn't see no one driving this train, and when it would come to ledges of rock sticking out of the mountain, sometimes it would have the wheels on one side on the ledges of rock, and the wheels on the other side would just be out in the air. And then it would turn back to the mountain in the trees again. And it would go the same speed no matter what obstacle it came to.

So now this train was coming around this mountain above us, and we were really scared, and we looked out the road and this road went through a tunnel of a huge limestone rock that stuck out of this mountain. And we ran and got in that tunnel and

when that train got above this tunnel, although it was high on the mountain above, it put pressure on this tunnel, and it started shaking and pieces as big as your hand started falling out of the ceiling. And we looked up and there was large cracks coming in the ceiling, and we could see it was not limestone rock, but some kind of soft stuff. So we were more scared of this tunnel than we were of what the train might do, so we ran back out in the open. And so the vision went away. I was caused to know that train represented this insert I was thinking about putting in these papers and that I didn't have to worry about it not getting to where it needed to go, that the Lord would take it where it needed to go. That He would make a way for it to get there, and it would go there with power. And everyone on that mountain would know it had passed by, because it would shake them and scare them.

And that tunnel that we thought was limestone rock, the Lord caused me to know that was a doctrine. It just looked like a solid rock, but it was something like chalk, and when the real power of God came by, it fell apart.

You know, I wonder about that tunnel. This seemed to be an old road. This tunnel may have been there for years.

"Was" - "Is Not" - "Is"

The Lord brought the children of Israel out of Egypt by miracles. They walked through the Red Sea on dry land and the water stood upright. They ate bread that fell from Heaven. When they ran out of water, the Lord told Moses in Numbers 28:8 to speak to a rock, and water came out and they and their cattle drank.

Now this had to be a branch for that many people and cattle. Also, the Lord would bring quails up in their camp at evening, and they would just cover the camp; so they had plenty of meat. The Lord was with them all the time. He was up over them in a cloud at day to shade them from heat, and by a pillar of fire at night to give them light.

Some say there were about three million of these people plus their cattle. I don't really know how many there was, but they were a living miracle here on earth.

Just imagine being in that mixed multitude headed for the promised land and the Lord being over you in a cloud leading the way. What a sight that must have been!

But do you know what happened? The devil that is giving us so much trouble today was there also. So he went with them; and you know how he is. He picked at them day and night. When they got to the place where they were going to cross over into the promised land, they couldn't cross over. That devil had stole their faith. And they could no longer believe in miracles - that they would happen at the right time.

A lot of people teach about the children of Israel, how small their faith had become. But they don't liken themselves unto them, to compare themselves with them. A lot of people trust God to perform a miracle. But they don't trust Him to perform it at the instant they need it.

Now we are getting ready to cross over. The mark of the beast will be our crossing. You must get ready soon.

Read your Bible. You can understand it better now. The Lord's light came to give you more understanding.

You know the Word talks about the world is go-

ing to be full of the knowledge of God. There is more knowledge of God here now than we know. I was looking for something in the World Book the other day and I saw a picture of John the Baptist when he baptized Jesus. And he had in his hand the morning star, fixing to give it to Jesus. If you haven't seen it, look for it in the World Book.

Now I ask you how did the man that drew the picture know how big the star was and how did he know it was round? I have seen the morning star. The Lord's light in the upper corner is made up of stars. I saw this light in a vision, and I walked in it. In this vision I was taken up to this light and when I got close, the reflection on one opened up. I looked inside and there was this ball that was pure. And it was so pure. It was shining like the brightest star. It was twice the size of a softball. As I saw it, as I was taken up in this vision, I started forgetting everything here on earth. And I was getting happier all the time as I went up.

I used to read in the Word about the hundred and forty-four thousand singing. And I would say to myself, half of those men will not sing. But believe me everyone will sing. They will be so happy, they will burst if they don't sing.

Brother and Sister and Friend, if you have made ready in this life, if you have used the opportunity that you have been given, there is a life out there that you just can't imagine. I have been in church services when the Spirit really felt good. But we were only getting waves off of that up there.

My friend, you cannot imagine how ignorant we are about God.

About 18 months ago I prayed for a child that was in a terrible shape - birth defects. And that night the Lord gave me a vision. In this vision there on a table was three things like, donuts stacked on top of each other. They were the color of red worms. And up in the air about three feet over them were three more just like those. They were in a fog. I didn't know what I was looking at. I would tell people about this and they didn't know what it was. But here about a month ago, September 1, 1979, the Lord caused me to know. Those on the table are the spirits that are

holding the child that way. And those up in the air are strong Spirits of God to cast those on the table out with. So on September 26, I went to see the child and went through the process of casting them out. But when I got home I wondered about it. So I asked the Lord to show me if I had cast them out. He caused me to know that I had not cast them out. I went to the prayer room and asked the Lord to show me how to get them out. And He said the world had gone into gross sin now. But some way I was caused to believe if we could set up a

Gospel Of Kingdom

I want to say something about the Gospel of the Kingdom. I hardly know what to say. I do know there was a change in September, 1979. Before that time I would see people doing things wrong. Now this wrong was like praying wrong. Halfway believing in a doctrine, supporting a preacher that wasn't saved - things like that - and the Lord would let me see them in the spirit world, and they would still have the blood on them. But some of them, their chariot would be sitting still and some would be going the wrong way. But they still had the blood on them and I couldn't see their ungodliness. They were hid in the blood. But in September 1979, I was caused to know the world had gone into gross sin. But I didn't know what that meant. Then the next night or two the Lord let me see two people that I knew. These two men had complained that they couldn't pray in secret, so the Lord let me see what they looked like praying out loud in the spirit world. They were laying on the floor. One's feet was to the East and one's feet was to the West. They were laying on their stomach, their hands and arms were under them, their noses was touching. They were looking in each other's mouth and praying out loud to each other. When I first looked down on them I thought they were serpents turning into people. But then I recognized them, and they were men turning into serpents. And when I looked down on them this looked so terrible I turned my head and got down on my knees. These people were in a large building that was some kind of factory, and in one corner of this building was a makeshift office with a petition about four feet high, and

group like unto the Lord's will that they could cast them out.

I looked up the word gross in the dictionary, and I know the Lord had a hand in what it said.

I also looked up the word sin and I know the Lord had something to do with what it said. You see the Lord showed me the devil's chain and it is a doctrine.

Who will escape the chain of doctrine? The devil has got millions tied with it.

"It was," "and is not," "yet is." It was just something they believed. It seemed like that was a better way; but when they

they were laying in the middle of the floor of this office. There was a Coke machine and a desk in that office, and when I knelt to my knees, I heard the Coke man coming, and I wondered if he would get down on his knees, but he went right on in there. He walked around them and made a lot of noise, filling up the Coke machine, and there they laid praying out loud. Then he made a lot of noise picking up the empty bottles and leaving.

Then I heard someone coming to the desk. I wondered if they would stop when they saw them. But they completely ignored them. They made a little noise hunting for something in the desk, and then the vision went away.

Now I wondered about this. I knew God wasn't hearing their prayers. And these people that went in there and ignored them, they represented the people of the world, and they knew God wasn't hearing their prayer. You know, I wonder why the people doing the praying didn't know.

And then a couple nights later. I was given another vision. I was showed two more people that I knew I had seen these people about six months before this in the spirit and at that time they had the blood on them. But now they were in the dark, no blood, no chariot, no yellow color, no light coming down from God. And I was seeing them kneeling and praying to an empty chair. I also was caused to know of other things they were doing wrong.

Now look at these people. I believe the Lord showed me these people so I could

About a year ago, the Lord caused me to know the devil had a slogan. It goes like this: "Lord, just keep your hands off. I know they are carrying your Book but they believe in my doctrine."

show them to you. I believe these people were doing the same things all the time. But before the world went into gross sin they were hid in the blood. But after the world went into gross sin, these things they were doing wrong showed up in the spirit world as ungodliness. I believe a record is being made of this or I wouldn't be seeing it.

What really happened in the spirit world? The white horse seal was opened, Rev. 6:2, on September 29, 1978. That was called time in Dan. 12:7, and three hundred and sixty days later on September 24, 1979, we went into what is called times, Dan. 12:7. I believe the Spirit of the Lord came down with the white horse. I believe He checked the whole world out and found it lacking, and He took the goodies out of the spirit world.

Now you have to study the Word of God and do what it says. Before you done a little good and a little bad, and the bad was hid in the blood, but now is time to preach the Gospel of the Kingdom, and a record is made of the bad.

My Bible has been falling open to a reference about the four Gospels and at other times it would fall open to a reference of Mark 1:14, 15 but I didn't know what to think. But around December 1, 1979, I was reading my Bible and this seemed to come up to me, Mark 1:15:

THE TIME IS FULFILLED, AND THE KINGDOM OF GOD IS AT HAND; REPENT YE, AND BELIEVE THE GOSPEL.

Article 19 — Jan. 1980

The Lord gave me a vision. He said, draw a picture of the church. So I started thinking about blocks, doors, windows. Then I saw a picture being drawn and it was like a human body. But it looked bad. About a fourth of the body was gone. The part that was gone was the left shoulder and side down to the hip bone. It was cut out like a puzzle, wavy, and there was a place cut out for the lock in the center of the chest about the size of my fist. So I looked at this and I said, well the church is not doing the Lord's will. But I already knew that. So I wondered about this. But I told some of my friends about this. Then

when the Lord showed the churches not getting their prayers answered I went back and looked at the church again that the Lord drew. I should have been more surprised at this. But down deep we all know. We won't admit it, but we know. I tell you, our birth defects and sick are going to have a field day. They have got a mouthful to be told in the Judgement.

Healing

Article 18 — Jan. 1980

Some people get healed fast, and some people get healed slow.

I have seen people that was prayed for, start getting healed. Then they would go and have someone to pray for them that wasn't getting their prayers answered, and they would stop getting healed.

Some people stop and get prayed for on their way to the doctor. But some wait and stop on their way back home.

Some people that are standing in the prayer line to be prayed for today are thinking about where they are going tomorrow to be

prayed for.

I am amazed at some of these churches. The Lord showed me a miracle child in a church. This child was born with birth defects. It was born this way for this church to pray and get it healed. And when the Lord showed me this I felt like a lot of churches have got children like this in them, just suffering and waiting for their church to get a prayer answered. What about that? The Spirit was on me and I felt like these children are testifying to these churches that their prayers are not being answered. And I felt like they will testify against them in the day of Judgement.

It's All A Miracle

Article 17 — Jan. 1980

After this I went to a friend's house and told him about this child. And my friend said something like this — Bro. Newberry, you need to be careful. You are beginning to believe in miracles. And this affected me. He was right. But I didn't know how to stop for this blind child was really seeing. I came home that day and sat down at a table trying to read the Bible but I couldn't read. This miracle business was on me too strong. So I closed my Bible and set one elbow on each side of the Bible and

laid my face in my hands and with my eyes closed I was thinking deep about this, and maybe praying some. Then a voice spoke down around my Bible. It said, "It's all a miracle." I opened my eyes and looked at my Bible. It was laying in a fog. I opened it and what I read was talking about a miracle. I opened it to several places and every one was talking about a miracle. 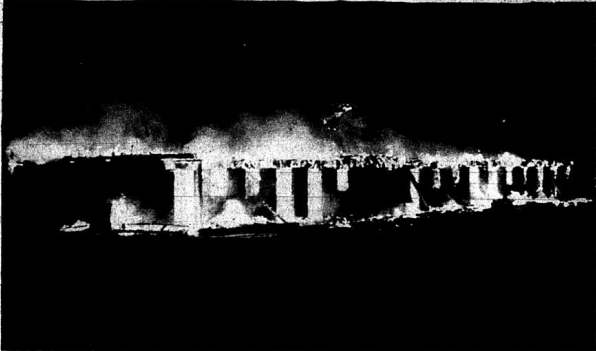

The Brodhead and Livingston Volunteer fire Departments battled a fire for approximately two hours in sub-freezing temperatures at the Kentuckiana Motel, just south of Mt. Vernon, last Thursday morning. The motel, owned by Reuben Hammond and had been closed for the winter.

Mt. Vernon has received a cumulative total of 11 1/2 inches of snow thus far this winter including the 2 1/2 inches which fell last Friday night and Saturday.

We specified Mt. Vernon in the statement above because we are not sure whether or not Bud Cox, who is the local weatherman and the person from whom we get our information, is also the official record keeper for the county. And we understand that folks in the Three Links area of the county may be ahead of us

According to a spokesman of the local school board, Rockcastle children are only behind the eight-ball for a total of 3 make-up days thus far. There has been a total of 10 days missed but two were taken up as in-service days for teachers and 8 have been approved as "Snow Bank" days and will not have to be made up.

Property selling for more than Assessed value in most counties

In all but 22 Kentucky counties property was assessed by local officials at a lower amount than its sale price in 1979, according to figures released by the Department of Revenue.

The figures, in the form of "combined assessment-sales ratios," were arrived at by dividing sales prices into locally-assessed values of residential, commercial and agricultural properties.

The ratios are, in some cases, subject to uncontrollable

variations due to small, non-random samples," according to a spokesman for the Revenue Department. And the properties sold in a county may not be representative of all properties in that county, he explained.

The biggest disparity between the assessed value and price—the amount a property actually sells for—is in Jackson County. There property sold for an average 47 percent above the locally-assessed property

Councilman Welch proposes New traffic plan for Main Street

Mt. Vernon City Councilman Tom Welch presented the council with a new traffic plan for Main Street and adjoining streets at Monday night's meeting of the council.

Councilman Welch said that he felt it necessary to rearrange parking on Main Street so as to relieve congestion caused by trucks loading and unloading and by persons trying to turn left into the bank's drive-in windows.

Welch's plan calls for parking only on the south side of Main Street and this parking to be done at an angle to permit more parking spaces. Parking would also be eliminated on the north side of Main Street across from Smith's Shoe Shop, on the right side of Church Street going up by Hatt's 54-10 and on the right side of Richmond Street between Main Street and the railroad tracks.

According to Welch, trucks would then have to unload on the north side of Main Street and truck their goods across the street on two wheeled carts. He said he had talked to several businessmen on Main Street and with truckers and they had all agreed that the idea was a good one which would eliminate congestion.

However, one businessman who was present at the meeting, Jim Bullock, owner and operator of Bullock's Catalog Sales complained that since he received such heavy items, such as major appliances, by truck it would be a real hardship for him to have to unload appliances across the street from his place of business and then have to haul these appliances up the steps at the curb in front of his store on a cart. Mr. Bullock said he also required a place at the curb where he could park his truck long enough to load the appliances back out when they were sold.

Welch said he had worked hard on this plan and that the State Department of Highways had agreed to cooperate with the city when a plan was agreed upon.

Following Mr. Bullock's voiced opposition to the plan, the council decided to hold a call meeting on the subject. The street businessmen and other interested citizens to the meeting to discuss the plan more fully by those who would be affected by it. No definite date was set for the call meeting.

John Cox, Mt. Vernon Fire Chief, was before the Council to request permission to answer fire calls outside the city limits with the old fire truck and 3 or 4 firemen.

Mr. Cox told the council that the fire department had been receiving a lot of criticism in the wake of two recent fires just outside the city when the fire department refused to respond. At the last fire, that of the Kentuckiana Motel last Wednesday night, the Brodhead and Livingston Fire Departments both responded while Mt. Vernon was unable to because of a request for permission to answer fire calls outside the city limits with the old fire truck and one of them, Donnie Singleton, a local insurance agent, told the council that a fee could be charged for answering calls outside the city limits to provide a homeowner insurance policy. The only requirement to collecting this fee from insurance companies was that the council must establish a set fee for answering these calls, Mr. Singleton said.

City Attorney Carl Clontz told the council that theoretically this charge would have to be made to anyone outside the city limits, regardless of whether there was a homeowner's policy involved or not.

The council finally directed Mr. Cox to respond to fire calls outside the city limits and that a decision on the amount of fee to be charged would be made at the March meeting.

Ron McMain with Howard K. Bell Engineers was at the meeting to obtain the council's approval of the plans and specifications for relocation of the water lines on Hwy. 150. These plans must also be approved by the State Department of Highways who are paying the entire cost of the relocation so that their project of widening Hwy. 150 at the industrial park can be carried out.

The council approved the plans and then moved into a discussion of the sewer lift-station at the industrial park with Mr. McMain. The council has refused to accept the lift-station for maintenance since it was not built to the original specifications approved by the council.

Mr. McMain explained that a change in the plans from non-subsurface to subsurface pumps was made after it was found that the non-subsurface pumps were much higher than anticipated and this change should have been brought back to the council for their approval by the industrial authority.

However, this approval was not obtained and the council decided upon the recommendation of Water Superintendent Matt Powell, Jr. not to accept the station for maintenance until the station and the access road were revamped to meet Mr. Powell's approval. The council also charged Mr. McMain with the responsibility of seeing that his company must certify that a high-level cut-off switch was installed in the station to prevent surface water being pumped through the station—in the event it became underwater.

Jack Crawford of Crawford and Crawford Engineers reported to the Council the status of the 201 facilities survey. Mr. Crawford said that the results of the public hearing held last month had been transmitted to EPA and that their comments were now being awaited.

Mr. Crawford told the council that it would be mid-summer before a recommendation on water rates for city customers and outlying water districts could be available. He also showed the council a water usage table which had been drawn up showing that, over the last two years, Mt. Vernon had an average daily usage of water of 487,000 gallons from their plant which has a total pumping capacity of 1,200,000 gallons per day. He said with age and some inefficiencies in equipment the plant's total capacity was probably down to somewhere around 1,000,000 gallon capacity per day.

The question had arisen several months ago in council meetings as to why the city was having a problem on a couple of peak days a year of not being able to keep their water storage tank filled.

Mr. Crawford said this problem might be alleviated by a work-over of the water plant which would include such items as replacing filter plates, etc.

Mayor Mullins asked Mr. Crawford if he would, for a flat fee, do the necessary engineering work to see what would be necessary to bring the plant up to capacity again. Mr. Crawford said he would talk to his associates and get back with the council as to what the cost of this engineering study would be.

It was brought out during the discussion that one of the ways to help solve the problem would be to work out a schedule with outlying water districts which would provide alternate times for each district to fill their storage tanks. The council asked Mr. Powell and Mr. Crawford to have a meeting with water superintendents of other districts to set up this schedule. In short discussion about increasing water rates, the council decided that they would hold off, if possible, increasing rates until a recommendation is made to the council by bonding agents sometime this summer. Mayor Mullins pointed out that this would be better than increasing rates now and perhaps having to increase them again at that time.

Police Chief Larry Williams made a report to the council on his observation of the patrolman who, at the last meeting, the council asked him to review with and make a recommendation on whether or not the patrolman should be retained in his present position. Chief Williams said he had complied with this request and saw no problem with the patrolman's administration of his duties. He also reported to the council that an incident attributed to the patrolman of stopping a young girl twice in one night without writing her a citation could not have been the work of this particular patrolman since he was on duty at the time the incident took place.

The council accepted these two reports and then Councilman Welch questioned the council as to why he was working all the overtime available at present since the resignation of one patrolman and the illness of another. Williams said he originally scheduled his overtime because he was under the im-

One of the biggest topics of conversation during last week's meeting of the General Assembly was about a possible tax increase. It is almost a certainty that Kentuckians are going to see an increase in taxes if services are going to be maintained at current levels, not to mention additional services being asked for by different groups around Kentucky. The question of who is going to be increased is becoming a political hot-potato between the General Assembly and Gov. Brown. Most frequently mentioned has been an increase in the coal severance tax and the severance tax being added to oil, gas, gravel and timber.

Gov. Brown has proposed a form of corporation tax reform. His proposal would give a tax break for about 20,000 of Kentucky's smallest corporations with a tax increase for the state's 500 largest corporations.

The Senate Health and Welfare Committee proposed \$2.8 million for local emergency services for the next two years.

A bill which would require the governor to appoint at least one black to each of Kentucky's state university governing boards was taken up by the Senate Education Committee.

The House passed a measure sponsored by Rep. Mary Ann Tobin (D-Irvington) which would enable Kentuckians to renew their driver's license every four years instead of the present every two years.

The House Appropriations and Revenue Committee approved legislation which would allow local school boards to levy a tax on utility bills not to exceed 3 percent.

Eugene Land of Lexington, an official with the United Auto Workers was appointed Commissioner of Labor by Governor Brown.

Robert Spurlin, a Richmond attorney was hired as a

lobbyist for Kentucky's second class cities. His job will be to encourage the General Assembly to have the Legislative Research Committee evaluate any annexation legislation before it goes before each house for a vote.

Legislative Report

Last week the House Republicans Caucus released its legislative package for the 1980 General Assembly. The Republican platform's main thrust calls for a ten percent reduction in state spending and a moratorium on any increased taxation at both the state and federal levels.

For legislative independence the House Republican Caucus is supporting a greater legislative review of and control over administrative regulations. Also, increased legislative regulation of state expense such as overuse of personnel service contracts.

The Caucus is supporting the creation of a task force to assist the appropriate sectors of state government in establishing a singularly cohesive accounting system for Kentucky state government. Further, that the task force shall report its findings to the governor, General Assembly and the citizens of the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

For education, we believe that Kentucky teacher salaries should be fully commensurate with that of surrounding states. And, that there should also be a reduction in the minimum unit size under the Classroom Foundation Program.

The Republican caucus does not support any state government subsidy of abortions, for the most basic of man rights is the right of life. We are a nation under law, and the rights

of all citizens must be protected.

The 1980 General Assembly is faced with the task of establishing a set of stripmine regulations for the Commonwealth. Recognizing the existence of Kentucky's vast natural resources, the caucus supports greater legislative input and review of Kentucky's energy program to ensure that Kentucky is able to assume its rightful place as a leader in the nation in the areas of energy production and environmental protection.

Also, the 1980 General Assembly must establish an equitable restructuring of the states workmen's compensation laws. The Caucus supports a reduction of insurance rates in Kentucky workmen's compensation laws to stimulate jobs, industry and business in the Commonwealth.

The House Republican Caucus enlists its support for legislation to regulate all aspects pertaining to the handling of hazardous waste.

There will be many important issues in the 1980 General Assembly and the House Republican platform is only meant to address those issues in a general context, that are paramount in nature.

When other important issues develop during the 1980 General Assembly, the House Republican Caucus will support legislation that provides for honest, responsible government for all the citizens of Kentucky at the lowest reasonable cost.

What the First Amendment Means To Me

"Congress shall make no laws abridging freedom of the press." The framers of our Constitution wrote that, of course, but more important than who wrote it is where they wrote it: in the First Amendment. It was no afterthought, this guarantee of a free press; those who wrote the Constitution knew the necessity of a free press to the kind of society they envisioned, and knew it well enough that they recognized it in the First Amendment.

And just as important as where they wrote it is how they wrote it: in unambiguous terms. They didn't write "Congress shall not make too many laws abridging freedom of the press," but "Congress shall make no law..." Some parts of the Constitution are vague, and

purposefully so; they were left to be interpreted as the mood of the times makes necessary. But there is no interpreting to be done with this part of the Constitution—Congress shall make no law... who can argue with the intent of that?

And so the question "What does the First Amendment mean to me?" could easily be answered "It means exactly what it says." But that's too easy; its meaning goes much deeper.

It means that the government cannot tell me what to write. I would have to be licensed. Italian Journalists must be, nor do I have to live with the fear that because what I have written displeases the government I will lose my right to write what I feel.

It means I can criticize our government, a right we take for granted, but one which is unthought of in other countries.

It means that the First Amendment gives the press great power, a power that must be exercised responsibly. Walter Williams of the University of Missouri writes: "I believe that the Public Journal is a public trust...that acceptance of a lesser service that the public service is betrayal of this trust."

It also, in giving the press the right to print the truth, charges the press with responsibility of respecting that truth, to be active in seeking the truth and unflinching in printing it.

And finally, the First Amendment charges each generation of journalists with the protection of the rights guaranteed in the amendment. The cause that freedom has been won does not mean it will stay won; the same amendment which gives the press its power depends on a free press for survival.

Withdrawal only prolongs the inevitable and perhaps allows the thing causing the anger to intensify so that it later comes out in subtle ways that neither you nor your marriage partner can understand. It may also come out in one gigantic outburst that can be very damaging both emotionally and physically to you and your partner.

Although it is normal to be angry at times and normal

to deal with your anger constructively, it is also important to realize that anger is an inner and outer expression of something else that is bothering you. In other words, it is a secondary emotion with one or more emotions that come before it. If your child is misbehaving and accidentally falls and hurts himself, you may become angry with him for his behavior, but that anger comes as a result of other emotions such as fear that he may be hurt badly or apprehension. Getting past the anger to the emotion that lies behind it is not easy, but it is necessary if we want to constructively deal with our emotions. Sometimes a moment's hesitation and reflection, when our usual reaction is to become angry, may be enough for us to understand why we feel the way we do, why we are angry. And remember, the more we practice, the easier it becomes.

Activities For Children

During the two days and cold weather, children tend to become bored. The question, "What can we do now?" is frequently asked. Parents and babysitters have to test their imaginations to eliminate the boredom syndrome. There are many activities to keep the child busy and help him to learn as well.

Preschool (ages 3-5) activities

Children this age have a short attention span, have limited eye-hand coordination, and underdeveloped small muscles such as fingers. This age group loves to experiment, to touch and to feel. The process of doing is the enjoyment, not so much the product. Many activities are not necessarily tidy, so space should be provided where the child can use messy materials.

One activity enjoyed by preschoolers is fingerprinting. To make your own fingerprint, thin liquid starch with water. Add a small amount of water to make a paste, beat with an egg beater until stiff. This can be used on colored paper or save newspapers to "paint" on.

Modeling dough can also be fun. Here are two modeling doughs you can make at home.

Uncooked Playdough

Keeps several weeks in plastic bag in refrigerator.

In a large bowl mix:

- 2 cups flour
 - 1 cup salt
 - 2 T. salad oil
 - 6 T. alum (optional)
 - 1 cup water (add slowly as you may not need all of it)
- food coloring or tempera added to water

Soap Modeling Compound

Mix soap flakes with a small amount of water. Beat with egg beater until quite stiff. Children can mold this into different shapes. It will harden and can be used later in the bathtub.

Along the same line as play dough, let the child "help" make bread. Make a yeast bread dough. Then after the child's hands are clean, let them knead the dough. The child will enjoy watching it "grow" and then baking it. This is good for at least 3-4 hours. The child will also learn about the origin of bread and how yeast works.

Many good toys are not expensive. Blocks of wood scraps, old spoons and empty cleansers; all can be stacked, line up or used in numerous other ways.

Children this age also love to use their imaginations. Give them some old dress-up clothes, or even pieces of fabric to use as caps. Preschoolers also like to hammer nails and use pliers. Toy plastic ones are often hard to handle and frustrate the child. Be sure to provide a strong table and soft wood and let them go to work.

Other ideas to keep preschooler busy are: a pair of scissors and an old magazine or catalogue; picture books, puzzle made from a picture glued to cardboard and cut in shapes. Make puppets from paper bags, drawing faces with crayons and gluing on paper cutouts. A large piece of plain paper, markers or a brush and tempera paints (tempera washes out better than marking pens).

Early school ages (6-9) activities

This age group has what seems limitless energy. They are in a hurry, cannot sit still and run everywhere. They are developing their muscles and nerves. They enjoy playing with others, and have longer attention spans than the preschooler. A child in this age group can find more to occupy his time than a younger brother or sister. Some things to keep on hand for "snow days" may include: a supply of easy-to-read books (either the child's own or borrowed from the library); a chalkboard and chalk to play school;

old shoes, hats, jewelry, make up, etc., to play "dress up"; card games and other table games; puzzles (50-100 pieces); old clock or radio to take apart; scissors, glue, colored paper, crayons; fabric scraps, needle and thread to make doll clothes.

Help the child learn to cook by allowing him or her to make simple snacks such as popcorn, cookies, milk drinks; learning to measure and follow a recipe.

Handicrafts such as weaving, embroidery, patch work, hook rugs, needlepoint, crochet, can be done by 8 and 9 year olds.

Collect - cardboard - boxes, markers, wallpaper, fabric scraps and let children make their own doll house or barn.

Drrape a blanket over the table. Pin on squares of fabric for windows and fold open one side for door to make a playhouse.

Make walkers from empty shortening or coffee cans by tying rope through hole punched in tops.

Give them a bar of soap and a paring knife to carve a figure.

Parents need to keep in mind that play is a child's work. Through play a child learns to lead and to follow, to confront and solve problems, and to discover his world and understand it.

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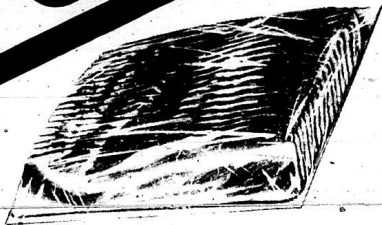

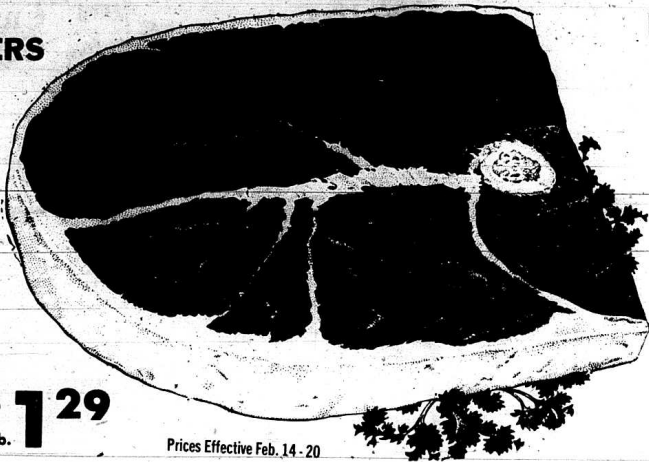

Cawood Comments

By the voice of the University of Kentucky Wildcats Cawood Ledford

LEXINGTON—"This is the tense time." We would expect those words from Kentucky basketball coach, Joe B. Hall, as the college season hits the homestretch. Not at all. The speaker was football coach, Fran Curci.

"The tense time Curci has in mind is the time between now and February 20. That's the date that the high school seniors will sign the national letter of intent. The 24 players that Kentucky has already signed have signed the Southeastern Conference letter. This means no other S.E.C. school, or the Atlantic Coast Conference which also honors the contract, can sign any of the two dozen Kentucky has already corralled. They are fair game, however, for all the rest of the college teams.

"We may lose some of them," says Curci. "We usually do. We're working as hard as we can to hold on to all of them. If we can keep all 24, the remaining six scholarships we have to offer are very important. If we can fill them with good blue chip players we have had a great recruiting year. If we don't, it could be a mediocre year. We are still hopeful of signing a couple more in-state players. If we get them, this will be the best recruiting year we have ever had in Kentucky."

The February 20 signing date is the first day a player can sign the national letter. He can sign anytime after that, but Curci thinks 95 percent of the players will be in the fold by then. They have all visited the schools, says Fran, "and I think most of them have about decided where they want to go to school. We're just hoping our luck holds and we are able to add some top quality players to those we have already signed to a Southeastern Conference agreement."

College football coaches all across the country are anxiously awaiting next Tuesday. Their futures are wrapped up in the names that will be penned on those grants-in-aid. For all of them, like Fran Curci, this is the tense time.

The Kentucky Wildcats will play three games in five days, including important Southeastern Conference matches against Florida and Vanderbilt before taking on the "Runnin' Rebels" of Nevada Las Vegas on national television.

Kentucky, which is fresh from a come-from-behind win at Alabama Saturday that helped preserve first place SEC title with Louisiana State, will host Florida Wednesday at 7:30 p.m. EST and then will travel to Nashville for an 8:30 p.m. EST game with Lane-Williams.

The Kentucky party will leave Nashville Saturday for Las Vegas for the Sunday game that will be seen nationally at 1:00 p.m. EST. The Wildcats will be headquartered at the Hilton Inn.

The Wildcats, who set a school record for shooting percentage in one half against Penn State in 1977, are in the second half, are 21-4 overall and 9-3 in the SEC.

Florida, which is lodged in 10th place in the SEC with a 2-12 mark, is 5-16 overall, while Vandy is tied for sixth place with Georgia and Mississippi State in the SEC with a 6-8 mark and is 12-8 overall.

Kentucky defeated Florida, 76-63, at Gainesville a month ago, and earned a hard-fought 106-90 win over Vandy at Rupp Arena.

Junior forward Fred Cowan paced the cat's win at Florida with 16 points, while Kyle Macy and fellow senior LaVon Williams pitched in 11 and 10 points respectively. The Gators were paced by reserve forward, Nov's 21 points, while All-SEC Reggie Hannah scored 11. The Cats led 39-24 at halftime and built that into a 21-point lead before a determined Gator rally cut it to eight at 5:14.

The foul-marred win over Vandy produced 36 personal fouls against Vandy and 33 on Kentucky and while Vandy was committing 40-49 free throws, UK was making 44-48. Three Rupp Arena records were set-MFT's. Both Teams 97; Most Free Throws Made 44 by UK, and consecutive Free Throws: One Game 12 by Kyle Macy and Vandy's Mike Rhodes.

Kentucky placed six men in double-figures-Macy 18, Cowan and Ford, 17, Bowie 16, Williams 16 and Minnifield 12, while Bowie led with eight rebounds. Vandy put four in double-figures with Rhodes 34 (a personal season high for a player in a game), and Ford 17. The Gators are 2-20 in Lexington (last win in 1974), while UK coach Joe B. Hall is 12-2 against Florida and 1-9 against Gator interim coach Ed Jucker.

Kentucky leads Vanderbilt 83-28 in a series that began in 1912. The Wildcats are 35-15 in Nashville (last win 1976), while Hall is 9-8 against the Commodores and 1-0 against VU coach Richard Schmidt.

Kentucky and Las Vegas have met only once-and that was an emotional last-home

game of 1978, when Wildcat seniors Jack Givens, Rick Borey, Mike Phillips and James Lee made their home finale with a scintillating 92-70 win on National Television. The Cats went on to win the NCAA championship three weeks later.

All-American Kyle Macy leads the Cats with 16.3 ppg, 54.8 FG%, 92.9 FT%, and 110 assists. Cowan is second in scoring and rebounding with 11.8 and 6.1 respectively, while 7-foot-1 freshman center Sam Bowie is third in scoring with 11.1, and leads rebounding with 8.1.

The Wildcats hold team margin in the following statistical categories-PG% 51.3 to 43.3; FG% 67.7 to 71.8; rebounding 36.2 to 30.4 and scoring 79.4 to 65.2.

SHORT SHOTS--Kentucky coach Joe B. Hall's teams have won 20 of 41 SEC titles in six of eight years at UK. The two non-productive years were 1974 (13-13) and 1979 (19-12). Hall's UK record is 175-58 for a 75.1 win percentage and his average of 22 wins per year is better than the immortal Adolph Rupp's 21.5.

Macy Moving On--Macy is the 25th player in Kentucky history to score over 1,000 points and while the talented guard has played under a tightly controlled team concept, he now ranks 17th on the scoring list with 1,278. No. 16 Jim Andrews has 1,320 points. Macy currently ranks No. 2 in the nation in free throw percentage (94.9) and earlier this season set a UK record with 32 consecutive free throws, as well as setting a UK career assists mark (he now has 417 compared to old mark of 319 by Larry Johnson in four years). Entering this year with an 88.0 percent free throw mark, he is a cinch to break the UK career FT% mark of 83.5 by Louie Dampier. Macy has led scoring in 17 games this year with a season high 29 at Ole Miss.

No Practice--Sunday for the Cats--Following Kentucky's great win over the bench and playing, rather than starting. It's just something in my mind, but I seem to get in the flow of the game better coming off the bench. I will prove that to be certainly is more effective in his shooting off the bench. In the seven games he has started, the popular lead has hit only 7-27 for 25.9 percent, while he has hit 27-44 for 61.4 percent in 18 non-starts. He saved the day at Alabama with 7-10 including 5-5 in the second half.

the location of caged animals. Fish and wildlife conservation officers make periodic inspections of permit holders' facilities to make sure they are adequate and sanitary.

Durell also helps control the number of native species, such as raccoons, skunks or deer, held in captivity. For a permit to be issued, the animal must have been obtained legally. Since virtually all wildlife species are protected except during open seasons, the permit system can discourage nest robbing and other out-of-season taking of wildlife.

"In most cases, wild animals don't make good pets anyway," Durell says. "Some never lose their wild nature and can become vicious as they mature. Others, like skunks, can carry serious diseases, including rabies."

"The best place for wild animals," Durell concludes, "is the wilds—and in their own environments. I'd hate to see something like the honey badger get established in Kentucky. The problems it could cause far outweigh any virtues it might have as a pet."

Kentucky Afield

What was a honey badger doing in Boone County?

It took quite a bit of research to figure out that the strange creature killed on a Boone County road was a honey badger, a native of Africa and India.

Identification problems were compounded by the fact that this particular specimen, a partial albino, was almost totally white. How it got onto a Boone County highway will probably always remain a mystery.

The honey badger gets its name from its liking for honey. According to published descriptions, he's generally a nasty little fellow, in spite of his sweet tooth. These badgers will reportedly attack horses, cattle, antelopes, buffalos or just about anything else that makes them mad or gets too near their burrows.

Although they're only about the size of a cocker spaniel, they could probably kill a human. They often prey on sheeps-eating the tongue, windpipe, eyes and brain.

All things considered, we're probably better off without honey badgers in Kentucky. This one was in the state illegally, since no pet animal for it had

ever been issued by the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources, as required by law.

"One major reason for requiring a permit to possess wildlife is so we can control what kind and how many exotic species enter the state," says J. Durell, assistant director of fish and wildlife's game management division.

Wild animals which cause problems also help control pest ranges can become major pests when introduced elsewhere, Durell explains, citing the examples of the starling, the English sparrow and the Norway rat as three introduced species which have become pests in this country.

North American species as varied as white-tailed deer and largemouth bass have wrecked environmental havoc when introduced in some areas overseas. All things considered, it's usually best to let species remain in the regions where they evolved and where natural checks on their population exist, Durell says.

"We would probably have issued a permit for one honey badger," Durell says. "But I doubt we would have approved the importation of a pair of them."

Another reason for requiring a pet permit, Durell says, is so the department will know

Regional Conservation Programs Scheduled

Two regional meetings will be held at Lexington, on February 19 to give the public an opportunity to comment on the future conservation programs of the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) according to local USDA officials.

Interested persons from Kentucky and portions of Indiana, Ohio and Tennessee are urged to attend, says John Houston, Chairman of the Rockcastle County Conservation District. One meeting is scheduled from 2:00 until 5:30 p.m. and the second from 7:30 to 10:00 p.m. at the E.S. Good Barn Building on the University of Kentucky Campus at the corner of Commonwealth Drive and Farm Road in Lexington.

The public is being asked to help USDA decide how to accelerate the application of conservation work now being administered under 34 USDA programs. Seven alternative strategies being considered include:

1. Redirection of present programs—Under this strategy, USDA would continue existing programs, but funds and personnel would be redirected to accomplish certain national conservation objectives.

2. Cross compliance—Under this approach, producers would be required to apply effective conservation measures to qualify for benefits under other USDA programs, including commodity price supports, low interest loans, cost sharing and crop insurance.

3. Regional resource project

approach—This strategy would direct USDA programs toward the more urgent and chronic regional resource problems. Federal participation would be available only for programs that contribute to meeting national conservation objectives.

4. State leadership—Under this strategy, states would assume leadership planning and carrying out conservation programs. State and local governments would develop conservation programs for USDA approval, provide technical assistance to producers, and fund those activities that benefit mainly state and local efforts. USDA would fund activities that have national benefits but are beyond the interest and financial resources of the producer or state and local governments.

5. Regulatory emphasis—This alternative would emphasize the use of backup regulatory authorities at the local, state and national level to carry out an effective national soil and water conservation program. This approach would be coupled with a strong cost-share and technical assistance program and low interest loans available for incentives for resource management.

6. Conservation performance bonus—This strategy provides incentives to producers who voluntarily apply and maintain conservation measures that meet USDA standards. It offers incentives to obtain benefits under federal programs but has no required cross compliance. Priority

would be given to resource areas where present conditions pose the greatest threat to future food and fiber production.

7. National resource contracts—Under this strategy, USDA would offer to purchase erosion reduction, irrigation water reductions, and other outputs of conservation from producers. The public would, in effect, buy special benefits from those who run, operate, or control private natural resources.

The meetings are being held under the Soil and Water Resources Conservation Act of 1977 (RCA). In RCA, Congress directed USDA to appraise the condition of the nation's renewable resources and to propose programs to guide future conservation activities of USDA.

As a result of RCA, three documents have been published that can be reviewed at USDA offices. These include Parts I and II of the appraisal and a summary of the appraisal, national conservation objectives, and alternative strategies.

The Department has set national objectives for reducing soil erosion and preserving prime farmlands, improving water quality, conserving water, improving fish and wildlife habitat, including the preservation of wetlands from destruction, reducing upstream flood damages, conserving energy and solving related resource

pression that the patrolman who was ill would be absent for long but that now his length of time to be absent was uncertain. Williams was told to draw up a new schedule under which other patrolmen would receive a share of the overtime presently available.

Councilmen Welch brought up several items which he had observed needed attention in town.

Among them was: painting all fire hydrants red; changing all non-regulation traffic signs to regulation size; installation of a city limits sign near Red Top Restaurant; the absence of several stop signs needed; changing the stop sign on the street leading from the library to a yield sign and the removal of the billboard near the railroad tracks on Richmond Street. On the latter item, the council decided to ascertain ownership of the sign and discuss it further at the next meeting.

Mr. Welch also reported that he had been in contact with the L&N Railroad concerning repairing the road over their tracks in town and that L&N had agreed to repair this as soon as possible.

And, handrails will be installed at the curbs at the corner of Main Street and Church St. In front of Hiatt's 5 & 10 and across the street from the post office on Main Street. Mr. Welch said he had talked to several businessmen and they all felt the rails were needed to assist people in getting up and down the sidewalks. The Council voted unanimously to have the handrails installed with city employees doing the work.

Narcotics Sniffing Dog Now Member of KSP Force

A narcotic sniffing dog, recently acquired by the Kentucky State Police, will be put through his paces next week in a special field demonstration planned for an audience of judges, attorneys, state legislators and other officials.

The demonstration, which will be held at the KSP Academy on Tuesday, February 12, starting at 10 a.m., will be conducted by KSP Narcotics Detective Vincent G. Noble and his new partner, a black Labrador retriever named "Dog."

Noble will demonstrate "Dog's" skills by searching out a variety of drugs which will be hidden in and around the academy area.

State Police Commissioner Kenneth E. Brandenburg and KSP Narcotics Commander, Lt. Lewis C. Babb, also will be on hand to explain the role which "Dog" will play in future KSP narcotic enforcement work.

"Dog" is one of two black Labradors just acquired by the KSP for narcotic search activities. Both were trained by the US Bureau of Customs at their training center in Front Royal, Va. Noble also is a graduate of the Front Royal training program.

According to Babb, both dogs were required to maintain a 100 percent success record in locating hidden drugs before

being certified by the US Customs training facility for work under real conditions in the field. Among the drugs they have been trained to detect are hashish, marijuana, heroin, opium and cocaine.

The demonstration at the academy will be open to the news media.

Senate Approves Divorce Law Bill

The Senate recently gave its approval to a House Bill which amends state divorce law so the 60-day waiting period for testimony applies only when there is controversy involving minor children.

Current law requires a 60-day wait in all cases involving children.

House Bill 42 was passed in the Senate after a floor amendment was approved. The amendment added the word "minor."

Without the amendment the waiting period could be mandatory even if the "child" was 38-years-old, said Sen. Clyde Middleton (R-Covington), who made the motion for the amendment.

In other action, the Senate passed a simple resolution approving appointment of Charles Cole as the director of the Administrative Office of the Courts.

SR 7 sponsor Sen. John Berry (D-New Castle) said Senate approval was made necessary under the Judicial Article which became effective state-wide in 1976.

Home Health Week is February 10-11

February 10-11 has been designated Home Health Week in Kentucky by Gov. John Y. Brown, Jr. and locally, County Judge Executive Hubert Thacker signed a proclamation recognizing the week in Rockcastle County.

Mrs. Betty Lewis, Social Services worker with the program, has written for us a background of the Home Health Agency in Rockcastle County and we are reprinting it here for your information.

Rockcastle County Home Health Agency is a branch of the Cumberland Valley District Health Department with the base office in Manchester. The local office has served this community since October of 1975 and, to date, has administered services to approximately 335 Rockcastle County residents.

Home Health services are rendered to individuals who are essentially homebound and, in accordance with their physician's recommendation, require nursing care, personal care, physical therapy, speech therapy, diet consultation, medical equipment, medical supplies or social services. Physicians specifically prescribe one or several of these services, depending on the needs of the patient.

Skilled and trained staff home to meet the needs specified by the physician. Any individual with a need for one or more of the available home health care services qualifies to be admitted as a home health patient.

Home care is not a substitute for hospitalization, extended-care facilities or nursing home care. It does complement these. Care is administered part-time with the skilled person staying only long enough to administer the required serv-

ices. This agency is certified by medical care standards to provide home health services to those who qualify. Payment for services is made by Medicare, Medicaid, the patient, his family or other health insurance. The method of payment is discussed with the patient and family during the first home health visit.

An auxiliary service provided by the Rockcastle County

Home Health Agency is medical transportation for county residents. The transportation vehicle is provided by this agency with a driver hired through the CETA (Comprehensive Employment Training Act) program.

Carter Won't Endorse Candidate for Congress

Rep. Tim Lee Carter has issued a statement repeating that he intends to endorse no candidate in the Republican primary this May for the seat in Congress he now holds.

"I do plan, of course, to campaign vigorously once that nominee is selected to insure that our Republican candidate is elected to Congress this fall."

Major Energy Assistance Program Funds Exhausted

With both of Kentucky's major energy assistance programs out of funds for this winter, where do people in need go for help?

State Department for Human Resources officials said today some assistance may be available from local agencies for the remainder of the winter.

Roy Butler of the department's Bureau for Social Insur-

ance suggests persons needing energy assistance check with local Community Action Agencies and other organizations.

Help from the department's Emergency Assistance Program is available on a limited basis to destitute families with children, Butler said. Unlike the two discontinued programs it is not designed to be used for energy assistance, he said.

Butler said the state paid more than \$22 million in energy assistance benefits to more than 80,000 households since December 1.

"The available funds for the state-funded Energy Cost Assistance Program and the Federal Energy Crisis Assistance Program have been exhausted for this winter," Butler said.

EKU Senior from Mt. Vernon Admitted into Nuclear Sub Program

The Navy has accepted an Eastern Kentucky University senior, Donald Ramsey of Mt. Vernon, Ky., into its nuclear propulsion collegiate program under which he will eventually become an officer on a nuclear submarine.

Ramsey, a chemistry major, is already in the Navy, which is paying him about \$750 a month until his graduation next December. He is also working on a minor in physics and mathematics.

After his graduation, he will attend officers school at Newport, R.I., for four months and be commissioned an ensign. Then he will be sent to a nuclear propulsion school at Orlando, Florida, for six months, following which he will be assigned to work on a prototype nuclear reactor another six months.

To gain acceptance into the Navy's collegiate program, Ramsey underwent intense technical and personal interviews, including an interview in

Washington, D.C., with Admiral Hyman Rickover.

Ramsey said he entered the Navy's collegiate program because it prepares participants for careers in the nation's defense as well as, possibly later, in nuclear industry. He advised other qualified students to consider the program and, for further information on it, to contact Lieutenant Robert Young of the Louisville Naval Recruiting

District.

Ramsey is the second EKU student to enter the nuclear propulsion program through the Louisville District which recruits from more than 20 colleges in Kentucky, West Virginia and Indiana. The first was Richard Goodpasture, Richmond, also a senior.

Ramsey is the son of Mr. and Mrs. William R. Ramsey, Rt. 3, Mt. Vernon.

Super Living

DUMP CAKE

- This recipe is being reprinted by request.
- 1 can pie filling (any fruit type)
- 1 can crushed pineapple
- 1 box any flavor cake mix
- 1 1/2 sticks margarine, sliced thinly
- 1/2 c walnuts, chopped
- 1/4 c cup flaked coconut

Spread the pie filling in a 9x13 inch glass pan. Scatter the pineapple over the fruit mixture. Sprinkle the dry cake mix evenly in a layer over this. Drop slices of margarine over the cake mix. Scatter nuts and coconut on top. Do not stir. Bake at 350 degrees for 40 minutes or until cake is done and lightly brown. Serve plain or with ice cream.

Pork Chop Dinner

- 3 T. butter
- 2 medium onions
- 6 medium potatoes, peel and cut into 1 inch pieces
- 6 medium carrots, cut into 1 inch pieces
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 8 oz. chaps
- 1 envelope shake 'n' bake seasoning for pork

Melt butter in oven in 13x9 inch baking dish. Cut each onion into 8 wedges. Toss vegetables in melted butter in dish until evenly coated. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Cover with aluminum foil and bake at 425 degrees for 15 minutes. Then coat chops as directed. Place chop in single layer on top of partially cooked vegetables. Continue to bake uncovered for 40 to 45 minutes, or until chops and vegetables are tender.

Country-Styled Ribs

- 2 pounds pork back ribs, cut into serving pieces
- 1 envelope shake 'n' bake for pork
- 1 can (30 oz) peach halves, drained on top
- 1 large baking apples, peeled, cored and cut into rings

Coat ribs with shake and bake. Save remaining mixture for apples. Arrange ribs in single layer on rack in an ungreased shallow baking pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes. Sprinkle peach halves or apple rings with remaining coating mix. Place in baking pan with pork and bake 30 to 40 minutes longer, or until pork is done. Makes 4 servings.

Since times have changed so much lately especially for women, I thought I would give you some information on Estate Planning and Property Rights in Kentucky.

Everyone who is 18 years old in the state of Kentucky should make a will. Why? Here are a few reasons:

1. By Kentucky law when a husband or wife dies, without a will, the surviving spouse shall have an absolute estate in one half of the surplus real estate and personal property shall devolve in the following order: To his or her children and their descendants. If none then to his or her father and mother equal parts to each. If none, to his or her brothers and sisters. If none then to the more remote kin.

You can make your own will as it is better than none. Or you can have a lawyer make you one. With you telling him what you want done with your property, for a fee. The amount of the fee is usually based on the amount of property owned.

To write your own will, you need to:

1. Make your statement as clear cut and simple as possible.
2. Date the will properly.
3. Either write or type the will but it is better for it to be hand-written.
4. Don't leave alterations or corrections in the final copy if changes are necessary. Re-copy the alterations or corrections changed.
5. Use a single page if possible. When more sheets are used put your signature on every page and fasten the pages securely together.
6. Have your will properly signed and witnessed. Wills that are hand-written are called holographic wills and are usually accepted even though not witnessed but acceptance is more certain when the will is properly witnessed.

Everyone should have a will no matter how little of value you own. This is for your family as well as yourself. In saying who is to have what. For more information write the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture, Cooperative Extension Service, Lexington, Ky. Ask for booklet

entitled "Property Rights in Kentucky, Estate Planning, Property Owners and Rights. These are free. Give your correct address and allow about four weeks for their return.

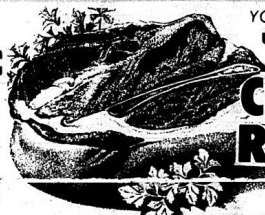

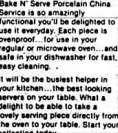

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Seven year famine to strike in 1982

The Lord has caused me to know we are going to have a seven year famine.

One night I was praying. I asked the Lord to give me something I could tell my son, so he could believe these articles I had been writing in the local papers. My wife and I were going to leave early the next morning to go and visit with him and his family. When I went to bed I couldn't go to sleep. The Spirit started impressing on me to tell him about the famine, but I didn't know anything about a famine. I know when I was on a fast a year ago, the Spirit was on me impressing on me to grow food and store against an emergency. But I didn't know what the emergency was. But as I lay there in bed, this famine kept getting stronger. This was November 10, 1979. I got up at 2:00 A.M. and prayed over my Bible and when it fell open the verse I looked down on was Gen. 41:19, and Pharaoh was telling Joseph about the seven thin kine he had seen in his dream. And Joseph went ahead and told him it meant seven years of famine. So that confirmed beyond any doubt that we were going to have a famine. And I wondered how long it would last, not seven years, maybe a year or two. But some way this seven years I had read wasn't going away. But we went on to our sons. I told him about the famine coming, but he couldn't believe it. He said it had always rained and it always would. But keep in mind, I asked the Lord to show me something he could believe. So, I believe when the famine comes he will be able to believe, if he doesn't before then.

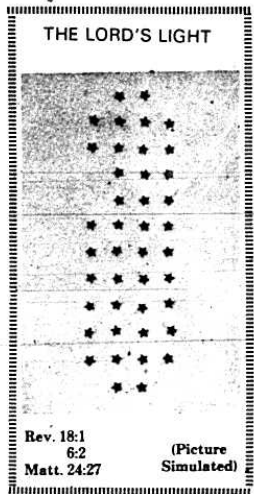
Now just because you don't believe in this I am writing now, that doesn't mean you won't believe in it when the famine comes. If my son can believe you can too, if you want to. I know after the famine comes it is too late to get ready for the famine. But it won't be too late to get ready for the Lord. The Bible talks about a famine coming before the coming of the Lord and it talks

about it in different places. Isaiah 13:9 says "Behold the day of the Lord cometh, cruel both with wrath and fierce anger, to lay the land desolate, and he shall destroy the sinners thereof

out of it." And then it says in Zachariah 13:8, "And it shall come to pass that in all the land, saith the Lord, two parts therein shall be cut off and die, but the third shall be left therein."

I saw the light of the Lord. This light is the one in Rev. 18:1. It was prophesied that it would come down. The Lord gave me a vision. It was September 29, 1978. I saw this light. It was a group of stars and I walked in this light. It was alive. It felt real good. It went right through me and it felt good inside, too. It was so beautiful I couldn't take my eyes off it unless it told me to.

Now Rev. 6:2 tells what this light is and in Rev. 5:8 tells who sent it down. In Dan. 12:10, the first half of that verse tells who it

comes to. When it speaks there of many, it is not talking of many in one church. But as many churches having one. Now Noah was one and Abraham was one. But the Lord has many. See the light.

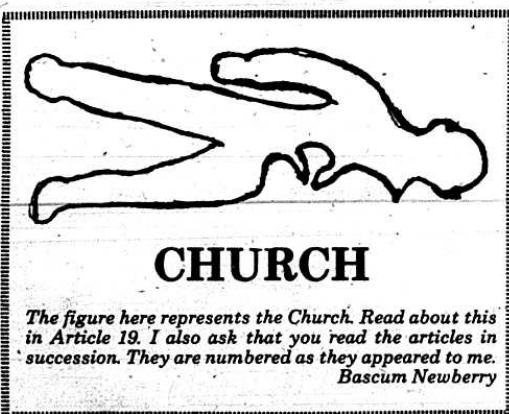
Dan. 9:27 tells why it comes down and how long it will last.

ake those days shall be shortened." And the time this is talking about is Dan. 12:12 and Rev. 14:13. To understand what Dan. 12:12 is talking about you will need to read Rev. 14:13. Read Dan. 8:12, 13:14.

We came home from our sons late Sunday night and were reading our Bible before going to bed. I was sitting in the living room, my wife was sitting at the kitchen table. She said, "I want to read you about the seals." Now the Lord had really impressed on me about the White Horse Seal. I read that seal in March of 1978 and something happened to me when I read it. I jumped up and called a friend and told him it had either been opened or it was just ready to be, and asked him to find out all he could about it. And nearly every time I read my Bible that Spring and Summer, I would turn and read about the seals. They were like a magnet to me, and I would say, to my wife at least once a week, (quote) "When the Lord was here before He gave His people, the Jews, about 3 1/2 years' ministry. Do you think He will give the Gentiles any more than that?" (end of quote) I didn't know why I was saying this.

But getting back to the famine, and my wife at the kitchen table. I said O. K. She started reading Rev. 6:1, and when she got down to that eighth verse and started reading about people being killed with sword, and with hunger, and with beasts, I knew beasts were afraid of people, and as long as there was anything in the woods and fields they would not kill man. And it seemed to me as she read that the only thing that was left, was flesh eaters. I could see it had been dry a long time.

So I started thinking and looking for seven years of famine here in the end times. I ran a reference to Dan. 9:27, "And He shall confirm the covenant with many for one week; and in the midst of the week he shall cause the sacrifice and the oblation to cease, and for the overspreading of abominations He shall make it desolate, even with the consummation and that determined shall be poured upon the desolate." Now this week it talks about is week of years. Seven years. And after the first 3 1/2 years our worship of God is going to be hampered. Now I don't know how to explain this. Oblation was a gift for the

priests to eat. Read Lev. 2:3, Num. 31:28. Sacrifice was for their sins. So our prayers replaces that. It is hard to comprehend not being able to get a prayer answered, and then in this 27th verse it tells why the famine is coming. It says for the overspreading of abominations (SIN) he shall make it desolate (DRY) even until the consummation (END). Now this week is split in two parts. And between these two halves is 1,290 days, Dan. 12:11, that are not counted. This is the Red Horse Seal (Rev. 6:4). This seal will be opened in March of 1982 according to Dan. 12. The famine will start soon after this seal is opened, and it will continue through the Black Horse Seal (Rev. 6:5). The mark of the beast will come soon after the Black Horse Seal is opened. Read Dan. 12:12 and Rev. 14:13 again. Now the way we count time, Daniel, Chapter 12, counted three periods of time. I believe the White, the Red and the Black Horse Seals represent these three periods of time. I believe seals #4, 5, and 6, are what Dan. 9:27 calls consummation, and it says the consummation is poured upon the desolate. That is they are opened during the third seal.

In Rev. 9, it talks about the bottomless pit being opened and locusts come upon the earth. And in the fourth verse it says, "And it was commanded them that they should not hurt the grass of the earth, neither any green thing, neither any tree; but only those men which have not the seal of God in their foreheads." So we see there is going to be some green grass someplace.

Now you may say a famine like this is awful. And it is bad looking at it from the human side. But looking at it from the spiritual side, it is a great blessing. There is one thing for sure, the Lord is coming but people don't believe it. So this famine is coming so people can believe and get ready. And when you are ready to meet the Lord and start thinking about eternity, then death is just the door you escape through.

I know some will say the Lord will take care of me. I'm not going to worry about the famine. To you I say: this is to take care of you, to warn those that believe to get ready.

Rev. 11:1, talks about a reed. This reed is to measure Godliness in the church.

The rod it talks about is a rod of correction.

Rev. 11:2, is telling how the Gentiles will react to Rev. 18:1, and Rev. 6:2.

When I had finished all these articles, I wondered if the Lord was pleased with all of them. So I took each one and laid them on the altar and let them hang partly off. Then I prayed and asked the Lord to let any He didn't like fall off on the floor during the night so I would know not to use those. I went to bed but I couldn't sleep sound. I got up and prayed, but I still wasn't sleeping just right. I was wondering if I should put a note in this and say I didn't really know who would speak to me at different times. I wondered whether it was the Lord or an angel. So around five in the morning, I got up and prayed over my Bible and when it fell open I looked down on this passage.

Acts 18:2, "The former treatise have I made O Theophilus, of all that Jesus began both to do and teach."

"Until the day in which he was taken up after that he through the Holy Ghost had given commandments unto the Apostles whom He had chosen."

But I wonder about one vision I had. I had read a book and this writer said the keeping of the Sabbath Day had not been done away with. So I wondered about that. So that night when I prayed I asked the Lord if it pleased him to show me which day we were supposed to keep or should we keep both. So up in the night I had this vision. A voice said, "My Son was just a small child and grew up."

Our Women

I was driving down the highway and the Lord gave me a vision. I saw a woman step behind her husband and I was caused to know as long as she stayed behind him she was hid from the wiles of the Devil. But if she stepped out and made herself equal with him, then she had no protection from the Devil.

The Lord loves our women. His mother was a woman.

You see, I didn't know why the Lord said in I Cor. 14:34, and I Tim. 2:11, for

posed to pray for her. So I just raised my hands above my head and with my mouth closed (like unto Matt. 6:6), I prayed down deep in my heart where the secret closet is and where the Spirit of the Lord is. I said, Lord grant the power to heal this cancer. In Jesus' Name. And with my right hand still in the air, I laid my left hand on top of her head. She took her right hand and touched herself. She jumped up in the air and hollered, "It is gone." She was just hitting herself and jumping up and down and hollering, it is gone, it is gone. Now you listen to this. There was a preacher standing on the platform and ran over to the edge when he saw this going on. He reached down and put his hand on her forehead and prayed out loud. He asked the Lord to heal her, but the Lord had already healed her. Now I know there is a big battle going on in the spirit world. And I wondered about this. There were about 200 people there that day. The Lord had healed this woman by His doctrine (Matt. 6:6) of praying in secret. Then there came the spirit of the devil and tried to steal it away with his doctrine of praying out loud. I tell you it is going to get hot.

And speaking of how to pray, in Psalms 141:3, David said, "Set a watch. O Lord before my mouth, keep the door of my lips." But when the Lord came (Matt. 6:6) he said shut the door before you pray.

And speaking of this period of time that we now live in (St. Luke 17:26), the Lord gave us some signs to go by in St. Luke 17:27 to prove to ourself: By the things that are going on at our house and in our com-

munity, that we can just look around and see the things that are happening and know we are living in the last time. The first sign it gives us — "They Did Eat" — Now this is saying, they really eat. There is something different about our eating. So, let us see. We eat out a lot more. Look at all the new restaurants. We are doing more eating than we are working. And too, we have people that won't work. They are money poor. But their table is set with packaged food to eat — their biggest health problem is they are overweight.

Then it said, "They Drank". When I used to read that I thought it meant alcohol. But when the Lord showed me this I looked at myself. I was drinking orange juice, coffee, Coke, tea, milk, Kool-Aid — you know, I'll go for days and not drink water. We have changed our eating and drinking habits.

Then it said, "They married wives." "They were given in marriage" — this is saying we had two kinds of marriages in the days of Noah. And in these days that we live in, called days of the Son of Man, we have the regular marriage where they are given into it. They promise to love each other and to protect that bond for as long as they both shall live.

But this other marriage is speaking of more than one wife. This is talking about these people that just move in and live with each other. There is no strings attached. While they are living with one they are thinking about another. When they get tired of one, they just move in with another. Only twice in

Get Ready

Article 7 — Sept. 27, 1979

The mark of the beast is coming soon, and people are not ready.

When the Lord came to earth, He healed their sick, cast out devils and did many works and the people seeing the hand of God working in their midst took courage and had faith.

And they were not afraid of death. But that was a long time ago, and our churches no longer believe in the power of God, as they should.

People's faith must be raised again.

The Lord provided a way for His people. I showed this in the article, if any was sick, how the Lord said to call for the elders of the church and let them pray over them (James 5:14). You should read that article.

Now if you were a serious minded Christian, and you got sick, you may have sent out to find some of

those elders that I talked about. Elders who met the qualifications in Titus 1:5 through 9, who have been ordained by the church, who have been set over the church, who believe in praying for the sick, and who anoint with oil. I sure hope you weren't very sick, for I haven't found a church with elders like that.

I don't know how it happened, but somehow church people got the idea that if they laid their hand on someone and prayed for them that they would have to have enough faith to heal them. I don't know where this demon stuff came from.

Look at James 5:14-15. "And let them pray over him, anointing him with oil in the name of the Lord. And the prayer of faith shall save the sick, and the Lord shall raise him up. And if he has committed sins, they shall be forgiven him." You see, the Lord is saying if you believe I am Lord and that I am able;

then you pray over your sick and anoint them with oil in my name and I'll raise them up. You see, if you could have enough faith to heal him, you could forgive sins.

The Lord said to Paul, my strength is made perfect through weakness. So just lay your hands on them, believing the Lord is able. Don't try to put any strength of your own in it. The Lord sees the thought on your heart.

If you pray out loud, He will not get healed. Try this and see.

I was at a church and a child with a birth defect came up to be prayed for and the whole church prayed. But the child didn't get healed. I was amazed at this. It affected me so much that the Lord gave me a vision of this. In this vision I was standing in the middle of the church, looking at the altar. I could see this child there and I could see all of us around her. I was

in the group, too. But when they started praying, I got confused and couldn't pray. But I didn't worry about that. Everyone else seemed to be doing O.K. So here I was watching us in that vision. And as I watched this, there was a man standing at the end of the altar to my left. He watched us real close until we started praying and then he turned his head. I just knew if he wouldn't turn his head that child would get healed. I saw this vision three times. And afterwards, I was caused to know it was the Lord. But I didn't know why he would turn his head. The first time I saw this it said, when an innocent child comes up before a church and the whole church prays for it and the child doesn't get healed, there is something bad wrong with that church.

The second time it said something terrible is wrong. Well, I had been amazed that the child was not getting healed, but I

still didn't know what was wrong. The next day I took my Bible and just set it on my knee and let it fall open. The passage I looked down on was Matt. 6:6, and that is when I found out that we are supposed to pray in secret. Then I turned to see what the Lord had said when He raised Lazarus from the dead (St. John 11:41) "And Jesus lifted His eyes and said, Father I thank thee that thou hast heard me." Before this crippled child came along the Lord was giving me visions. I would stand in the front of a church and the Lord would have them to pray. There would not be a whisper in the whole church. He did this three or four times but I wasn't getting it.

the history of the human race has sin dropped to this low ebb, where this kind of sin could be practiced out in the open and be accepted by the public as being their own business.

When I first saw this vision, I was on a high mountain. This mountain was beautiful. It was grassy like a lawn. When I got to the top, there was some trees on my left. They represented the world. And there was three people under these trees. One of them represented a mountain some way. It must have been the Spirit of God. And when I got even with them they pointed their finger to Heaven and said, "The light went out, but it is shining now." I looked up to see what they were pointing at. I saw two things up there. They seemed to be so pure and precious. They were reddish pink. With what looked like powders on them. They were a long ways off. The biggest was about two or three feet wide and about eight or ten feet long. The other one was about three fourths as large. I was caused to know that I was looking at the bottom of the thrones of God, and of our Lord, and

seven months later, I was caused to know that the white on the thrones was the Holy Ghost. But before the Lord showed me about the Holy Ghost, the Lord had called a 21-day fast. I fasted 21 days. I came off that fast in January, 1979. After this fast was over, the Lord would show me people in the spirit world from time to time, and I had seen this white on people. It was on the blood and I thought it was a decoration.

I went to a church several years and before I quit going there, it had got to where all their preachers it seemed, when they would read the Bible and come to the words "Holy Ghost", they would stop and say or Holy Spirit. And I didn't feel like they should do that. Now I know it was a mistake.

But as I looked at these thrones, there was a beautiful light started shining from another direction. And I turned to look at it. And it was a group of stars. That is it you see in the upper right corner. This light seemed to be in the West. So here I stood with this light shining on me. And it really felt good.

I didn't know why it looked so good and why it felt so good, but about six months later I was caused to know it was alive.

But I knew this light represented the family of God. I also knew the power was going from the thrones to this family and causing it to shine brighter than any star.

Now remember, I am talking about a vision I'm seeing. I was caused to know one of those stars represented me. And I knew I wasn't pure like that, so I didn't know hardly what to think.

I had seen this family on the ground two months before this. And they were dark then. And there was a cloud up over them at that time about 200 feet above them. And the wheels that carry away sins and healing stayed in that cloud.

But I couldn't praise Him down inside me anymore. He was in my neck. And as this came on up in my neck, I couldn't tell if I was praising Him or not. Then I was caused to know I was and that the Lord and I were the only

ones that knew about it.

You know I have found out the Lord can just do anything. But I have never got over being amazed when it happens.

Now about two months after I saw this vision, the Spirit got on me real strong to find out when the light went out. So I started around telling people about this vision. Then I would ask when the light went out and I couldn't find anyone that knew it was out. So I figured anything this strong the Lord must have said something about it. I got a red letter Bible and started looking. Sure enough, I got over to St. John 9:5, and the Lord said, "As long as I am in the world, I am the light of the world." And in St. John 12:35, then Jesus said unto them, "Yet a little while is the light with you." And in 12:36, "While ye have light, believe in the light."

This is between the light and outer-darkness. Now you can prove this to yourself. Look at the Word. It says the wife has made herself ready. Now this is talking about a special effort. (Rev. 19:7)

And, too, if the wife was doing the Lord's will, why in the world did the Lord send that strong angel in Rev. 18:1, down with His light, which is understanding, to prepare a group of people, Dan. 12:10, and purify them and make them white to confirm His covenant, Dan. 9:27. Now if the wife is already doing the Lord's Commandments then someone needs to get

word to this angel. For he has been down here working for over 10 months.

Now Acts 5:32 says God gives the Holy Ghost to them that obey. And Mark 16:17, 18, says "And these signs shall follow them that believe. In my name shall they cast out devils, they shall speak with new tongues, they shall take up serpents, and if they drink

any deadly thing it shall not hurt them; they shall lay hands on the sick and they shall recover. I want to say right here and now, don't you handle no snakes or drink any deadly poison. The Lord gave me a vision two or three weeks ago. And as this spirit was leaving it said, "When the Lord made that statement He was in the spirit."

And then He showed me the love He had towards me. I tell you that was the

deepest love I had ever felt. I know the Word teaches that the Lord loved us so much that He died and shed His blood that we might be free. But we were sinners then. He loves us more now.

I also saw this dagger. It was red and about 1/2 inch long.

May the Lord's love touch you.

Devil's Chain

Article 13 — Jan. 1980
